Taxpayers will be accorded the same oppportunity to save on their state taxes this year as in previous years of late, she offered. Payments made during the month of October will be subject to a discount of 3%, dropping to 2% discount in November and scaling on down to a 1% discount during the month of December. These discounts, she emphasized, apply only to STATE TAXES and are not to be deducted from county and school taxes.

Now is the time when most people are interested only in how the war is coming along and how to meet the emergencies created in our farming work by the war-as shortages of labor, machinery, etc. We don't seem to have time to figure out some of the things which we will need to be doing after the war is over. But, now is the time for us all to start doing some postwar planning along the line of agriculture in our county. If we don't start this planning now we are not going to be ready for some of the work which might come our way after the war.

Farmers Must Keep **Records on Cotton**

Farmers are asked to keep records of their 1943 cotton production and it is highly important that these records be kept accurately, said Ellis M. Mills, of the AAA office, today.

Mills explained that in the past years ginners have cooperated with the AAA by furnishing detailed records of cotton production for each farm, but this year these records will not be kept by ginners, due to suspension of marketing quotas. Production records, Mills said, serve as a basis for determining the yields used in marketing quota programs, crop insurance, and in determining AAA payments.

"It is to a farmers' best interest that an accurate record of his 1943 cotton production be kept because this record may be needed in future AAA programs," the supervisor remarked. He added that each farmshould keep every gin ticket, bale receipt, or sales ticket for baled cotton and for lots of seed cotton sold. Mills added that the AAA would be glad to keep the records for any farmer who wishes to deliver or mail them to the county office.




