The meeting is scheduled to close Wednesday, and the Parmer county delegation is expected home on Thursday or Friday.

Oil Test Nearing Contract Depth

Drilling on the wildcat test some 4½ miles northeast of Farwell, Tharp No. 1, is nearing the contracted depth of 7,500 feet, it was reported early this week. The drill has reached a depth of 6,810 feet, and operations are continuing. To date, according to reports, at least two small showings of oil have been encountered, neither of which would be paying. Speculation here is that the test will be completed within the next few days, or weeks, at the longest.

Lonnie Coltharp Is Buried In Okla.

Lonnie Coltharp, age 44, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Coltharp, who were pioneer residents of Texico, was buried at Erick, Oklahoma, on November 14, it was learned here this week.

He was born at Texico on April 5, 1902. After his parents proved out a homestead claim south of here, they came to Texico, where Mr. Coltharp operated a meat market for a number of years. Lonnie took up railroading and followed that trade for several years.

Survivors include two sons, John Erlon, a veteran of World War II, who is attending Oklahoma A. & M. College at Stillwater, and Keith, also a veteran, a senior in the Erick high school. His mother, Mrs. J. B. Coltharp, resides in El Paso. His father died in Texico several years ago.

Amarillo Boosters Will Visit Bovina, Dec. 6

The Amarillo good will trippers, 100 strong, who are making a four-day good will tour of this section, are scheduled to visit Bovina and Friona on Friday, December 6th, it was revealed here today.

The trade boosters will make these two stops in Parmer County on the last day of their excursion, enroute back to Amarillo, after visiting in the Pecos Valley in New Mexico. The schedule calls for a 15-minute stop at Bovina, starting at 5:15 p. m. Going from there to Friona, the special will stop for 20 minutes, arriving at 5:50 the same day.

The special train bearing the group left Amarillo at 8:30 a. m. on December 3rd, going to Lubbock the first day, after making all intermediate stops. On the second day, Dec. 4, they are scheduled to leave Lubbock at 1:00 p. m., arriving in Texico-Farwell at 4:20 this (Wednesday) afternoon, and concluding the day at Clovis, where they will spend the night.

Thursday will be spent visiting towns in the Pecos Valley, with the first Texas stop scheduled for Bovina, on their return home, Friday afternoon, Dec. 6th.

The boosters will be accompanied by a 40-piece band from the West Texas State College at Canyon, and a band concert will be rendered at each stop. Businessmen of Bovina announced early this week that preparations for a big turnout was being arranged for the visitors.

ASSISTS AT POSTOFFICE

Mrs. Lois Billingsley is assisting Miss Reva Martin at the Farwell postoffice during the absence of Mrs. Noma N. Lokey, postmaster, who is receiving medical treatment in Mineral Wells, Texas.

One of the most gruesome crimes ever committed in the State of Texas was called to mind this week, when Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Lindop returned here for a visit with Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Smith and other relatives.

It was the Lindop family that resided on the Hassell place when the famous case broke, resulting in the finding of nine bodies buried in a cellar located in the farm home yard. Lindop recalled that he was the man who came to Farwell to get a doctor and Sheriff Jim Martin when Hassell had attempted suicide, after he had been questioned about the disappearance of his family.

That was just a few days before Christmas in 1927. Hassell was brought to Farwell and placed in jail, where he confessed to killing his wife and eight children, burying them in the cellar, and then covering the opening to the cellar grave.

Before his confession, Hassell had maintained that his family had gone to visit relatives in Oklahoma while he remained behind to close out his affairs and conduct a public sale at his farm. It was on the day of the sale that suspicion crystallized, principally when Hassell put up for sale several personal household effects, and he was questioned.

On the day of the sale, people trod over the shallow grave that hid the nine bodies of his victims. Hassell was found guilty of the mass murder and was later electrocuted at the Huntsville prison.

County's Wheat Crop Is Needing Moisture

Complaints of dry weather are being voiced here this week, as the wheat farmers begin to survey fields that got off to a good showing early in the season.

Due to the excellent growth made some weeks ago after soaking fall rains, thousands of head of cattle have been shipped here from other regions, and placed on the wheat for grazing. Already reports of cattle movements are being heard, and farmers report that unless moisture in some form is forthcoming soon, an exodus of livestock from the fields may be expected.

Producers point out that dry weather thus far is not calculated to be detrimental to a wheat crop next year, owing to the splendid underground season. But, weather conditions are effecting the growth to such an extent that it will afford little grazing without additional moisture.

Wheat pasturage is still in demand, with stockmen as far away as Durant, Oklahoma, inquiring about pasturage here during the past week, one wheat grower reported.

Chism Sale Northwest Of Portales, Dec. 10

Col. Dick Doshier of this city, this week announced a general farm clean-up sale at the Bill Chism farm 12 miles northwest of Portales on Tuesday, Dec. 10, starting at 10:30, New Mexico time.

Fifteen head of registered Jersey cattle will be featured in the auction. Also included will be a large collection of household goods and farm implements, together with a number of miscellaneous items.

Frank Doshier and O. W. Francis will serve as clerks of the sale. A complete list of the offerings will be found on page seven of this issue of The Tribune.

ATTEND MEETING TODAY

Harold Carpenter and Leon Billingsley, both of the Parmer County Triple A office, are in Lubbock today (Wednesday) attending a one-day meeting of agency workers. The crop insurance program for 1947 and commodity loans for both 1946 and 1947 are to be discussed, Carpenter said before leaving.

Despite the exceedingly dry year, many farmers in the Lariat section have been reaping an unexpectedly abundant harvest of grain during the past few weeks.

Elevator men at Lariat reported last Friday that grain had been coming in in such abundance that sufficient cars to haul the crop to market were not being furnished by the railroad company. Boone Allison, manager of one grain elevator, said that an average of "three to four cars" were being furnished each week, "just about enough to last half a day," he added.

Irrigated crops, south of Lariat, came through with wonderful yields as had been expected. But even the dry land farmers were gathering more grain than their fondest expectations. One farmer reported a yield of 800 pounds of threshed maize to the acre on land that had already produced a 14-bushel wheat yield this year. "I got two crops when I really didn't expect any," he commented.

Joe McWilliams, who farms in the Lariat section, is believed to have the best dry land grain crop in that region.

The car shortage was forcing Muleshoe farmers to haul their grain to Farwell over the past weekend, it was revealed.

Fat Steer To Provide Barbecue For Legion

Fresh beef from one of the fat steers now in the Triplett & Pringle feed pens at Bovina will provide the barbecue to be served at an open house program, to be rendered in that city on Saturday, December 7, starting at 6:30 p. m.

The beef is being donated, and Bob Pringle, local manager, said that he would guarantee plenty of barbecue, "if we have to kill an 800-pound steer".

The occasion will celebrate the formal opening of the recently completed American Legion Hall at Bovina. Officials of the Legion there have extended a general invitation to the public to attend, and those who made contributions to the building fund are especially invited to be on hand. All former servicemen of the county are expected to be in attendance, and are requested to appear in their uniforms.

A program will follow the free barbecue, and service men are urged to remain for the program, on which prominent Legionnaires of this area are scheduled to appear.

Rev. George York Is Pastor At Bovina

Arriving last weekend to take up his duties as pastor of the Methodist Church in Bovina was Rev. George York.

Rev. York comes to Bovina from Greenwood, Mississippi, and was assigned to the Parmer county charge after Rev. Woodrow Adcock, previously named for the pastorate, was transferred to another work as a recognized promotion. Former pastor for both Bovina and Oklahoma Lane was Rev. Roscoe Trostle.

Rev. York occupied his pulpit in Bovina last Sunday. His wife and one small child will join him in Bovina after the first of the year.

Christmas Holidays Are Announced For Schools

Holidays for the Yuletide season have been set for both the Texico and Farwell schools, Supts. B. A. Rogers and H. A. Clift reported today, with both institutions dismissing classes on Friday before Christmas, December 20th.

However, the Texico students are slated to enjoy a little longer holiday, not being asked to return to classes until January 1st, while the Farwell scholars will re-assemble for regular work again on Monday, December 30th.

Various Christmas programs and festivities are now in the making by the classes of the schools, with the general program of the Texico school being slated for Friday night, December 20th, officials announced.

Owing to the fact that girls' teams are limited in the number of games which they may play in one day, the Farwell invitation basketball tournament, announced last week to open on Thursday night, December 5th, will instead get underway tonight (Wednesday), December 4th, Coach Jack Williams reported today.

With eleven girls' teams and eight boys aggregations competing for championship honors in the invitation meet, games are arranged for Wednesday night, Thursday afternoon and night, Friday afternoon and night, Saturday morning, afternoon and evening.

The Friona Squaws, already rated as one of the strongest title contenders, will open tournament play tonight when they take the floor against the Bula aggregation, with the game beginning at 7:30. Also representing Friona during the evening will be the Chiefs, who will meet the Bula boys at 8:30.

Hostilities on Thursday afternoon begin at 1:30, when the Oklahoma Lane and Spade girls tangle, followed by the boys' teams of the same schools, playing at 2:30.

Starting at 7 o'clock on Thursday evening, three games will feature the second round of the series. First up will be the Lazbuddy and Texico girls, the winner moving into the semi-final bracket. Then will come the Farwell and Pleasant Hill girls' game, at 8, with the Farwell Steers and Lazbuddy boys meeting at 9.

Play Friday afternoon opens at 1 o'clock when the Friona-Bula winner will meet the Oklahoma-Lane Spade victor, while the second game of the afternoon pits Grady, in a first-round pass, against the Farwell-Pleasant Hill winner. Both games are quarter-final series.

The Bovina and Ranchvale girls meet at 7:30 Friday night, the winner advancing to the semi-finals, while the Bovina and Morton boys will take the floor at 8:30.

Semi-final play for the boys' division will come Saturday morning, when the Farwell-Lazbuddy high team takes on the Friona-Bula winner at 10, and the Bovina-Morton champ plays the top scorer of the Oklahoma Lane-Spade tangle at 11.

For the girls, semi-final play begins at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon, for the lower bracket, and at 2 for the upper bracket.

Finals for both divisions will be played on Saturday night, the boys taking the court first, at 8 o'clock, while the girls will battle it down to the final score at 9.

Trophies To Be Given

Trophies for the tournament will be the most generous in several years, due to the fact that such prizes have again become available in quantity, Coach Williams said.

First and second place awards will be presented to teams in both divisions, while six girls and five boys, selected by an unnamed committee, will be given the gold basketballs signifying their positions on the mythical all-tournament team.

C. D. Holmes, of Friona, and Charley Fisher, of Clovis, will be on the floor with the whistles, while Abie Crume has been named as official scorer. No official timekeeper had been secured Tuesday.

Tickets Give Admittance

Giving holders of season tickets their money's worth, Coach Williams announced today that these ducats, sold earlier in the season for all types of sports, would admit their holders to the Wednesday night and Thursday afternoon sessions.

He stressed the fact that such tickets were good only for these two specified sessions. Otherwise, admittance at the door will be 25c and 40c throughout the tournament.

Friona-Ranchvale Favored
Speculation as to which teams might be expected to clash in the finals gave the nod to the Friona and Ranchvale girls, both of whom have already lambasted considerable opposition. However, the Lazbuddy and Grady girls are also on the eager-beaver list, and it may be a battle royal to decide which teams will go on to final play.

On the boys' side of the ledger, no definite choices were given by the arm-chair observers, the consensus of opinion apparently being that it was "six of one and half a dozen of another". Due to the early date of the tournament, not many of the teams have had much activity, and little statistical information could be compiled in predicting the champs.

Extension Of Draft Law Recommended

WASHINGTON—An Army decision is expected this week on whether to resume the draft in January after a two-month holiday—a step manpower advisers are reported to favor.

Officials said recommendations are in the hands of Secretary Patterson and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Chief of Staff, awaiting action. Those advisers favoring a call on Selective Service for a quota next month are understood to contend it would spur volunteer recruiting, as well as supplement it.

Latest reports show volunteer recruiting took an upward turn in the third week of November, after a steady decline for more than a month. Recruits, including regulars who reenlisted or extended shorter terms of service to three years, totaled 5,006 compared with 4,444 the previous week.

But for the entire month a total of only about 20,000 was expected, representing little more than half the 37,000 monthly fixed by the War Department as a minimum requirement of the regular army.

It was to determine the recruiting trend that the draft decision has been postponed since the October quota of 25,000 was unexpectedly cancelled when only half filled, along with the November quota of 15,000. Selective Service was informed at that time that there would be no more calls for men from the war department at least until after the year's end.

The action was laid to a temporary state of Army over-strength that has since been reduced by discharges. It left Selective Service with a backlog of qualified registrants between 19 and 25, considered ample to meet renewed monthly calls of 25,000 the first quarter of 1947.

Large Wheat Farm Sells This Week

One of the largest wheat farms in Parmer County changed hands the first of this week, when a deal was consummated between Paul Jones, of this county, and W. B. Harrison, of near Stamford, Texas.

In the transaction, Jones sold to Harrison some three sections of farm land, located in the northwest section of the county, those handling the papers reported.

This is the second large sale of land to take place in recent weeks, with the Jersig acreage, north of Bovina, having been sold to H. A. Poindexter, of Friona, in October.

FFA BUYS PIGS AT SALE

Two pigs and one sow were recently purchased by the Texico FFA department for project work, when a sale was held by Leon Madelo, supervisor Tom Hudson reported today. The three are all registered Duroc animals, Hudson added.

Christmas Lights Will Soon Be Turned On

Workmen completed the job of stringing colored lights in Texico and Farwell last Saturday, and the Christmas lights will be turned on this week, possibly on Thursday or Friday.

Hundreds of the brightly-colored bulbs, strung across the Main Street and across the intersection of Highways 60 and 70 in Texico, have been placed in readiness, and will give the Twin Cities a bright holiday attire throughout the Christmas season.

Nominating Committee Will Be Selected, 5th

Members of the Parmer County ACA committee from all communities have been called to meet in the local office on Thursday morning of this week, for the purpose of naming a nominating committee, which, in turn, will meet on Saturday, December 7th, to list prospective community committeemen.

Harold Carpenter, ACA secretary, reported today that it was now planned to hold the county election of committeemen on Tuesday, December 10th, at the regular community polling places in the county.

Annually, representative farmers of the different sections are named by their neighbors to administer the various duties of the ACA in the county, and Carpenter urged that all eligible voters take cognizance of the announcement that the election will be held next Tuesday, and help in selecting those who will have charge of their program.

300 Applications For Payment Mailed

The first group of applications for 1946 payment under the government's ACP program left the local AAA office on Friday, Harold Carpenter, local secretary, said today, adding that the first mailing totaled 300.

"We are mailing more applications as fast as they are completed," he added.

Before applications for payment can be mailed, farmers are required to fill out performance sheets, showing the various types of conservation work done under the program.

UNDERGOES OPERATION

Mrs. G. W. Magness was removed to a Lubbock hospital early last week and underwent a major operation on Wednesday. Reports from the hospital are that she is "doing as well as could be expected", and that if her condition continues to improve she will be able to return home early next week.

Pension Requirements Discussed For Vets

Q.—What is the difference between compensation and pension?

A.—Compensation is a term used to describe monetary benefits payable for service-connected death or disability under laws administered by Veterans Administration. The term "pension" is used to describe non-service-connected monetary benefits.

Q.—Is a widower of a World War II veteran eligible to receive compensation or pension?

A.—No; the term "widow" does not include a widower with reference to payment of compensation or pension based on the death of a World War II veteran. However, a widower is eligible to receive unpaid disability compensation or pension which accrued prior to the death of a woman who had served in the armed forces in World War II.

Q.—How do I go about filing claim for pension on the death of a veteran who was my sole support?

A.—You should file your claim for pension with the Veterans Administration on its Form 535.

Q.—Will various monetary benefits received by veterans under the G. I. Bill be deducted from future bonus?

A.—No, that portion of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill) which formerly provided that any benefits received under the Act would be deducted from any future bonus authorized, has been repealed.

A.—Yes.

Education On Co-Op Plan Is Resumed

DALLAS—Engineering education on the co-operative plan will again be made available at Southern Methodist University with the beginning of the spring term in February, Dr. Umphrey Lee, president of the university, has announced.

In successful operation from the time the school was organized in 1925 until interrupted by the Navy V-12 program in 1943, the co-op plan of technical training provides students with opportunity to divide their time between industrial employment and college training.

Dean E. H. Flath of the SMC school of engineering said that engineering students on the co-op plan work in partnership, dividing their on-the-job time and classroom time. They also divide any vacation offered by their industrial employer.

To qualify, students must have satisfactorily completed all prescribed freshman pre-engineering work. The plan is approved by the VA and may be selected by veterans attending school under the GI Bill.

Plan For Convenience In Electrical Outlets

COLLEGE STATION.—Adequate wiring with plenty of electrical outlets makes rooms more comfortable, convenient, and adaptable to furniture arrangement, according to Mrs. Berniece Claytor, specialist in home management for the Texas A. and M. Extension Service. She offers several suggestions for those planning to build or remodel their homes.

In the living room, Mrs. Claytor advises placing duplex outlets so that no point at the floor line is more than six feet from an outlet. In each smaller space that is three feet or more in length, she suggests placing an additional outlet. This makes it possible to place furniture where desired.

In the bedrooms, include triplex outlets near each bed and behind dressing tables for lamps, clocks, heating pads, radio or electric blankets. Also remember the convenience of lighting in the closets.

Place lights at the head and foot of each stairway. A night light in the upper hall will insure safety to children, invalids and guests. Duplex outlets near a hall table or chest allow for lamps or a vacuum cleaner when cleaning.

Kitchen needs include plenty of outlets at counter height to take care of all present and probable future needs. Lights are necessary over the sink and food preparation counters.

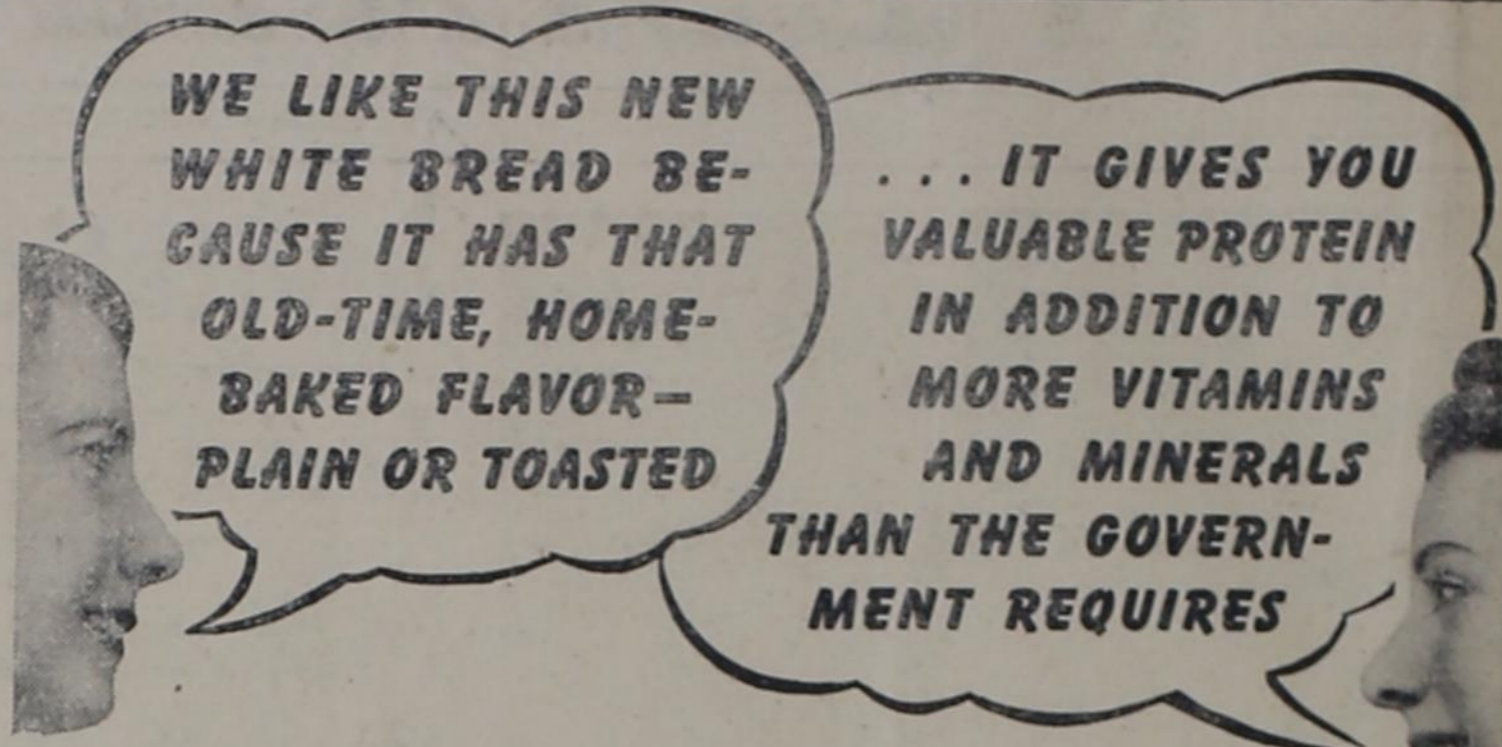
LUBBOCK.—A registered Poland China pig has recently been purchased by the animal husbandry department at Texas Technological College.

STORES SHOW INCREASE

AUSTIN.—Independent retail stores in Texas had a sales increase of 4.2 per cent over September, compared with an increase of 16.2 per cent for the same period in 1945, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports. The statistics were compiled in cooperation with the Bureau of the Census.

Sales of all types of apparel combined showed a decrease of about one per cent. The greatest month-to-month increase, 10 per cent was in sales by women's specialty shops. Men's and boy's clothing stores continued to make larger gains than any other type of clothing stores included in the report. They reported a rise of 7 per cent during the month, with an increase of 5 per cent over October 1945.

Health Notes

by Texas Department of Health

AUSTIN—In a preventive program directed against typhus fever in Texas, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has prepared for distribution through the State and local health departments, a pamphlet explaining the importance of incorporation rat-proofing in the construction of new buildings.

"I am anxious to have this pamphlet in the hands of every builder and prospective builder in Texas," Dr. Cox said. "Detailed drawings show how simply and cheaply fundamental rat-proofing can be incorporated in designing a building."

The booklet further explains how much less expensive it is to include rat-proofing in construction, than to make a building rat-proof after it is already built.

"When we build new homes in Texas, they should be for our families only. Rats should be excluded," Dr. Cox declared. "When a new home is not rat-proofed, the rats usually move in about the same time your family does. As long as this continues, typhus fever menaces your family and community."

The booklet may be procured by writing the State Health Department, Austin, and every prospective home builder in Texas is urged to procure a copy before completing the plans for a home.
