Health Notes

AUSTIN,-Because of the fact that a venereal disease is no respecter of persons, people of every class and color, rich and poor, educated or ignorant are numbered among the victims, asserts Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Heath Officer.

"Venereal diseases are among the most vital health problems in the State of Texas today," Dr. Cox said. "The amount of suffering, economic loss, insanity and even death from venereal diseases cannot be accuartely estimated but would reach a shocking figure if disclosed."

The State Health Officer pointed out that self-diagnosis and selftreatment are extremely dangerous and advised consulting a physician for determining definitely whether or not a venereal disease is present.

"Only a reputable physician can properly diagnose such a disease. The presence of gonorrhea is not disclosed by a routine blood test, and the diagnosis of syphilis requires more than a blood examination," declared Dr. Cox. "Both syphilis and gonorrhea are almost 100



Voicing the all-but-plaintive request through Commander Fred M. Sloss, USNR, director of the New Orleans office of naval officer procurement, the Navy asked enlisted WAVES veterans who saw active duty during the war to return to duty in the rates they held at dis-

Their peacetime tour of duty will last only until July 1, 1947, it was announced, although hope was held that legislation during the coming, year will set up regular Navy status for WAVES and make possible permanent appointments.

Women between the ages of 20 and 36 will be accepted. Cdr. Sloss said, regardless of the time elapsed since discharge, although applicants may not have dependents under 18 years of age.

Ratings to be acceptéd include seamen; telegraphers; parachute riggors; aerographers mates; avia-

tion machinists mates; instrument; aviation storekeepers; hospital apprentices; pharmacist mates; specialists; gunnery; specialists teachers; link trainer instructors; specialists, teachers, link celestial navigation trainer; specialists, transport airmen and specialists, control tower opera-

Cdr. Sloss said that applications from Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi should be submitted in writing or in person to the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, Federal Building, New Orleans. Applications from Texas and Oklahoma will be handled by the Office of Naval Officer Procurement at the Naval Air Station, Dallas, he said.

Questions On College Answered For Vets

Q. Is it possible for me to complete a four-year course in three years if I go to school during the summer and regular school year?

A. Under the accelerated program in some schools, it is possible to complete a four-year course in three years or even less.

Q. In event a vet is employed, can he meet all requirements for a degree by attending late afternoon and evening classes?

A. Some colleges and universities have served the needs of employed workers for many years by offering a complete program of instruction in late afternoon and evening. With the exception of medicine, requirements for a degree in any curriculum may be met while the student is employed full-time during the day. Since it takes proportionately longer to complete the college work on a part-time basis, approximately 60 percent of the veterans in the past two years have preferred to obtain subsistence benefits from VA and attend college full-time.

Q. May I transfer from one college to another under the provisions of the Service-mans' Readiustment or Rehabilitation Act?

A. Yes. Under the regulations of the VA, the vet may change his school, but must have the approval of VA in advance.

Q. If I get out of service just before school opens and do not have


WARNING
