Palm Sunday, one of the most dast-
ardly deeds in the history of civilized nations oceured when 330 Texian prisoners were brutally mast cred near Goliad. It was by direct order of the Mexican com-
mander-in-chief, President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, who is now encamped at Bexar. It is thought escape. tilla, in charge of the prisoners at Goliad, received the order last night by special courier, with detailed Instructions as to the mode of execution. This is despite the solemn
reaty of surrender, in both English and Spanish, signed by General Jose Urrea for the Mexicans and Colonel James W. Fannin for the Texians, which assured the Texians
of prisoner-of-war status and of prisoner-of-war status and
repatriation to the United States within eight days.
A total of 445 men were being held prisoner at Goliad, including the men under Colonel Wiliam Ward.
Besieged at Refugio, they had managed to escape, but were later captured. The prisoners also included 80 men under Major William P. Miller of Tennessee, who were
captured at Copano immediately upon landing there. Their ship had run aground, and seeing a large Mexican force on shore, they threw claimed to arms ene water and claimed to be peaceable immi-
grants. Since they had done no fighting, they were spared from Santa Anna's order. Also spared were four doctors and four hospital assistants needed by the Mexican
to take care of their wounded. At daybreak this morning, able-bodied prisoners were lined up and marched out in separate groups under yarious pretexts. Some were
told that they were being taken to Copano to embark for the United States, some were told that they were being removed to make room for Santa Anna. After being marched a short distance from the
fort, the Mexicans in charge of each group turned their guns on them and killed them.
The medical personnel being spared were held under guard near-
by. They report that they heard by. They report that they heard
