Jr. Wolves Tame Lambs

Texico's Junior Varsity tamed the Portales Lambs when they met in action in Portales Thursday, Oct. 3, by a six point margin, 20-14, to give Texico a 2-1 record thus far in season play.

First quarter action saw Texico put the first points of the game on the scoreboard when Steve Turner scored on a three-yard plunge to put Texico in the lead 6-0. Points after touchdown attempt failed and the Wolverines remained in the lead.

Portales' Paul Hatch took Texico's kickoff and returned it for a TD to tie the score 6-6. PAT by Portales was good and the Lambs took the lead 8-6.

Before the halftime buzzer sounded, Portales once again scored to widen their lead 14-6 but failed to add an extra point to their score.

Play evened out in the third quarter of the game and the score remained 14-6 until the fourth quarter when Wolverine quarterback Holmer Asley connected with Turner on a 13-yard pass to the left side and Turner went into the end zone to close Portales' lead 14-12. PAT attempt was successful as Asley ran a sweep to the left side to even up the score 14-14.

With 40 seconds to go in the game, Texico had the ball on the 20-yard line when Portales intercepted a pass. The Lambs moved the ball to Texico's 10-yard line in three plays. On their next fourth down play the Lambs lost possession when Wolverine David Newcomb intercepted a pass and ran to the 30-yard line. With four seconds showing on the clock Asley moved the ball to the 40 and a time out was called by Texico.

When play resumed, Asley threw a pass which was deflected by Portales but Wolverine Kelly Lindley managed to come up with the ball and ran into the end zone for Texico's final touchdown of the game. PAT was not good and the final buzzer sounded with Texico leading Portales 20-14.

Statistics for the game revealed Turner accumulated 131 yards rushing and 41 passing; Terry Rolan, 62 rushing and 20 passing; Asley, 78 rushing; and Kelly Lindley, 60 yards passing.

Wolverine Coach Kenneth Shaw commended Kelly Lindley and Steve Turner as best offensive Wolverines during action against Portales. In citing defensive players, the coach named Holmer Asley, Henry Salguero and Richard Kelley.

Coach Shaw remarked, "Portales was a good team. We just got a lucky break at the last of the game."

The Jr. Wolverines' next game was scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 10, at Ft. Sumner against the Foxes. Game time was set for 6 p.m. MDT.

According to Shaw, Ft. Sumner has a record of 2-1 thus far in season play. "We shouldn't lose another game. Our kids really look good," the coach said in his closing remarks.

Haggis is a fine dish and is served with neeps and champit tatties. Champit tatties are mashed potatoes. Neeps is the Scots word for turnips. If you thought neeps were glasses of whisky, you're confusing the word with nips.

First District Clash --

Ft. Sumner Out-Foxes Wolves To Take Win

The Foxes of Ft. Sumner out-foxed the Texico Wolverines during the Wolves first district clash of the season 19-0 in Fox Stadium last Friday.

Ft. Sumner controlled the ball most of the first quarter starting from the first kickoff by Texico. The Wolverines had a chance at scoring but fumbled on a punt return and the Foxes recovered. Ft. Sumner then took the ball and completed a pass to a loose end who moved the ball to the Wolverines' 20-yard-line. Following a first down play, the Foxes ran across the goal line for their first six points of the game with six minutes left in the first quarter of play. The extra point attempt was no good and the score remained 6-0 throughout the remainder of the quarter.

However, after three minutes of second quarter play, Ft. Sumner added seven points to their six point lead when they completed a pass which moved them to the three-yard-line. The Foxes then forced their way across into the end zone and with the extra point kick made the score 13-0.

Wolverine Roger Pace picked up the on-side kick and returned it to Ft. Sumner's 48-yard-line. Steve Harrington then completed a pass to James Steward and Steward moved to the 40-yard-line. Pace ran two more first down plays and caught a pass which moved the Wolverines to the 15-yard-line. After four plays with no yardage gained, Ft. Sumner took possession and the half ended with the Foxes leading 13-0.

After halftime activities, the Wolverines still couldn't get the ball under control and were forced to punt. Following two first downs the Ft. Sumner quarterback completed a pass to an end who ran for Ft.

Sumner's third TD of the game. The PAT was no good and the Foxes moved ahead 19-0.

The Wolverines held the ball during the greatest portion of the fourth quarter but were unable to score. The ball went to Texico after Jackie Reid held Ft. Sumner's runner for a gain of only two yards. After the ball exchanged hands a few more times the game ended with Ft. Sumner leading 19-0.

"We just were not ready to play ball Friday night," said Texico Head Coach Ray Manly. "We got a good start and had a pretty bad break against us and we didn't come back from it. We just lost interest in playing."

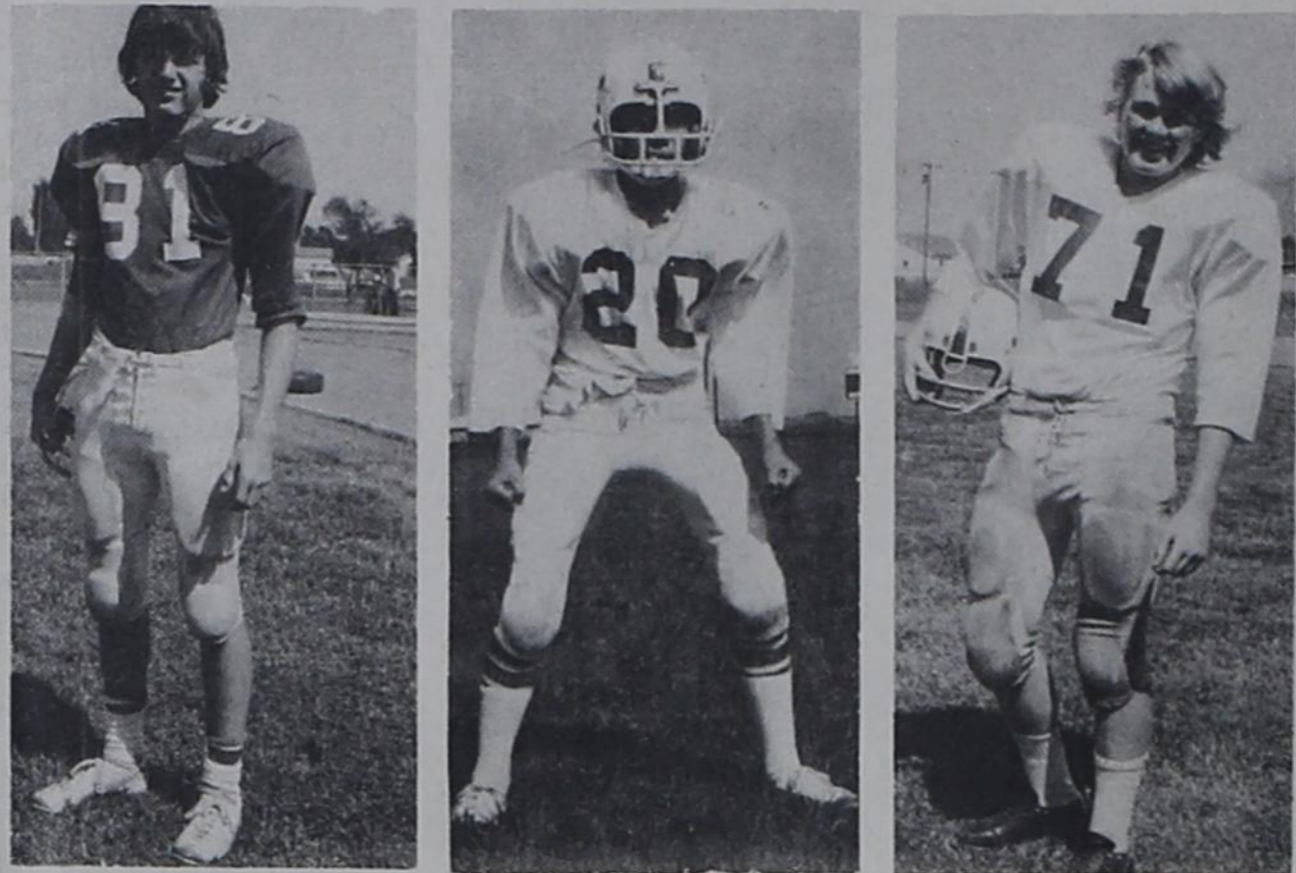
According to the coach, Ft. Sumner had no advantage over the Wolverines, but Texico did have an advantage. "We were faster than Ft. Sumner and just a shade bigger. Our mental attitude was a contributing factor to our loss. It was Ft. Sumner's homecoming and they were fired up and ready to play while we weren't."

In reference to individual Wolverines, Coach Manly cited Roger Pace as a key offensive man. "Pace was our lead runner and pass receiver during the game," stated Manly, who further commented on Jackie Reid and Steve Harrington, defensive men. "Reid is the littles player we have but he hit for everything he's worth and he made key tackles for us and so did Harrington who played on our defensive secondary."

Other players mentioned by the coach were Ted Richardson and Steve Askew. The coach remarked, "Richardson did a good job for us and Askew really came on strong."

The Wolverines have an open date tonight (Friday) but will see action against Jal next Friday, Oct. 18, in their next district clash of the season.

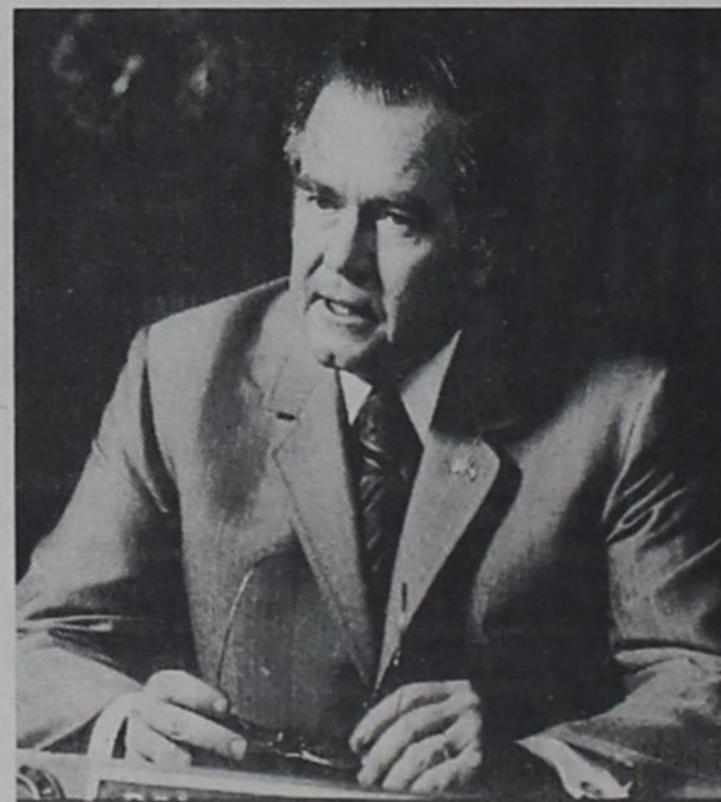

Farwell Steers Pluck O'Donnell Eagles 20-0

Homecoming weekend could not have been more complete. Steer fans thoroughly enjoyed watching Farwell whump up on the Eagles of O'Donnell last Friday night in a home tilt before a large gathering of Homecoming fans. It was fantastic to see the scoreboard light up 20-0 and good, ole Farwell was on top of the scoring. All the area sportscasters had picked Farwell to lose but the Steers had another idea in mind. Everybody on the team and in the school was ready for a good win and nobody or nothing was going to deny the Steers that victory.

The first nine and one half minutes of the game were played smack in the center of the field. But with 2:25 left in the first quarter, Steer quarterback Lesley Curtis completed a perfect hand-off to Mike and Woods and Woods went like he hasn't gone all year - right into pay dirt. Thad Phillips converted for another big one and Farwell was off and going with a 7-0 lead.

Farwell and O'Donnell both had fumbles which were recovered by their opponents. On the recovery by Farwell, the whole Steer team rushed out to cheer the boys on and Farwell was penalized for having too many men on the field. But the Steers would not be denied. Even with a first down and 25 yards to go, Curtis sneaked the ball past the Eagle line on the fourth down play for another great first down. Farwell continued to march down the field but had a pass intercepted giving the Eagles the ball again - but not for long. The Steers recovered another Eagle fumble on the eight-yard marker making it a first and goal to go on the eight-yard line for the Steers. It looked as if the Steers were going over again but the O'Donnell defense rallied to hold. Woods suffered a minor injury on that series of plays but was able to walk off the field unassisted. While the ball was in Eagle possession, the Steers sent the teams to the dressing rooms for half-time. The enthusiasm seemed to grow for Steer fans during this break and for the team, too.

During second half action while Farwell was in possession, the Steers made two good first downs before a long pass was intercepted by O'Donnell. The Steers' determination showed up again and they intercepted an Eagle pass on the next series of plays. The next few plays were exciting for the fans and Steers. The Steers attempted a field goal but it was wide and O'Donnell made a good threat but Steer Clint Robertson brought down an Eagle and Barry Goldsmith threw another Eagle for a loss. In the punt situation, David Cantu covered the ball on the 35-yard line. On the first play by the Steers, George Garza took a hand off from Curtis and scampered through everyone for a 66-yard TD run. The

extra point by Phillips was good again and the Steers were on top by 14.

Farwell controlled the ball for six first downs during the first few minutes of the fourth quarter. The sixth first down resulted in Steer Mike Goetsch hitting pay dirt for the Steers. It was on this TD play that an Eagle was injured. The PAT was not good and the Steers were leading 20-0 when the final buzzer of the game sounded with Farwell winning the 1974 Homecoming clash.

"We had a real good team effort. It was a better effort than we've ever had. Our Steers showed that they wanted to win before they hadn't put forth the effort it takes," said Farwell Steer Head Coach Eugene Jennings in reference to the Farwell victory over O'Donnell.

"Our Steers really deserved to win because they wanted to and they played a real hard game all the way through to get the win," he added.

O'Donnell had an advantage over the Steers in speed and size but, according to Jennings, Farwell had more depth and the Steers' determination was a key factor to the win.

"They (the Steers) knew they could win and a few breaks during the game really helped our mental attitude," the coach continued. "The Steers sustained no lasting injuries during the clash and, according to the coach, are all in good playing condition for their encounter with Plains tonight."

Individually, the coach remarked on Mike Woods who had 17 carries for 131 yards, averaging 7.5 yards per carry; George Garza, 8 for 102 yards, 12.5 average; Mike Goetsch, 6 for 32, 5 average; and Jay Alana, 4 for 26, 6.5 yards average per carry.

In reference to defensive play, Jennings cited Alana who

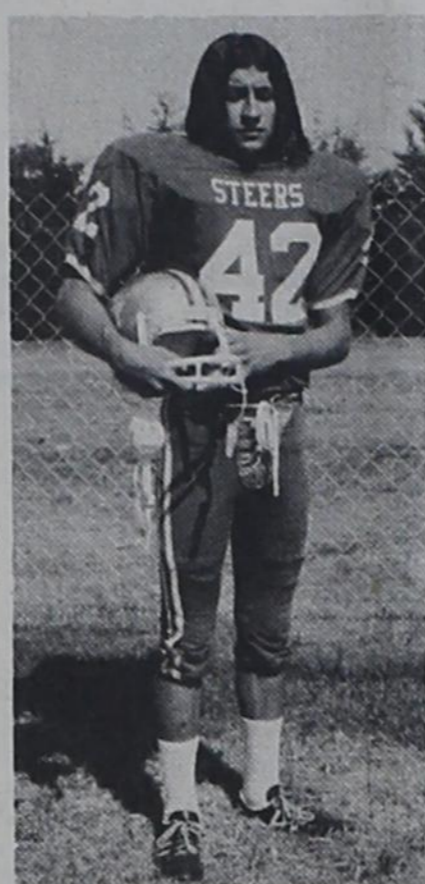
"did an outstanding job," and Clint Robertson and Joe Hasehoff, who both had a "real good ball game against the Eagles." The Steers will be facing the Plains Cowboys in action tonight (Friday) at Plains with kick-off slated for 8 p.m. CDT. Jennings commented, "Plains has a real good ball club. We have viewed the film of the Plains-Bovina game and Plains had a few bad breaks against them. The Cowboys are real

large, probably as big as Friona. Their speed is not outstanding but they have a lot of depth. We expect them to pass alot in tonight's game." The clash with Plains will be the Steers' final game before the open district play against Bovina next week. The coaching staff and the Steers urge everyone to turn out for the pep rally and to attend the game to boost the Steers on to their second win of the season.

The Texico Wolverines have an open date scheduled this week but will be meeting the Jal Panthers in action next Friday, Oct. 18, in Wolverine Stadium.

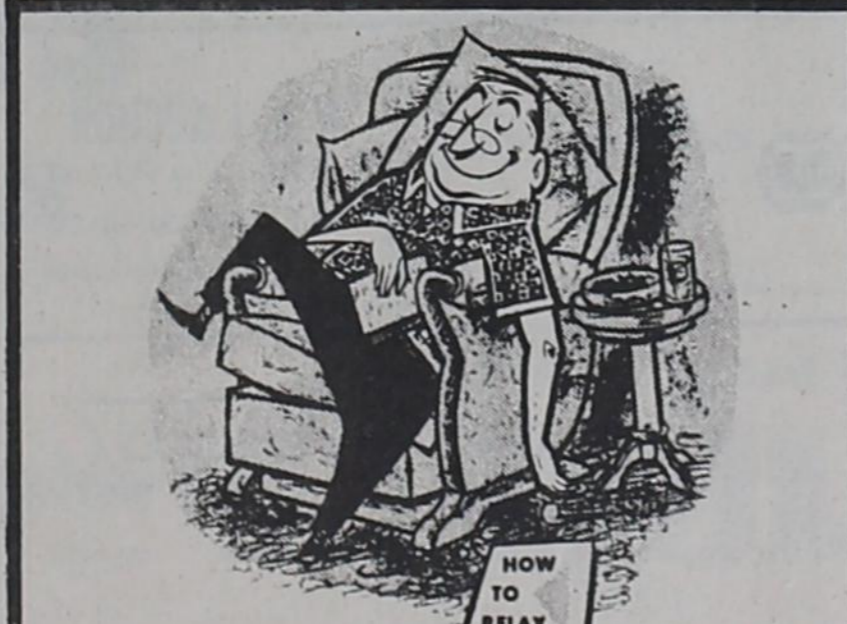
4-H's Place At PSP Fair

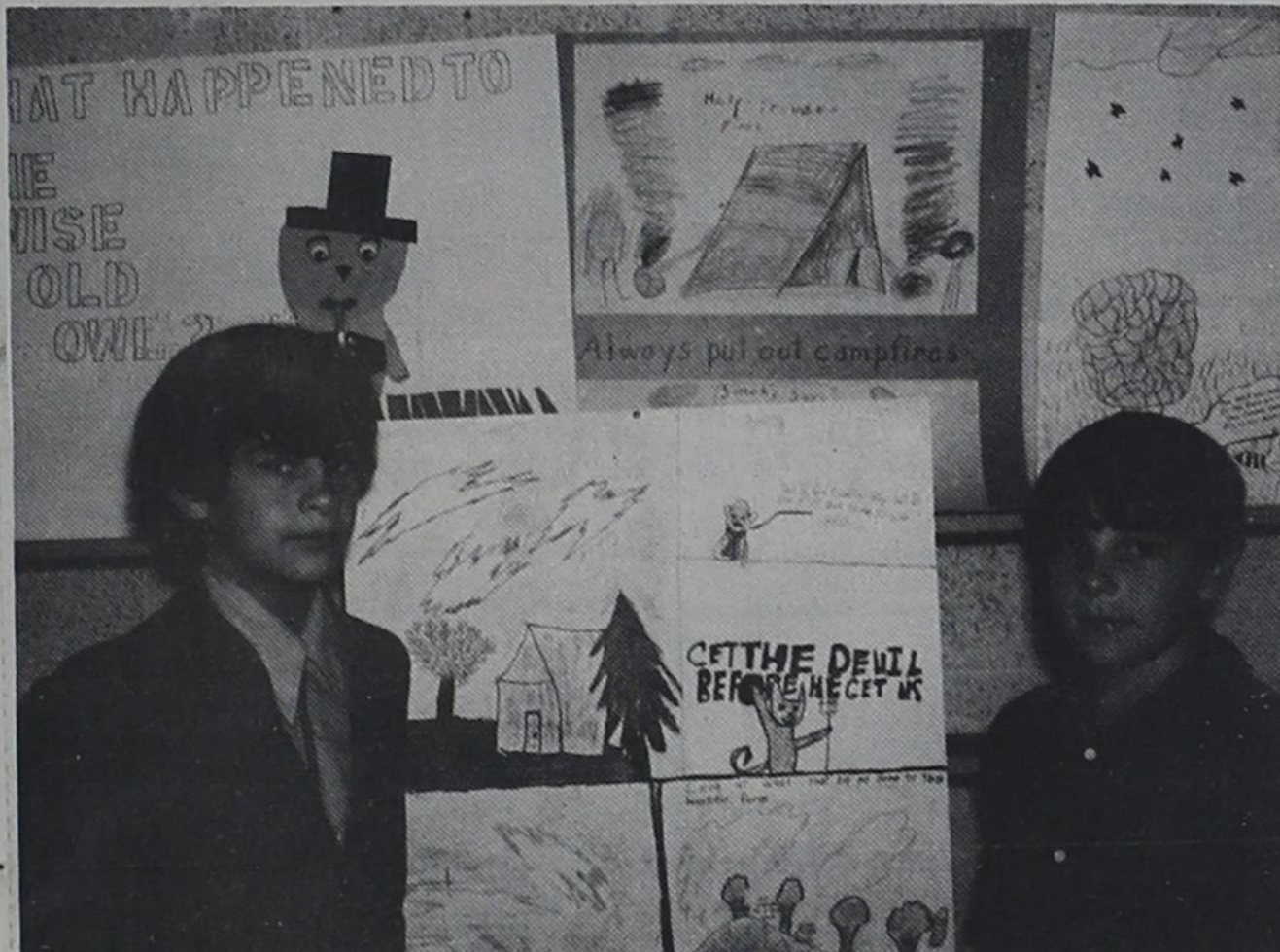

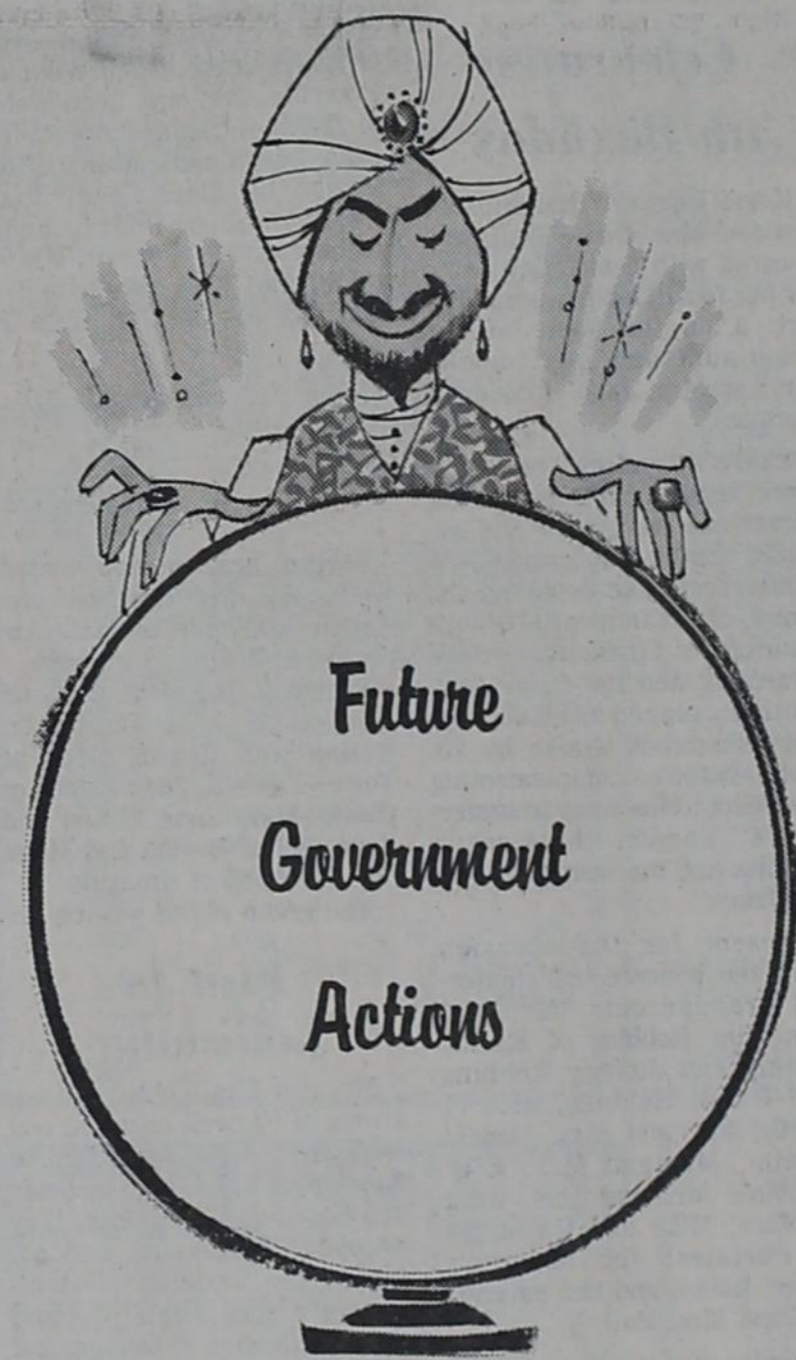
Corn harvest is getting into full swing. This means that there is a lot of residues on the soil surface. These residues are essential for the good health of the soil.

The residues on the surface allow rainfall to filter into the soil, not seal over the soil and run off.

The residues are also valuable to prevent wind erosion. As the residues decompose they improve the tilth of the soil, making plowing and cultivating easier.

The bonus in good corn residue management is pheasants. Corn stubble furnishes excellent food and cover for these birds. With pheasant hunting becoming so popular in this area the residues can be a "real added attraction."
