a lovely Christmas party, held in the American Legion Hall, Tuesday.

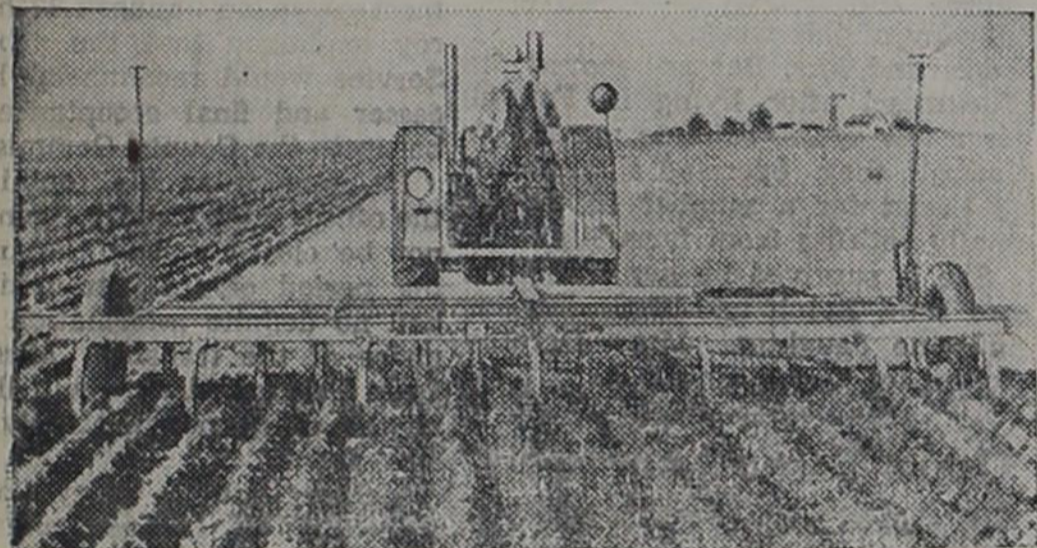

Stadium Plans Are Okayed For Tech

LUBBOCK—Final plans for the proposed new stadium for Texas Tech have been approved by the committee of business men, faculty and alumni named by the Tech board of directors to map the program.

Dr. Clifford B. Jones, president emeritus of the college, said the structure will be ready for use next fall, provided the government will release materials.

Plans call for a seating capacity of over 15,000, with arrangements for enlargement to 45,000, should attendance at football games make it necessary. About 2500 bleacher seats, under the plan, would be used until the enlargement starts. Funds totaling \$300,000 already are available for the project.

At the first of this year there were 5250 New Mexico families whose orders for service had not been filled. 3947 of those applicants now have service. and we now have more employees than ever before. In 1940 there were 547; today there are 933. They have been resourceful and competent in meeting unprecedented demands for service. We are carrying out the largest construction program in New Mexico in our history this year. Despite material shortages, our gross construction program in this state in 1946 will amount to approximately \$1,672,000.

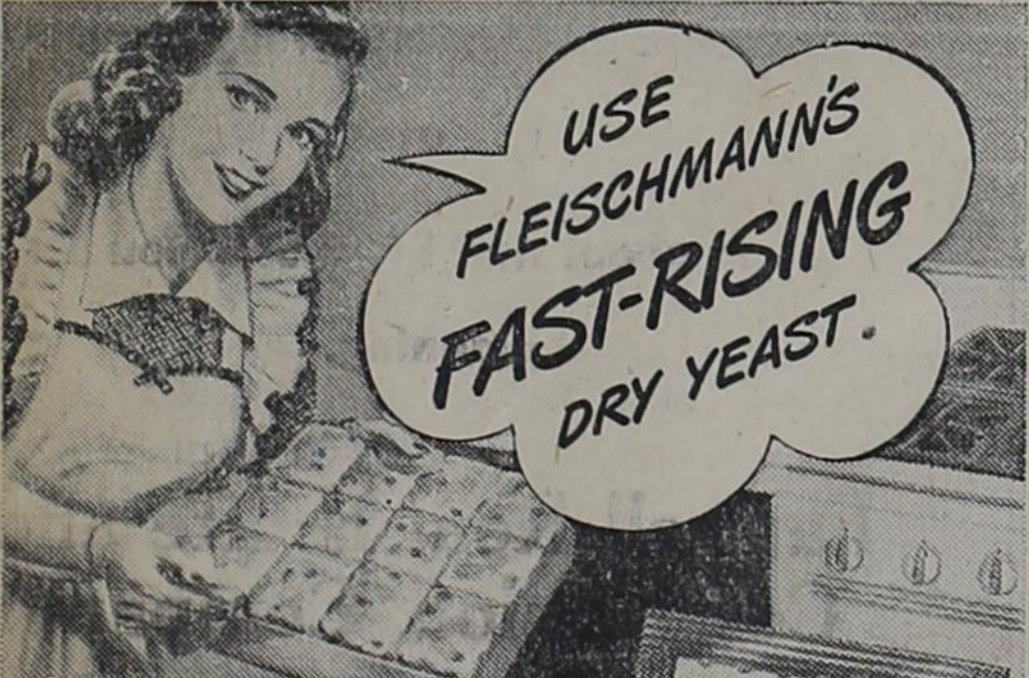
