This was the confident statement of Chairman G. D. Anderson of the War Finance Committee today when asked about the progress of the sale of series E bonds in the Sixth War

Figures released today by Chairman Anderson showed that total sales of E bonds to date have amounted to \$117,543.25, which leaves only about \$7,000 yet to be sold. "I feel certain we will sell that amount before the close of the week," he said.

The quota of \$120,000 in the sale of all other series was reached the middle of December, before the Change in Taxing deadline on such sales, and the time for placing E bonds was extended until January 1st. The E bond quota for the county

was \$125,000, cash value.


