I still can't understand why the ball goes in one direction, even though you're aiming in another. DON'T want the ball to go; then you could be right on.
Hhhmmmm, that's a thought. from veteran golfers: blame it on the ball. You see, it's not my fault that the ball trickles down the fairway or gets lost in the tundra - it's
