Oh yes, the back of ye olde Trib will also feel the weed cutter's stroke as the urgings of our helpmeet are becoming irresistible. It looks like a busy time of the year coming up, from a civic betterment standpoint.

We were reading an editorial from a university publication and came across these sentences -- we hesitate to say facts. In the context of the editorial it said, "an imperialistic war 12,000 miles away, threats of suppression of the press from the nation's second leading governmental official and the unconstitutional enslavement of young men in the military machine."

The writer of these words is grossly ignorant of the meaning of simple words in the English language, unable to interpret what is clearly said, and passing judgements in fields way beyond his knowledge and experience.

To wit: the dictionary definition of imperialism: "The creation, maintenance, or extension of an empire, comprising many nations and areas." The definition of "imperialistic" is "one who advocates or upholds imperialism."

Simple reflection will show you that this definition fits Red Russia perfectly. The roll call of free nations swallowed up by the Red Bear is quite lengthy. Name me one nation that the United States has subjugated. Even our bitterest enemies have benefited from our generosity. To call the United States "imperialistic" is to slander the memory of the thousands of brave men who have died to keep this country and the world free.

To make the bald statement that the Vice President is threatening to suppress the press is almost too asinine to comment upon. Sufficient to say, yes, our enemies would like to silence the press of the United States. Only restraint, responsibility and true dedication to democratic freedoms will keep our press free -- not wild unfounded innuendoes or false statements palmed off as fact.

Lastly, the remarks of unconstitutional enslavement coming from a person who probably was receiving pap from mama's breast when these questions were resolved by the courts is insulting to our intelligence. We may say that we think something is unconstitutional. That is our personal privilege. We cannot honestly make a flat statement that something actually is unconstitutional unless the Supreme Court has so ruled. And goodness knows if it had been given half a chance, it probably would have so ruled a long time ago and not waited for a 20-year-old intellect to so advise it in this enlightened year of our Lord 1970.

The most charitable thing we can say of people who use this line is that they are grossly ignorant. The most uncharitable thing becomes unprintable.

You cannot conduct a LOGICAL DEBATE without a mutually agreed upon set of facts and use a language wherein words have one meaning. This twisting of the true definitions of English words is a revealing mark of those whose basic aims are inimicable to the long term welfare of the United States. Use your dictionary -- it can be a friend in pulling you out of semantic morasses.

Announcement will be made in the local newspaper from time to time concerning the reunion in the next few months and reminders will be sent to former residents and ex-students of the school.

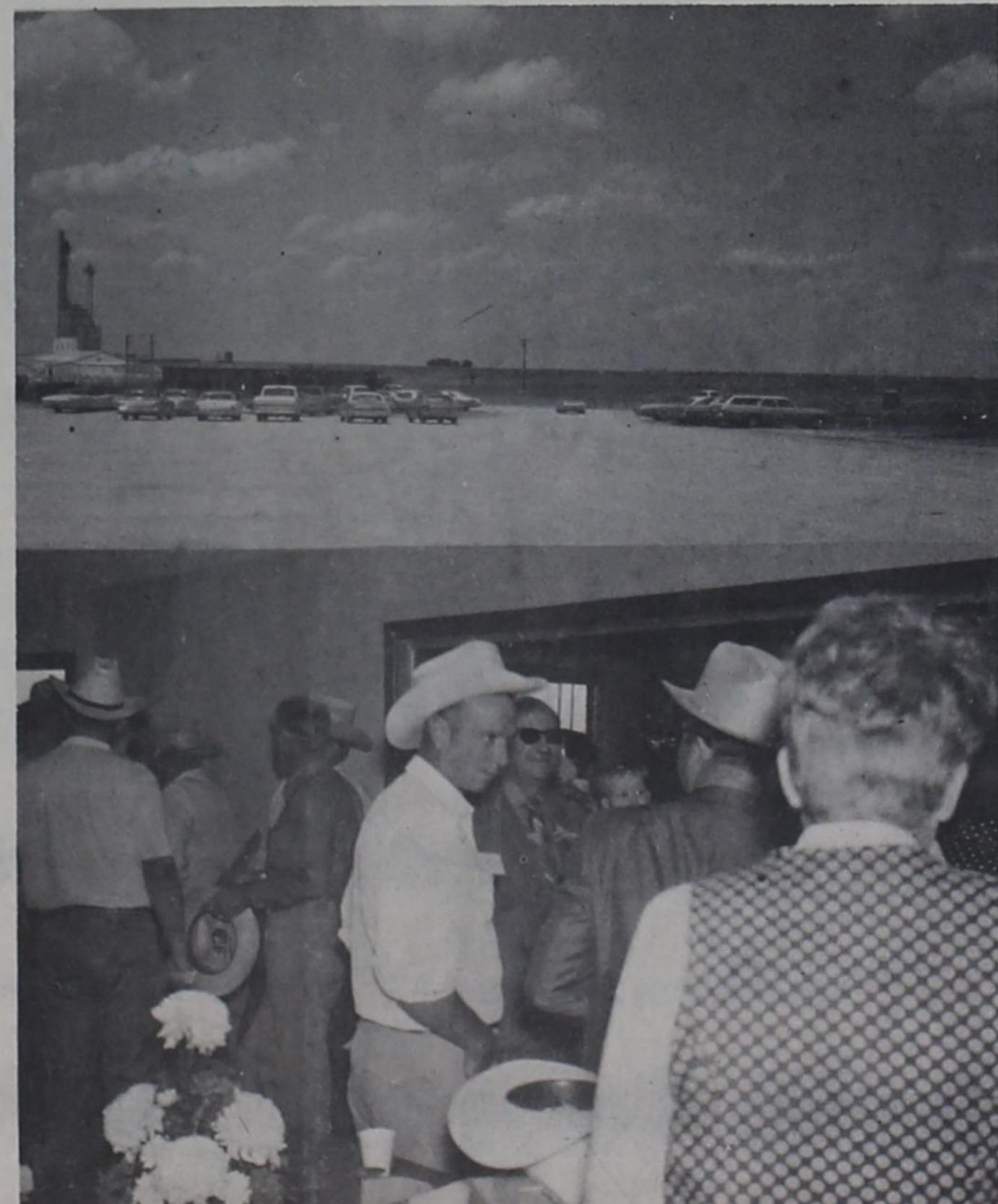

The symposium will be held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin from June 2-5.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, of which Southwestern Public Service Company is a member, and the University of Texas at Austin will present the symposium. Forty-four High Plains students and teachers, including the Farwell pair, will be sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Co.

Kirt, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Preston Martin, is a Student

Council officer and a member of the National Honor Society at Farwell High.

Supt. Roberts received his bachelor degree from North Texas State at Denton and a master degree from Eastern New Mexico University. He has been superintendent of schools at Farwell for 11 years.

In addition to hearing lectures by some of the nation's leading authorities in thermonuclear fusion and nuclear physics, the symposium participants will have an opportunity to tour the fusion research laboratories at the University, where much of our nation's search for knowledge in this vital field is taking place. The symposium will conclude with commencement exercises which will feature an address by Dr. Theos

J. Thompson, a member of the United States Atomic Energy Commission.

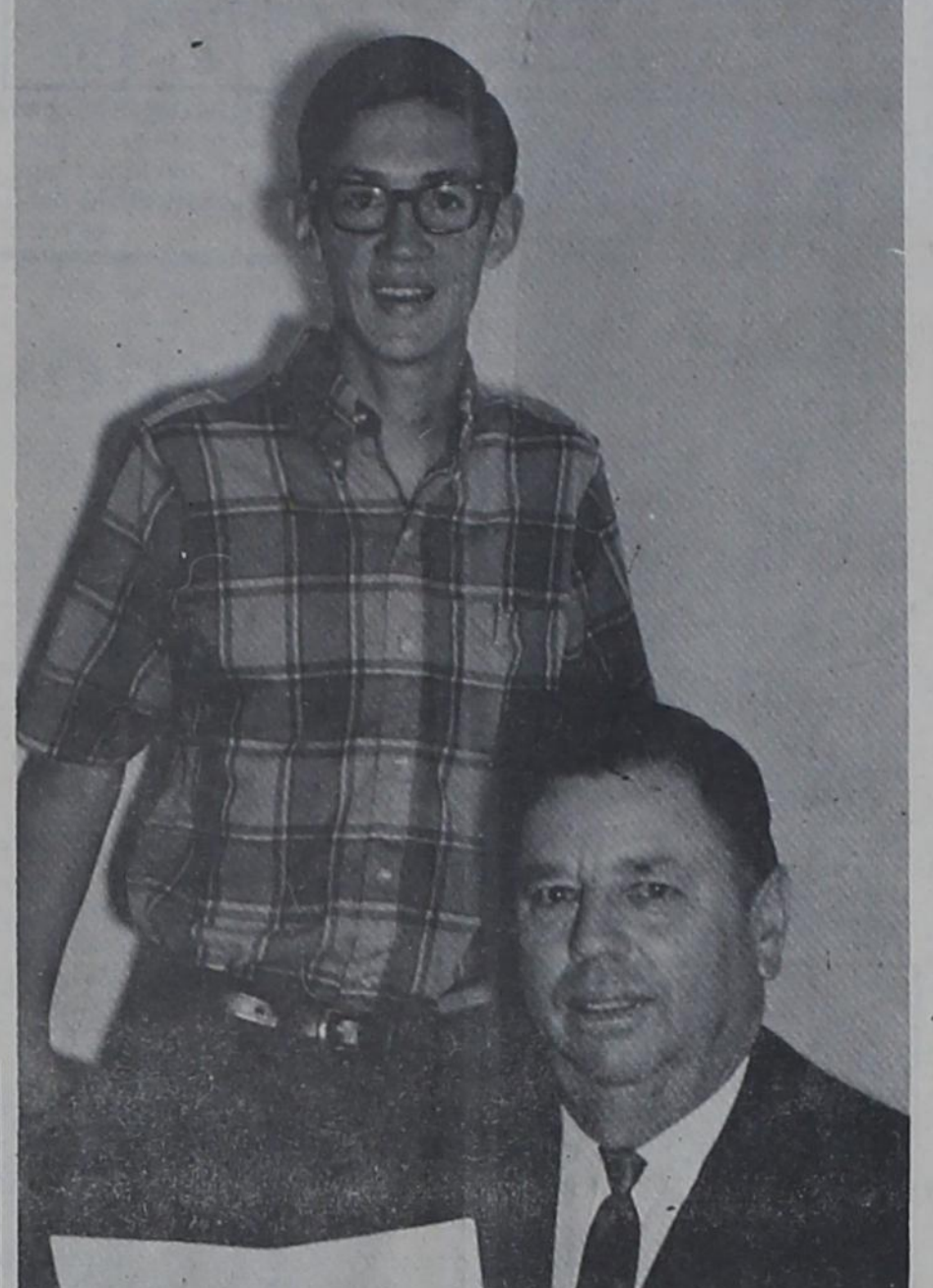

Large Crowd Attends Annual Meeting

Nearly 1,200 members, guests and employees of Deaf Smith County REC enjoyed a barbecue lunch catered by the Hereford Rotary Club and were entertained by "The Windborne" musical group composed of Ruth Dyer, Skip Skinner and Suzanne Merritt, sang a number of popular and folk tune selections. Director of the trio is Ralph Smith of Dimmitt.

All incumbent directors were re-elected. Sloan Osborn of Friona, Tom Draper of Hereford and Noel Gollehon of Dimmitt were selected to a new three year term on the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative's board of directors. Osborn is a 30-year veteran on the board, while Draper has served 20 years and Gollehon nine years. Following the annual meeting, Osborn was named president of the board, Raymond Higginbotham, vice-president; and Tom Draper, secretary-treasurer.

Ken Loyd, sales manager, Texas Electric Cooperatives, Austin, was the guest speaker. He reminded the members that pride of ownership has always been the key to the REC's strength and success, and that their continued support would be needed in the months and years to come.

James Hull, manager for the cooperative, reported that 1969 had been a highly successful year with substantial growth in all service categories. Highlight of his report was the announcing of the retirement of the two original loans made to the cooperative in 1937 for \$254,000.00. The first note for \$135,000.00 had an interest rate of 2.77% and the second note of \$119,000.00 was at an interest rate of 2.88%.

Capital credit checks amounting to over \$140,000.00 were distributed to members who received electric service in 1958. The \$140,000.00 represented slightly over 18% of the total patronage of \$777,361.63 for the year.

To date, a total of \$1,447,069.83 in capital credits has been returned to members of the cooperative. This is an average of 19.1% of \$7,560,603.00 in patronage. In addition, \$2,624,547.07 has been paid in advance on existing loans from the Rural Electrification Administration.

He is now serving as staff scientist at Kirtland AFB, N.M. He serves as chief of the solid state laser branch at the Air Force Weapons Laboratory.

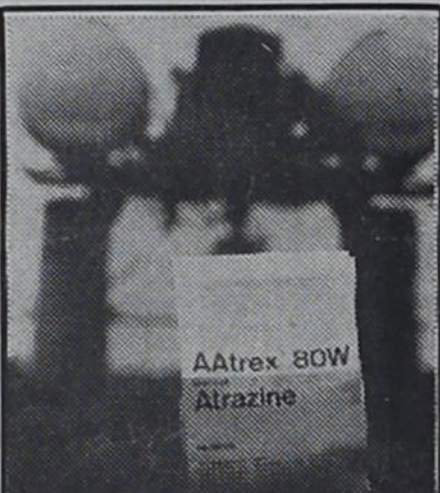

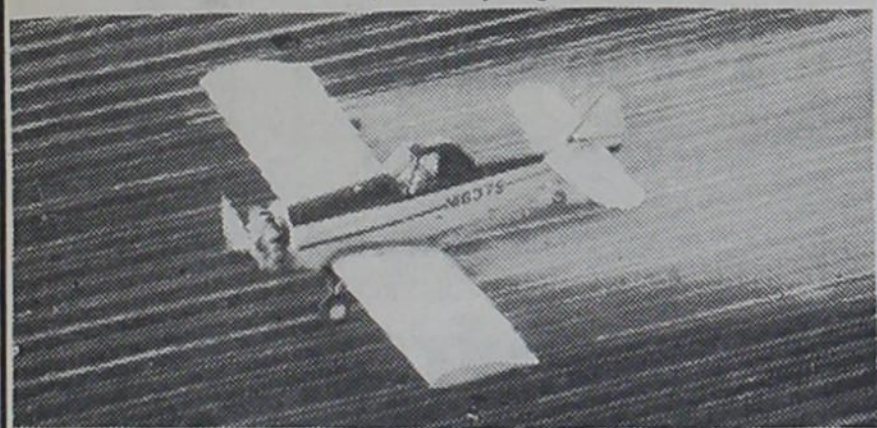

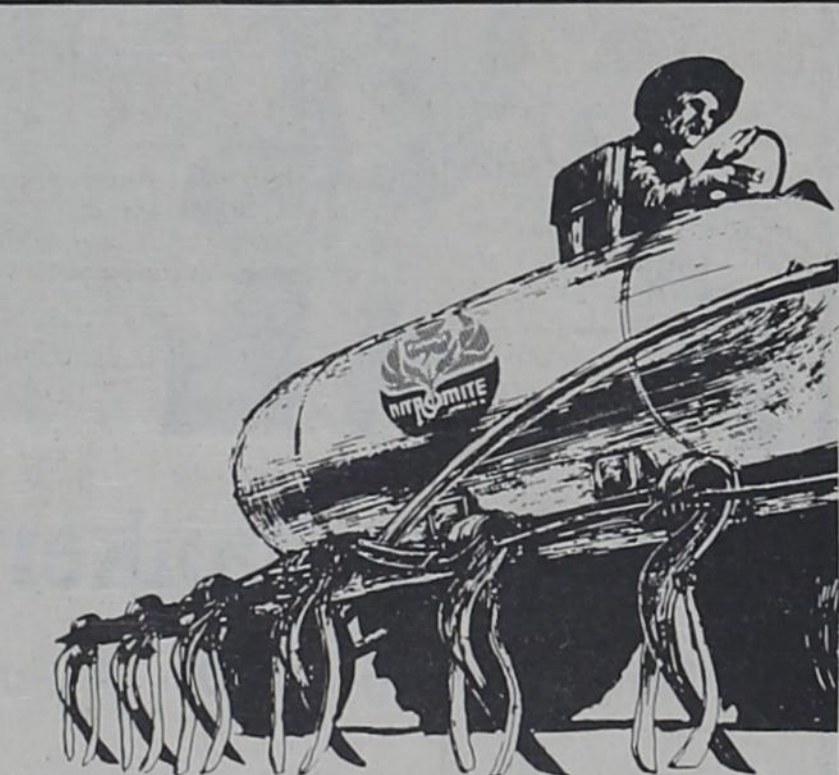
