FORT WORTH,-Fuel tablets used around the world during the war for heating "C" rations may soon be everyday utilitiy items for Texas hunters, fishermen and outdoor workers

More than 21 million packages of fuel in tablets and in cans are now for sale, the War Assets Administration announced today. These compact fuel units can be used outdoors by placing them in a hole in the ground large enough to fit cooking

Samples of different sizes of cans and tablets are on display in the WAA Fort Worth regional office in the T&P Building. Minimum purchases range from 25 cartons for small retailers to 100 cartons for large retailers.

SURPLUS HOSPITAL MATERIAL

Hospitals, universities and colleges or North and West Texas will be able to share in an offering of 13,000 new hospital and laboratory type autoclaves and sterilizers to be made nationally available by the WAA for one month, starting October 15. 



Chock-full of Chowder

If the meat situation has you stymied, serve chowder tonight instead. Seafaring folk learned the stout-hearted satisfaction of such kettle cookery centuries ago. Legend says chowders originated in Brittany, famed fishing sector along the coast of France. Long ago, when the fishing fleets came back from far-flung seas, there would be a great communal celebration.

At sight of the first sail, out came a huge black cauldron. And into the pot went fish, crustacean, vegetable, and spice. Each family tossed in its contribution as a measure of rejoicing. And there, along the shore, was brewed a mammoth stew in which the whole community partook. In time, this custom grew into a festival, like America's own county fairs.

Today's sturdy chowder stems from that hospitable tradition. It has the air of a collation about it still, as though its ingredients were tossed in by lavish, grateful hands. And it rejoices in that same rich aroma, that robust flavor compounded when honest sea food is stewed

into one richly glorious composition. Its making is quite casual: condensed cream of green pea soup pro-vides a vegetable stock base; saves precious cooking time by coming prepared in a can. Into this soup is tossed haddock or cod, potatoes, salt pork, the omniscient onion, crackers, and milk. You will find this chowder makes a heart-warming, a soul-staying meal teamed with salad and a fruit dessert:

Fish Chowder

Wash-1 lb. haddock or cod. Cover with-3 cups water

salted withteaspoon salt. Cover then simmer for 5 minutes. Drain, reserving stock.

Add to stock and cook until tendercups diced, raw potatoes. Remove skin and bones from fish. Cut into cubes.

Cut into small pieces-1-inch cube fat salt pork or 1 strip

bacon. Sauté. Remove to absorbent paper. Sauté in pork drippings-

1 medium onion, chopped. Add to potato mixture-

1 11-oz. can condensed cream of green pea soup, undiluted 3/3 cup milk

1/8 teaspoon pepper 12 oyster crackers, split in half Cooked fish listed above. Heat thoroughly. Serves 8. (1 cup per serving).

Q. Can milk production be increased by giving cows more water? A. It is often possible to increase production of a herd by 10 to 15 percent, simply by increasing the number of times they are watered. If possible, water should be available

at all times with water cups at each stanchion. If not, cows should be watered at least three times daily, winter and summer.

Q. I have quite a large number of young cockerels that I wish to market as broilers. What is the best way to finish them out?

A. Use a broiler growing feed all the way until the birds are marketed. Fattening feeds are not generally used for feeding broilers.

Q. What kind of housing is required for dairy goats?

A. Housing for goats need not be elaborate. The Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company recommends a dry, well ventilated build-ing that is free from drafts, with a floor that has good drainage and a surface that can be scrubbed and disinfected. Individual pans for feeding grain should be provided, and an ample water supply must be available at all times.

Q. What is the best hay for feeding work horses?

A. An excellent hay for work stock is a mixture of well-cured clover and timothy; mixed alfalfa and timothy; or similar combinations. These mixtures are usually better than a single source of hay, because they possess the good qualities of both legume and non-legume hays.

Q. Can turkeys be caponized?

A. Yes, but caponizing does not seem to be practical or economical, probably because it takes turkeys nearly two years to reach physical maturity and the results of caponizing are not evidenced until after that time.


