Is This Pest Bothering Your Victory Garden?

FLEA BEETLE-Color: Quick-jumping, dark brown or metallic beetles. Eat small holes in leaves. Dust with cryolite 1 part and sulfur 5 parts, or pyrocide dust. Repeat at 5-7 day intervals. Destruction of weeds in and near the garden will often prevent serious damage from flea beetles. For further information see your County Extension Service Agents.


