There's no magic formula

Jeanette Pierce, from the Parmer County Extension Service office, stopped by the office with a piece about "strong families." After reading it, I thought it would be an appropriate guest column. Here it is:

No magic formula exists for creating the "perfect family." But after years of studying families broken by divorce, drug and alcohol abuse, troubled children and family crises, researchers have begun to focus their attention on what makes a family successful.

Since Nov. 24-30 is National Family Week, let's look at what the experts say are characteristics of strong families.

It starts with family members who are close. They value their family bond, and want to spend time working and playing together.

Members of strong families respect individual differences. They don't expect each other to have the same interests or appearance. Individuals are encouraged in their separate pursuits knowing that the family stands behind them.

Strong families share a basic set of values that provides direction for day-to-day decisions. They are clear about their values that provides direction for day-to-day decisions. They are clear about their values, yet tolerant of individual differences and respect the values of others. Most recent research studies indicate that families with strong values also tend to have a high degree of religious orientation.

Parents in strong families take their leadership responsibilities seriously. Mothers and fathers share leadership and both actively teach, lead, guide and discipline, but do not attempt to be peers or friends with their children.

These families tend to face problems openly and realistically. They are flexible in seeking solutions to problems and willing to try something else when a first-try does not work. As a result, strong families are the most capable of adapting to crisis situations.

Strong families have bonds of love that reach out to less effective families, and contribute to many community activities. They help others.

Strong families laugh together. They create and nurture family jokes and patterns of play. They use laughter and teasing for transitions at difficult moments, but do not indulge in hostile or painful kidding.

For many years, it seemed that where we lived influenced family lifestyle. But today the lines between rural, suburban and urban families may be blurring.

Rural families have tended to be among the most traditional. But like many other family forms, the farm family is changing. It is becoming more urban-oriented and egalitarian, with family members sharing decision-making. Yet, rural families still reflect a high degree of stability and strong ties with kin. Farm families show usually a deep sentimental attachment to the land that is not often found in other family units.

The trend toward two-income and more equal roles for husbands and wives is influencing all families. As a result, contemporary rural and urban families more closely resemble each other in most essential features of daily life than they have in the past.

Virginia Sheets worked in an aircraft plant

Mr. and Mrs. Ted Sheets moved from Oklahoma, where they had farmed for several years, to California in 1938. The move was caused by the Dust Bowl.

They got as far as Phoenix, Ariz., where Sheets had an appendicitis attack. He was able to get a government job and worked there about a year, before continuing on to Los Angeles.

Sheets started to work at Lockheed, building airplanes. He attended 3-month aircraft school in Los Angeles. He then decided to take the shipfitting course, which took three months. He worked in Long Beach as a shipfitter. He read blueprints and did welding.

Sheets came in one day and asked his wife about going to work at Douglas Aircraft in Los Angeles. She had no experience at all but went down and filled out an application. Two days later she was hired.

The first few days she could be called "Rosie the Riveter." She learned how to rivet without any difficulty. She was then put on the wing assembly. Also she worked on bomb cases.

"When a plane was sent back for repairs I was chosen to go into the wing of the plane. I was the smallest to fit inside," said Mrs. Sheets.

She worked at Douglas for about four years. She was paid 52 cents an hour.

"You could buy groceries for a week for \$8. That included meat. At one of the bakeries you could take a sack and fill it up with bread or rolls and pay a quarter," said Mrs. Sheets.

Since gas was in shortage, they had car pools to get to work.

The main rules for working at Douglas were: slacks, blouses

tucked in and scarves or hairnets on hair.

"When word came by radio that Pearl Harbor had been bombed, we were shocked," said Mrs. Sheets. "Needless to say, the ship-builder and airplane factories started more production."

They moved back to Texas in 1945 and bought Sheets Welding. Sheets ran the business until 1963. He died that year.

Mrs. Sheets worked for Clovis High Plains Hospital from 1964 to 1973. She worked in central supplies, making surgical packets, putting instruments on trays and sterilizing instruments.

Mrs. Sheets is active with Meals on Wheels, Bible study at the Church of Christ in Farwell, and likes to cook Mexican food.

Mrs. Sheets has three children - Harry of Farwell; Wanda of Ranger and Pauline of Ohio.

She has 8 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

Theta Rho sponsors pheasant hunt

The Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority will be sponsoring a pheasant hunting preserve for the fourth year in a row.

The sorority is undertaking this event as a fund-raiser for the group's philanthropic projects, and also to benefit a worthy cause in the community. Their first hunt resulted in a \$3,000 donation toward the community center fund, and in 1983, a whopping \$10,000 was donated by the same group, also toward the community center.

The 1984 proceeds purchased 24 tables for the Community Center and \$2,000 for the center itself. Vacuum cleaners were bought for Girlstown at Whiteface. They donated \$400 to New Mexico Girls Ranch. They established the Rosa Roberts Educational Fund with the Opportunity Plan, Inc. They also helped with medical expenses for some local families.

A lot of time and hard work goes into the planning of the preserves. The sorority members make sure that all areas of their preserves have plenty of cover for birds to hide in, so there will be some birds there for the hunters. They talk to the landowners to secure permission for the use of their land, and pay a fee to the Texas Parks and Wildlife to establish a shooting preserve, then the land is posted as such.

After the land is set up, the sorority then must estimate the number of hunters who can safely hunt in each area. They patrol the preserves themselves to make sure there are no unauthorized hunters.

To hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter, and one must also purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. The permits are good for any or all of the land secured by the sorority. Each participating landowner is given one or more complimentary permits.

The cost of the ESA permits are: If they are purchased on Dec. 14 or 15, \$75; those purchased Dec. 16

through 22, \$50; and those purchased Dec. 23 through 29, \$25. A permit may be purchased for anyone age 12 and under for \$25. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season.

The permits are good for hunting areas secured in Parmer and Bailey counties in Texas.

Permits may be purchased Dec. 13, at Hughes True Value from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. at Farwell Community Center. On Dec. 14, permits will be sold at the Community Center from 5 to 10 a.m.

After the opening days, permits may be purchased at the office of Aldridge, Harding, Aycock and Actkinson, 402 Third Street, Farwell, or by calling Maxine Williams, 481-3638; Leslie Lunsford, 481-9336; Altha Herington, 481-9351, or Terri Nichols, 481-3401.

A lot of effort is made by the planners to make sure that everyone involved in the hunt benefits from it in some way. The land owners benefit in that his land is posted and patrolled, and unauthorized hunters are kept off his land. The hunter coming in from out of town is given a map, so he knows where to go to hunt. The community benefits, as the hunting season brings money into the community, and the sorority tries to keep at least part of it here.

In conjunction with the hunt, there will be a longest tail feather contest. The tail feathers are measured on the last day of the season at 5 p.m. at Farwell Hardware. There will be first, second and third prizes awarded, and also a countywide contest for the longest tail feather in the county.

The Alpha Rho Lambda chapter of Beta Sigma Phi will be serving breakfast Saturday morning, Dec. 14, at the Community Center.

The breakfast will consist of sausage and eggs, biscuits and gravy, and coffee. The cost will be \$4.00 for adults and \$2.50 for those 10 and under. For this price, you get all you can eat.

Dannheim wins football contest

Charles Dannheim captured the overall victory in the 27th annual Area Merchants Football Contest.

Dannheim, who has lived in Amarillo for 12 years, is a Farwell High School graduate. He has participated in the contest every year he has lived in Amarillo. It was the first time he has won the contest.

Dannheim won the overall contest with 107 points. Thus, he averaged 8.9 correct answers each week. Last year's winner, Gay Goetsch, had averaged 8.2 correct answers for her victory in 1984.

Dannheim won his title by 2 points over runnerup T.J. Kittrell. Ironically, both Kittrell and Dannheim had filled out the exact same picks in the last contest week except for one - Perryton vs. Post. Kittrell picked Perryton, and Dannheim chose Post.

This year's contest had a record number of participants. All told, 604 folks participated in the contest. Last year's total was 502. Thus, there was a huge increase in entrants.

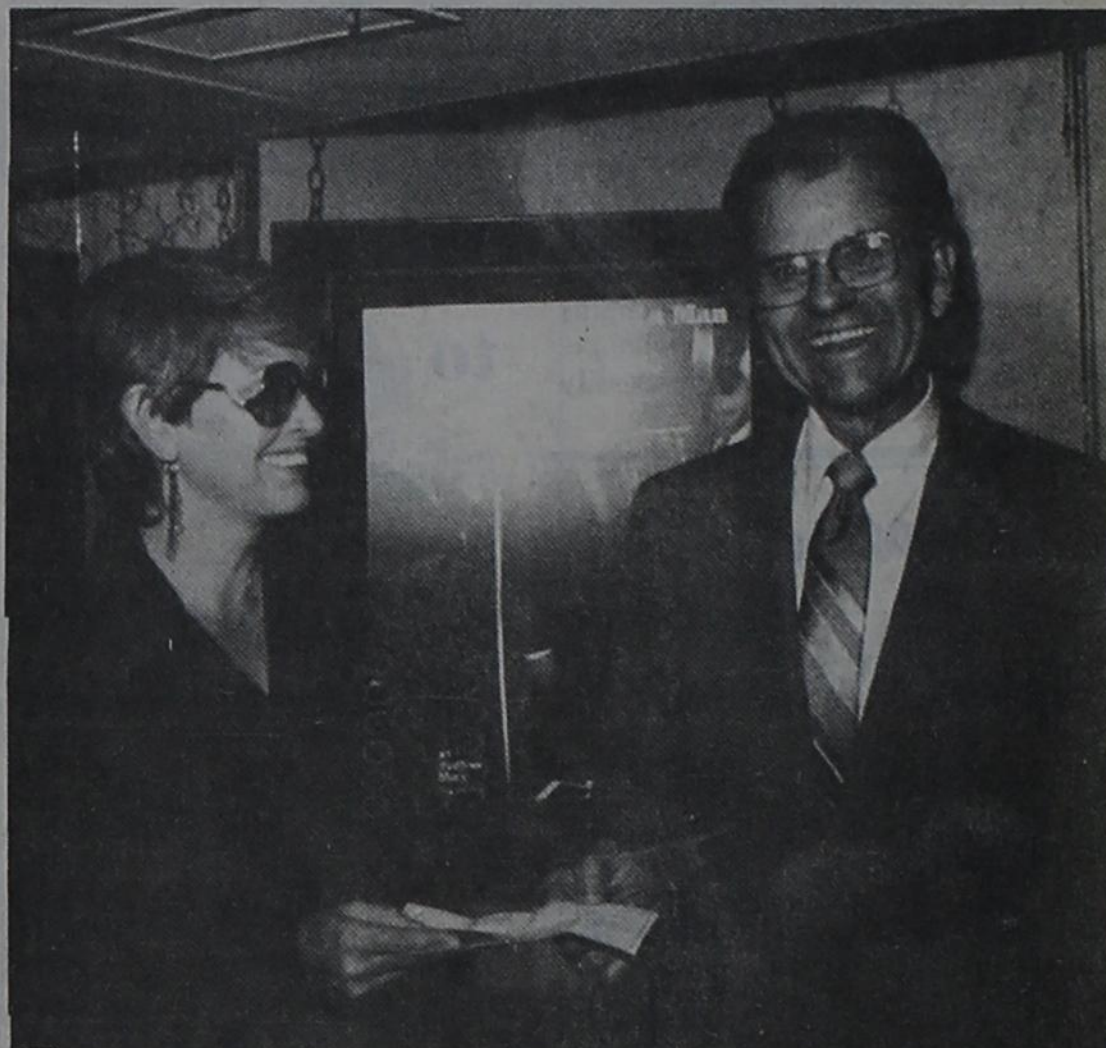

Texico moves ahead on truck center

The Texico City Council took action Tuesday night that will allow construction of a truck center to begin.

Giese Development has purchased 12 lots just west of Playorama and is planning a center, which may include a convenience store, restaurant and shops. Construction is expected to start in December.

The council approved a resolution that vacates Turner Street which lies south of the highway and dead-ends at the railroad. This was needed before Giese could go ahead.

The resolution's approval is contingent upon four factors, including granting of an easement by Giese for utility lines.

In other business, the council discussed appointing a person to fill the council post vacated earlier this month by Vane Doshier, who resigned after moving outside the city limits.

Councilman Lewis Cooper suggested Doyle LaRue, and Mayor John R. Hadley said LaRue would be an excellent choice.

The other councilmen, Steve Chancy and Bryan Kube, wanted a chance to check with other possible applicants so no action will be taken until the next council meeting.

The councilmen asked that if any Texico residents were interested in serving as a councilman, until the March election, to call any of them.

The council also: --Approved buying a heater for the city barn for \$189.

--Denied a request from Joe Horne to move a mobile home south of his residence and remodel it.

--Scheduled the next meeting for Dec. 10.

--Changed the date of its second December meeting to Dec. 23, due to the holidays.

--Tentatively approved the request from James and Charlotte Pierce to have their property on the north side of Craig annexed into the city. The proposed ordinance is published in today's newspaper. Final action will be taken in the next few weeks.

--Noted that the election March 4 is for 3 posts: that of Mayor, held by Hadley, and for two councilmen. One post was vacated by Doshier and the other is held by Cooper.

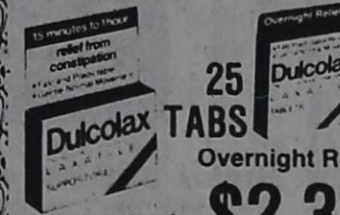
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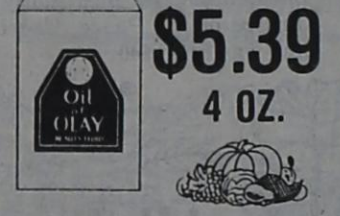


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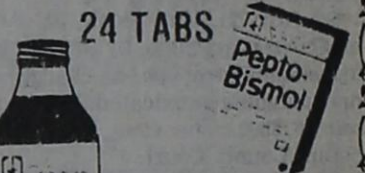


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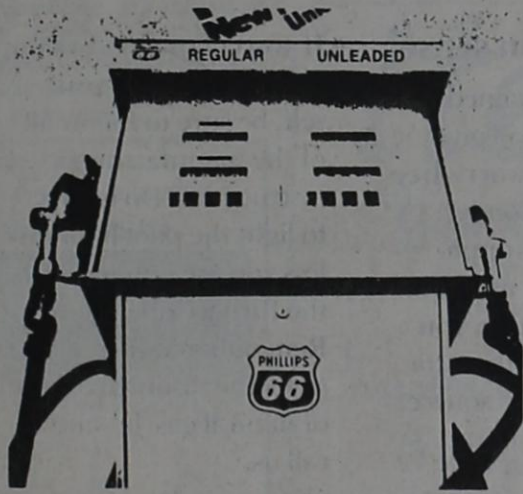
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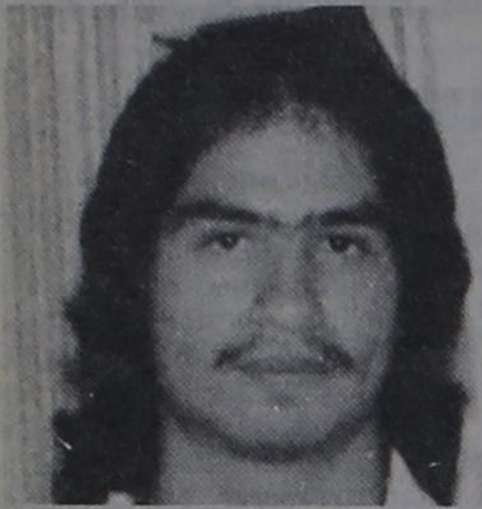
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Double scholar

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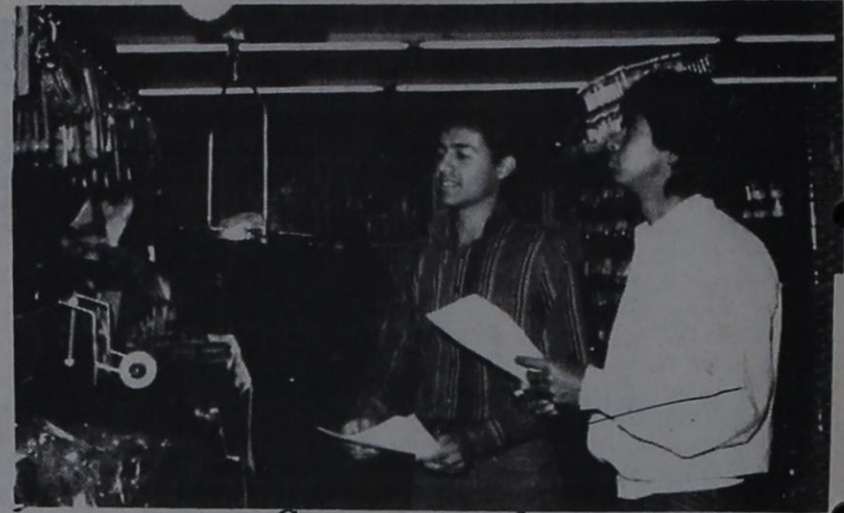

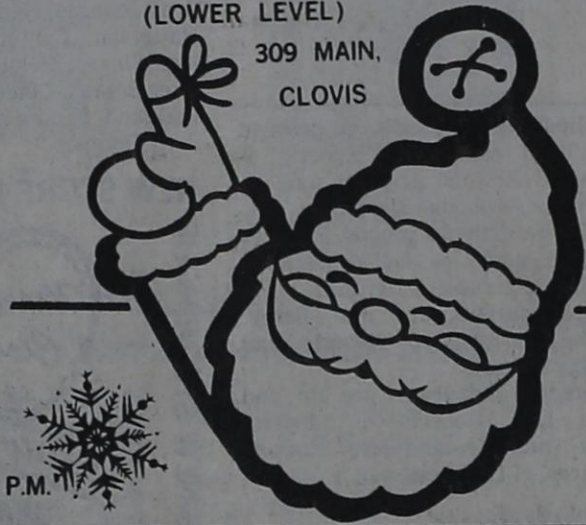
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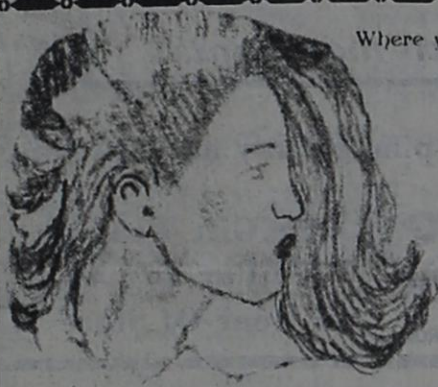
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Lazbuddie boys win 3

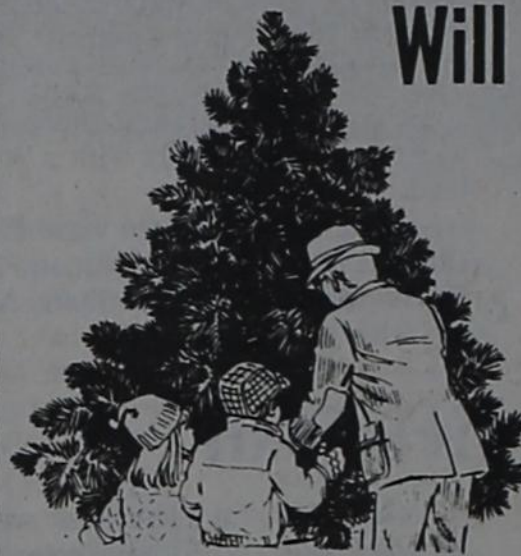

Muleshoe pricing policy changed

The Governing Board and Administration of West Plains Medical Center announced a change in the pricing policies for West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe.

Effective Nov. 18, there will be no minimum charges for patients of West Plains and the maximum charge per day for each patient will be \$1,500. This new policy will allow each patient to pay only for the services they receive, but will protect the patient with extremely serious illnesses from catastrophic bills.

West Plains provides a wide range of services including the hospital, nursing home, ambulance service and home health agency. The facility must pay its own way, since it receives no tax subsidies. The prices charged must cover the expenses of providing a wider range of services than many facilities of this size.

Even though West Plains Medical Center and Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas have not been able to successfully negotiate a contract, there are still many BC/BS policies which will pay for services provided at West Plains. Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas will not pay the hospital, but will pay the individual patient on certain policies.

To clarify any questions that Medicare patients in the area may have concerning what the patient must pay on their hospital bills, West Plains Medical Center is reimbursed by the DRG system, the same as all other area hospitals. The DRG system or Diagnostic Related Groups establish a price that is paid to the hospital based on each individual diagnosis. The patient is not responsible for the difference between the charges and the DRG payment. The patient is only responsible for their annual deductible and any co-insurance prescribed by the Medicare Program.

Farwell 8th boys lose

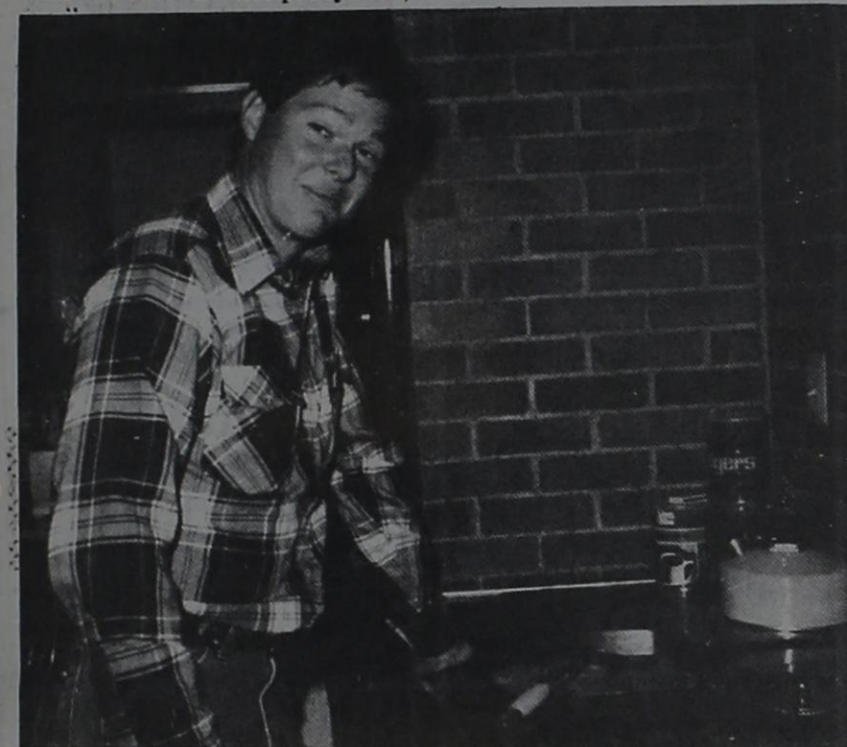
The Farwell 8th grade basketball boys lost to Happy, 34-31, Nov. 25.

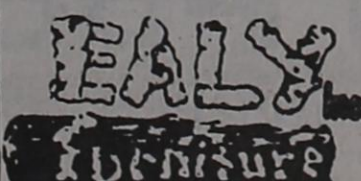

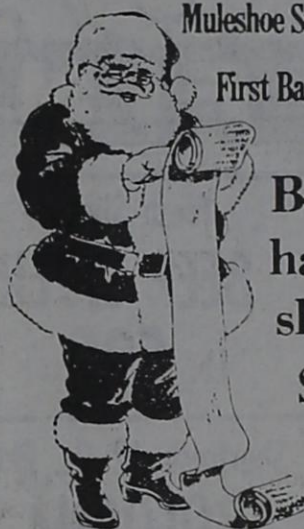

Friona likely will get school trust funds

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday heard impassioned pleas from Bovina and Friona school board members who wanted the county to give them their portions of the school trust fund.

The commissioners have about \$900,000 in the school trust fund. They received a state legal opinion earlier this month that said they can give funds to the schools if (1) they are used for reducing bonded indebtedness and/or making permanent improvements, and (2) the funds are divided up on a scholastic basis - i.e., based on the number of children ages 6 through 18 in a school district, whether or not they attend public schools.

Also present Monday were some school board members from Lazbuddie and Farwell School Supt.

John Grigsby. The Farwell School Board had included itself in the four schools' request last spring for the school trust funds. But the board voted recently not to continue participating.

It appears that Friona and Bovina will seek funds. Bovina wants new school roofs while Friona wants funds for its classrooms currently under construction. Friona apparently may seek about \$300,000.

Friona officials said that they will present the necessary application for the funds at a future commissioners' meeting.

The vote on a specific request by Friona and/or Bovina is expected to be close.

Commissioners Ernest Anthony and Raymond McGehee have indicated they prefer leaving the funds under the county jurisdiction unless an emergency occurred. But Tommie Williams and Robert White indicated they would be amenable to a specific request for funds for building improvements.

In case of a tie, County Judge Porter Roberts, who chairs the commissioners' court, would vote. He indicated he would support a specific Friona request.

If one or two schools received their portions of the funds, the remainder of the funds would still be available to the other schools later.

Friona officials made a strong case for receiving their funds now, saying that a tax increase would be likely if they didn't get the trust fund monies. They said they were using funds, which normally would go for operation and maintenance, for the classroom construction, mandated by the state.

It will take some time for Friona and Bovina to put together their requests since a survey has to be taken for the "scholastic" basis.

In other business, the commissioners received one bid for a loader backhoe for Precinct 1 - from Yellow House Machinery, Lubbock. Its trade-in price was \$33,000. The bid was accepted.
