

The liberation of Paris has been completed by the French patriots. The French capital-first to the freed from the Nazi grip-fell yesterday. This Allied success is announced by Gen-Koenig, commander in chief of the French forces of the interior, who says his 50,000 troops won back the city in four days of bloody street fighting. The fall of Paris comes four years and 70 days after the triumphant Wehrmacht marched through the Arc de Triomphe and seized the city without firing a shot-

Outflanked from almost every direction by the Allied forces, it became apparent several days ago that the liberation of the French capital was imminent, but that the actual task of driving the Nazis from the city would be left to the French patriots, who were known to have been furnished with arms by the Allies.







upon an airplane in flight. These are "thrust" and "drag", which control the forward motion of the plane; and "lift" and "gravity" which control its ability to remain

function of the airfoil, or wing shape, we spoke of the conditions creating lift. In the forward motion of the plane the force which is involved is known as "thrust". It is called "thrust" because the propeller which winds through the plane through the air. This is brought about by the shape of the propoller which winds through the air, just as a wood screw acts on a piece of board in which it is inserted. Sometimes two loose boards may be brought together by tightening a screw. In the same way that one board is brought toward the other, the airscrew causes the air currents to pass swiftly through its blades and past the plane. This

Different types of propellers are used for specific jobs, just as a carpenter uses different wood screws for various kinds of work. The desired speed or altitude at which a plane is to be flown, or the speed of take-off, are some of the factors which decide the type of propeller. The propeller may also vary with the size and shape of the airplane. Propellers usually are from two to four blades, and in some cases two propellers are used, revolving in opposite directions, in order to get a desired effert.

"If your child has not been vaccinated, have it done immediately so the scar will be completely healed before school opens."

Immunization against diptheria is also highly desirable, Dr. Cox believes. This disease, which causes serious illness and deaths among young children, can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send your child to school, you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defect there will be time to build up his gneral health and correct dental defects before school opens. Don't let your child start his school life with any avoidable handicap."

AUSTIN-Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, in outlining the duties of the Texas State Department of Health said in a statement today that public health measures are preventive and not curative.






vaccination against smallpox, typhoid fever, and immunization against diptheria; by investigating sources of disease outbreaks; by quarantinng and isolating those ill with communicable disease; by the prevention of the spread of the disease; inspection of water supplies and advocating the production and use of safe milk to prevent the occurrence of milk-borne diseases."

Dr. Cox said that in spite of all preventive measures, people will become ill and accidents will happen. The cure of sickness and repair of accidents fall within the scope of the duties of the private practitioner of medicine and surgery. "Of course," he said, "the general practitioner of medicine is also engaged in prevention of disease when he advises mothers to have their children protected against diptheria and smallpox or to have the family as a whole immunized against' typhoid fever."

The general practitioner and State Health Department alike advocate that it is better to remain healthy than it is to recover from an illness, but the State Health Department is engaged in the control and prevention of disease as it affects the general population of a community or state.





Retailers may sell only to the consumers and for the purpose specified in the order. Every dealer is allowed to sell a VERY SMALL quantity of lumber on what are called "uncertified and unrated" orders. This quantity is so small that many dealers will be permitted to sell LESS THAN FIVE PER







In addition to the renewal form, applicants must attach the back cover of the current "A" book, properly endorsed. In case applicants may have lost their original back covers, they must attach state automobile license receipts to the forms, which receipts will be returned by mail with the new books.

Board members stressed the point of mailing the renewal forms. "We expect to be extremely busy, and to have some one call at the office will take up extra time and delay the issuance of books," one worker said. "Your new books will likewise be returned by mail as soon as they are complete."

The current A books expire on September 21 with new coupons going into effect the following day, or rather, at midnight September 21.

News dispatches have carried the word that there will be less coupons, and an increased amount of gas per coupon, however, this report has not been verified locally In any case, the ration will remain the same.




