

Grain Bins Moving Out of Parmer Co.

Such grain bins as the Commodity Credit Corporation had on hand in this county a yeek ago are now sold, Ellis M. Mills, local AAA representative, announced today, adding that principally, sales had been to out-of-county buyers.

Changes Announced In Food Rationing

Two important changes in the food rationing program were announced today by Opal L. Wood, acting food rationing officer for the OPA, Lubbock district.

Effective September 17, all processed vegetables, except tomatoes, all fruit spreads and all special products, except tomato catsup, were taken off rationing.

Use of blue tokens will be discontinued after October 1, as a result of removal of these foods from rationing. Since Sept. 17, retailers are not issuing blue tokens to consumers for change.

From September 17 through Sept. 30, shoppers will be able to spend their blue tokens only in groups of 10. If necessary they may pool tokens to make up units of 10. Fewer than 10 may not be used.




