

County Agent Lee H. McElroy tendered his resignation to the Parmer County Commissioners Court here Monday with the announcement that he was going to Tarry County to take over a similar position, assuming his new duties on January 2nd.

In announcing his intention to make the change, McElroy said that the new position offered a "definite advancement' over the position he has held in Parmer County for the past five years, exclusive of the time he was in the Army.

Before coming to Parmer County in November of 1941, McElroy served as assistant agent in Lubbock County. He remained here until May of 1942, when he entered the service, and was in uniform two years. Upon receiving his discharge in November of 1944, he returned here and has been serving as agent since that time.

At present, the Extension Service has no man available to offer as his successor, but the name of a new roy explained that the Extension Service would recommend his successor and final acceptance would be up to the County Commissioners.
