

# Merchants participate in BTD giveaway

## Why oldtimers wave with a finger

Last week, a Texico fella explained to me why longtimers only raise a finger to wave while keeping their hand on the wheel.

Back in the 40's and 50's, pickup trucks were hard to handle on back roads. Thus, it took a steady hand to keep the pickup on the road. Since it wasn't wise to take your hand off the wheel, that's how the finger wave came to be - at least that's what the Texico fella says.

Did you catch that Letter to the Editor in last week's Tribune from Hurshel Harding?

It makes a good point. There aren't too many things more important than the future of our water supply. I hope his words are heeded.

My wife talked with Arvene Eckhardt, of Nutri-Tech, the other day. He made some points about economic development that are very worthwhile.

His keynote was for us to support the businesses we have now here. We have some very fine businesses that are known throughout the area. And we have good leaders, like Jerry Monk, with growing businesses.

When talking about business expansion, Arvene says, you should start with the natural resources we have available. For example, we have more cattle here than just about anywhere in Texas, so think in terms of cattle byproducts, such as leather goods manufacturing.

Then there are finished goods from plants, like potato chips, and frozen and canned vegetables; cotton goods, soybean products, corn starch, sunflower oil, etc.

There is one trend to keep in mind when planning, Arvene pointed out: Americans will be consuming more vegetables in the future due to health reasons and the fact they are cheaper than red meats.

If you thought I might be a worry wart when I wrote my column about the probability of higher taxes last week, take a look at what State Comptroller Bob Bullock said in a recent news release:

"A skyrocketing unemployment rate will be one key factor moving the state's budget deficit well above the current \$2.3 billion," he said.

So get ready for the bad news. And as I've said repeatedly, I'd rather see our tax base increased than having to pay higher taxes. I surely hope we see some activity in this sector.

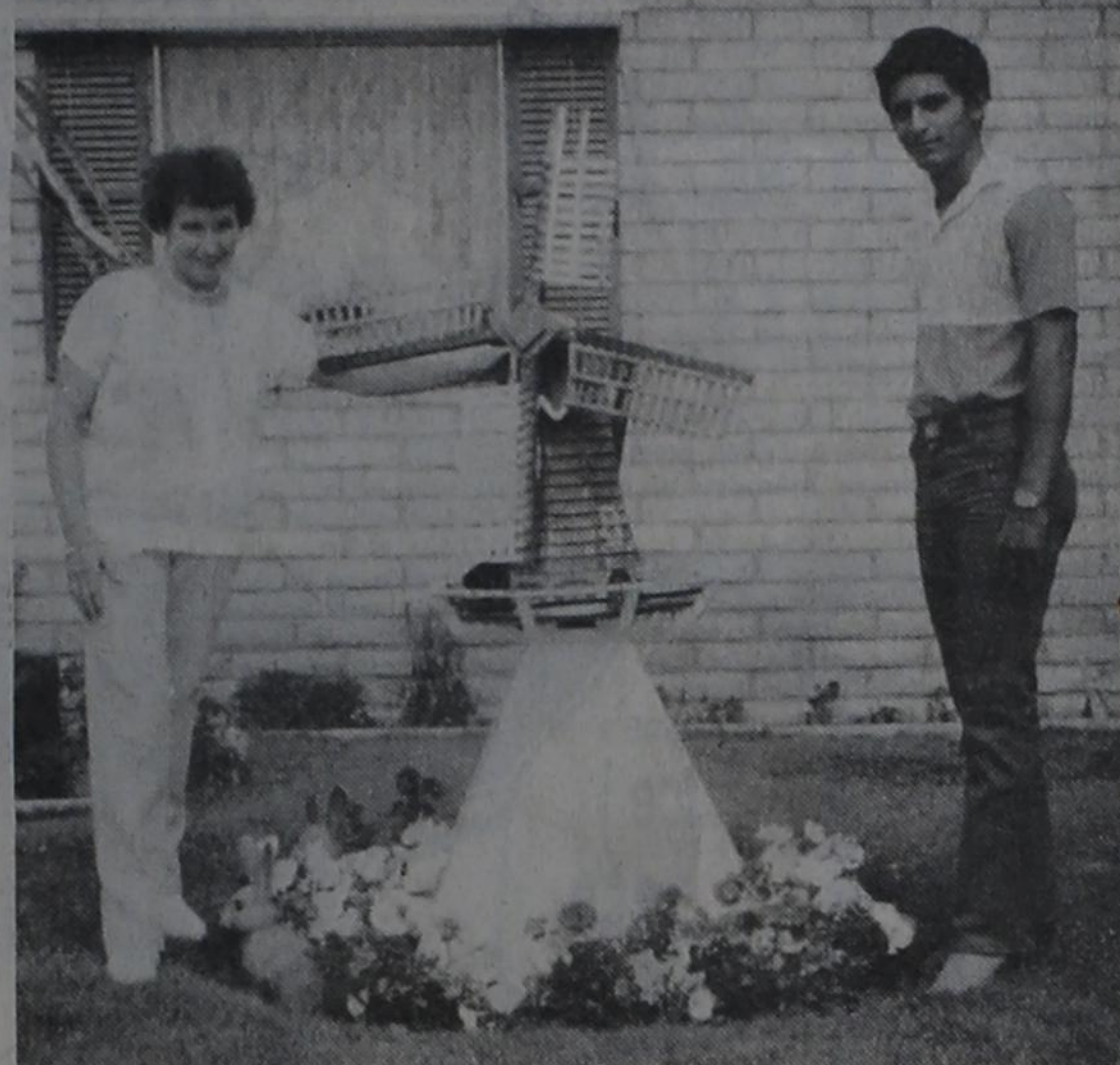

## Panamanian student visits Oklahoma Lane

Jose Marin, 19, of El Cano, Cocle, a small town in Panama, is a 4-H exchange student visiting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Mesman, Oklahoma Lane.

Jose is one of 50 exchange students visiting in the United States. He is part of an extensive program funded by Panama and the United States. In this program each student stays in two states, a total of 4 months each. The students work to gain experience in agriculture.

Jose will stay with the Mesmans 2 months.

The students undergo 50 days in a seminar in Panama to learn English, before they are allowed to come to the U.S.

The program is different from our 4-H. In the Panama program, the student receives money to raise a crop, then they sell the crop and give the money they receive from the sale back to the program.

Jose comes from a family of seven. This includes his mother and father, two brothers, one sister and a cousin.

Jose's father is a farmer who raises watermelons and onions, which are imported to the U.S. His mother is a housewife. Jose's oldest brother works in the rice fields for their father.

Farming is small on the province where Jose lives. The growing season for watermelons and onions range from February to June. The weather during these months is very dry. During the time from December to April they grow rice, because this is the rainy season.

Irrigation water is pumped from the river. Farmers rotate their crops from one area of land to another each year.

Jose's family lives in a 4-room house. This includes one bedroom, kitchen, two living rooms and a

bath. They have running water in the home, but no hot water. The outside structure of every home in Panama consists of a type of adobe block with a Spanish style zinc metal roof and a base of stone.

In El Cano, the boys are allowed a choice of schools. The choice is between military or public schools. The schools are different, in that they attend elementary school for six years, high school for three years and then college for three years. Boys and girls all wear uniforms to school.

There are a total of 85 students in the high school which Jose attends. Jose is one of 23 students to graduate from his school.

Upon completion of high school, Jose and his classmates took a trip similar to our senior trips to Costa Rica for a week.

Jose plans to attend college at the Panama National Institute of Agriculture.

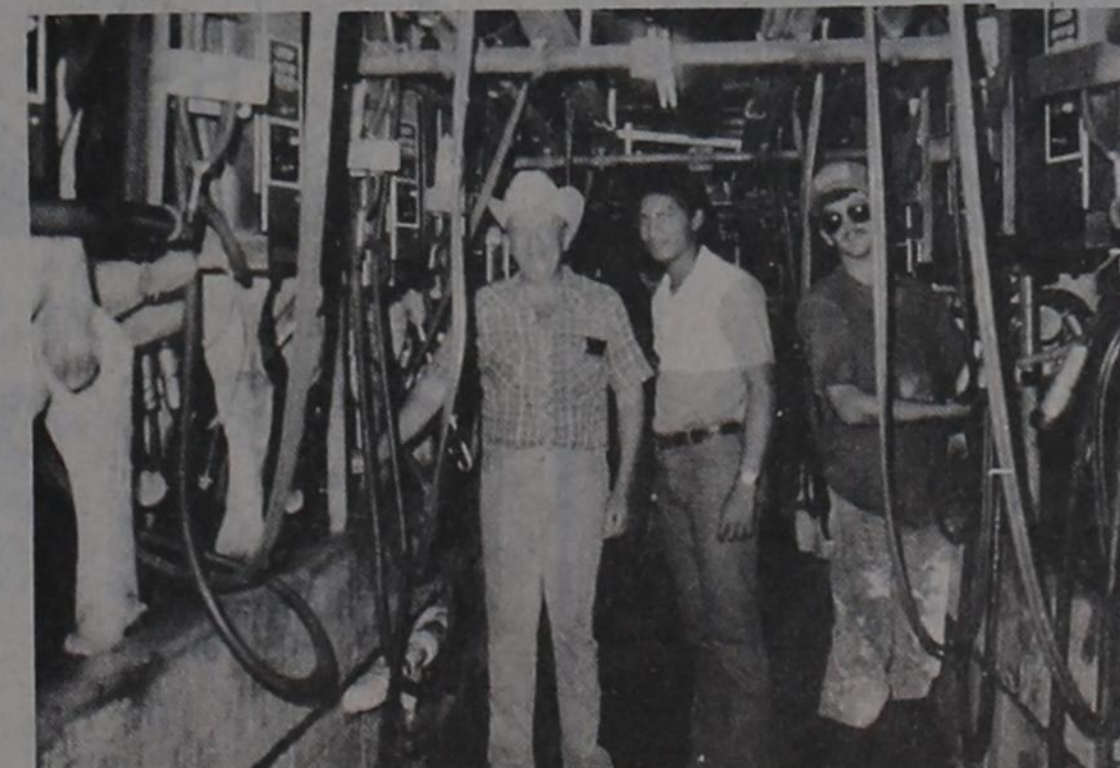
Jose says he likes staying with the Mesmans very much. He is treated as one of the family.

He works with the boys, Tommy, Teddy and Berney. Jose works according to the Mesmans' schedule. At 5:30 a.m. he rises to help feed the cows. Jose also helps to milk and wash the cows in the afternoon. Jose has milked one cow by hand.

The Mesmans are really enjoying having Jose. As a host family in the exchange program, the Mesmans take care of most of Jose's living expenses. Jose receives an allowance from the U.S., also. The Mesmans have bought Jose some clothes, including his first pair of cowboy boots.

Some activities Jose has taken part in are roller skating with the county 4-H kids, church parties and parties with friends of the Mesmans.

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## Fowler, Walling named Pioneers of the Year

As a new Border Town Days project, each year two Pioneers of the Year will be chosen.

The first recipients are Mitz Walling and Vashti Fowler. They will ride in the BTD Parade July 26 and receive special certificates.

Here is information about Mrs. Fowler, as provided by Harold and Avis Carpenter:

Miss Fowler is 82. She came to the Oklahoma Lane area with her widowed mother, an older sister, a younger brother and an older brother May 5, 1916. She still lives on the same farm, nine miles east of Farwell.

This family, coming from Oklahoma, was among the first settlers of Oklahoma Lane. Other families came later, all from Oklahoma - thus the name for the community.

Miss Fowler was 12 at the time.

She finished her formal education in a one-room school, Sunnyside, located on the present Earl Routon farm.

She was always active in the community. She started teaching Sunday School classes at an early age and helped organize the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church in 1927. She always sang in the church and community choirs.

She ministered to the needs in the community, such as sitting up with the sick or helping out in times of tragedy. She kept the home fires burning while her mother was called to a home as a midwife. She helped hold elections and helped organize what is known as our present Community Christmas Tree, which started Dec. 24, 1916.

Mitz Walling was nominated by several people. Here is some in-

formation about him:

Mitz is 70 years old and was born in Farwell June 28, 1916. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Walling, who settled in Farwell in 1901. His family had six children, all of whom attended Farwell schools.

Mitz participated in the sports programs while in school and has lived here his whole life except for three years in the U.S. Army. He has farmed here.

Mitz and his wife, Nell, live in Farwell and have two children, Milton Lee and Edith Ann, and three grandchildren who also live here.

Mitz is known nationwide for his calf-roping abilities and is still active in roping, as he is a member of the Old Timers Roping Association. He has been active for many years with the fire department and has helped with the Farwell Arena.

**Letter from the Philippines**

**Arrival starts with manicure**

(Editor's note: Loretta Gonzales, the Texico girl who is spending a year in school in the Philippines as part of a Rotary exchange program, will be writing letters for publication every couple of weeks. Here's her first one.)

I'll first start out by telling you about my trip to the Philippines. The plane flight wasn't as bad as so many had commented it could be, although staying in the air for a period of 13 hours can be rather boring!

I also witnessed daytime for 24 hours. At this very moment, it is 7:30 p.m. here, and there, the time is 5:25 a.m. So, as you can tell, it has taken me some time to adjust.

My first day in Quezon started out with a manicure and pedicure. All Filipino women take good care of their nails.

Then I was enrolled in St. Joseph's College where a uniform is required wear. The uniform consists of a skirt, blouse, tie, and standard black shoes.

My first day at school was Wednesday, July 2. The students were very friendly towards me and have invited me to enroll in their dance club.

Wednesday night was my first time to meet the Rotarians and their wives (who are involved in the inner wheel for women). I showed my slide presentation and gave a short



talk; in return, they asked me numerous questions.

After that, I spent the next two days in bed because I developed a very serious cold, but I am feeling better now thanks to my host mother.

I'll try to write more the next time after this cold goes away and describe more about my life in the Philippines.

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# Lamar resigns as Texas commander-in-chief

7th birthday

Lauren Newton celebrated her seventh birthday with Uncle David and Aunt Carol Snider, and grandparents Peggy and Chris Gikas. Lauren is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Newton of Lubbock.

1836: MONDAY, JULY 18. Major General Mirabeau B. Lamar today resigned as commander-in-chief of the Texas Army after the army had refused to accept him. He had the title less than three weeks, and had not yet taken active command.

General Lamar was previously Attorney General and Secretary of War for brief periods in the Cabinet of ad interim President David G. Burnet. It has been charged that he was appointed commander-in-chief by President Burnet to prevent General Sam Houston from resuming that position when he recovers from his leg wound received at San Jacinto. Houston relinquished command of the army on May 6 to former Secretary of War Thomas J. Rusk in order to go to New Orleans for treatment. He arrived there on May 22, and some 20 bone fragments were removed from his leg. He is now recuperating in San Augustine and Nacogdoches. Although General Lamar is well thought of, and conducted himself well at San Jacinto, the army strongly prefers General Houston as commander-in-chief.

The army is currently stationed on the Guadalupe River near Victoria. It has grown to some 2,300 men, nearly all volunteers from the United States. With no enemy in sight, there is little for them to do, and much confusion reigns. Also, according to one of the officers, "There are very few above the rank of captain who does not aspire to be commander-in-chief." This seems to be especially true of General Felix Huston, who arrived only two weeks ago with a contingent of volunteers, and General Thomas J. Green, who also arrived with a group of volunteers on June 2. General Green at that time was instrumental in preventing release of the Mexican prisoner, President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.

General Lamar arrived at army headquarters last Thursday to take command. Having heard of his appointment in advance, the officers had met and drawn up a resolution asking him not to take command because there was "some question of the propriety of his appointment by the President," even though, they said, they "highly appreciate the gallantry and worth of General Lamar." Texian volunteers have always claimed the right to elect their own commander-in-chief.

Lamar received the officers' petition, and requested that the matter be placed before the entire army. That evening, July 14, the men were assembled on the parade ground, and Lamar was presented to them by General Rusk with the words: "Fellow soldiers, I have the honor to present to you Major General Lamar, appointed by the Cabinet."

"We're planning a super time," says Doris Ford.

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Lamar then addressed them, describing his military experience. He stated that he had not solicited nor was he ambitious of the position.

General Green appeared to think that Lamar's last remark was an allusion to his ambitions, and he addressed the men with some asperity, stating that it was improper for the cabinet to go over the head of General Rusk. Lamar responded with some heat that Rusk himself had requested the cabinet to make an appointment. Rusk then stated that some time back, when the army was only 300 or 400 men, he had asked to be relieved to return to his family, but now that the army has grown to its present size, he did not think it proper to abandon the post tendered him by General Houston. Felix Huston also made a speech, which he reports was "in a jocular manner," in an attempt to smooth things over.

After the speeches, the question was put to the army by General Huston. At Lamar's request, he first announced that Lamar planned to hold the office only until the return of General Houston. He then ordered those favoring Lamar to "form on Major Ward, stationed on my right," and those opposed "on Colonel Morehouse, stationed on my left." Upon the order of "March!" the tellers counted only 179 votes for Lamar, with the rest of the army, some 1,500 men, against, so no negative count was made.

The next day, however, Lamar said that he intended to insist on the command. Yesterday he wrote to President Burnet that "if Green and Felix Huston still maintain their

present attitude of rebellion to my authority, I shall punish them by court-martial, if possible, and if not shall report them to Congress." He referred to the army as "a rebellious mob of strangers."

Today, in view of increasing agitation in camp and the growing number of deserters, Lamar has reconsidered and submitted his resignation. He will depart tomorrow morning.

1841: TUESDAY, JULY 20. Texas President Mirabeau B. Lamar today addressed a message to Governor Miguel Barbachano of Yucatan, a province of Mexico in revolt against the Centralist government, inviting him to send an agent to Texas to discuss a formal and permanent relationship in their mutual opposition to the Mexican government.

The message was prompted by a report President Lamar has received from his special agent to Mexico, James Webb. Webb returned to Galveston on June 28 after failure of his mission to obtain a treaty of peace. He was not even permitted to land at Veracruz. He has returned convinced that only force will be effective in treating with Mexico. He urges that Texas recognize the independence of Yucatan, and of Tabasco, which is also in revolt, and that Texas join them in military action by providing naval support.

Vice President David G. Burnet strongly supports this position. Last December 16, when he was Acting President during a leave granted

President Lamar because of illness, Burnet sent a message of Congress urging an invasion of Mexico, saying that "the sword cancels all previous pledges." The Rio Grande is not necessarily the Texas boundary, he said: "Texas as defined by the sword may comprehend the Sierra Madre. Let the sword do its proper work." After considerable debate in Congress, the proposal was shelved when news arrived that England had agreed to negotiate with Mexico on behalf of Texas. If successful, Texas would pay England a million pounds sterling, \$5,000,000, against Mexico's debt to England. England's efforts have failed, however, and President Lamar is now proposing joint action with Yucatan, and perhaps later with Tabasco.

1842: MONDAY, JULY 18. Congress today passed a bill entitled "An Act to Authorize Offensive War Against Mexico and for Other Purposes," popularly known as the "War Bill." While it does not formally declare war, it authorizes and requires President Sam Houston "to call for and accept the services of volunteers to form an army for the prosecution of offensive war against Mexico" whenever he might "deem it compatible with public interest." Should the number of volunteers not be sufficient, he is required to call out the militia, not to exceed "one third of the whole population capable of bearing arms, including those who may have volunteered." Funding is to be derived from the sale of land.

President Houston is authorized to take command of the army in person. This Congressional action is required by the Republic's Constitution, which states that the President "shall be commander-in-chief of the Army and Navy of the Republic, but he shall not command in person without the authority of a resolution of the Congress."

The war fever now sweeping Texas stems from Mexico's brief invasion of San Antonio, Refugio and Goliad early last March. Although the enemy withdrew after a few days, there were widespread reports of a much larger army to follow. An urgent call was put out for volunteers from the United States, since Texas has only a minimal regular army, and several militia units were briefly mustered.

When no enemy appeared, the militia was dismissed, and the volunteers became highly disorganized and mutinous, with desertions on a large scale.

### SPICY TEXAS SHRIMP

1 lg. chopped onion  
2 lg. minced garlic cloves  
2 T. oil  
2 lg. chopped tomatoes  
1 (4 oz.) can chopped chiles, drained  
2 lbs. medium sized peeled shrimp  
¼ c. freshly squeezed lime juice  
¼ c. chopped cilantro  
½ tsp. salt  
Warm flour tortillas

Guacamole  
Sour cream

In large skillet, cook onion and garlic in hot oil until tender. Add tomatoes, chiles and shrimp. Cook, stirring gently until shrimp turn pink and opaque. Stir in lime juice, cilantro and salt. Serve shrimp wrapped in warm flour tortillas with guacamole and sour cream. Makes 4 servings.

## Historic Recipe of the Week

### YELLOW SQUASH MEXICAN STYLE

To make 4 to 6 servings: Saute ½ cup minced onion and 1 minced garlic clove in 3 tablespoons bacon fat until the onion is tender. Add 2 tablespoons chili powder, ½ tsp. coriander, and ¼ teaspoon cumin powder and blend. Add 2 cups of canned tomatoes, the peeled variety, and cook the mixture slowly about 10 minutes. Prepare 2 pounds of very young and tender yellow squash for cooking, cutting them into ½ inch rounds. Drop them into

the tomato sauce while it is still hot and cook the entire mixture until the squash is slightly tender, about 15 minutes. Add salt and cayenne pepper to taste and 2 teaspoons sugar. Blend well. Pour the mixture into a buttered casserole and top with 2 cups of grated cheese. Bake in a moderate oven, 350°, until the cheese is well melted and the entire mixture well blended. The finished product should be very moist but with very little excess liquid. The extra liquid may be spooned off.

1985-86 audit and for setting up the city's books.

--Agreed to hire High Plains Pest Control to spray trees on city property.

--Heard Smith say the fire department was planning to incorporate as a hedge against lawsuit problems. Many departments throughout the nation are doing the same.

--Agreed to buy five uniform

shirts, at a cost of \$6 apiece, for each city employee.

--Approved proclamations honoring the Pioneers of the Year and the honorary parade marshal for the Border Town Days parade.

--Reaffirmed that when the cold weather comes that the Sesquicentennial mural will be moved from the side of City Hall to the Farwell Community Center.

--Noted that a Texas Department of Health inspector checked the pits July 3. Few violations were found and they can be corrected easily.

--Heard Mayor Chris Gikas say that a man was caught dumping in the pit without authority. He agreed to properly cover the pit and has done so satisfactorily, said Gikas. A new pit has opened with a fence around it.
