Clifford McGuire, of Phillips, Tex., spent the weekend with his family here. He is making preparations to move his family there in the near future.

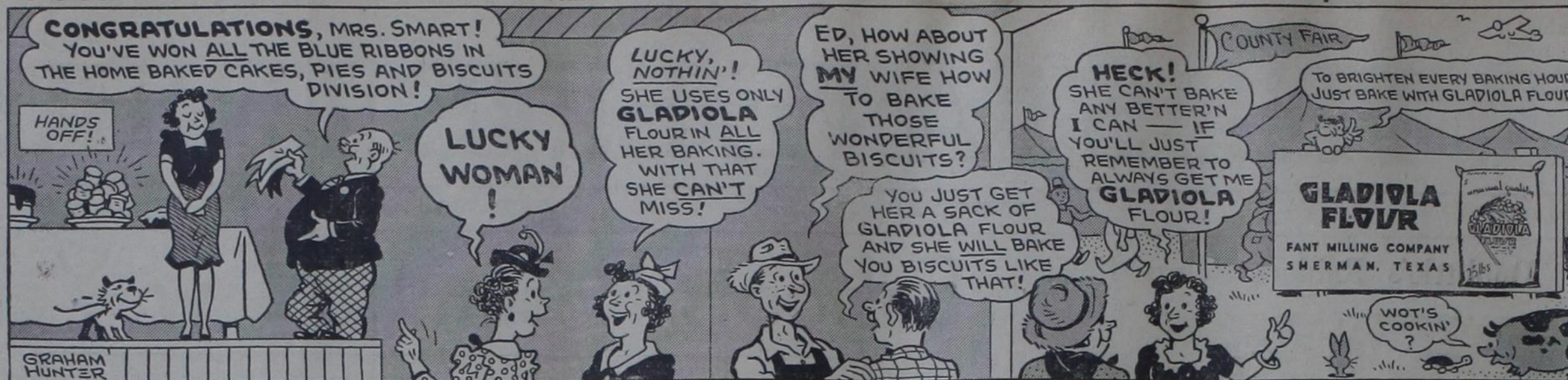
Mr. and Mrs. Turner Paine are the parents of a daughter, born Saturday morning, September 1.

Cauliflower, Peas And Potatoes are Plentiful

Cauliflower, green peas and Irish potatoes have joined the ranks of plentiful foods and all housewives are being encouraged to keep supplies moving from markets to kitchens by buying generously and serving them often, according to C. B. Hodges, state director, production and marketing administration.

"Farmers are doing a good job of producing food this year and unless civilian consumption of fresh vegetables keeps pace with marketing, some of our supply will be wasted," he said. Peas and cauliflower are selling at prices attractive to housewives, giving them additional incentive to keep larger supplies moving.

In many areas of the state, potato shortages exist while supplies in this section are piling up because they cannot be moved out in great quantities, due to transportation bottlenecks. Since the potatoes cannot be shipped out readily, housewives can help expand local markets by buying and serving them more often.

State Fair Books Out, Dates Are Oct. 7-14

ALBUQUERQUE — Leon H. Harms, manager of New Mexico's Victory State Fair, October 7-14, announced today that the State Fair premium book and catalog, to be distributed shortly, offers a total amount in excess of \$15,000 in cash premiums for livestock, farm, garden and orchard crops, poultry and home arts and sciences. The prizes range from 50c in the Home Arts and Science classes up to \$100 for the grand prize county exhibit. Harms said that entries are rolling in rapidly from all parts of the state although entry blanks have not yet been distributed.

"We have already received entries

for a number of show herds of Hereford, Angus and Shorthorn cattle," Harms said. "Several entries also have been received in the open classes for sheep, goats, swine and poultry. The number of these early entries indicates clearly the desire of producers for the State Fair which provides an opportunity for breeders of fine stock to show the entire state what they are doing. Since our dates have been advanced to October 7 through 14, farmers, truck gardeners, and orchardists will have a better opportunity to show well matured products. The latter date is also found desirable by cattle growers, as stock at the later date is in better show condition. We have completed all arrangements for the usual amusements, including racing, rodeo, etc., and also have a number of new features, some of which we feel sure will receive a warm welcome. We intend to make this Victory Fair the best New Mexico has ever had in every detail."

**"Food From Home"
Still GI's Choice**

COLLEGE STATION—The war's end has not solved the problem of sending food to servicemen overseas and "food from home" is the first thought most of the boys have when asked what they would like to find in their Christmas packages.

Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, Extension Service Specialist in food preservation says, "Experience last year taught us to use foods canned in tin if at all possible. At least, it is essential to pack the foods in tight metal containers."

Reports from servicemen indicate that food not sealed in cans was usually molded, infested with insects, soaked in oil or water, or it was dried out and old.

Proper canning will be even more important this year, with the bulk of packages going to the Pacific, where the climate and distance of travel will be harder on the contents.

"When sending food to the serviceman, it is best to send a variety of things unless he has asked for one specific food," says Mrs. Leverenz. "Some women planned a menu on this order: 1 can turkey, 1 can cranberry sauce, 1 can nuts, 1 can plum pudding. Another sent 1 can cheese, 1 can pickles, and 1 can crackers at one time. A meat, a vegetable, a fruit, a relish and a sweet which will go together well might make a whole meal," recommends the specialist.

Fruit cakes were among the most popular items sent last year. It is one of the most desirable products; therefore, Mrs. Leverenz advises that fruit cakes continue to be sent even if sugar substitutes have to be used.

Other items which have been canned and sent overseas successfully are: cookies, candies, baked or fried fruit pies, breads, preserves and jellies, well-cured meats, fritos, potato chips, pickled boiled eggs and many other types of cake in addition to fruit cake.

Keep On Buying U. S. War Bonds and Stamps

Soldiers Demand More Chicken For Meals

COLLEGE STATION—Victory has not decreased the demand of Uncle Sam's fighting men for chickens, says U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson, appealing to poultry producers in Texas and other designated states to furnish 125,000,000 pounds of dressed poultry to be held for the preparation of canned poultry for the armed forces. Canning will begin Oct. 1.

A month ago the Secretary issued an order, effective August 13, designed to effect "the equal sharing of the armed forces and civilians of all poultry handled in 'authorized' plants" in Texas and a group of other states. Under the order of the Army Quartermaster Corps, buying poultry for the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, will purchase 50 per cent of poultry killed, bled and plucked in authorized plants in designated areas. The remaining 50 per cent will be made available for civilians immediately after selection by the QMC of the share for the armed forces.

To facilitate a flow of live poultry from producers through established channels to which the army has access, authorized processors and their buyers or suppliers will be given official stickers for their truck windshields. The plants or buying stations of authorized processors, suppliers and all others qualified to obtain live chickens under the order will be identified. With such identi-

fication producers easily can make certain that their poultry likewise actually is reaching the armed forces and legitimate trade channels for civilians, Secretary Anderson believes. The Secretary attributes the greater need for canned chicken primarily to the shortage of refrigeration in tropical areas. All of the inaccessible hot spots of the world can be served by canned chicken, but with-

out refrigeration many places cannot be supplied with fresh poultry. Accordingly, "there's simply got to be more fowl available for canning," he said.

In his order, the Secretary emphasized that farmers and poultrymen are not being urged to sell their laying hens. "We must not jeopardize the nation's 1946 egg supply," he said. "I am asking merely that when the farmer or poultryman, in carrying on normal culling operations, has hens to sell that he sell them only to 'authorized' suppliers, providing army poultry under this program."

ELECTRIC CO-OPS EXPAND
COLLEGE STATION—Three rural electric cooperatives recently have been awarded REA allocations for expanding electric services. They are located in Clay, McCulloch, and Wood counties. In addition, a Lynn County cooperative has awarded contracts for construction of 125 miles of line to serve 260 members.

AAA News Briefs

Since the present truck set-aside program for surplus military trucks started June 9, a total of 2912 vehicles have been allotted or sold in 30 counties of 32 states. The vehicles are set-aside for sale to farmers in a specified area by the department of Commerce after determination by AAA that lack of transportation threatens to hamper production.

Trucks earmarked for farm use are sold only to dealers who agree to resell them to farmers in the designated area holding certificates issued by local County AAA Committees.

The more used fats that can be assembled now, the sooner will housewives find their soap supplies replenished and the sooner will farmers find unlimited supplies of insecticides, fungicides, veterinary preparations, ungicides, veterinary preparations.

With world sugar supplies still running 'way short' the Government is standing behind the request for more sugar produced in this country by increasing the guaranteed return to producers.

Secretary of Agriculture, Clinton P. Anderson, announced the support on net year's crop at \$13.50 per ton. That's national average return, and it's one dollar higher than this year's prices. Sugarcane produced or sugar also gets an increase in Government support. The rate was set or \$2.10 per ton for average sugarcane in Louisiana, Florida, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, and Hawaii.

At the same time, government is smoothing the way for increased sugar production at the other end of the line. That's with special payments to processors to help them bear the higher processing costs.

So it looks as if the government is doing its part to help farmers and processors turn out the production needed to straighten out the sugar supply.

Applications for beef production payments for sales of eligible beef during the period May 18, 1945, thru June 30, 1945, should be filled out not later than August 31, 1945, in order to be eligible according to W. M. Sherley, Chairman of Farmer County AAA Committee.

After June-30, 1945, applications for beef production payments should be filed within 60 days of the date of sale in order to be eligible.

Good pastures conserve soil and water, reduce livestock production costs and when operated in rotation with cultivated crops result in larger crop yields. Pasture establishment and improvement practices become especially important in meeting present food and fibre needs. Assistance in carrying out such practices is available to farmers under the conservation program of the AAA.

Your fall garden—small or large—should be planted with care. Vegetables planted should provide a high degree of food value and yield over a long period of time.

More than 90 percent of the farm land of the United States needs soil conservation treatment to protect it from soil erosion, maintain fertility,

and put it to its most efficient use, the USDA reports.

Wheat producers can plan their 1946 crops with the knowledge that acreage allotments and marketing quotas will not be in effect for the marketing year which begins July 1, 1946. The AAA act of 1938 requires that the Secretary of Agriculture make public announcement each year of data concerning the supply and consumption requirements for wheat. This year, as in recent years, the national emergency makes unnecessary the establishment of marketing quotas. Acreage allotments are dispensed with "in order to encourage production of a sufficient supply of food to maintain normal domestic consumption, taking into consideration current trends in consumption and exports and the quantities of substitutes available at fair prices and otherwise to effectuate the declared policy of the act".

Changes in the operating department affecting the Slaton and New Mexico divisions of the Santa Fe railway were announced on September 1 by G. C. Jefferis, general manager, at Amarillo.

Effective that day, W. H. Jones became acting superintendent of the Slaton division with headquarters at Slaton, and J. N. Landreth returns from that position to that of trainmaster on the New Mexico division with headquarters at Las Vegas.

J. H. Rapier, acting as trainmaster in the absence of Landreth, will return to Amarillo, where he will be assigned to other duties.

10 AWARDS PRESENTED

COLLEGE STATION—Ten Texas plants have been given A awards or outstanding war-time quantity and quality processing of food. The USDA has presented the awards for two years.

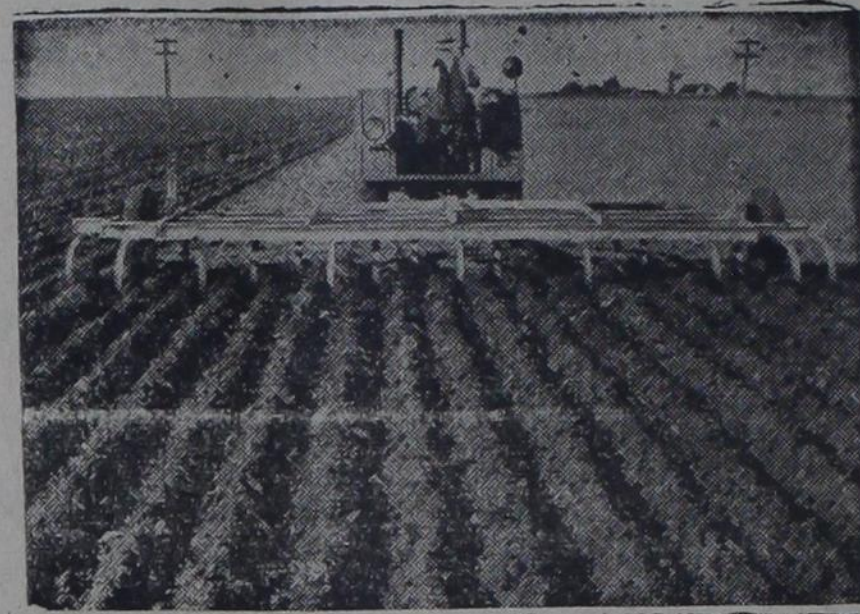
MORE LARD PREDICTED

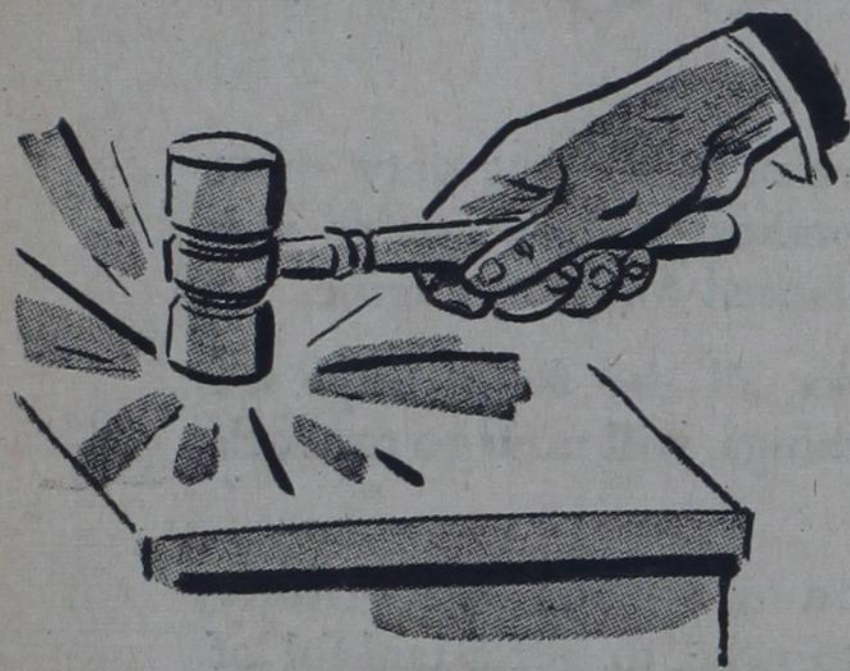

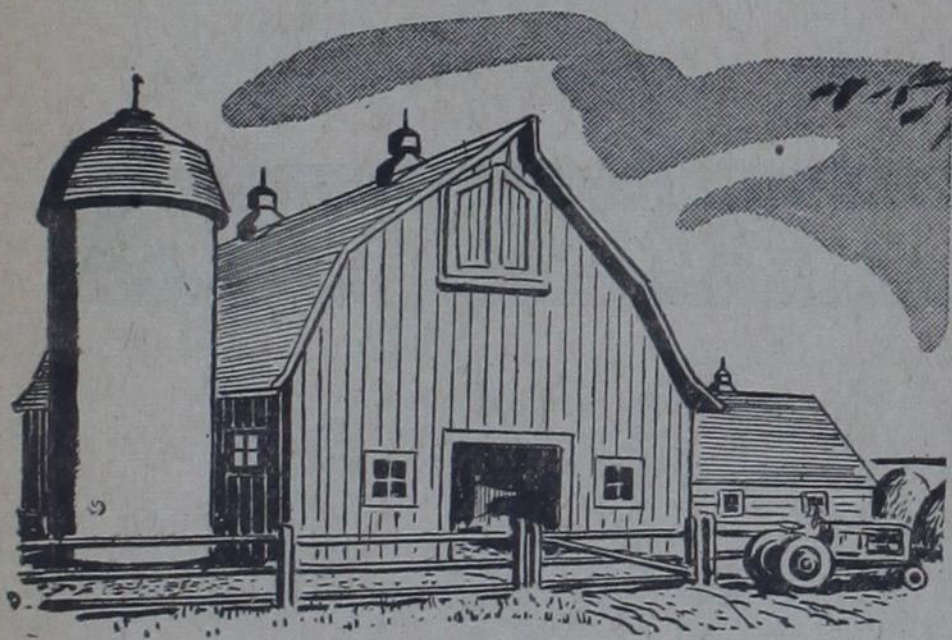

Six-Man Football Is Slated For Farwell

Limping and groaning, casting wistful eyes at malts and candy bars, some twenty-odd young Farwell hopefuls are finding out that the opening of a football training season isn't quite the snap they had expected.

Under the direction of Coach Jack Williams, the Farwell school hopes to turn out a hot-shot six-man football squad this year, and initial limbering up (although the boys opine it was more of a "stiffening up") workouts were held last Saturday.

Contacted Tuesday, Coach Williams explained that he had actually worked so little with the boys that he could not, as yet, make much of a guess as to what sort of team he might be expected to develop this season, but went on to say that within a week he felt most of the youngsters would have grasped the rudiments of football.

At the present time, Farwell and Bovina appear to be the only two schools in this county interested in six-man football. Tentative plans were laid for an interscholastic league last spring, which would include eight teams, but Coach Williams said he had been informed that the district was not certified before September 1. This means, he pointed out, that games played will not be rated in an official league.

"We'll go ahead with our workouts and schedule a few games for this season," Coach Williams told a reporter the first of the week, looking forward to a time when a league can be formulated.

Pfc. Crume Honored At Camp Gruber

The cameraderie of Texas in the same army outfit is far-famed. An intense pride in their commonwealth binds together officers and men from the Lone Star state to a degree that has made it the subject of song and story or years. Common heritage in the proud history and wide open spaces of the largest state in the Union seems to breed an attachment that makes all Texans brothers—or, if an age difference is involved—at least fathers and sons.

An example of an attachment of the latter nature came to light last week at Camp Gruber where the commanding officer of a traditionally "hard-boiled" military police unit presented a lowly Pfc. (but a fellow Texan!) with his personal pistol—a weapon he had carried through two wars—as a memento of their two and a half years together in the "foreign territory" of Oklahoma.

The MP commander, Major Hubbert L. Murphree of Pharr, Texas, provost marshal at Camp Gruber, made a little ceremony of the occasion. He formed a detachment to make a public presentation of the weapon to Pfc. Barney D. Crume of Farwell, the oldest member (in years of service) of Camp Gruber's downtown Muskogee MP patrol.

Making the presentation, Major Murphree said: "In view of the fact that I have no son of my own and that you have served with that degree of honor with which I would have had my son serve, I wish to present to you my .45 caliber pistol which I have carried through two wars. It has been used on the side of right against might during World Wars I and II. God willing, may it never be used again. But, if might again rears its ugly head, I have no fear but that you and yours will again use it with honor.

"I make this presentation to you as a father would to his only son—to show my appreciation to you for your faithfulness to duty. I am capable of bestowing no higher honor upon any man."

Pfc. Crume is the son of C. F. Crume, of Farwell, and has four brothers in the service, Staff Sergeants Van Kirtland and Vance De Kater (twins) and Lieut. Hugh L., in the army, and Lieut. (jg) Paul, in the navy.

Major Murphree was an officer in the 343rd machine gun battalion of the 90th division of World War I and served in the Army of Occupation in Germany.

(Note: The following story appeared recently in a Muskogee paper and was sent to friends and relatives in Farwell.)

Feed Crop Southwest Of Texico Good

Reports from farmers living southwest of Texico, in what is known as the old Locust Grove and Fairfield communities, are to the effect that fairly good feed crops are being produced there this year.

A good portion of that section is sandy loam land, and farmers who are producing feed crops took advantage of their limited moisture early in the spring to get their seed in the ground before it became too dry.

J. R. Hadley was in town, Tuesday, stating that he had about 400 acres of feed that was in the head, and added that W. J. Matthews, Perry Owens and Sam Randol in that section would also have very good feed this year.

T. J. (Uncle Tom) Randol, living southwest of Texico, says that he has 216 acres of feed that is reaching the maturity stage with a good yield of grain expected.

Rains have been falling in scattered localities during the past two weeks, with a heavy deluge being reported in the Oklahoma Lane section and northward early last week. Other light showers are reported in the county during the past week.

Lubbock District OPA Office to Close, 28th

September 29 is the official closing date for the Lubbock district OPA office, when functions of the office are divided between the Fort Worth and San Antonio offices, Earl E. Kerr, director, has announced.

Seven counties—El Paso, Hudspeth, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Culberson and Pecos—will be transferred to the San Antonio district. The remaining 64 counties, including Parmer, will be transferred to the Fort Worth district.

Operations of local boards will not be affected by the change, other than to come under the supervision of the Fort Worth and San Antonio offices.

As to what the next move of the 13th will be, the Farwell boy could only guess. At present, all men with sufficient points for discharge have been relieved from the division, and "we're about 50-50 now, with men who have and haven't had combat," he said.

"I just had a nice trip and saw quite a bit of country, but it will be okay with me if the army decides that I can stay in the States now," he told friends Tuesday.

A brother, Capt. "Penny" Anderson, with a Field Artillery outfit, recently came in after three years overseas and is now in Fort Sill, Okla. The younger Anderson hopes to visit his "brass hat" brother during his stay at home.
