

LEGION AUXILIARY REPORT

Mrs. Foister Rector, secretarytreasurer of the Friona Auxiliary of the American Legion, this week released the following report on the work of the group during 1942:

"To the Legion Auxiliary members around Farwell and Bovina who do not get to come to the meetings, I am making this report for you.

"We, as a unit, belong to one of the largest organizations in America today and we are very proud of our small unit in the very efficient work done in this year. We had 27 members last year. We sponsored, with the Legion, the sale of \$3800.00 in war bonds over the county. We held food sales to the amount of \$59.69. Our county Poppy Sale amounted to \$104. Our poppy money goes into our welfare fund which consists of welfare work among veterans in our county; \$15 is sent to the State Deparment for student loan, a fund which enables veteran's children to attend college, a chance they otherwise might not have; \$10 goes to state rehabilitation, \$5 to child welfare, also state. We sent \$10 to Amarillo veteran's hospital for entertainment of veterans and \$12 to the state department for veteran's Christmas fund.

"One dollar went to the mobile blood donors this year. This is something new that has come up since the present conflict and will help furnish blood transfusions for the boys now on battle fields. In all, our welfare work amounted to \$80.30 this year.

"We sent flowers to our members or any of their families who passed away. One-half of this expense is cared for by the Legion. Our general fund takes care of lights, gas bills and all incidental expenses of our organization, while we carry onehalf the expense.

"Forty-five leters and 77 postal cards were written to you members and the state department through the year. All members should receive the "Lone Star". If you don't let me know soon. Our program will be much harder to carry on this year under the ration programs but we must solicit all of you girls who are eligible for membership. Join our Auxiliary and send in your \$1.25 dues for one year. We need you now as never before and you with sons eligible for army service and sons already in service need us as your organization. Our program is for service to you and those around us."

GET 'HEAD START' ON GARDENS

COLLEGE STATION-Getting a 'head start" on next year's vegetable garden is a good idea, especially for people" who do not have thriving fall gardens.

Jennie Camp, specialist in home production planning for the A. & M. College Extension Service, says there are a number of ways to prepare for successful spring gardens long before the seed catalogues begin to arrive.

First, the family should plan, Miss Camp says, and the garden should be part of the overall plan for the year's supply of food and feed. A guide to planning for the family's food and feed supply can be obtained from the offices of county Extension Service agents. A family of five, for example, should plan to have at least a dozen kinds of vegetables, 20 bushels of potatoes, plus plenty of dried peas and beans, home-produced grain, berries, fruits, reelons and syrup. Seeds of most vegetables will be adequate for next year's gardens, Miss Camp says.

Second, gardeners can plant a winter cover crop on their garden plots to hold down the soil and increase fertility. This is especially important since nitrates will be scarce and only commercial growers will be entitled to commercial nitrogen. Cover crops planted this fall can be turned under early next spring to build up the soil.

Third, Miss Camp advises, start a compost heap containing autumn leaves, dead flowers, lawn clippings, table scraps. In the spring when the garden plot is plowed or spaded, the compost can be spread over the garden plot.


