More Arrests Made On Pot Possession

Three area men appeared before Farmer County Judge Paul Fortenberry Monday on charges of possession of marijuana under two ounces. They were all fined and sentenced in Judge Fortenberry's Court.

Alan David McCleskey, 19, of Farwell was fined \$100, plus court costs. He was also sentenced to 30 days in jail - which was probated to six months probation.

David Hernandez, 18, also of

Farwell, was fined \$200 plus court costs. Since he elected to serve the 10 days' jail sentence he received rather than accept six months probation, Hernandez is presently in the Farmer County jail, according to Farmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Keith Reed, 25, of Hereford, was fined \$100 plus court costs. He was also given a 30-day jail sentence which was probated to six months proba-

tion. DPS Trooper Glenn Fant arrested McCleskey and Hernandez shortly after midnight Saturday. The two men, who were in McCleskey's vehicle, were stopped six miles east of Farwell on Highway 84 for a traffic violation, and according to Officer Fant, the marijuana possession was discovered.

Several years ago, shortly after the Oil Producing Exporting Countries (OPEC) established an artificially high price for their crude oil, we said that eventually their national interests would coincide with the United States' national interests. We made that observation on the obvious fact that only the capitalistic countries could "buy" the oil under the terms that the OPEC countries wanted to sell.

This is natural, as the communist countries do not have private ownership and therefore no place for the OPEC nations to re-invest their profits from their oil sales. This is still true today. The major change in this is that today the national interests of the United States is becoming inextricably woven into the national interests of the OPEC powers, Saudi Arabia in particular.

The United States must continue to have Saudi oil and at the restrained prices the Saudis are willing to continue to sell it to us. Our present amicable relationship with Saudi Arabia we view as a cornerstone in the continued economic well being of the United States.

President Carter, from his present firm stance, apparently shares the opinion of Saudi indispensibility to the United States. In this matter we support and commend the President while hoping that he continues on his present Middle-East national policy.

At this point we will interject this statement. We have always, admired, and still do, the Israeli nation and the people who have represented them at home and abroad. We have applauded the manner in which they have always stood four square for their country's interest. We have wanted our politicians to be so imbued with the idea of the United States first. We have wanted the people of the United States to emulate the Israeli attitude of thrift, honesty and patriotism. In short, we admire the Israelis and their country.

However, what now is causing us uneasiness is the trend in our opinion for United States citizens of the Jewish faith to put the national interests of the Israeli nation above the interests of the United States.

A concrete example of this we believe is contained in the present squabble over President Carter's plan to sell advanced war planes to Israel, Egypt and Saudi Arabia. We can understand the Israeli opposition to this plan and do not condemn the Israeli Prime Minister for opposing it by political action. What is causing our concern is the pressure being put on Congress by United States citizens in behalf of Israel.

Were every segment of the ethnic mix of the citizenry of the United States to adopt the same attitude and demand that our Congress favor their ethnic or religious origins the homogeneity of the United States would be irreparably riven apart. We would soon degenerate into a myriad of squabbling factions and we would quickly be easy prey for stronger nations with more national unity.

Our bottom line says two things. One, we must preserve the freedom of the Israeli peoples. Two, we must continue close ties with Saudi Arabia and Egypt. We think President Carter's stance in the "war plane deal" will accomplish both objectives.

We trust our representatives will adopt the obvious Israeli attitude of "Israel First" and begin to put "America First" in our foreign policy dealings.

Students are selected by the high school faculty on the basis of leadership abilities, citizenship, and academic a-

chievement.

Delegates at the sessions will set up a mock state government, also establishing city, county and state governments. Attendants will introduce bills and carry them through the entire legislature process. Delegates will also be given the opportunity to run for offices of the three levels of government.

County Voters Follow State, District Trend

Farwell and Parmer County voters went with the trend across the state and district, selecting most of the final winners in ballots cast here in Saturday's Democratic and Republican Primaries. Voters numbered 1864 in the county Democratic Primary while 200 persons cast ballots in the Republican Primary.

John Hill easily carried the county with 1007 votes to 467 for incumbent Dolph Briscoe for governor. Kent Hance easily outdistanced his opponent, Morris Sheats, in the race for the Democratic nomination to succeed George Mahon for U.S. Representative, 19th District.

Local and area Republicans chose Clements over Hutchison in the governor's race and Reese over Bush in the U.S. Congressional race, but there will be a runoff in that race.

In the most hotly contested race in the county, Jack Patterson and Glendon Sudderth will face each other in a runoff on June 3 to determine the Democratic candidate for county commissioner, precinct 2.

Other county officials ran unopposed on the Democratic ballot. Judge Paul Fortenberry secured a place on the November ballot by amassing 1468 votes across the county and 260 in Farwell.

Names of other county officials are followed by numbers representing total county votes and total Farwell votes: Dorothy Quickel, district clerk, 1473, 278; Bonnie Warren, county clerk, 1507, 273; and Benna Felts, county treasurer, 1396, 266.

Patterson got 156 votes in the commissioners race, precinct 2, followed by Glendon Sudderth, 89; Charles E. Trimble, 77; Archie R. McCutchan, 63; and Richard Carson, 55.

Republican Vernon Estes with 30 votes defeated James W. Dixon with 7 votes for commissioner, precinct 2. Jimmy Briggs received 25 votes for county commissioner, precinct 4. He was unopposed.

Raymond McGeehee defeated Pete Jesko for the Democratic nomination for commissioner, precinct 4. McGeehee received 144 votes to 47 for Jesko.

In the Justices of the Peace race Ray Mears, precinct 1, received 278 votes; Frances Euler, precinct 2, received 438; and Wayne Spears, precinct 3, garnered 253.

Hollis Horton received 1054 votes for Democratic county

chairman, receiving 161 votes from Farwell. In the race for Republican county chairman, there will be a run-off between J.W. Gammon and Frank Hinkson.

The following votes were received for Democratic precinct chairman posts: Martha Hamilton, precinct 1, 35; Jay E. Beene, precinct 2, 437; Ken Horn, precinct 3, 205; Albert Smith, precinct 4, 219; Max Steinbock, precinct 5, 164; Wendol Christian, precinct 6, 37; Raymond K. Schueler, precinct 7, 43; Otho Whitefield, precinct 8, 37.

Texas Attorney General John Hill defeated Gov. Dolph Briscoe in Saturday's Democratic primary election, mixing the incumbent governor's hopes for a third term with a promise of new energy in government.

Republicans chose Bill Clements over Ray Hutchison in the governor's race. U.S. Rep. Bob Krueger, who led former Texas insurance commissioner Joe Christie throughout the race, won the Democratic race for the right to meet U.S. Sen. John Tower in November. Tower was unopposed in the Republican primary.

Hill narrowly avoided a run-off in the five man race, garnering 914,375 votes compared to 743,962 for Briscoe. Former governor Preston Smith compiled 91,353 votes and Ray Allen Mayo had 19,785.

Parmer County voters chose Hill over Briscoe by a vote of 1007 to 467. Smith received 317 votes; Donald R. Beagle, 22; and Mayo 9. Farwell voters picked Hill over Briscoe by a 142 to 94 margin. Smith captured 60 votes and Beagle and Mayo received 3 and 2 votes, respectively.

In the Republican primary, Clements received 69 county votes and 32 local votes. Hutchison compiled 29 county votes followed by Thompson, 8. Locally, Hutchison received 7 votes and Thompson, 1.

Krueger received 844,638 votes compared to 692,665 for Christie. Krueger garnered 943 county votes and Christie picked up 640. Locally, Krueger defeated Christie, 165-84.

A total of 177 county votes were cast for Tower, including 40 from Farwell residents.

Lt. Governor Bill Hobby was easily nominated to run for a third term by an almost 4-1 margin over his nearest opponent. Hobby garnered 1104 county votes and 171 Farwell votes. John Hill Westbrook received 212 county votes and 40 local votes followed by

James L. (Lynn) McNeese, Jr., 188, 24 and Troy Skates, 83, 16.

Gaylord Marshall, who was unopposed in the Republican Primary election for Lt. Governor, received 85 votes in Parmer County and 37 votes in Farwell.

State Senator Kent Hance won the Democratic nomination for the 19th District Congressional seat by an almost 2-1 margin. He will face the winner of the Republican runoff in the November election to name a successor to veteran U.S. Rep. George Mahon.

Jim Reese and George Bush, Republican candidates for the Congressional post, will face a runoff election to determine who will be the Republican candidate.

In Parmer County, Hance garnered 1059 votes to Sheats' 706. The vote was much closer in Farwell as Hance defeated Sheats by a slim 149-145 vote.

Parmer County favored Reese over Bush by a margin of 129-33. Joe Hickock received 31 votes. Farwell cast 26 votes for the right to meet U.S. Sen. John Tower in November.

Mark White, who will meet the Republican candidate for the post of Attorney General in the November election, defeated Price Daniel, Jr. However, Parmer County favored Daniel by a vote of 880 to 823. Farwell picked Daniel over White, 151-121.

Jim Baker ran for attorney general and was unopposed in the Republican Primary, receiving 92 county votes and 38 votes in Farwell.

Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Officer, who was unopposed received 1292 county votes and 210 Farwell votes in the Democratic Primary.

Warren G. Harding won the Democratic state treasurer nomination, garnering 998 county votes and 116 votes in Farwell. C.R. "Charlie" Sanderson picked up 234 votes in the county and 34 local votes. A third candidate, Harry Ledbetter, captured 341 and 43 votes in the county and local precinct, respectively.

Bob Armstrong, who was unopposed for Commissioner of Land Office, received 1217 votes in Parmer County and

202 votes in Farwell.

Reagan V. Brown bested his two opponents for the commissioner of agriculture post receiving 1010 county votes and 165 votes in Farwell. Joe A. Hubenak and Dan G. Sewell, picked up 283 county votes each. Sewell got 65 Farwell votes to 20 for Hubenak.

In the Democratic primary Mark Wallace defeated John Thomas Henderson for railroad commissioner. Wallace received 819 county votes to 606 for Henderson. Farwell also picked Wallace over Henderson, 125-102.

Jerry Sadler won the nomination for railroad commissioner (unexpired term) over Ray Lemmon, John Poerner and Jake Johnson. Parmer County voted as follows: Sadler, 802; Lemmon, 144; Poerner, 469; and Johnson, 194. Sadler drew the most local votes - 149 - followed by Poerner, 68; Johnson, 17; and Lemmon, 15.

Joe R. Greenhill, who was unopposed for Chief Justice, Supreme Court, received 1176 county votes and 199 Farwell votes.

Franklin Spears bested O'Neal Bacon for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1, garnering 916 county votes and 150 local votes.

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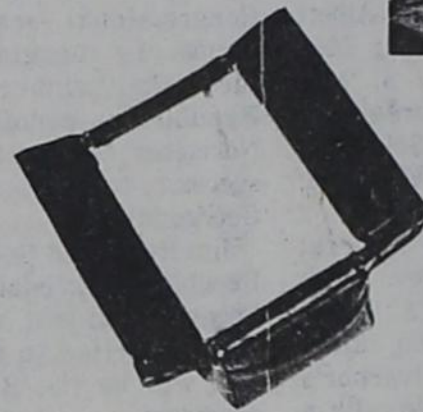
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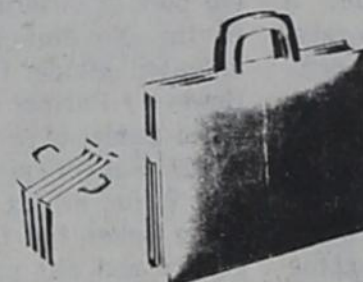
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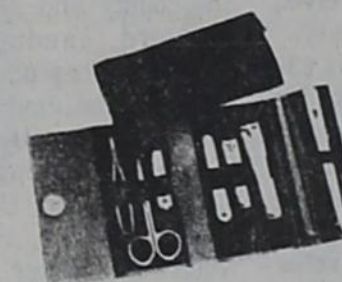
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Parmer County 4-H'ers Compete In 'Round-Up'

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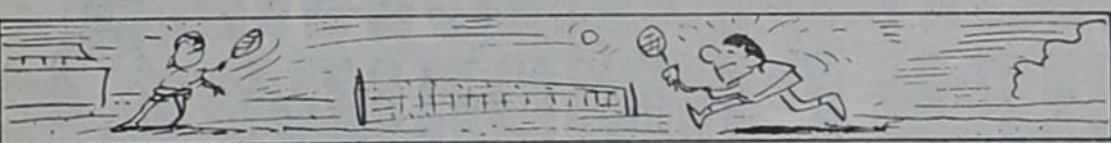
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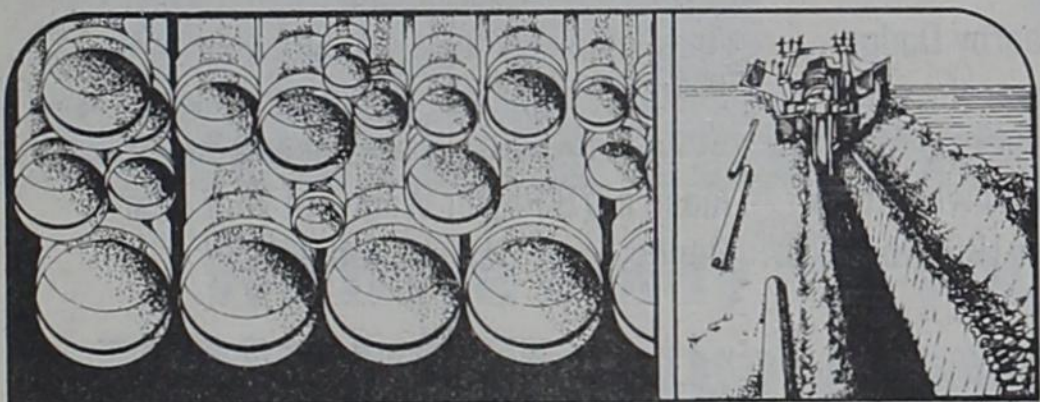
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Little League Results

THE LAW MISUNDERSTOOD
There are three misconceptions that most people entertain about the law of God and its Ten Commandments.
1. Most people have a vague notion that the law always was; that it must have been given to Adam or soon after. Actually, God gave the law to Moses for Israel about 1500 B.C., after about 2,500 years of human history had elapsed (John 1:17). So mankind lived on earth for about 2,500 years without the law of the Ten Commandments.
2. Most people suppose that the law and the Ten Commandments were given to mankind in general, while in fact it was given to Israel alone (Deut. 5:2,3).
3. Most people suppose that the law was given to help us to do right. Even some clergymen teach this, although the Bible clearly teaches that the law was given to show us that we are guilty sinners.
It is true that the law, while given to Israel, also shows the Gen- tile that he is a sinner. This is why Rom. 3:19 says:
"Now we know that what things soever the law saith, it saith to them who are under the law; that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may be brought in guilty before God."
But most important of all: few people realize that the Lord Jesus Christ died for our sins to deliver us from the just condemnation of the law. This is taught in the following Scriptures:
"Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, having been made a curse for us..." (Ga. 3:13).
"For God hath made Him to be sin for us, (Him) who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him" (II Cor. 5:21).
"For sin shall not have dominion over you; for ye are NOT UNDER THE LAW, BUT UNDER GRACE" (Rom. 6:14).

Gafford Deeds Land To City Of Texico

Texico City Council met in regular session Tuesday night with Mayor Manfred Turnbough and trustees Bill Thigpen, Lewis Cooper, Vane Doshier and Marie Christian present. Also attending the meeting were city employees, Mickey Fenn and Billy Hammit.

It was reported that Doshier donated several steel posts to be used on the north side of

the dump grounds. In other business, Dale Gafford deeded 60 feet of right-of-way on his property to the City of Texico. The area in question is located on Eunice Street.

It was announced that Tony Lara of the New Mexico Highway Department would be in Texico Wednesday to inspect the city's streets. The Council is hopeful that by working with the highway

department, the streets in Texico will be sealed and chipped. No definite agreement has been reached as yet.

The swimming pool was discussed and it was noted that the north runway needs either to be replaced or repaired.

The Council decided to apply to CETA - a summer work program for youths 16-20 - for summer workers. In past years Texico has utilized CETA workers. The youths work for the city but will be paid by CETA, a federally-sponsored program.

A resolution was adopted to the effect that Mayor Turnbough and all Texico trustees will be able to sign for property issued through the Federal Surplus Property Assistance and Utilization Program. The necessary forms will be filled out and mailed to Santa Fe in a few days.

Water Superintendent Billy Hammit's requests for supplies for the water department were okayed except for the new meters. Since the city cannot trade in the old meters, the Council decided to look into the feasibility of establishing a sand trap for the city instead - rather than to keep replacing the water meters.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Farmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reported that Fred Constancio, 48, of Friona; Rodolfo Corella, 24, of Roswell; and Ricardo Flores, 19, of Dumas; have all been transported to the state penitentiary in Huntsville.

Constancio was recently convicted of the theft of several cylinders and his probation for a similar charge was also revoked. Corella was sentenced to 40 years in the robbery and assault of a manager of the Piggly Wiggly Store in Friona. Flores' probation was revoked.

In other law enforcement activities Sheriff Lovelace reported that a Bovina juvenile was apprehended in connection with a theft. The juvenile was released to his parents.
