Every box in the county fell short of a record vote, officials andicated, adding that a total of 1500 or more ballots could have been cast in the county.

Interest in this county centered particularly on the race for district judge, for district attorney, for county and district clerk, and for

county judge.

In the final tabulation, with all boxes reporting, incumbent Judge A. D. Smith was returned to office by a close count of 37 votes, having received a total of 716 to the 679 garnered by W. O. Cherry, of Borina. Loyde A. Brewer, of Friona. also took a close win for the clerk's office, nosing out Charles Lovelace, LEWIS C. COX, minister of the of Farwell, 726 to 668. Incumbent



Awards will be made August 14 and 15 by WAA on the basis of the oldest dated certificate for each type of vehicle. Veterans are urged to inspect all vehicles before ordering, and to submit a list of alternate choices.






