

Divebomber Pilot Says Ship Is Easy Target

"Dive-bombing a ship at sea is duck soup, and we rarely ever miss one," Lt. Kenneth Grissom, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grissom of the Oklahoma Lane community, said in an interview here the latter part of last week.

Lt. Grissom who acheived much success as a farm club boy before entering the service, is just home from a fourteen and one-half month tour in the Pacific theatre, where he served as a dive-bomber pilot on a Douglass Dauntless. He saw service at most of the advanced bases of the American forces in the Pacific, including Hawaii, Soloman Islands, Luzon and in the Phillipine Islands.



August Truck Tire Quota Reduced

Passenger car and small truck tire quotas for the nation and for the Lubbock District remain the same for August as for July, but the quota of large truck tires was decreased, according to District Executive William G. Williams.

The reduction of more than 34,000 in the large truck tire quota will require the most rigid conservation of tires in this category, WPB and OPA said. The District Emergency Truck Tire Board will screen all applications with the greatest care to assure that purchase certificates are issued to only the most essentail applicants. Truck owners' and drivers are Urged to do everything possible to strech the life of their truck tires.

Production of both large and small truck tires was reduced by recent strikes in Akron, Ohio. Fortunately, production of passenger car tires was not greatly cut by the shutdown of ubber plants.

Despite curtailed production, substantial inventories of most small-sized truck tires permitted the July quota to be repeated in August. Only exceptions are the 700-20 10 ply and the 750-20 ten-ply that were short prior to the strikes and are new critically short. Because of the limited unmber of these size tires, the WPB has given OPA a seperate quota for them and each application




OTHER CAUSES TOTALS 538

What about Travel now....

under the new Government rulings?

The Government has curtailed civilian travel by ordering the railroads not to make reservations on passenger trains more than five days in advance of departure and by banning sleeping car service on trips of 450 miles or less.

A lot of people are assuming that, with the European war over, the travel situation on trains should have eased up by now.

But they are finding out that it's harder than ever to get space. They're asking themselves, "Why?"

The reason is simply that the railroads are being called upon to repeat a job of moving over 3,000,000 soldiers. But this time it is to be done in 6 to 9 months whereas originally it took more than 2 years to move these men. 4

The railroads are still operating with the same number of passenger cars that they had when the war started. Building new passenger cars has not been permitted since Pearl Harbor.

Many Pullman cars have been converted into


hospital cars, and, of course, more Pullmans and coaches than ever are being withdrawn from civilian service to use in the movement of men to the Pacific.


The great bulk of traffic for the Pacific funnels into 4 railroads to ports of embarkation in California. Santa Fe, with its improved facilities, is. carrying a large part of this traffic.

This all adds up to the fact that only a very. limited amount of space is left over for civilian travel.
