



SAVING VEGETABLE SEED

COLLEGE STATION-Seed of many vegetables produced under farm conditions generally prove satisfactory for planting, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A. & M. Extension Service. Plants grown in soil of low fertility, or where disease lowers vitality, cannot be depended upon as a reliable source of seed.

Seed of beans of all kinds, including bush and pole varieties, should mature thoroughly on the plant, then be harvested and spread out to dry. Most varieties of butterbeans, pole and bush, must be harvested as the seed pod is beginning to turn brown to prevent splitting. Spread out to dry further before storing.

English peas: Pick when the pods turn brown and spread out to dry. Cucumbers: Select straight-sided dark green specimens and leave on vine until a rich, golden color. Remove seed, spread out to dry.

Tomato: Remove seed from vine-

If thoroughly dry, vegetable seed can be stored in various paper containers and should be kept in a cool, dry place. Beans and peas should be treated with a teaspoonful of carbon disulphide to a quart of seed to prevent weevil damage.


