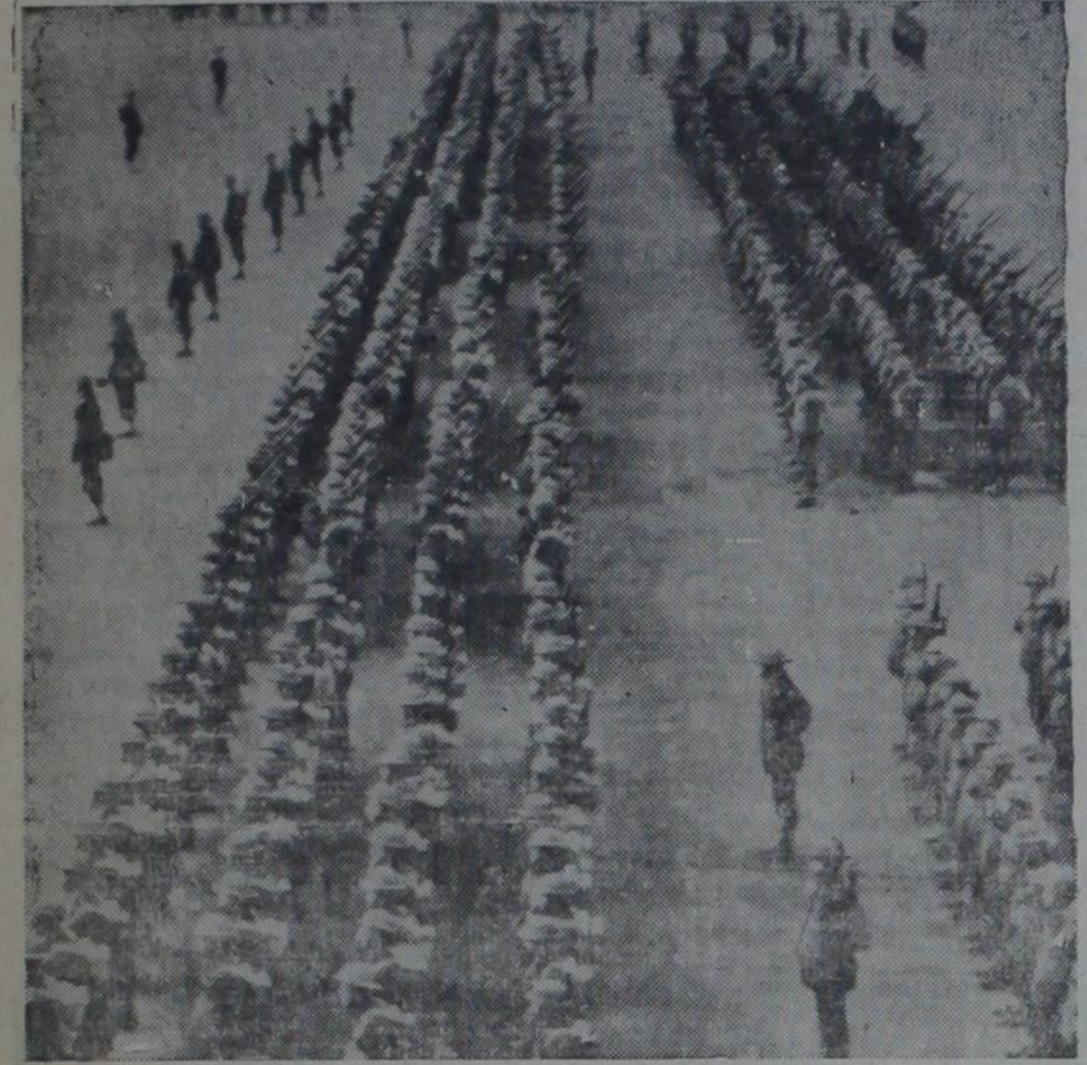


A. E. F. In Review Of Northern Ireland

352 Register in Parmer County Draft

Tragedy Brings Death to Small Boy

The most tragic accident of the year thus far occurred the past Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, when four-year-old Hershel Dwayne Rundell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Cunnell of Oklahoma Lane, met his death beneath the steel wheels of a heavily loaded farm wagon.

Playing in the field with his older mother, six-year-old Leonard, young Hershel Dwayne, and Leonard were enjoying a game of dashing from one shock of feed to another, while their father was engrossed in hauling feed from the field, using a tractor to pull the heavy wagon.

For some reason, the child decided to grab a ride on the wagon as it approached him, and unknown to his father, darted out and made a try at the wagon bed, only to bail under the wheel.

The older brother, Leonard, at once screamed to his father that the wagon had passed over the body of the lad, and Rundell rushed to the aid of his son, whose chest had been badly crushed by both front and rear wheels of the wagon.

The child was promptly rushed to Farwell for medical treatment, but was dead by the time the family reached the city.

Burial was made Sunday in the Oklahoma Lane cemetery, with the Rev. Mortuary in charge. Preceding the interment, Rev. W. C. Wright, local Baptist pastor, conducted the funeral services in the Oklahoma Lane Baptist church.

Immediate survivors include his parents, the older brother, and a younger sister.

No Need to Call for Help If Fire Occurs

NO SUGAR CARDS

Superintendent J. T. Carter, of the Farwell schools, stated today that as yet he had received no cards for the rationing of sugar to local consumers.

Announcement has been made from Washington that the school teachers of the country would be charged with the responsibility of issuing sugar rationing cards.

Fire Chief Ira Selman stated today that in event your house catches on fire, it will be useless to call on the Texico fire department for assistance.

The very good reason for his statement is that the main fire truck is damaged beyond repair and cannot answer any more calls. Selman said that the motor of the truck has been completely "knocked out" and is capable of no more service.

The chief stated that he had located a second hand truck at Electric, Texas, that could be purchased for \$1000, but added very emphatically, "we don't have any money to buy it with."

He urged that in the face of this imminent danger, the people of Texico and Farwell get together immediately and get behind a move to replace the disabled truck.

Registration of Parmer county's manpower in the third nation-wide tabulation of men who might be available for military service was completed here Monday without a hitch, officers of the Selective Service Board announced.

The board was in session here Tuesday, tabulating the results of the registration. It was announced that the number of registrants here fell below early estimates, with only 352 men in the 20-44 age group signing up.

Early estimates had placed the Parmer county figure at not less than 500.

TEXICO REGISTERS 42

Superintendent L. A. Hartley, of the Texico schools, announced that a total of 42 registrants was handled by the Texico clerks, members of the school faculty.

Only 26 of those registering in Parmer county will be sent out to other local boards, the rest remaining under the jurisdiction of the Parmer county board. Of the 352 registrants, 54 of that number were below 21 years, and 298 showed their age to be above 36 years.

The registration in the county was conducted by the school teachers of the county with school being dismissed for the entire day. Their efficient work was highly praised by members of the Selective Service Board. Only one registration card was found to be incomplete, board members said.

Friana led the county in the number of registrations, with a total of 108. Farwell was next with 74, and Bovina followed with 61. Other registration points showed the following totals: Lazbudd, 44, Oklahoma Lane, 31; Rhea, 10; Black, 9; Midway, 9; Lakeview, 6.

While official information is lacking, it is being reported in press dispatches that those registering on Monday will be placed in a separate group from the other two bunches registering on Oct. 16, 1940, and on July 1st, 1941. This will mean that those registering previous to last Monday will be exhausted before the last group will be considered for induction.

Board members pointed out today that such an arrangement would have little effect on the induction proceedings here. "We are virtually out of 1-A men from the other registrations, anyway," one board member said.

Serial numbers will be assigned those registering Monday in March 9, when the local board will meet for that purpose. The date of the national lottery, at which time the order numbers of the new registrants will be determined, is yet to be announced. It will not likely be held before the latter part of March or the first of April, one board member opined.

Rationing Board to Handle Sale of Cars

The Parmer County Rationing Board will soon take over the added responsibility of rationing automobiles in this county, John Armstrong, county chairman, announced here today.

Armstrong said that as yet his office had received no details of the rationing program, but predicted that few—if any—new sales will be allowed under the rationing plan.

He said, furthermore, that rationing for retreading and recapping of tires would be handled by the local board after Feb. 19.

Details of the recapping and retreading program are lacking at the local office.

The Rationing Board, in session here last Wednesday, issued its largest allotment of tires and tubes to local users since the board was set up early in the year. All applications for purchase were issued for use on trucks, tractors, and pick-ups.

Mercury Hits The Bottom

For the first time in the current winter, the mercury in local thermometers dropped to zero, Tuesday night.

Previous to the cold wave that blew in here on Tuesday afternoon, the lowest reading recorded here had been four degrees above zero, which was recorded early in January during a cold spell of several days.

A slight flurry of snow accompanied the cold wave, but very little moisture benefit is expected to local wheat crops.

Fingerprint Class May Be Conducted Here

Mrs. Florence Wallace, head of the American Woman's Volunteer Service in Parmer county, stated today that a fingerprint class was being considered for Farwell.

She was in receipt of a letter from S. L. Smith, New Mexico state police, to the effect that Jimmie Clark, of the Clovis police force, was an accredited fingerprint man, and would be available to conduct a study of this kind, should a class be organized here.

Smith went on to state that only one afternoon would be necessary for such a class, and that all equipment could be furnished out of Clovis, thus eliminating the necessity of buying the costly equipment for use here.

Should such a class be held, any local person interested would be eligible to attend, since no size is set on the class which could be handled.

Mrs. Wallace stated that the matter would be taken under consideration, and further developments will be announced later.

Auto License Tags On Sale March 1st

The new 1942 automobile and truck license tags will not go on sale here until March 1st, it was announced today at the tax collector's office.

Unlike many states this year, Texas laid in its license tags some months ago, and the Parmer county numbers have been on storage at the collector's office since early last fall.

The 1942 license tags will be just the reverse in colorings to the 1941 models, in that they will be orange with black numerals. The new tags must be displayed on all cars and trucks in operation by April 1st.

New Teacher Named For Farwell School

Mrs. A. W. Johnson, of Clovis has been named as the new primary teacher for the Farwell school, succeeding Mrs. Jewel Stevens, who tendered her resignation last week.

In making this announcement, Supt. J. T. Carter stated that Mrs. Johnson is now teaching at Pleasant Hill. She will be released from her contract there this weekend, and will assume her duties at the local school on Monday, the 23rd.

Mrs. Johnson holds a degree from New Mexico Normal at Las Vegas. She has also done work at WT in Canyon, and Tech in Lubbock, holding a permanent Texas' certificate. Formerly, she was connected with the Clovis schools.

During this week, Mrs. Lee McElroy is acting as substitute teacher.

Gold Star Girl To Receive Pin in April

Oleta Thompson, Parmer county 4-H Gold Star girl for 1941, received a letter of congratulation this past week from Miss Onah Jacks, state girls' club agent. Oleta, one of the 135 Gold Star girls to receive this honor in 1941, has been recognized for her outstanding work. The Gold Star designation is one of the most cherished honors of approval and recognition of leadership given by the Texas A. & M. College to 4-H club girls.

In her letter, Miss Jacks informed the Parmer county girl that her Gold Star pin would be received in April, and the Oklahoma Lane clubs have announced that they are planning to present the emblem to Oleta at a public ceremony.

Oleta joined the Oklahoma Lane club in 1935, as a sub-junior. She has held several offices, and is secretary of her club at present. During the seven years as a member she has learned food preparation, preservation, storage and serving; learned about bedroom improvement, and many details about care and construction of clothing. Her outstanding clothing demonstration won her the Gold Star award. This year she became a "Victory" demonstrator.

There are 38,351 4-H club girls in Texas, and in 1941, 11,453 of these clubbers completed three or more years of work, making them eligible to complete for the Gold Star award.

Ezell Named Assistant FSA Supervisor Here

R. B. Ezell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy B. Ezell of this city, received word on Tuesday afternoon that he had been appointed assistant supervisor in the local Farm Security Administration office and will take over his new duties on Thursday morning of this week, February 19.

For the past five years, Ezell has been employed "off and on" in the local AAA office, alternating his work with attendance at Texas Technological college in Lubbock, from which he received a degree in agricultural economics the past spring.

Ezell succeeds Ermon Miller, who was recently called to active duty in the U. S. Army.

Farm Repair Step To Solid Farm Front

Repair of farm machinery now is just one more step toward a solid farm front, Olan N. Schlueter, chairman of the Parmer county USDA War Board, said this week.

"Food is just as important in total war as tanks, guns, planes and ships, and delivering the goods is our pledge to help whip Hitler, the Japs and the Italians," the chairman said.

In connection with the farm machinery repair program in Parmer county, Schlueter outlined three reasons why immediate action is important:

- (1) Farmers are being called upon to produce more food than ever before;
- (2) Expected shortage of farm labor means more farm work with machines;
- (3) Manufacture of new farm machinery has been restricted by need for critical materials in war industries.

Reconditioning every available piece of farm machinery, and ordering all repair parts during the present slack period, will offset shortage of labor and machinery later, Schlueter said.

Discovery of a new source of vitamin D by an American chemical company is expected to make the U. S. poultry industry permanently independent of exports of the element.

Farmers Still Behind With Threshing Work

A survey of the farming operations reveals that many farmers of Parmer county are still far behind with the harvesting operations of last year's crop.

Practically all of the feed crop has been placed in the shock, but many fields are still full of unthreshed bundles of shocked feed. This is particularly true from Farwell to Lazbudd, a distance of some 26 miles.

Scarcity of farm labor and bad weather early in the fall and winter have been responsible for the setbacks. Farmers admit that it will soon be time to begin their spring planting operations, and are beginning to wonder if they will have their land cleared when that time arrives.

Farwell Drops Title Game to Springlake Team

Playing a two-out-of-three series the past weekend, the Farwell and Springlake quintets matched wits for the title of cage champions of District 5-B, with the more experienced Springlake crew breaking through for the necessary duo of wins.

The first match, played at Springlake, ended 31-24, with Farwell on the short end of the score. With Acker, usually the high man, held down to a solitary free shot during the entire game, Gast and Dycis carried the scoring brunt of the Farwell attack, having 7 and 6 respectively.

The defeat, however, Coach Jeff Hooper opined, came through the inability of his boys to halt the Price twins, who rang up 15 points together, with Parish coming in for a share of 8.

Second Game Best

The best game of the playoff series came Friday night at Farwell. It was believed, with the locals coming from behind a Springlake 17-4 lead at the half to win by three points, 82-31.

Starting off in a lethargic manner, Farwell trailed dismally through the first half, never able to match their opponents in either offense or defense, but in the second half came the fireworks, Acker going on a scoring rampage to whom in 19 of his team's 31 points.

Playing inspired ball, the locals crowded Springlake all over the court and the score saw-sawed, by a scant point, from first one team to the

other. In the final seconds, Farwell pushed up three points ahead to win.

Blowing both hot and cold, Lovelace played his best defensive game of the year Friday night, breaking up innumerable passes, but the majority of times, failed to make his own passes effective. Gast, Dycis Crume and Dow also did good work.

M. Price paced the Springlake quintet offensively, with 7, while his running mate, Haberer, was next with 6. Sigman turned in the best defensive game.

Final at Springlake

Decided by a toss of a coin, fate played into Springlake's hands, the final game being staged there Saturday night, in which they took the District title, 31-39.

Despite the fact that this was the deciding game of the weekend, neither team came near the standard of play set on Friday night, with Farwell looking exceptionally ragged during the second half.

The small gymnasium at Springlake assisted the winners in their zone defense, with Farwell unable to crack it, due, principally, to refusal of some of the players to pass to any forward but Acker, who was consistently smothered.

Dycus was the hot shot of the evening, taking six field goals out of not more than ten attempts, while Haberer paced his team with 10. M. Price was second for the winners with 9; Acker turned in 7 and Crume hit the bucket for six.

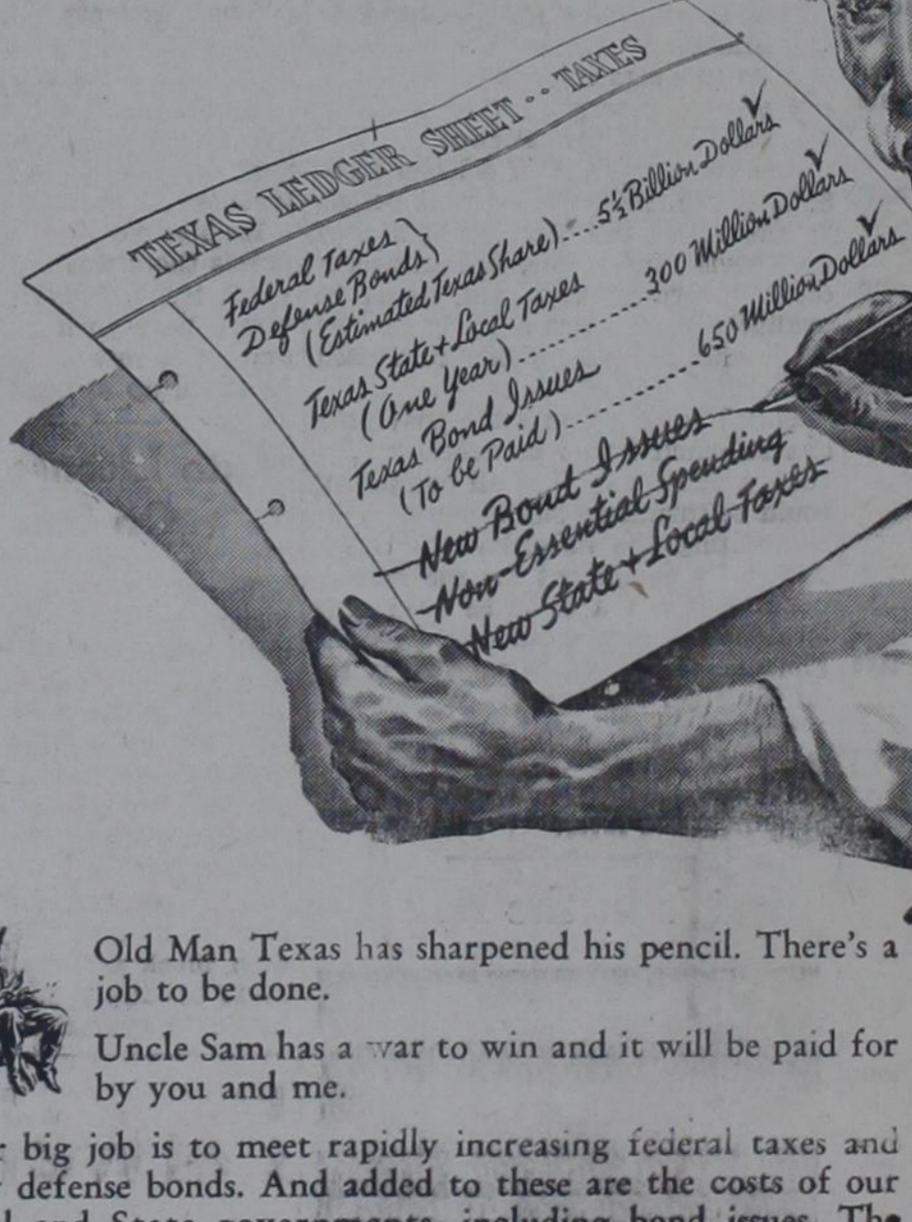

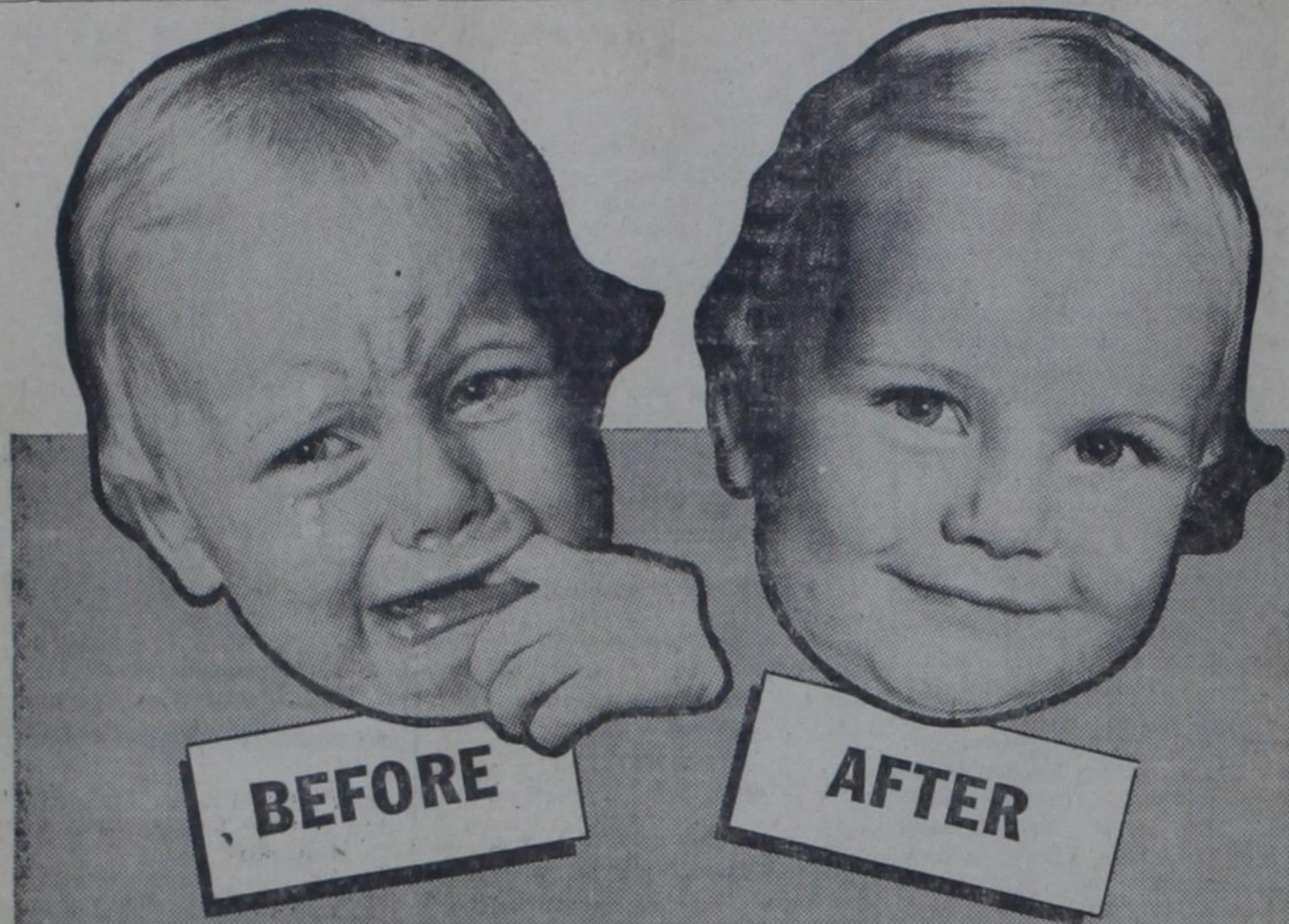

Texico Teams Enter Curry Cage Meet

With hostilities opening on Thursday night, the annual Curry County boys' basketball tournament will be held in Clovis this weekend.

In view of this fact, all three boys' squads, of the Texico school—including the grade, second string and senior boys—are undergoing grueling workouts under Coach A. D. McDaniel and Lee Richards, who is handling the second string team.

The grade boys have the brightest prospects for the tourney, it was believed, having done fairly well this year. Their first opponents of the meet will be the Field aggregation.

Having inoped through the season and taken a good deal more losses than wins, the seniors have a too-good outlook, it was admitted, although their victory over Melrose the past Friday night may do a good deal toward bolstering their morale.

The locals will first play Ranchvale, to whom they lost earlier in the season.

The second string players probably have the easiest game of the three, facing Pleasant Hill, although this was definitely not to be counted as a cinch.

Time for the games was not available today, since the schedule announced last week was being arranged, in order that some senior games might be played at night, Coach McDaniel said.

Texico Girls Lose In First Tourney Round

"Going completely to pieces", in the words of Coach A. D. McDaniel, the Texico girls' cage team, expected to go to the finals, lost their first tournament match to Pleasant Hill, last Friday night, when the Curry county girls' squads met at Melrose for two days of play.

Having defeated Pleasant Hill twice this season by good margins, local fans were of the opinion that the girls had "drawn a breeze" for their first match, but in radical contrast to expectations, the locals went down, 15-17.

Probably the main cause of the defeat was the new-style backboards, the local girls viewing them more as "men from Mars" rather than something to shoot at, with the result that practically all of Texico's attempts went elsewhere than in the basket.

Actually, Pleasant Hill was in the same spot over the new backboards as were the locals, out, getting a slight edge in the opening round inspired them to victory.

Flye and Tucker paced the respective teams, taking 11 each. Texico proved notably weak on free shots, getting only one out of 9, while Pleasant Hill, receiving 17, sank only 7.

Boys Win Game
Interspersed in rounds of the girls' tourney was a clash between the Texico and Melrose boys, a thriller which the locals took by four points, 15-19.

Early in the game, Melrose grabbed a slight lead, but in the second quarter the locals began to inch up and during the third round, passed Melrose, to get out in front by 6 points.

But the final installment was the hair-raiser. Leading by six points, Texico began to freeze the ball and to the hysterical excitement of fans and players, did so in such good style that Melrose hardly saw the ball that quarter, taking it once for a field goal.
