With the largest list of animals ever to be exhibited expected to arrive for competition, the Parmer County Dairy Show will open its doors in Bovina next Wednesday, August 29th, for the third annual showing.

The show, open to registered Jer-I sey, Holstein-Freisian and Milking Shorthorn breeds, will continue through Friday, August 31st, with cattle to be removed from the show barn after 4 o'clock the final day.

Featuring the opening day of the show is the butterfat production contest, with two tests to be run on the cows entered, morning and evening. Thursday will be highlighted by the judging and a free barbecue, sponsored by Bovina merchants, at the noon hour, and the show barn will be open all day Friday for visitors who wish to see how the various animals placed in competition. **Classes** Outlined

In the butterfat production contest, two classes are listed: (1) cow four years and over and (2) cow under four years. Prizes will be \$10, \$7.50 \$5 and \$3, with a banner to go to the champion of the two classes. Perking Up the Men Folks' Clothing

COLLEGE STATION-"Right now a man's civilian suit is one of the most precious garments in the home," says Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, specialist in clothing for the Extension Service. "If your husband or son is not wearing it because he's in uniform, you should see to mending it and putting it away safely."

But if your menfolk are still wearing "civvies", you and they together can make their suits last as long as possible-get every possible day's wear out of them. You can help by cleaning, pressing and mending the suit-but the men can do much to save repairs and keep their suits looking well.

Here are some tips from Mrs. Barnes on how men can help save their suits: Any suit lasts longer if it gets brushed often. Brush a suit with the grain of the cloth-inside as well as out-in and around pockets and inside of cuffs, if the trousers have cuffs.

Let the suit hang in the open air a while before it goes into the closet, especially if the closet isn't ventilated. From time to time give the suit a good out-door airing on a bright, breezy day.

Don't spoil the press by throwing it over a chair; put it on a hanger as soon as you take it off, preferably on one of those wooden hangers with broad shoulders made especially for men.

As for cleaning and pressing, you save the suit by having it' cleaned before it gets too dirty. It saves money as well as the suit.

5 Good Country Tricks for Saving More Used Fats

THIS year our domestic supply of fats and oils will L be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Right now, we are facing our worst fat shortage since the war began. To make up for this staggering loss, the government is depending on the women of America-and particularly women on farms and in smaller cities.

Every spoonful, every drop of fat is needed to help make battlefield and homefront essentials. So roll up your sleeves and do an all-out job, won't you? Clip this checklist and pin it up in your kitchen as a reminder.



- I. FRIED SALT PORK-with milk gravy, Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
- 2. DEEP FAT FRYING --- use the fat over and over; but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
- 3. ROASTS AND CHOPS --- save all trimmings (scraps from plates, too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
- SAUSAGES-they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water scrape the fat from the frying pan.
- CHICKEN SOUP -- chill it before you use it. Scoop off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 2 red points and up to 4c for every pound of used fat you turn in.

GOING BACK TO SCHOOL?

Every honorably discharged service man or woman of World War II can go to school at government expense under two acts of Congress (see chart below) if the requirements are met.

Additional information can be obtained from the Disabled American Veterans national service officer in your area or write D.A.V. national headquarters, Cincinnati 6, Ohio.

PUBLIC LAW NO. 346 (G I Bill of Rights)

TO BE ELIGIBLE:

- 1. A veteran must have served in active military or naval service on or after Sept. 16, 1940, and prior to the end of World War II.
- 2. The veteran's discharge must be other than dishonorable.
- 3. At least 90 days active service is required for one year of schooling.
- 4. Veterans under 25 years of age at induction are entitled to instruction (not less than one year, not more than four) commensurate with length of service. Over 25 years of age must prove interruption or interference for one year of schooling.

WHAT YOU GET:

Tuition and necessary school expense (up to \$500) for an ordinary school year. In addition subsistence payment of \$50 a month is made to veterans without dependents, \$75 a month to veterans with dependents.

WHERE YOU GO:

The veteran may choose any recognized educational or training institution which will accept him.

FUTURE BONUS:

This law, as it stands today, provides that money spent on a veteran's education will be deducted from any federal bonus he may get.





More Soap Promised For Laundry Use

COLLEGE STATION-American housewives are going to have 10 per cent more "heavy duty" laundry type soaps.

According to a statement from the USDA received here, Secretary Clinton P. Anderson has made possible the increase by an order requiring manufacturers to use additional quantities of water-softening "builder" materials in their products. The order became effective August 7.

At the same time, the Department announced that army requirements for soap will be lower during the next six months. This will make it unnecessary to reduce further the quotas of fat available for the manufacture of civilian soaps, the statement said. It quotes the secretary that the quota of fat assigned to soap manufacture for civilians in 1945 is more than the quantity of fat consumed in the manufacture of soap for civilians in this country before the outbreak of war in Europe.

In announcing the order, Secretary Anderson put a quietus on rumors that soap may be rationed. "If we were to have soap rationing," he explained, "it would be necessary for me as Secretary of Agriculture to authorize it. I do not plan to issue such authorization. Operating a soap rationing program is just too great a problem to undertake now."
