Plans Finalized For Celebration

Final plans for the seventh annual Border Town Days celebration were made at a noon meeting Tuesday of Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber, headed by Charles Aycock, named Fred Chandler and Shorty Hughes co-parade marshals for the Border Town Days parade slated to begin at 4 p.m. Saturday, July 28, in Texico in front of the Burger Barn. Parade participants will proceed down the Lubbock highway through Texico and Farwell ending at Farwell Roping Arena.

Immediately following the parade, a barbecue is scheduled in Farwell City Park. The meal will be catered by Floyd Trantham of Clovis and will cost \$3 a plate.

Lee Hutchins, Farwell fire chief, was named to take care of the banners promoting Border Town Days up by Thursday.

Max Carter was instructed to contact a sign painter about painting merchants' windows as a promotion for the celebration.

The Chamber will award float decoration efforts with cash prizes. First, second and third prizes will be given with \$50, \$25 and \$15 awarded, respectively.

Trophies will be given to the

top three riding clubs. Judges are to be furnished by Farwell Community Arena Association.

An assortment of parade participants are expected from riding clubs to floats, bicycles, farm equipment and cars, says Aycock.

A traveling plaque will again be awarded to the family registering the most members and traveling the farthest for an Old Timers' Reunion which has been slated Saturday afternoon at the City Park. The plaque went to the Ray Ford family last year for having 36 members present.

Entertainment for the get-together is being planned by Fred Chandler, Rev. John

Summers and Butch Franklin.

In conjunction with Border Town Days, the Farwell Community Arena Association will sponsor a junior rodeo. This event, sanctioned by American Junior Rodeo Association, will have evening performances at 8 o'clock each night Thursday through Saturday, July 26-28, at the Roping Arena east of Farwell.

Three divisions of contestants will participate in the rodeo. The divisions are 12 and under, ages 13-15 and ages 16-19, for both boys and girls.

Approximately 15 events are on the rodeo agenda with tie-down roping, pole bending, bareback bronc riding, bull

riding and break-away roping included, among other. Belt buckles will be given winners in each event.

Deadline for entries is Saturday, July 21, at 10 p.m. Frank Doshier is in charge of accepting entries. Around 200 youngsters are expected to participate.

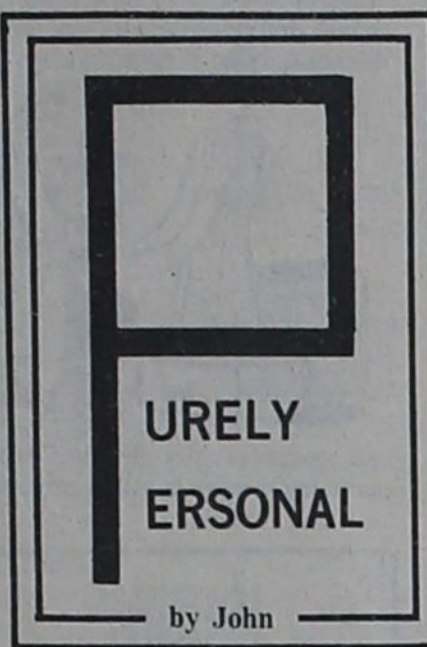
The 1974 Border Town Days

Farwell City Commission believes in charging ahead full tilt. It is taking on the thorny problems of weeds, junk cars and loose dogs and cats all in one swoop. The commission is on firm legal ground as there are ordinances on the books that explicitly spell out how these problems can be handled.

In their meeting last Monday afternoon, the City Dads gave instructions to the proper city employees to begin enforcing the provisions of these ordinances without fear or favor. This is as it should be.

The problems of city lots overgrown with weeds and littered with all sorts of junk has detracted from the beauty of the community long enough. It is too bad that some property owners do not think enough of the community to see to it that their property is not an eyesore and that they have to be forced into common decency by provisions of law.

Likewise, pet owners will soon be up in arms as they find out that the City will no longer allow their pets to roam at large and both soil and despoil other people's property. The freedom of a person is bounded by the rights of his neighbor, and a property owner has the right to have his property free from the depredations of his neighbors' pets.

These issues are clear and well-defined in the ordinances of the City of Farwell, but inescapably they will become emotional and good judgement will be clouded. The laws to be enforced are on file at Farwell City Hall and every resident can readily find out what will be required of him in the care and maintenance of his properties and his pets.

Also last Monday evening, the Farwell Arena Association had a fun and games session for the community. Specifically they invited the businessmen of Texico and Farwell and their families to share their evening with them at the Roping Arena. Unfortunately very few showed up for the occasion.

As the lone outsider we can unequivocally report that the cookout hamburgers were delicious. Good family fun was enjoyed by all those present and it is too bad more folks were not there to enjoy the occasion.

We have come to more and more realize that the old ways of getting together and enjoying each other's company is fast disappearing as a social custom. Today, it seems people must be provided with entertainment. They are unable to generate their own entertainment by just being together.

Possibly this necessity to be entertained is a spin-off of the boob tube where entertainment is beamed at the individual without effort on his part. Possibly the pace of keeping up with today's living make self-generated entertainment a chore.

Whatever the answer, it is clear that today's values are rapidly changing; whether for good or bad is unclear.

Six persons in addition to Mr. and Mrs. Salinas were injured in the collision that occurred about noon Saturday at the intersection of FM 145 and FM 1731.

Discuss Tennis Court --

Paving Project Started, Engineer To Make Map

Farwell City Council met Monday evening in City Hall. Members present to discuss city matters were Mayor Gil Patschke, Councilmen Jim Berry and Fred Chandler and City Clerk Janie Bowery. City Attorney Charles Aycock was present to establish legal guidelines within which the council could plan specific action. The upcoming city paving project was the first item of discussion. The Council officially ordained that the city was in need of improvements in the area of paving, curbing and guttering. This ordinance

put the legal wheels in motion and gave the green light to the engineering firm to go ahead with its official map of the sections of the city which will receive the paving.

The city, it was determined, would be responsible for 20 percent of the total paving costs. This percentage would be divided between two divisions of paving. Ten percent will be paid by the city toward curbing, guttering and paving. The city will also incur 100 percent of intersection costs which are about 10 percent of the total.

The remaining costs will be assessed to the land owners to be paid in five annual payments. The first will be due within 10 days after each paving unit is inspected and approved. The approximate cost of the paving is \$9.85 per lineal foot.

The Council next discussed buildings needed to house chlorinators for the City of Farwell's water lines. It was determined two buildings were needed to protect equipment necessary for proper chlorination of a system Farwell's size. D. E. Hammit, assistant water and sewer superintendent, appeared before the Council and gave estimates received from contractors for various structures. A motion was made by Jim Berry to accept the bid of Dura-Bilt Products Co. of Clovis. The company's bid for two metal buildings was \$540 each as compared to \$925 per building for concrete structures. The motion was seconded by Fred Chandler and it carried.

Construction of a city tennis court was discussed and general plans were outlined. Plans for a 100'x100' double court with a special entrance, fence and lighting system were accepted.

However, specifications for the tennis court will be obtained from a Clovis architect. On receipt of bidding companies' estimates, the Council will make the final determination concerning the matter. It was also brought out that the Farwell Youth Commission was willing to pay one-half of total costs up to \$4,000.

Action was taken and an ordinance effected as to the disposition of dogs in the city limits. On August 1, all dogs are to be licensed and tagged. Licenses will be issued on proof of vaccination for rabies. Dogs will not be permitted to run loose as of this date either. Owners of impounded dogs are told that after notification of impoundment and a reasonable length of time, unclaimed dogs will be destroyed in a humane fashion. The Council agreed to buy a new net for Douglas Landrum, city dog catcher.

Mayor Patschke introduced Carl Roach, contractor from Clovis. Roach appeared before the Council to give estimates on refurbishing the City Hall building. Roach estimated \$2500-\$3000 to stucco the entire building. And additional \$400-\$500 was estimated for metal studs necessary in dry-walling the three large windows.

Consideration was also given to part-time employees. It was determined to retain Gralee Parr while Janie Bowery is on vacation. Parr, a math major at Texas Tech, will maintain the city hall offices during the interim.

John Getz, publisher of the Tribune, expressed regret at the loss of Miss Crane by the paper and the community. Getz also commented, "Her work with us was a great inspiration to the staff of the paper and we all have thoroughly enjoyed our association for the past two years." At the present time, Judy Yell of Texico will assist in the news gathering duties for the Tribune.

School Tax Rate Increased

According to Gilbert Kaltwasser, president of Farwell School Board, Farwell Independent School District, will see a new tax rate increase for the 1973-74 school year.

A 15-cent increase, from \$1.85 to \$2.00 on \$100 property valuation will be necessary if the School Board is to keep its books in the black, Kaltwasser said.

He attributed the tax rate increase to the fact that the District will be receiving less money from the state this year because of a lower average daily attendance (ADA). The figures have gone from 620 to 605 this year with the 605 to be used by the state in appropriating funds for the coming school year.

New Park Discussed At Special Called Meeting

Texico City Council met Tuesday evening in a special called meeting at City Hall. Members in attendance were Mayor Manford Turnbough and Councilmen Bill Christian, Bill Thigpen and Wes Engram. Also in attendance were City Marshal Willie Ronquillo and Robert Montano of the Sanitation Department.

Major business of the meeting was to pay city bills. In addition, the council discussed sanitation problems in the community. Operation of the city's swimming pool was also on the docket.

The Council is seeking a new manager for the swimming pool for a two-week period. According to Mayor Turnbough, the position could extend through the summer should the right man be found.

The Council also discussed a piece of property they are looking at as a possible new city park. Council members Thigpen, Christian and Engram were appointed to draw up a preliminary plan for the park to be submitted with a grant application for Federal funds by August 1.

August 1 is the date of a hearing in Santa Fe where grants will be rejected or approved. If approved, the Federal government would pay 50 percent of total costs in preparing the land for a park. The state and city governments each would be responsible for

25 percent of the total amount. Final determination by the Federal government will be on a "community need" basis.

Christian said Eastern Plains Planning Council is working with the City of Texico in a "community need" basis. (Continued On Page 2)

Citizens of Hereford are currently preparing for the town's upcoming Diamond Jubilee Celebration scheduled Aug. 25-Sept. 1.

Serving as living memorials of the past, such enterprises as the "Brothers of the Brush" and the "Celebration Belles" kindle sparks of yesteryear by adopting the fashions of the late 1800's. Those clean-shaven and short-skirted citizens who are not animated by the Jubilee's hubbub are promptly given their due at the local Kangaroo Court.

A summer spiced with promenades, caravans and special exhibits will precede "Hustling Heritage Week" at the end of August. This year marks the 75th birthday of the city.

The present rate is figured on 39 percent of the total property valuation in the school district, according to Mrs. Dorothy Eason, tax assessor and collector.

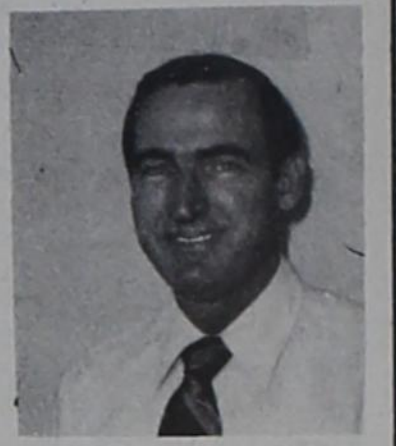

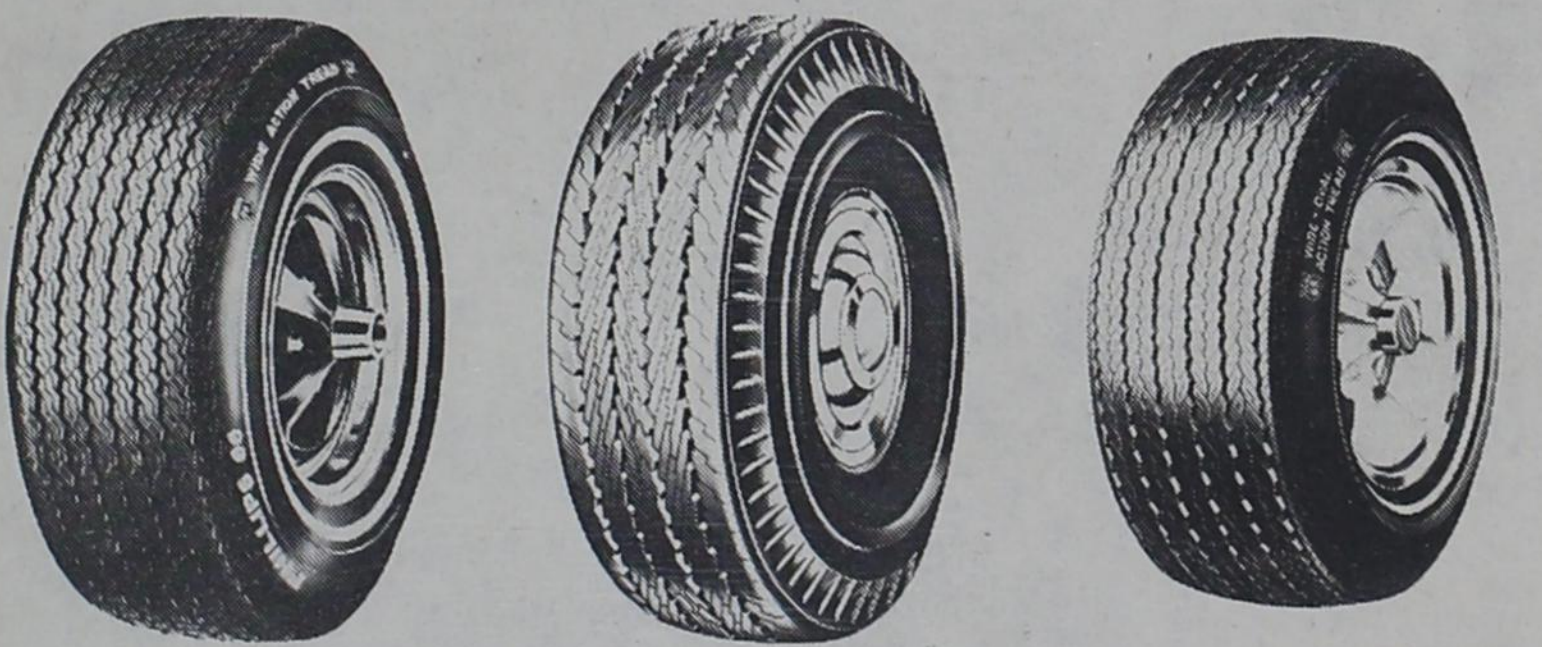

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Miss Langford At Band Camp

A young musician from Farwell is currently attending the 21st West Texas Instrumental Music camp on the West Texas State University campus Sunday through next Friday, July 15-27.

Jacquelyn Langford, Rt. 2, Farwell, is among the 1,100 students attending the music camp.

"Interest and enthusiasm is really high this year since the ceiling for camp enrollment was reached May 1," said Dr. George Umberson, camp director. "This is the earliest date we have ever closed the camp."

Regarded as one of the largest camps of its kind in the nation, the camp features band, orchestra and baton instruction along with private lessons.

"Seventy string instrument students, which is the largest number ever enrolled at the camp, will be attending, which should make this year's string and symphony orchestra the best ever," Umberson said.

Dr. Gary Garner, professor of music and director of bands at West Texas State, will conduct the honors band which is composed of the most advanced instrumental players.

Michael Matesky, assistant professor of music and orchestra director at WTSU, will direct the string and symphony orchestras.

"Goals we have for the camp are, first of all, to make the students better players," Umberson said. "But we also want them to leave better leaders, that is, to take positions of leadership in their bands at home."

"Many directors have told me that students who attend our camp are at least one semester advanced over what they would have been without attending the camp," he added.

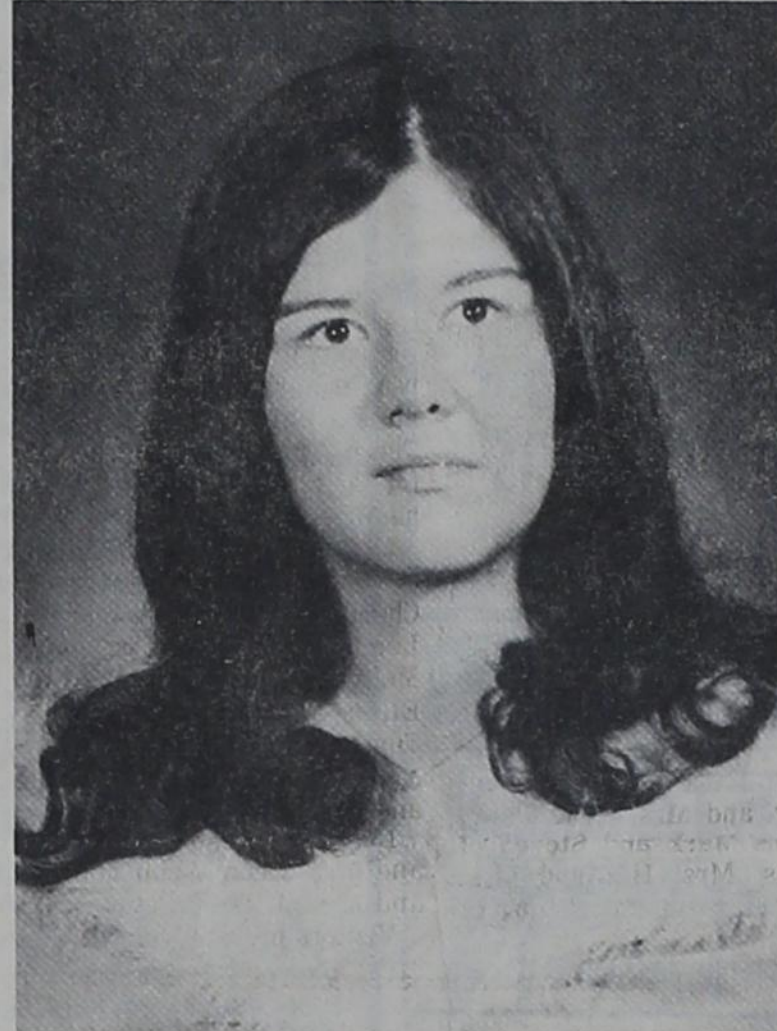

SIN KILLS—CHRIST SAVES

The Bible clearly states that "as many as have sinned without law shall also perish without law, and as many as have sinned in the law shall be judged by the law" (Rom. 2:12).

What some people overlook or forget is that entirely apart from the law, *sin kills*. This is evident on every hand. Envy, hate, vice and profligate living dissipate the human frame and *de-stroy* it.

This is why so many in pagan lands barely live out half their lives. "Sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death," entirely apart from law and judgment.

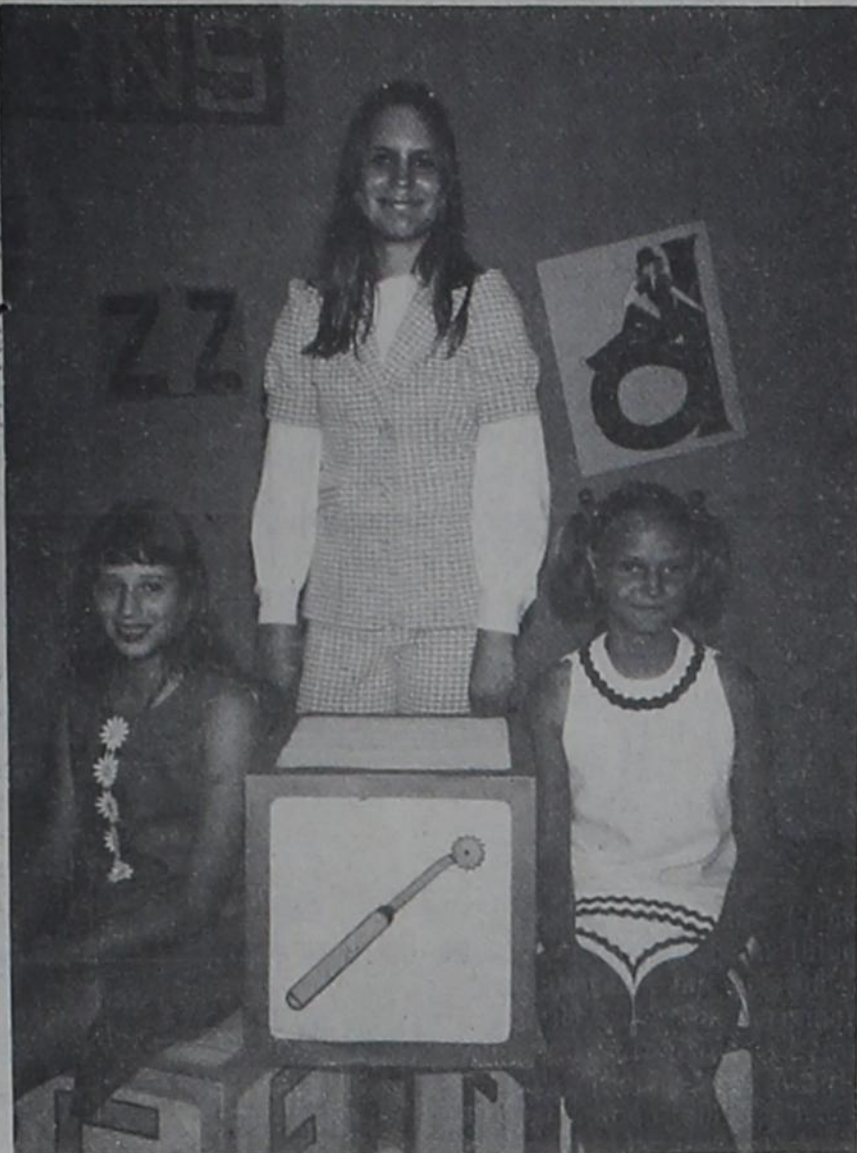
Five dollar gift certificates were given to the county winners from merchants in Farwell and Bovina. Consolation prizes were also given.

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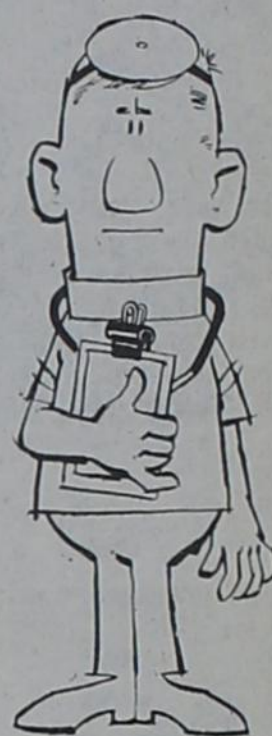

Nixon Announces Farm Safety Week

Farmers in Parmer County and the surrounding area should be aware that President Richard Nixon has proclaimed the week of July 25 as National Farm Safety Week.

As pointed out in his proclamation, the blessings of technological progress so significant in achieving agricultural abundance also add to the danger of injury on the nation's farms.

In keeping with the President's concern about safety in Rural America, and in an effort to help farm families avert daily hazards, the Department of Agriculture has undertaken a year-round farm and home safety program. Monthly emphases are centered on practices and activities that will help avert mishaps on the farm and in the home. Plans for the coming year call for renewed USDA emphasis on rural safety, says President Nixon.

Recent studies indicate falls in the home and from equipment in fields or around farmsteads are responsible for one-third of the annual national farm accident toll. Farm Safety Week this year will provide an excellent opportunity to point out hazards which may result in dangerous falls.

In addition to calling attention to risks involving falls, it is important everyone engaged in agriculture focus on other safety problems as well. Timely monthly farm safety emphasis programs are an opportunity for providing a safer and happier environment for Rural America.

"I call on all agency heads and on every USDA employee to stress farm and home safety all during National Farm Safety Week and throughout the year ahead," President Nixon said.

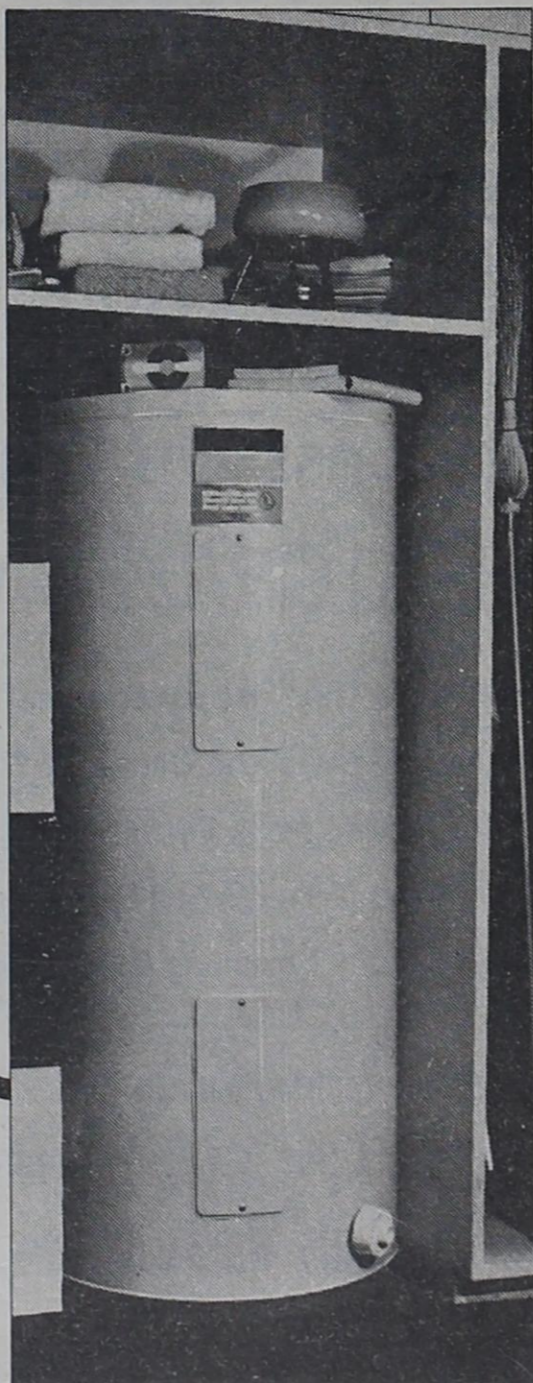
