Texas Enters Final USO Campaign

In typical style Texans are accepting their responsibility to put the state over the top in the next and final USO drive, Governor Coke R. Stevenson, General Chairman, said today.

Texas' share of the \$19,000,000 quota is \$800,000. Stevenson added, "We are particularly pleased with the manner in which Texans are accepting the responsibility of leadership in the counties throughout the state. These leaders are providing the backbone of the organization necessary to make this drive a success."

Stevenson pointed out that there are still approximately 125,000 Tex-

ans in the service and we certainly cannot overlook our responsibility to them. He said, "We cannot overlook our responsibility to these men who are helping us to win the peace. Morale problems in the armed forces are greater now than ever before and I feel that we owe as much to those in uniform now, as those who served during the combat phase of this war."

FIFTEEN MEN JOBLESS

COLLEGE STATION—The gears of a Model T Ford and the brains of J. B. Hons and some neighboring Karnes County Farmers put 15 men out of work. According to County Agricultural Agent A. P. Morris the farmers fashioned a fork lift on their tractor with the Ford parts to bull rake their hay and put it into eight foot ricks. The home-made lift will also be handy in loading the hay on wagons if it is found necessary to haul it to the barn or stack it in feed lots, he says.

The man power the machine would replace is Mr. Morris' own estimation.

USES NEW LIGHTING AID

Vertical walls of light shooting skyward from the lateral edges of the runway will provide an "aisle of light" for pilots landing aircraft during soupy weather at Idlewild Municipal airport, New York City's gigantic new landing field. This innovation, developed by engineers of the Westinghouse Electric Corporation, will be one of several landing aids designed to make Idlewild an all-weather haven for pilots of transcontinental and world-flying aircraft.

LEGAL NOTICES

A JOINT RESOLUTION S. J. R. NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton

Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937. **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING

THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE," and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the

proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Used Motor Vehicles Go To Veterans

Offering of 648 used motor vehicles, all items on the "set aside" list for sale exclusively to veterans of World War II, was announced today by Hamilton Morton, War Assets Administration regional director in Fort Worth.

The vehicles, at sixteen different locations throughout north Texas, are available for inspection from July 29 through August 13, with the exception of Saturdays and Sundays. All are being offered the ex-servicemen at fixed prices and purchase may be made on a mail-order basis following inspection according to the catalog mailed to a list of several thousand vets.

Passenger sedans, jeeps, motorcycles, weapon carriers, carryalls, a wide variety of trucks and trailers are included in the listing. Locations include Abilene AAF, Amarillo field, Pantex ordnance plant, Big Spring AAF, Camp Bowie, Camp Hood, Dalhart AAF, Fort Worth AAF, Fort Worth quartermaster depot, Lubbock AAF, Pampa AAF, Camp Wolters and Goodfellow Field, San Angelo.

Awards will be made August 14 and 15 by WAA on the basis of the oldest dated certificate for each type of vehicle. Veterans are urged to inspect all vehicles before ordering, and to submit a list of alternate choices.

New Dressing Rooms For Tech Athletes

LUBBOCK, TEXAS—New dressing quarters for Texas Tech athletes and visiting teams are being erected on the Tech football field to replace the old facilities which burned out two years ago.

The quarters will be housed in a new 72X30 foot fireproof concrete building which will be divided into two large rooms, one for use of Red Raiders, the other for visiting teams. Showers and hot water will be provided. The building also will have modern rest rooms for public use.

The structure was started when it became apparent the proposed new \$300,000 stadium for Tech would not be ready by fall. When the stadium is completed the dressing rooms will be assigned to track and baseball teams. The burned portion of the football stands have been razed.

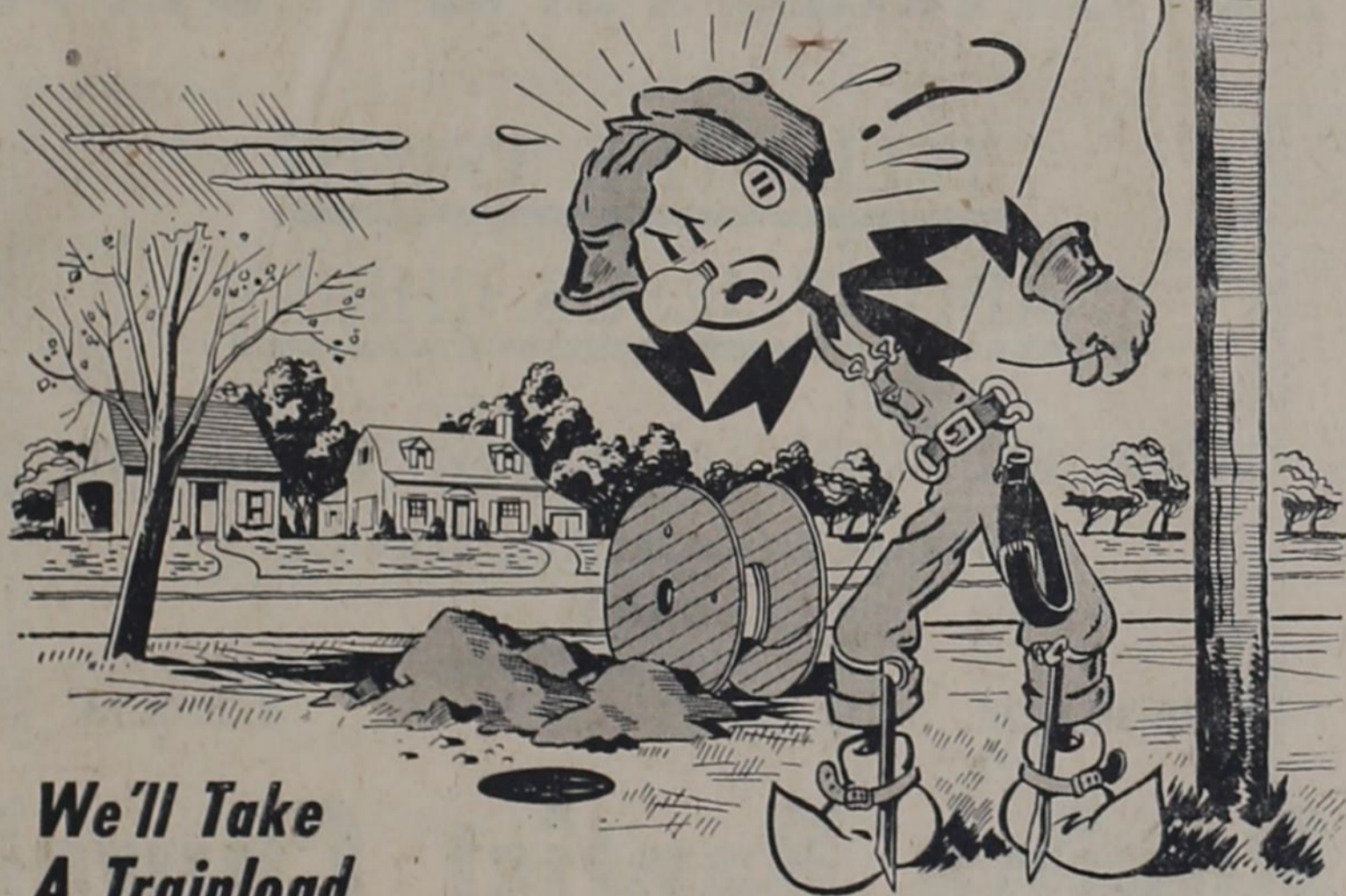

Tips Are Given On Freezing Dairy Goods

COLLEGE STATION—Butter, cream and some kinds of cheese may be preserved successfully in a home freezer unit if a few precautions are taken, says Gwendolyn Jones, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Butter to be frozen should be made from pasteurized milk or cream. If the milk has not been pasteurized the butter gets rancid or acquires off flavors in two or three months.

Prepare and season butter as for eating. Although some authorities say unsalted butter keeps fresh longer than salted butter, Miss

Jones says salt will not cause it to get old if the butter is of high quality and is kept only three to six months. Pack in half pound or one pound rectangular molds, wrap in cellophane paper, and package tightly in waxed cartons or clean, dry, plain tin cans. Avoid air space or excess water in the package.

Only the best quality heavy cream should be frozen. In handling milk, avoid containers and equipment which are made of copper or iron. Pasteurize the cream at 175 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Stir well. A teaspoon of salt or a tablespoon of sugar or corn syrup per cup of cream helps to keep a better texture. Chill the cream and then pour it into leakproof containers to freeze. When ready to use allow it to thaw in the refrigerator. This cream does not whip as the original cream does, but it may be used otherwise as fresh cream.

Well-ripened cheese is cut in about 1/4 to 1/2 pound blocks, wrapped in cellophane and frozen. When cheese thaws it dries out rapidly and should be used soon. Cottage cheese does not freeze very well.

Texas 4-H Roundup At College Station

COLLEGE STATION—The Texas 4H Round-up will be held here August 27-30, Dr. Ide P. Trotter, director of the A. and M. College Extension Service has announced.

Two boys and two girls, selected from each county on a basis of accomplishment in 4H Club work, will attend a three day program of instruction and entertainment. County

agricultural agents and home demonstration agents from counties will also attend the Round-up. J. P. Schmidt, supervisor of Farmer's Institutes and Professor of Rural Sociology Extension with the University of Ohio, will be on hand to conduct leadership training for the adults and direct panel discussions. Iris Davenport, representative from Southern Agriculturist magazine, will instruct the club girls.

Classes for girls will include handicraft, good grooming, and making corsages. Boys will receive instruction in beef and dairy cattle, swine, poultry, sheep and goats. Outstanding boys and girls will participate in panel discussions under the direction of Professor Schmidt.

Entertainment highlight will be a magician show and party at Sbis Hall for both adult leaders and club members.

Four club members who attended the National 4-H Club camp will give reports and district rifle teams will compete for state honors. Girls from 77 counties will model dresses in the State Dress Revue August 30.

According to Lorene H. Stevens, 4-H Club Specialists with the A. and M. College Extension Service, 1200 boys and girls will take part in the Round-up.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 49

Proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-A"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring right-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-A and to read as follows:

"Section 7-A. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring right-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roads, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from the motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Section 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall

have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring right-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring right-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

Proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund; for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and

administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Section 62 (A). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per cent (5%) of the compensation paid to each person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person."

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal or any interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said funds, such amounts of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person."

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in

bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of the said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

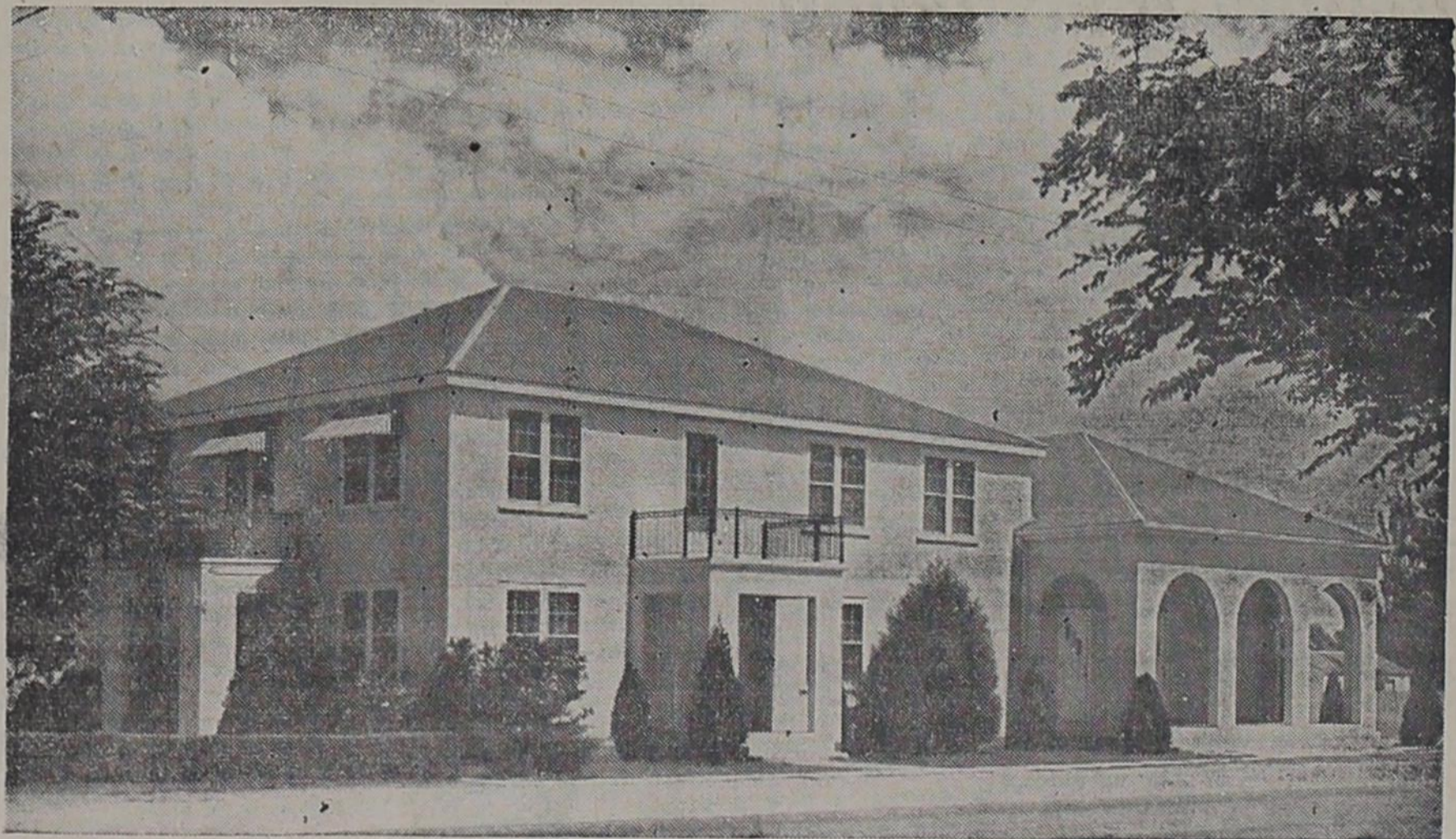

E. Butler, polling 241. Incumbent Jesse James, state treasurer, was also favored in Parmer, polling 739 votes to Clarence Williams' 314. Pat M. Neff, Jr., received the largest vote in Parmer County for attorney general. His count ran 680, and opponent Price Daniel had a total of 405. J. E. McDonald, seeking return as commissioner of agriculture, polled 311, while R. E. McDonald had 358. W. R. Chambers carried 184, and Benjamin F. Hill received 134.

Olin Culberson, current railroad commissioner, was out in front with a total of 668, while Mac Coker received 283 ballots and Ike Lyons had 96. In the race for associate justice of the supreme court, place 1, Charles T. Rowland had 420, and John H. Sharp counted 509, while for place 2, associate justice, Graham B. Smedley drew a total of 461 and James B. Hubbard edged him with 463.

For judge of the court of criminal appeals, the count ran: Jesse Owens, 519; Weaver Baker, 129; Joseph Dickson, 140; Tom L. Beauchamp, 188.

All of the above races for state offices show totals without the Rhea box, unreported here as The Tribune went to press.

With sufficient votes in to decide the candidates, the Texas Election Bureau reported on Tuesday that run-off campaigns were due for August in the race for governor, for lieutenant governor, for agriculture commissioner, and the court of criminal appeals.
