Farwell Approved for Surplus Army Goods T-Sgt. Tom Atkins, former local automobile mechanic, is here this Pearl Harbor Group Holds Hearings

on the approved list by the Army's Eighth Service Command, Dallas, to secure surplus army equipment, Robert Morton, local vocational instructor, said today, following a visit to Dallas voer the past weekend.

In explanation, Morton said that the Army is donating, to tax-supported institutions, such equipment as may be surplus and desired, out of army camps or air bases slated to be closed. The only cost to the school is the freight from the camp to delivery point.

In a meeting with several Service Command officials last Saturday, Morton was advised that two routes could be followed to obtain surplus equipment. 1. The school 'can list County Hospital To such equipment as it would like to have, and wait for an assignment. 2. School officials can be "on the Meeting Here lookout" for closing camps, contact the commanding officer as to what delivery of equipment.

With only two days remaining to complete the task, Parmer County is due to default on its obligation in the Victory Loan Drive, it was indicated here today by Chairman G. D. Anderson, of the War Finance Committee, who revealed that subscriptions thus far amounted to only \$19,287.50 against a quota of \$85,000 in E bonds.

"It is my belief that we will reach only about half of our quota," Anderson opined, and then added with a further note of discouragement, "we'll do well if we reach that high."

While Parmer County purchasers were defaulting on their quota of E bonds, figures released by the War Finance Chairman showed that the county quota of \$80,000 in F and G bonds had been surpassed with a sizeable balance.

"It looks like we are sunk and I have no suggestion to offer for raising our quota . . . I have tackled every man that I could who might buy more bonds, with the result that I have made little progress," Anderson added gloomily.

Failure of a crop this year was given as the principal reason for this county failing to meet its quota for the first time, with Christmas, county hospital, and other matters occupying the minds of the people. Figures also released by Anderson showed that Texas was at the bottom of the list in the purchase of E bonds over the nation, "and there

It is hoped that a satisfactory arrangement can be made to move the units from Ft. Sumner to the campus in order that a portion of the dwellings can be made available to veterans enrolling for the second semester, which begins January 7, said President Golden.

LIVESTOCK SITUATION

COLLEGE STATION-Production of all classes and types of meat in 1946 is expected to continue at or slightly above the 1945 level, according to a USDA report.

If subsidy payments to slaughterers are removed in 1946, some decline in cattle and hog prices will probably occur.

Pork production may be somewhat greater in 1946 than in 1945. even if market weights of hogs are reduced. Output of lamb and mutton, however, will be somewhat reduced in 1946.
