AUSTIN-Dr. Geo. W. Cox, Sta Health Officer, urges the parents of
all children who will respond to the school bell for the first time in September to be sure the child is phy
sically ready for school duties. sically ready for school duties.
"First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. 1or vaccination against smallpox.
Parents and physicians should see
that children are vaccinated that children are vaccinated before
they are one year of age; however they are one year of age; however,
if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said. "If your child has not been vaccinated, have
it done immediately so the scar will be completely healed before school opens.'
Immunization against diptheria is also highly desirable, Dr. Cox be
lieves. This disease, which cause serious illness and deaths amons young childre, can be prevente with toxoid. The child who has ne-
ver been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded been immunized as a baby doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoic to strengthen immunity before rance into school
"In addition, before you send you take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defect there will be time to build dental defects before school opens Don't let your child start his sphoo life with any avoidable handicap.'

## The TRUTH about the Lumber Situation

The broad statement that lumber is "frozen" and no longer will be availabe is not only misleading but false. Due to the unprecedented demands of our world-wide war fronts and the record-breaking industrial consumption incident to manufacturing and shipping war materials, the use for lumber for MANY CIVILIAN NEEDS must be curtailed. For certain purposes not considered absolutely essential NOW, lumber will be unavailable or at least "hard to get" for the time being.

## PEOPLE WHO CAN BUY

All consumers who have priority ratings (except AA-55 MIRO and repairmen) will be able to purchase AS IN THE PAST, by giving their dealers the proper certifications. For maintenance, repair and operating needs this includes certain businesses, all governmental subdivisions (federal, state, county and school), hospitals and educational institutions. It also includes utilities, mines, petroleum operations and every job or project authorized by WPB or FHA and industries and businesses having specific ratings.

## FARMER

Special provision has been made for essential farm reeds through County Agricultural Consrevatio Committees. This does not include residential, but it does include farm labor buildings for seasonal housing. Farmers are also included in the "uncertified and unrated" group, but little if any lumber will be available in this bracket.

The new lumber control plan (War Production Board Reg. L-335 effective Aug. 1, 1944) regulates the distribution of lumber from mill to consumer. Retailers may sell only to the consumers and for the purpose specified in the order. Every dealer is allowed to sell a VERY SMALL quantity of lumber on what are called "uncertified and unrated" orders. This quantity is so small that many dealers will be permitted to sell LESS THAN FIVE PER CENT of the normal needs of their customers in the "uncertified and unrated" bracket.

## A MEANS OF APPEAL

Anyone unable to purchase ABSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL lumber because of lack of priority rating (or one high enough) may apply to the WPB for the necessary rating. Your dealer will tell you what application form to use for this purpose.
This program is new. It is an attempt to allocate dumber, based on actual production, to the various needs IN THE ORDER OF THEIR ESSENTIALITY. It is a flexable program. As soon as more lumber CAN be made available for civilian uses it WILL be made available. No one knows how soon that will be. It may be a matter of only 60 to 90 days or it may be longer.

## THE ORDER DOES NOT COVER

This new plan does not control shingles, posts, hardwood flooring, cement, brick, windows, doors, insulation, asphalt roofing, paint or the HUNDREDS OF ITEMS OF BUILDING MATERIAL OTHER THAN LUMBER. Building material dealers can still sell lumber for MANY uses and can sell other material and supplies for all uses.
