## Bond Election Scheduled For \$260,000 School Improvements

The Farwell Independent School District Board will present to qualified registered voters in the Farwell school district a bond election in the amount of \$260,000 for school improvements on Tuesday,

Sept. 24. Polling place will be the Farmer County Court Room. The polls will open at 8 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m. CDT on Sept. 24. Absentee voting began Tuesday, Sept. 10, and

will continue through Friday, Sept. 20 at 5 p.m. Absentee voting is being conducted in the office of Dorothy Eason, school tax-assessor from 8 to 5 p.m. CDT each day, except Saturday and Sunday.

Two ballot boxes will be available to voters in the Farmer County Court Room, one for property owners and one for non-property owners. The bond issue must pass on the total vote and must also pass in the property-owner's box, according to Farwell superintendent, W.M. Roberts.

Additionally, Roberts stated, every voter should bring his voter registration slip to the bond election.

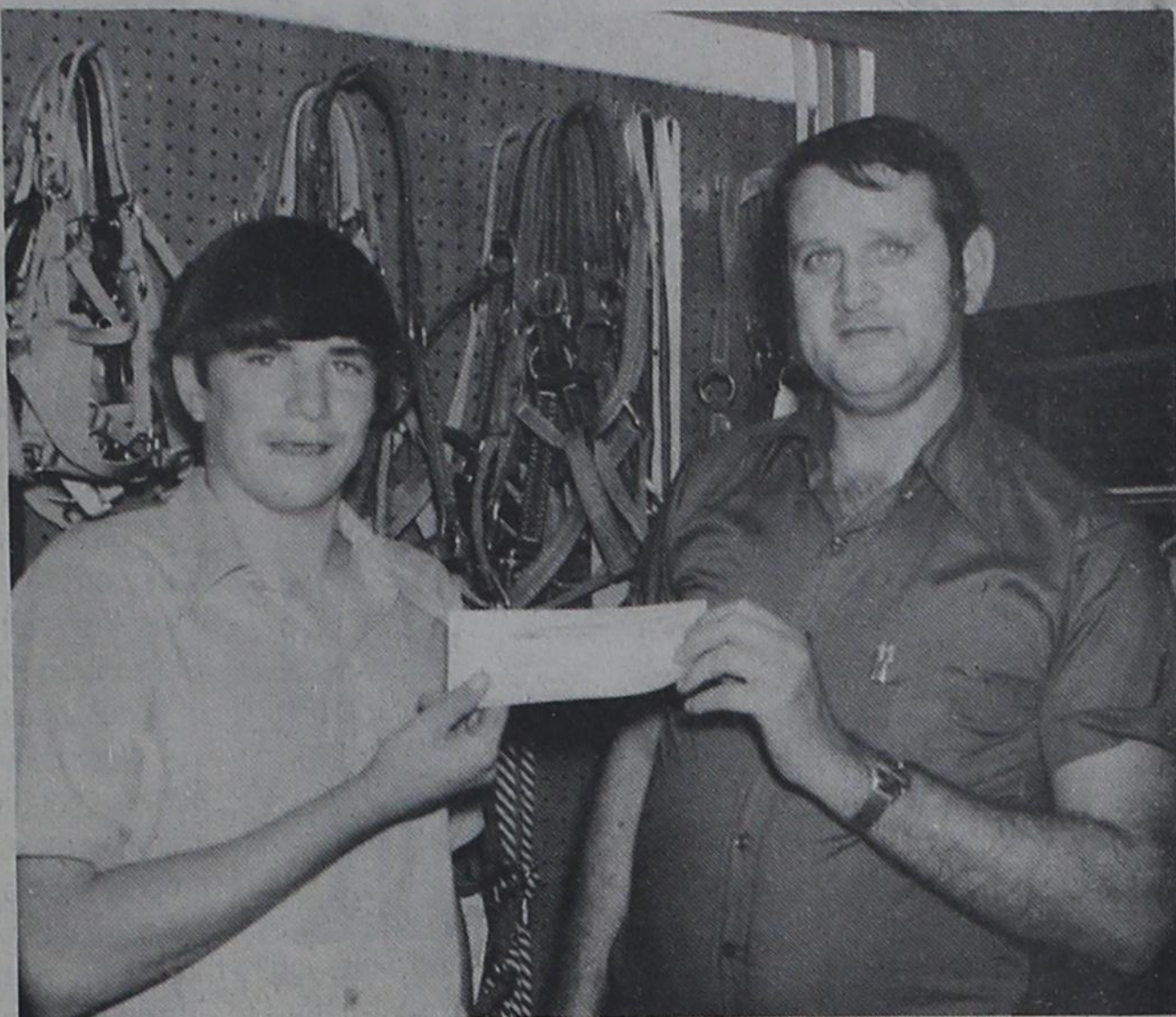
The \$260,000 bond issue will be used for the construction of a new band hall, paving the parking lot in front of the gymnasium, and repairing the high school parking lot and pavement in the bus loading and unloading area.

Also the old gymnasium will be repaired including tearing out the stage and placing dressing rooms in this area and leveling the floor on the east side of the gymnasium, replacing window units in the building and making other needed repairs to this building and shop area.

The funds will also provide for evaporative cooling in the lunchroom, relocating the football field and repairing the bleachers and improving lighting on the field. Also in the plans is the building of a concession stand and restrooms at the athletic field if the money is available.

Albert Smith was named by the Farwell School Board as the presiding judge and he is to secure what help he needs for the election.

The Farwell School Board would like to have the support of the people in the community in the passage of the bond issue.

## Community Senior Center Receives Grant From AAA

check of a year's grant to the Community Senior Center in Texico at a meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 5.

Accepting on behalf of the

City of Texico was Mayor Manfred Turnbough, and on the behalf of the Community Senior Center were Joe Caywood, director, and A.D. McDonald, president.

The check from the A.A.A. is partial payment of a year's grant totaling \$6,050 for operation of the Community Senior Center. A federal grant in the amount of \$3,250, along with \$2,800 from residents of the area, Curry County and the City of Clovis make up the total grant amount.

Caywood has resigned as president of the center to fill the position of part-time paid director. He stated plans are to have the center open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 to 12 p.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. MDT.

The regular meeting nights are the first and third Thursdays at 7 p.m. MDT. A pot luck supper is served. Membership in the center is open to residents of Texico and Farwell of mid-age or over. A 50 cent membership is assessed upon joining. At present the center has approximately 60 members.

Caywood said plans are to have singing prior to the meals at the Thursday night meetings, and the group is considering having another Thursday night of the month for singing only.

# Bobcats Claw Wolves In Clash

Hagerman's Bobcats ventured into Wolverine territory Friday evening to claw the Wolves to a 25-8 victory in the first game of the 1974 football season for Texico.

In the first quarter of action, Texico was forced to punt on downs and the Bobcats were successful in an attempt to block the punt. Hagerman took the blocked punt and reaped a harvest of six points. The Wolverines blocked the extra point attempt.

On Hagerman's fourth play of the second quarter, the Bobcats once again gained Texico's end zone to add six more points to their side of the scoreboard and the Wolverines again foiled the PAT.

With five minutes left in the second quarter, Joe West intercepted a Bobcat pass and returned it 55 yards into the Hagerman end zone to put the Wolverines on the scoreboard. Tommy Galvan ran the PAT and added two more to the Wolverines scoring effort.

In third quarter action, both teams held their ground and neither team was able to penetrate into scoring territory.

The Bobcats regained their momentum in the final quarter of play and connected on a six yard pass for their third touchdown of the evening. Again, the Texico team blocked the extra point attempt.

As the final minutes of the

game ticked off the clock Hagerman racked up seven more points to make the final tally of the non-district tilt 25-8.

"My reaction to the game was that basically we did a good job on defense but our offense just couldn't click to get going," said Wolverine Head Coach Ray Manly in commenting on the Texico-Hagerman clash.

According to Manly, Hagerman was a little bigger than the Wolverines and their overall speed and quickness were contributing factors to Friday's game outcome. Hagerman is sporting some seasoned veterans and this was their biggest advantage," he said.

Texico suffered no severe injuries during the game with moderate injuries including two twisted ankles. Manly stated that all players should be ready to go when the

Wolverines meet their next opponents.

The Wolverines will go on the road tonight (Friday) when they travel into Longhorn territory to battle Lazbuddie. Kick off time has been set for 8 p.m. CDT at Lazbuddie.

"I have scheduled some position changes for the Lazbuddie game. Lazbuddie played Whiteface a pretty tough game. They're a pretty young and salty club but they play pretty fair. When things are right, they play tough. When things are wrong, they can be a little soft. But I look for them to be tough tonight," said Manly in reference to the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

The Texico coaches and players urge everyone to attend the pep rally this afternoon and to be present tonight at 8 p.m. as Texico takes on their second opponents of the 1974 season to avenge the loss to Hagerman.

## Chiefs Scalp Steers In Season Opener Loss

With the first game of the '74 season a thing of the past, the Farwell Steers are looking for a win this week against Sundown. Friday's 44-0 raid by the Friona Chieftains left the Steers more determined to get winning team into shape. Although the Chiefs scored twice during the first quarter, the Steers made a good try defensively, holding the Chiefs on the kick-off plays to a 24-yard field goal. Gene Christian and Mike Woods teamed with plays from quarterback Lesley Curtis for three first downs when Farwell had possession for the first time. But play was halted when the Chiefs intercepted a pass intended for Gary Green and took control again. Jay Alana, playing defensively, finally stopped Friona's Cleveland on the 10-yard line but the next Friona play put the Chiefs over. The point after touchdown was good and the scoreboard glared 10-0 in favor of the visitors. The next few plays by Farwell were stopped about mid-field and Friona began another assault into Steer territory which resulted in a climaxing three touchdowns by the Chiefs during the second quarter. On the opening plays of that quarter, Farwell fumbled three times and all were recovered by Friona. With three TD's and three good PAT's for Friona, the Steers headed for the dressing room at half time with the scoreboard showing Friona leading 31-0.

Opening the second half, the Steers charged for yardage. But a penalty for illegal motion gave the Steers a first and 15 situation. George Garza went for eight followed by Mike Woods for 11 yards and that needed first down. The next first down try failed and Friona took over again for another touchdown. Mike Goettsch took the reins for his first try of the evening as quarterback and went for four yards on a quarterback sneak. Jack Foster made the first and it looked good for the Steers but a pitch-out failed and Friona recovered the loose ball. Cleveland again took a long pass and got through to the Steer one-yard line. The Steers just couldn't hold the Chiefs and with one second left in the third quarter, the Chiefs made seven more big ones - 44-0.

The opening plays of the last quarter, Farwell drew two penalties. Brad Jones hauled in a 23-yard pass but another pass play was intercepted. The Steers had the ball for three more TD attempts. They fought hard, but the weight advantage of Friona left Farwell off the bottom of a 44-0 score.

"The score of the Farwell-Friona game was real deceiving. We played a real good game but Friona had us in size and experience. They are a real seasoned ball club and the fact that their coach has been with them seven or eight years aided in their win," stated

Steer Head Coach Eugene Jennings in commenting on Friday's game, adding, "Friona was not as physical as we thought they would be."

Jennings remarked that Farwell's pass defense broke down and the numerous fumbles which occurred made the difference in the ball game. "Our backs did a real find job of running. Gene Christian, Mike Woods and George Garza really did an outstanding job in the running field. And Lesley Curtis executed real well at quarterback." ### Pearce Wins Ribbons

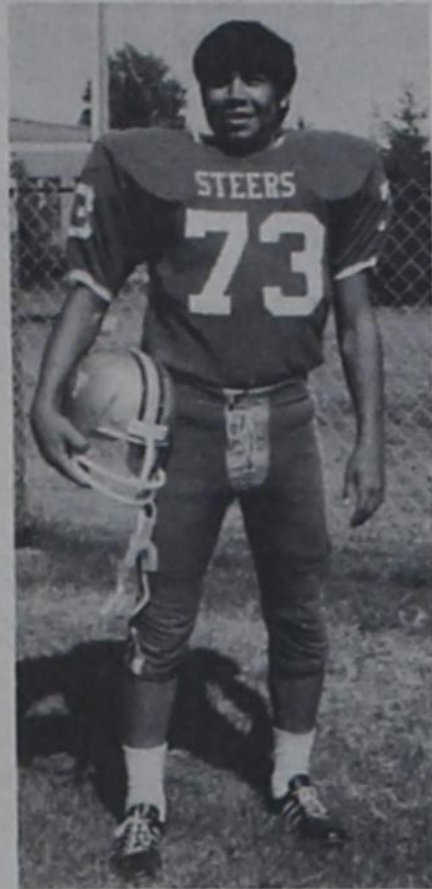

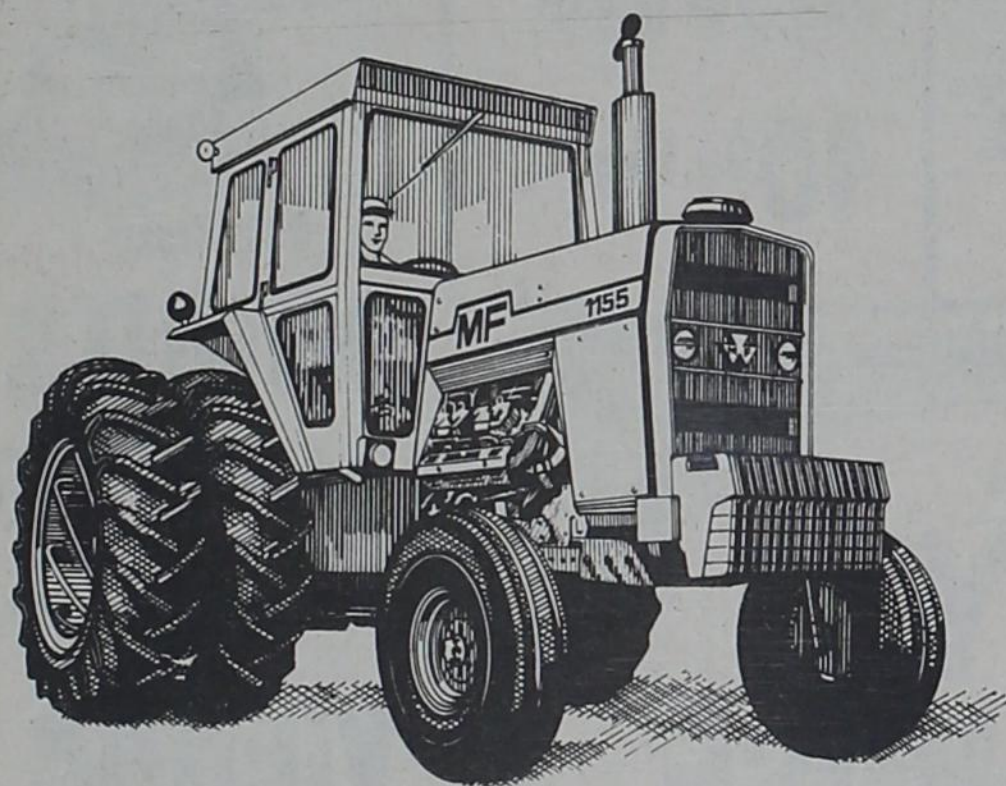

## Jana Pronger Has Active Interest In Parmer County 4-H Youth Work

Last month Jana Pronger marked her third year as Parmer County Extension Agent. On Aug. 1, 1971 Jana became the Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent. Her job title was changed about one year later, so she now fills the position of Extension Agent.

Jana hails originally from Stratford, Tex., and is one of five children of Mr. and Mrs. A.E. Pronger Jr. She has three brothers and one sister. Two of her brothers are high school students and one is a spring graduate of Texas A&M University. Her sister is an elementary school student.

A graduate of Stratford High School in 1967, Jana enrolled at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Tex., and completed four years there, graduating in 1971 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in home economics education. She minored in art.

Her student teaching assignment was at Stephen F. Austin High School in Bryan, Tex. Preparatory to assuming her present duties, Jana went to Perryton for a two-months training program with the extension agent.

As Parmer County Extension Agent, Jana is deeply involved with the youth of the county in 4-H activities. She acts as advisor for 4-H clubs and for home demonstration clubs and serves as coordinator for extension home economics programs in Parmer County.

She travels to all areas of the county to give demonstrations on any phase of home economics. At present the county has two home demonstration clubs, one at Oklahoma Lane and one at Rhea. Jana states attempts are being made now to organize a club at Lazbuddie. Activities of these clubs encompass such areas as crafts, foods, family relations - all areas that are of interest to women.

Jana works with all six 4-H clubs in Parmer County, including clubs at Farwell, Friona, Lazbuddie, Rhea, Bovina and Oklahoma Lane. These clubs are open to both boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19. She tries to attend as many meetings of these clubs as time will allow.

One of the big activities of the county 4-H clubs is the annual 4-H Project Fair. This year's fair is being held today (Friday) at the New Community Building in Friona. Competition is divided into different divisions to give entrants a chance to display many items that they have made in their various projects.

Divisions include canned and baked goods, clothing, arts and crafts, poultry and rabbits, fresh vegetables and fruits, and crops 4-H members have grown or helped to grow.

Another highlight of the year for 4-H members is the Achievement Banquet, scheduled this year in October. Each entrant who submits a record book on his particular project will receive an award, Jana stated, with special awards to be given at the banquet.

All clubs in the county meet for at least six 30-minute meetings on specified projects each year, according to Jana.

Each 4-H club has an adult leader. The new program entitled "Design For Discovery" lists projects and references that may be of interest to a 4-H member. Goals of each project are listed and different ways of accomplishing the goals are suggested.

Head, Heart, Hands and Health is what 4-H stands for. "All projects are geared to further the mental, physical and emotional development of 4-H members," Jana states.

"4-H is a program that can be of mutual benefit for the children as well as adult sponsors," Jana comments, "if the adult is willing to share his knowledge and if both are willing to share responsibilities in accomplishing mutual goals."

Jana, as county 4-H advisor, is involved in the planning and enactment of such 4-H events as the Food Show, Bake Show, Dress Revue, Livestock Shows, 4-H Project Fair, Method Demonstration Contest and Judging Contest and other special activities.

Frequently Jana is called on to serve as a judge for numerous activities, both in

Parmer County and out of the county. She served as a judge for the Cookie Bake-Off Contest at the 1974 Curry County Fair.

Jana is a member of the Texas and American Home Economics Associations, Texas Association of Extension Home Economists, the National Association of Extension Home Economists, Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church and is president this year of Delta Epsilon Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi in Clovis.

Additionally, she serves on the Parmer County Committee for Planned Parenthood and on the Board of Directors for the Panhandle Planned Parenthood Association. She is serving as secretary of the latter organization this year.

SECTION 1: That said election shall be held on the 24th day of September, 1974, in the County Court Room, County Courthouse, Farwell, Texas, and the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for said election.

SECTION 2: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:  
ALBERT SMITH Presiding Judge  
CAROLLA SMITH Alternate

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than seven qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.  
On election day the polls shall be open from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

DOROTHY EASON is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the School Tax Office in said District, Farwell, Texas, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

SECTION 3: That at said election the following proposition shall be submitted:  
Shall the Board of Trustees of the FARWELL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT of Farmer and Bailey Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of

TWO HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$260,000) for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal and of interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?

SECTION 4: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code.

so as to permit the elector to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. At said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who had duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election and said notice shall be published one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the election in a newspaper of general circulation in the District.

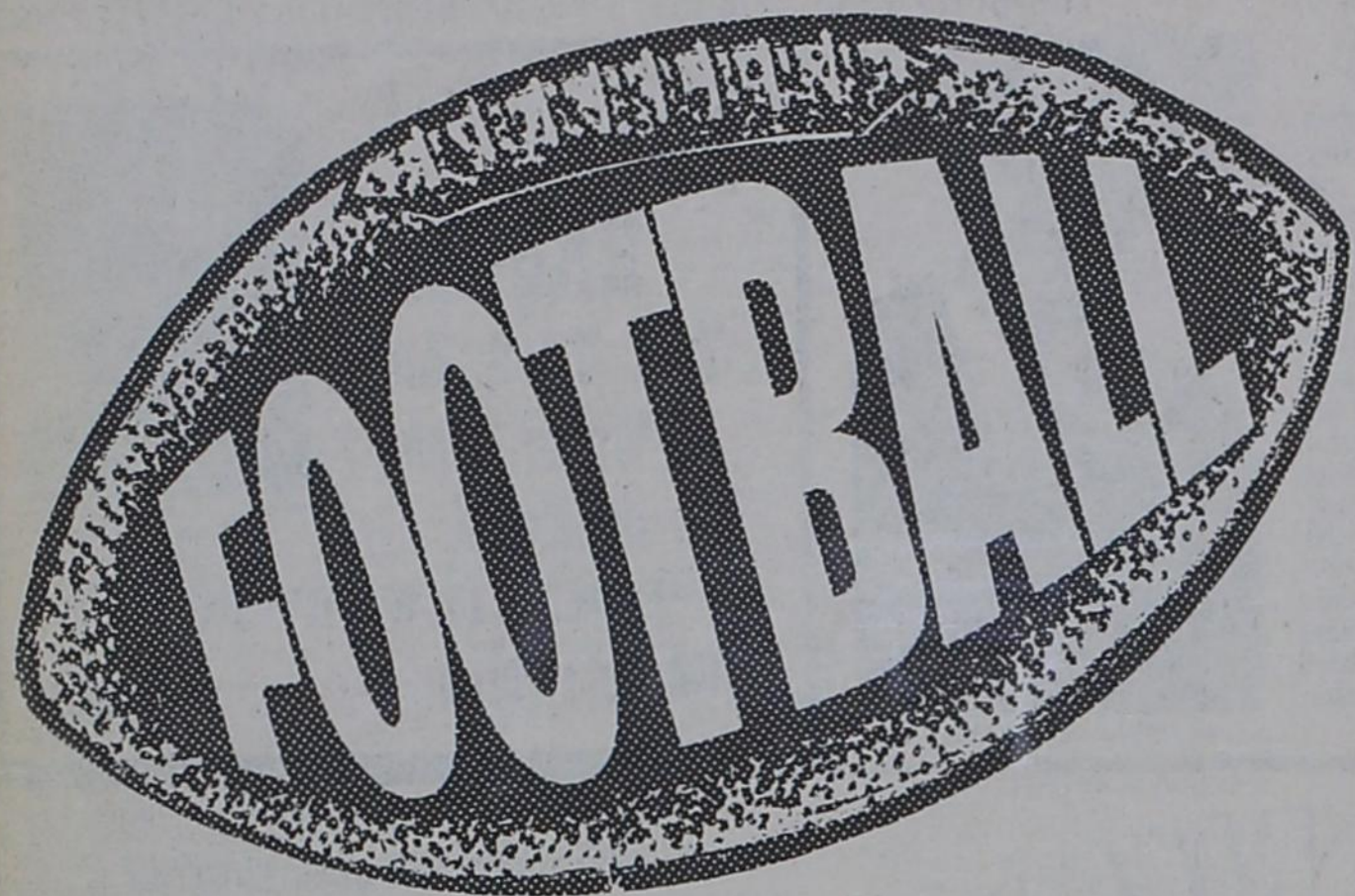

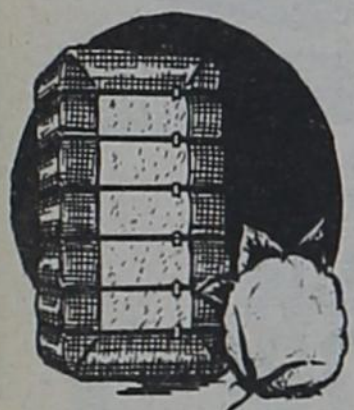

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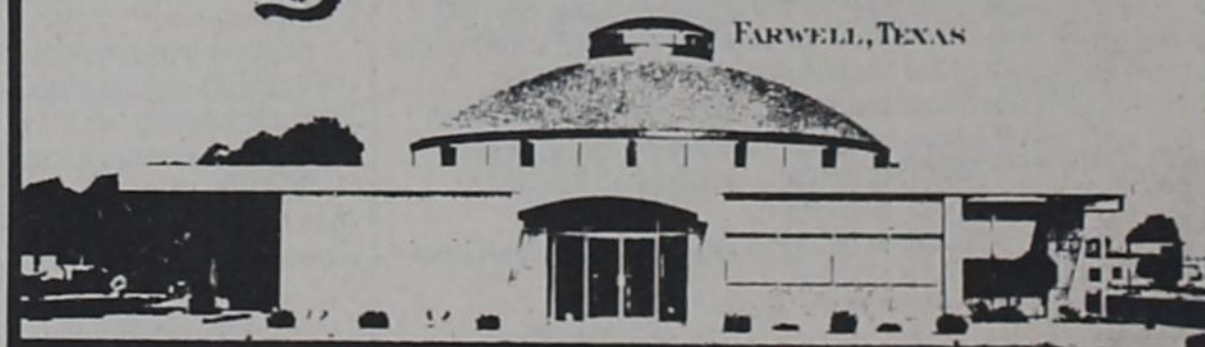
