DD apparently is as effective in nematode as other chemicals for this purpose, including carbon disulphide. methyl bromide mixtures, and tear gas. And the cost is much less than the other chemicals, which ran from eighty to several hundred dollars

Trials at the Plant Industry Station of Beltsville, Md., and the Branch Experiment Station, Weslaco, Texas show that DD is highly effective on the common rootknot nematode when soil conditions are favor-

The DD liquid is applied in holes driven into the soil or as an emulsion, sprinkled on the surface.

DD, now in limited commercial production, is a mixture of 13 diochloropropylene and 1-2 dichloropane.

Jennings Gives Platform In Asking Election

Joe W. Jennings, of Hale County, this week anounced the formal platform on which he seeks election to the Legislature from the 120th Legislative District.

In the last election, Jennings received 6,026 votes of a total of 12,-379 votes cast, being defeated by 327 Large Enrollment Is votes. "Had I received 165 more votes I would have been elected by a narrow margin," he said. "With a more vigorous campaign this time, I feel confident that I will be successful," he said. 'Many citizens have indicated to me that they want a



change at Austin. I have never held any political office."

A native Texan, Jennings graduated from Texas A. & M. in 1911 taught vocational agriculture, managed a ranch in Bailey county in 1916-18, served as county agent in Lubbock and Randall counties, and since 1929 has farmed in Floyd county where he owns and continues to operate a 320 acre farm since moving to Plainview.

His platform advocates:

1. Retention permanently of 4c per gallon refund on farm-used gasoline. 2. Equitable proportion of farm to market roads for West Texas.

3. Adequate support of the needy aged, underprivileged children, the deaf, dumb, blind, and insane, but is not in favor of creating an Utopia

4. American system of free enterprise, as opposed to government regimentation.

5. Reorganization of Texas Legislature by reducing the House of Representatives from 150 to 93, three representatives nom each of the 31 senatorial districts, same being designated as Places One, Two and Three, so arranged as to equally represent each district.

6. Adequate, but not exhorbitant salary for legislators, thus tending to reduce length of regular sessions and to decrease number of special sessions, and to give legislators something over the expense of attending. This would make the members independent of gratuities of wellmeaning friends and free them from obligations thus incurred.

7. Four-year terms for all elective offices, both state and county, deducing expenses of elections and increasing services of public officials.

He irrevocably opposes: 1. Any form of state control of our underground water resources. If, and only when, any control should appear advisable, that it be under districts governed locally by elected representatives, subject only to such special advice and specific information as may be necessary or desirable from the State Board of Water Engineers.

2. Any new or higher taxes and deficit financing, except in cases of dire necessity. Strict pay-as-you-go state fiscal policy and building up in good times a cash reserve to serve as a cushion in leaner years.

3. Unnecessary governmental interference in private business and agriculture-"more business in government and less government in bu-

4. Government by special blocks or by pressure groups.

on the Santa Fe

Santa Fe serves the Southwest with two main lines.

The northern route runs across the plains of Kansas, southeastern Colorado, and goes over the mountains at Raton Pass.

The southern route leans south in eastern Kansas, runs through Oklaboma, the Texas Panhandle (where it is joined by other Santa Fe lines serving Texas), crosses central New Mexico, and joins the northern route again near Albuquerque.

Questions, Answers For **Discharged Veterans**

Q. How does the Veterans Adminstration determine the amount of pension to be paid a disabled veter-

A. The VA has rating boards that review the veteran's medical records. These boards decide how much he is disabled and award him a pension based on the percentage of his disability. The awards range from \$11.50 to \$115 per month.

Q. When a veteran applies for a loan to buy a home does he have to pay the appraisal fee on the proper-

A. Yes, However, he may arrange with the lender for payment of this fee out of the loan.

Q. Can a veteran go to a college or school as long as he wants to?

A. Veterans are entitled to one year of schooling, plus one month of schooling for each month of active duty in the armed services up to a maximum of 4 years.

Q. If a veteran becomes disabled while taking on-the-job-training, is this considered the same as a service-connected disability?

A. Yes. Q. Are all veterans entitled to free private dental care?

A. No. Only veterans with serviceconnected conditions are entitled to

Q. Can a veteran convert National Service Life Insurance into a 20or 30-year endowment policy?

A. No. He can convert his term insurance only to ordinary life, 20payment life, or 30-payment life po-

Q. Is the widower of a woman veteran entitled to pension at her death, and are the children entitled to any pension?

A. A widower is not entitled to pension under the present law, but surviving children may be.
