

### Sorghum Storage Shortage in Prospect

Martin stated on Monday that the Passes Here pre-fabricated grain bins shipped in by the Commodity Credit Corporation during the wheat harvest were already being snapped up by alert tarmers who had considered the possibility of encountering the "no space" sign at the elevators when the sorghum crops begin to roll.

At present, he stated, there are probably 75" bins in the county which may be purchased from the CCC and installed on the farms for use in storing the grain sorghums Large and small bins are available in Friona and Bovina, while only the small ones are on hand in Farwell, Martin said, adding that he planned to order more large bins to be delivered locally.
