This is a particularly pleasant season for me in that I enjoy watching a good college football game.

Deep into the gridiron season, these are the times when each contest between the football super-powers takes on added importance. Who will be No. 1?

As I write this, Iowa and Ohio State still have to go head-to-head. Here's my pick: Ohio State 21, Iowa 20. Now let's see how close I was.

Although I am not a college alumni, I have my favorite teams. I attended the University of Illinois for two years; thus, I have always rooted for them.

I was fortunate to be at the U of I when a fellow named Dick Butkus enrolled. He lived in Chicago about two miles from me. He went to a nearby vocational high school and his fame was already spreading.

A cousin of his went to school with me and alerted me to his future greatness. Butkus was one heckuva football player, he informed us.

So Butkus and I arrived in college as freshmen. In those days, freshmen were not allowed to play college football so he wasn't part of the varsity that year. The team, which was undergoing a transition from a longtime coach who had just retired (the famous Ray Eliot) to a new, young coach (Pete Elliott, now director of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio), did not win a game my first year there.

After the season was completed, it came time for the varsity to play the freshmen in their annual scrimmage. The freshmen, led by Butkus, creamed them. It was something else.

Then came the sophomore year, and Butkus was playing middle linebacker, was on the kickoff return team, and centered the ball in crucial offensive situations.

The crucial couple of games were lost by the Fighting Illini. Then came a road game at Purdue which the Butkus-led squad won.

I'll never forget that day. Downtown Champaign, home of the university, went berserk. People crying and laughing and having a good time. It was a long bus ride back from Lafayette, Ind., so the Illini didn't arrive home until about 8 p.m.

When the buses came back, they were directed straight to Memorial Stadium where an estimated 10,000 students had gone to congratulate them. That was an inspiring sight that night.

Illinois finished with another win or so that year. But it was a prelude to Butkus's junior year when he led them to the Big 10 title and a Rose Bowl win. Of course, Illinois had other great players, too. Remember any of these players who went on to pro football careers: fullback Jim Grabowski, tackle Archie Sutton, guard Greg Schumacher, defensive back Ron Acks and quarterback Mike Taliaferro?

After his junior year, Butkus finished third in the voting for the Heisman Award, the top honor given a college football athlete. I believe at that time, it was the top finish ever made by a player other than a quarterback, halfback, fullback or end. No defensive player had ever come in that high.

I also got to watch Butkus play as a Chicago Bear while I lived in Northern Indiana. Until he hurt his knees, he was the best player in the game, as far as I was concerned.

The Bears, in the late 1960s, were not a very good team. Papa Bear, George Halas, simply didn't have the money to keep the top stars, and the ball club also lacked a decent quarterback. But that didn't stop Butkus. He played to win.

I'll never forget one pro game where the Bears were behind by 17 points with less than one minute to play - and the other team had the ball.

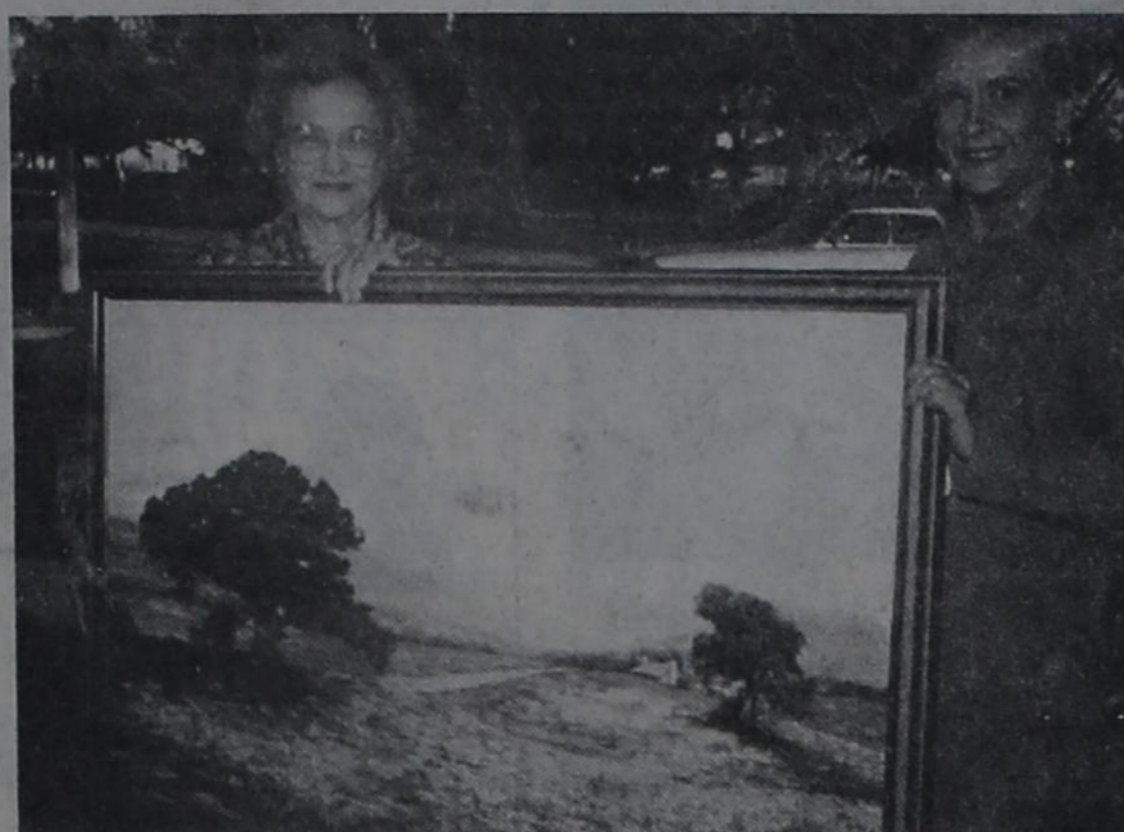
That's the time when you pack it up, right? Obviously, it's impossible to win so you just shrug your shoulders and accept the loss, right?

In that last minute, Butkus, the defensive captain, called three timeouts.

He wanted that ball so his team could have another shot.

To me, that's a football player.

Parmer, Bailey counties go along with state

Parmer County voters went along with the statewide results on the two important water plan issues, considered crucial to Texas' future.

Statewide, voters approved Proposition I by a 74 percent margin. It authorizes issuing \$980 million in bonds for construction of reservoirs, pipelines, treatment plants and flood control projects. In Parmer, the vote was 629 for and 111 against. In Bailey, the vote was 533 for and 65 against.

Voters approved Proposition 2 across the state by a 70 percent margin. It is aimed at reducing water use by farmers and would authorize \$200 million in bonds for low-interest loans for farm equipment that would reduce water usage. In Parmer, the vote was 613 for and 127 against. In Bailey, the vote was 810 to 134.

Every constitutional amendment on the ballot Tuesday was approved by Texas voters. Here are the Parmer and Bailey results:

No. 3 - Authorize Legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds for relocating or replacing water laterals on

private property. Parmer - 336 for, 342 against; Bailey - 289 for, 258 against.

No. 4 - Authorizes proceeds for land sales dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund. Parmer - 395 for, 293 against; Bailey - 354 for, 201 against.

No. 5 - Authorizes Legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts. Parmer - 182 for, 482 against; Bailey - 222 for, 325 against.

No. 6 - Permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement. Parmer - 440 for, 226 against; Bailey - 374 for, 186 against.

No. 7 - Authorizes Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts. Parmer - 365 for, 222 against; Bailey - 319 for, 164 against.

No. 8 - Provides \$500 million in additional bonding authority for veterans housing assistance, etc. Parmer - 362 for, 305 against. Bailey

He said about 130 boxes will be added. Currently, there is a waiting list of about 25 persons for boxes.

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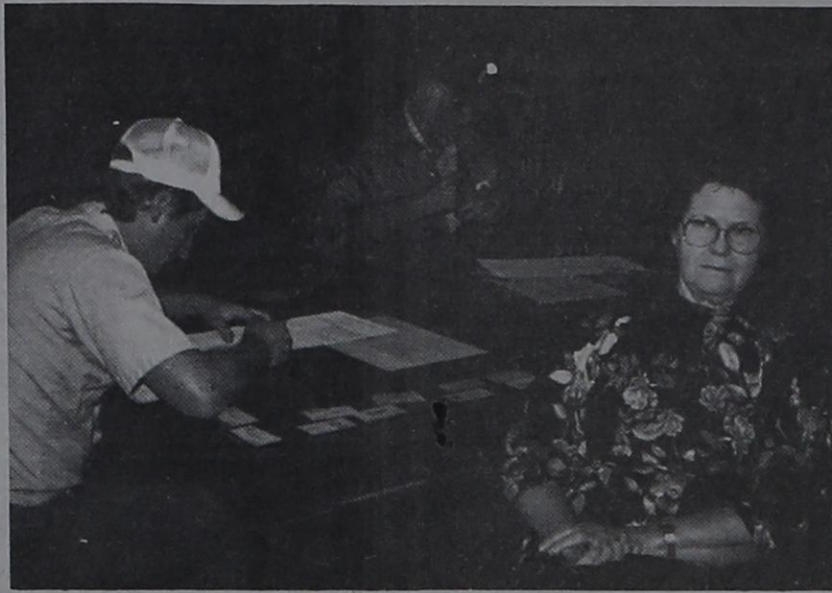

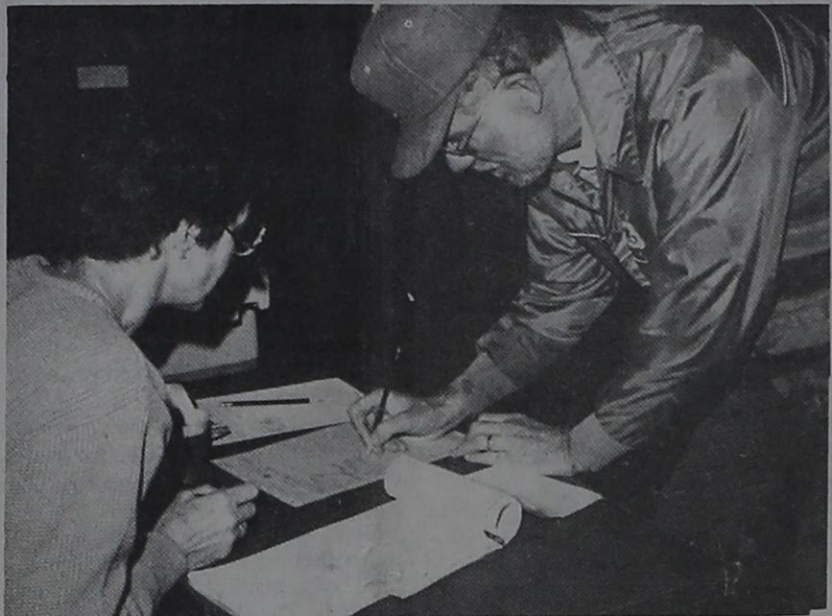

Election procedures changed

On Oct. 29, the Parmer County Committeemen of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District met to discuss the upcoming January election, changes that are necessary in the election procedures to comply with House Bill 332 and other matters of interest to the committeemen.

Election years beginning with 1988, and that counties in Precincts No. 1, No. 2 and No. 5 will elect committeemen in the even-numbered years between Presidential election years beginning in 1986.

Currently, Parmer County residents are represented on the county committee by: Billy Lynn Marshall of Bovina; Jerry London, John R. Cook and Robert Gallman, all of Friona; and Wendol Christian of Farwell.

In its action, the Board stated that the purpose of these changes was to re-establish staggered and overlapping terms in office for committeemen.

During the meeting, staff members informed the committeemen that in order to comply with legislation passed during the last legislative session, changes would need to be made in the years in which the committeemen were elected.

Additionally, the staff discussed the up-coming general election on November 5 and information concerning the passage of Constitutional Amendments No. 1 and No. 2, and staff activities related to supporting the passage of these amendments as well as other programs and activities of the District.

The staff explained that on August 5, the District Board of Directors approved an amendment to Rule 4, which modifies current election policies. This rule states that beginning in 1986, each county shall elect committeemen only in years when District Directors are chosen for the District Director's Precinct in which the county lies. The amendment to this rule states that counties in Precincts No. 3 and No. 4 will elect committeemen in Presidential

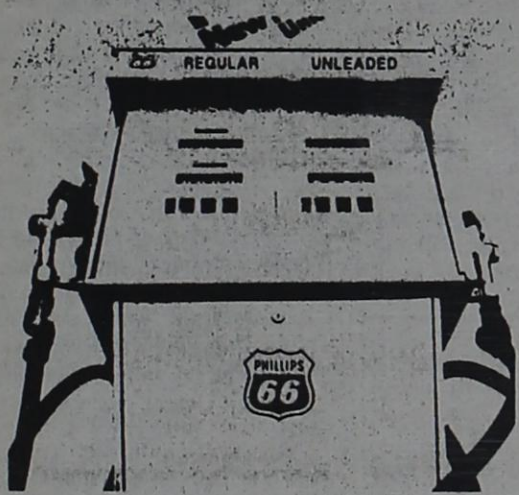

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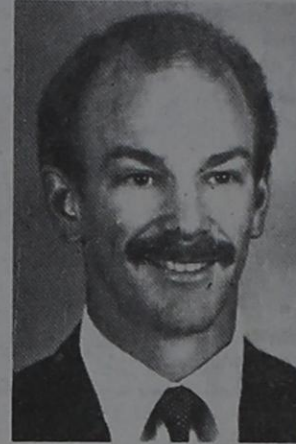

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Lady Spikers win district tournament

Texico's Lady Spikers took a leap into the New Mexico Class A Regional Volleyball Tournament by winning District 6-A last weekend. Texico, which wasn't seeded No. 1 or 2 this year in district, won four straight games to take the district crown. To do so, they defeated No. 1 ranked Tatum, 15-12, 11-15, 13-15, 15-8 and 15-6, to avenge an earlier loss.

The regional tournament will be held at Texico Saturday.

The first-round games, Texico plays Grady, District 7-A runner-ups, at 1 p.m. (all times MST). Tatum plays San Jon, District 7-A champs, at 3 p.m. The contest for third place will be at 6 p.m., with the

championship tilt at 8 p.m. In the district tourney, Texico led off with a win over Floyd, then a defeat of Melrose. Thursday night, they topped No. 2 seeded Elida 15-8, 4-15, 13-15, 15-9 and 15-12. Then came the win over Tatum. The win over Floyd was easiest -- in three sets, 15-12, 15-4 and 15-6.

"We got behind 6-0 before we got started. But once we got started, we hit on all cylinders. Everyone had a good night," said Coach Michael Littlejohn.

On Oct. 30, Texico played Melrose. "It was a very close match until the fourth and fifth games. This match was nip and tuck all the way," said Littlejohn.

"Kelly Lynn, Helen Jo Boarman, Coy Jo Burk and Twilla Longo all had good nights at the net. Lynn had 14 kills while Boarman had 8 kills and Burk, 5. Longo was a factor to be reckoned with in getting 13 blocks and 3 kills. Loretta Gonzales had another super night setting. Gonzales and Lynn both were perfect in serving on the night. Lynn was 22 for 22 and Gonzales was 19 for 19. Lynn, Burk, McDonald and Boarman all did a great job passing," said Littlejohn.

Then came the Elida match. "We started out red-hot, winning 15-8. Then we kind of stumbled, losing games two and three, 4-15 and 13-15. "Facing elimination we fought back and won a 15-9 decision. Then everything seemed to fall apart. Elida took a 12-3 lead before

we began to fight back. With everyone doing their job, Burk was able to serve 10 in a row as we made a miraculous comeback, winning 15-12," said Littlejohn. "As a team we served 91% and we also had 41 kills and 28 blocks."

Another very close match was with Tatum.

We came out fired up, taking a 15-12 win in the first game. Tatum came right back, taking games two and three, 15-11 and 15-13. Just as soon as it seemed we were run down and exhausted from the tough week, the girls reached down and came storming back to take games four and five, 15-8 and 15-6," he said.

"Lynn and Boarman led the way with 20 and 12 kills, respectively. Gonzales had 42 assists. Longo had another super night, getting 15

blocks. McDonald did a good job spiking. Robin Pierce came in as she did all week and gave us a super effort from the serving line and back court. This was the second year in a row that we won the district tournament," said Littlejohn.

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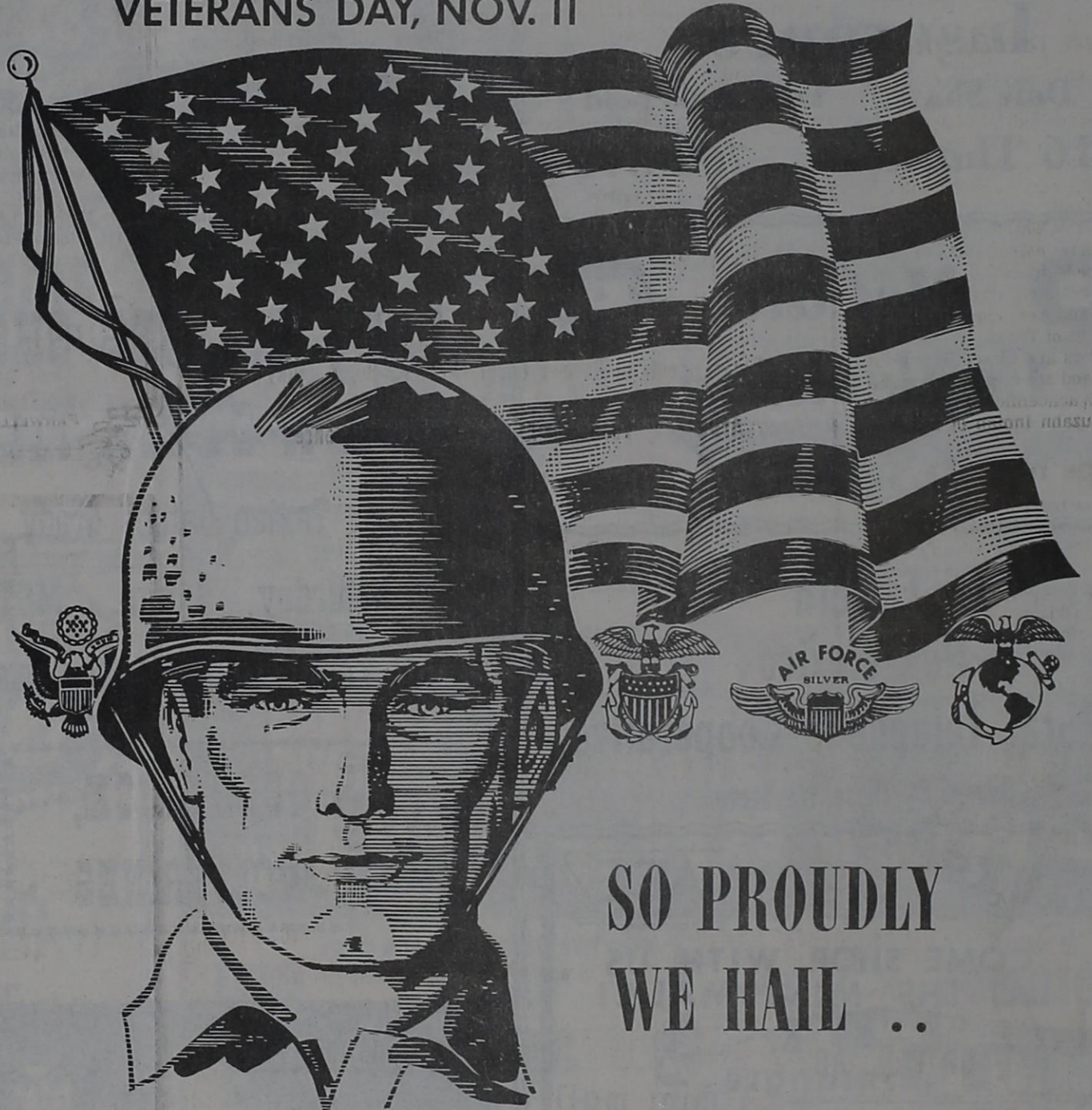

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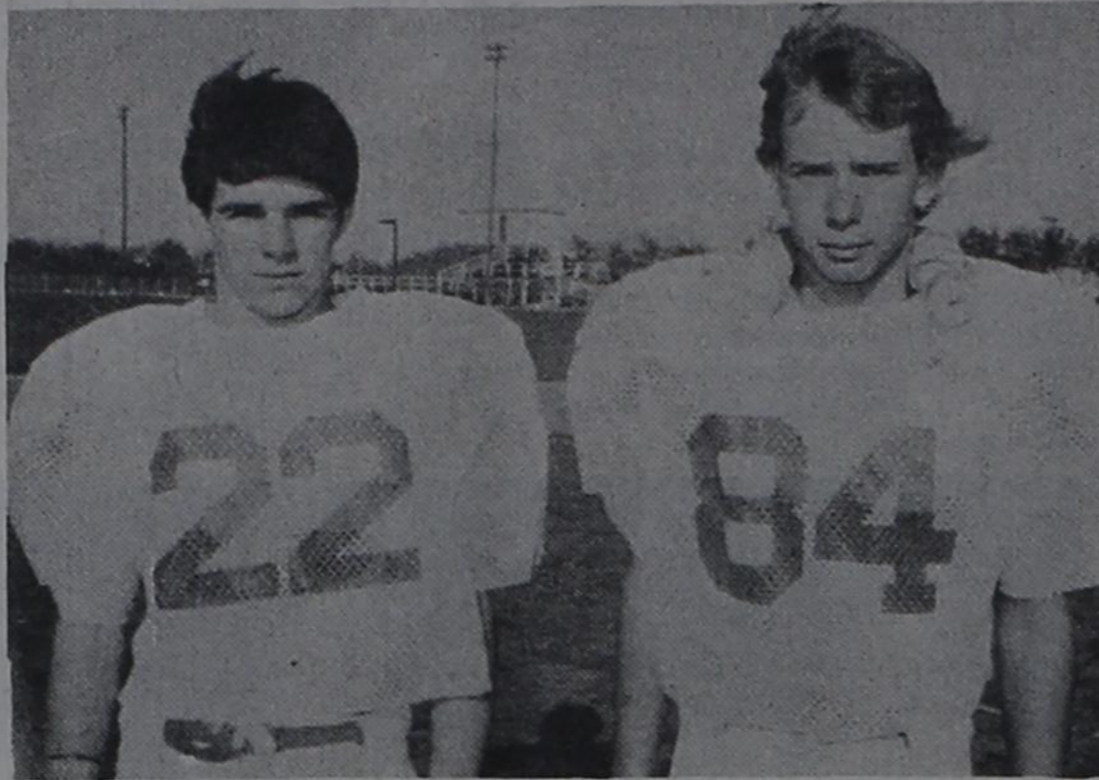

Texico's Wolverines overcame adversity to blank Fort Sumner last Friday at home, 30-0, and capture a semifinal spot in the state playoffs. The win was accomplished without halfbacks Charlie Bibbs and Stanley Cross, who are injured. Bibbs is expected to play tonight. Texico, the District 2-A runnerup to Tatum, hosts District 1-A champion Reserve at 6:30 p.m. MST tonight. The winner will play for the New Mexico Class A championship against the winner of the Tatum-Carrizozo game. A major key to Texico's win over Fort Sumner was the play of Mark Meeks, who was moved from offensive center to running back. He gained 175 yards on 16 carries. they were weak rebounding.

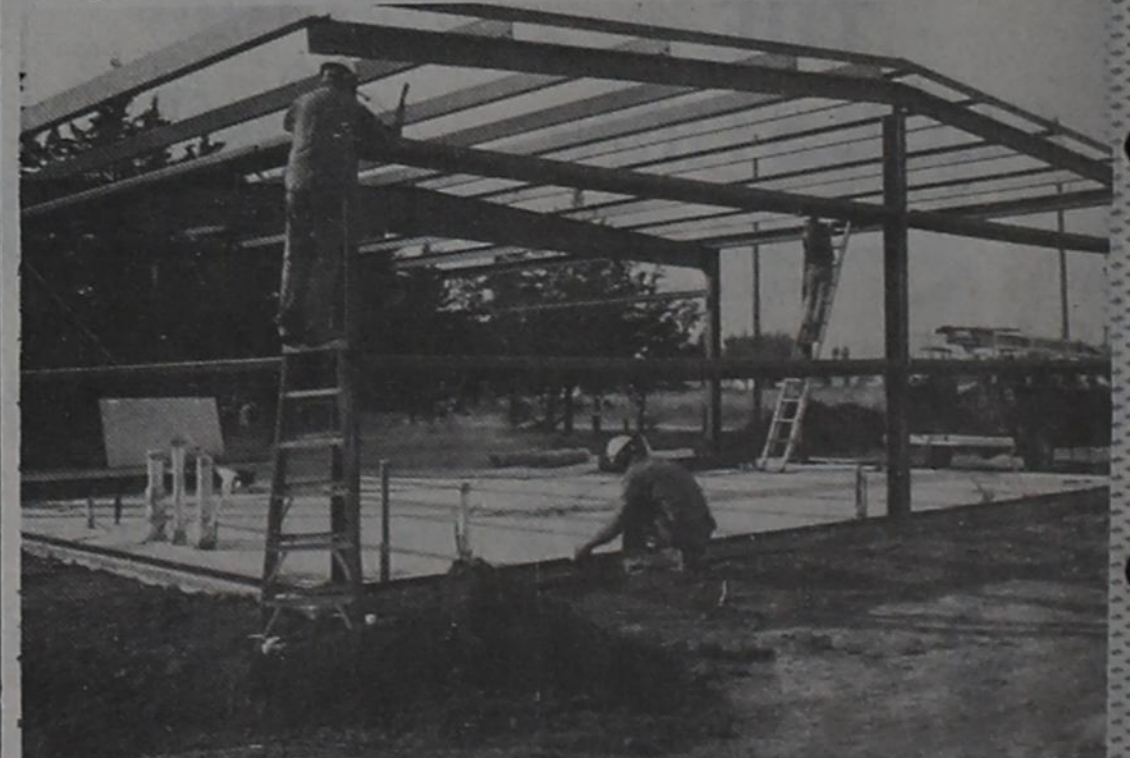

Lazbuddie-Vega films shown to area officials group

Lazbuddie School Athletic Director James Bartosh took video tapes of last Friday's 20-6 loss to Vega (at Vega) to Monday night's meeting of the Amarillo chapter of the Southwest Football Officials Association.

Members of that association are used in games in Lazbuddie's district, which includes Farwell, Vega, Happy, Kress and Nazareth.

Lazbuddie officials questioned four calls during the Vega game. They said they were:

1. A holding penalty was called against Lazbuddie on a pass play that carried Lazbuddie to a first down on the Vega one-foot line. The penalty took Lazbuddie out of scoring range when a field goal just fell short.

2. A punt to a Vega player found the ball fumbled by the Vega player and the ball recovered by Lazbuddie. Officials ruled the Vega player's knee was on the ground and the ball dead.

3. With Lazbuddie with a 4th down and goal to go from Vega's 1 yard line, the center was fumbled by the Lazbuddie quarterback who fell on the ball in the end zone. Officials said the quarterback had his knee on the ground on the one and blew the whistle, ruling the ball dead.

4. A Lazbuddie punt was short and apparently hit a Vega player in the

back. The ball was recovered by Lazbuddie. Officials said the punt had hit a Lazbuddie player.

Bartosh, after meeting with the area officials, stressed that he felt the calls "were just bad mistakes. Period."

He said some of the officials present felt the calls were missed, while other felt it was too difficult to tell on a video tape.

He said the officials group stressed that they encouraged coaches coming to them with questions, saying it would help them be better officials.

Bartosh also said he told the officials how Farwell was penalized for 160 yards in its loss to Vega at Vega earlier this season.

As for the game, Vega scored in

the first quarter on a 1-yard plunge. The kick was good and the score was 7-0. In the second quarter, Tim Lust passed 16 yards to Paul Gonzales for a TD. The kick failed.

In the second half, Vega scored twice - on runs of 8 and 17 yards. The final score was 20-6.

Rushing: David Schacher, 8 for 45 yards.

Passing: Lust, 10 of 24 for 214 yards.

Receiving: Gonzales, 5 for 119 yards; Guy Brockman, 4 for 89 yards.

Lazbuddie had 12 first downs; gained 272 yards, was penalized twice for 25 yards, and punted 4 times for a 25-yard average.

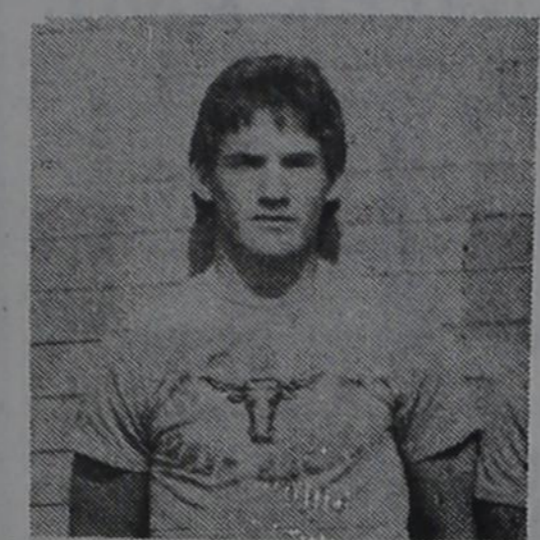

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
