



Gridiron guessers all across the nation who enter in football contests in an effort to win tickets to various bowl games have developed all types of systems for selecting the winners: statistics, ratings, intuition, coin flipping; but none seem to work as well as the method used by Sam Gonzales of Muleshoe.

Gonzales has twice been the recipient of tickets to the Cotton Bowl Game played in Dallas on New Year's Day and \$50 expense money from area newspaper football contests and he has his bid in this year for the same prize and is doing quite well. This week he took first place money of \$5 in the Tribune's Annual Area Merchants Football Contest and added points to his season total in an effort to once again capture a first place prize. What's his method?

Gonzales has been a football referee for the past 10 years and every Friday he referees a game for class A, AA, AAA or B teams. This is, every Friday except the Friday of Muleshoe's homecoming game. "I've even refereed Farwell's games while Coach Toby Booth was there," he stated.

But being a referee isn't the only thing aiding Gonzales in the weekly contests - he comes from a winning family. For five out of the past six years a member of Gonzales' immediate family has won Cotton Bowl tickets. "I've won the tickets two times and my mother, father and sister have all won tickets. We all won our tickets in the Muleshoe contest and one year I won second place in the contest."

Gonzales stated that he has been entering area football contests for about seven years, the Tribune contest for three years, and the first year he ever entered one, "I won the big prize!"

Texico's Junior Varsity tamed the Portales Lambs when they met in action in Portales Thursday, Oct. 3, by a six point margin, 20-14, to give Texico a 2-1 record thus far in season play.

First quarter action saw Texico put the first points of the game on the scoreboard when Steve Turner scored on a three-yard plunge to put Texico in the lead 6-0. Points after touchdown attempt failed and the Wolverines remained in the

Portales' Paul Hatch took Texico's kickoff and returned it for a TD to tie the score 6-6. PAT by Portales was good and the Lambs took the lead 8-6.

Before the halftime buzzer sounded, Portales once again scored to widen their lead 14-6 but failed to add an extra point to their score.

Play evened out in the third quarter of the game and the score remained 14-6 until the fourth quarter when Wolverine quarterback Holmer Asley connected with Turner on a 13-yard pass to the left side and Turner went into the end zone to close Portales' lead 14-12. PAT attempt was successful as Asley ran a sweep to the left side to even up the

With 40 seconds to go in the game, Texico had the ball on the 20-yard line when Portales intercepted a pass. The Lambs moved the ball to Texico's 10-yard line in three plays. On their next fourth down play the Lambs lost possession when Wolverine David Newcomb intercepted a pass and ran to the 30-yard line. With four seconds showing on the clock Asley moved the ball to the 40 and a time out was called by Texico. When play resumed, Asley threw a pass which was deflected by Portales but Wolverine Kelly Lindley managed to come up with the ball and ran into the end zone for Texico's final touchdown of the game. PAT was no good and the final buzzer sounded with Texico leading Portales 20-14.

Statisites for the game revealed Turner accumulated 131 yards rusing and 41 passing; Terry Rolan, 62 rushing and 20 passing; Asley, 78 rushing; and Kelly Lindley, 60 yards passing.


The Steers will be facing the Plains Cowboys in action tonight (Friday) at Plains with kick-off slated for 8 p.m. CDT.




