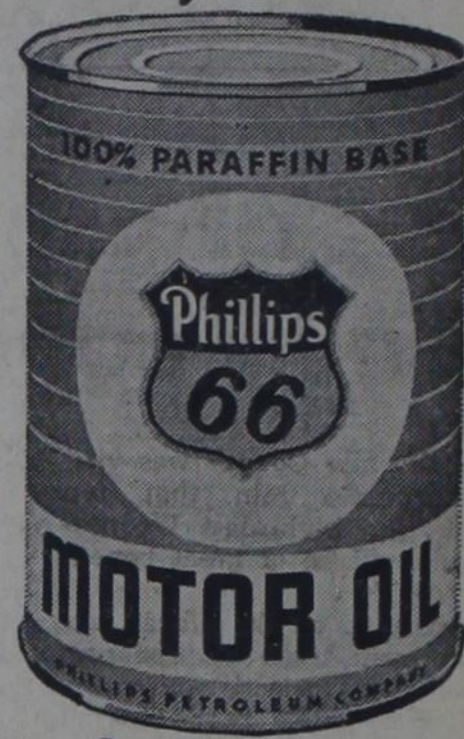

Health Notes

AUSTIN—Pellagra, even though not a communicable disease, is of concern to public health officials in Texas, since many people die of pellagra in this state every year. The disease is caused by the lack of certain essential foods and since it comes on slowly may not be recognized until the victim begins to have the more serious symptoms such as sore mouth, stomach trouble, and reddening and scaling of the skin.

"When these symptoms appear, the disease has been present for some time," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "The longer a person has pellagra the harder it is to cure. Consequently it is well to watch for the early symptoms such as nervousness, indigestion, and burning of the hands and feet. In its advanced stages pellagra may become so severe as to seriously affect the mind."

Pellagra is not contagious, Dr. Cox pointed out, and he emphasized that it can be prevented entirely by including the right kinds of foods in the daily diet. These essential foods include milk, fresh meat, whole wheat products, brewer's yeast, salmon, tomatoes, and other fresh fruits and vegetables. By including these foods in the daily diet, any individual can rest assured that pellagra will not constitute a menace to his health.

SINUSITIS IN TURKEYS

COLLEGE STATION—Sinusitis, more commonly called roup, of swell-head, affects turkeys of all ages. According to Sam Moore, poultry husbandman for the A & M Extension Service, the disease is highly contagious and is transmitted mainly by contact with infected or recovered carrier birds. It generally is seen after birds are over six weeks of age.

The condition usually is exhibited by swelling or enlargement of the sinus, due to accumulation of a gelatinous-like fluid in the sinus. The lung form often is present with or without the swelling of the sinuses and sometimes produces more deaths. Birds so affected usually exhibit a rattling in the lungs and go off feed.

Moore says that vaccines or bacterins do not provide any protection or promote any curative effects on sinusitis. But turkeys at all times should be provided with sufficient amounts of vitamin A either in the feed, or as green feed or alfalfa hay.

In the swollen sinus type, good results often are obtained by removing the fluid from the sinus with a syringe and needle (16 or 18 gauge needle) and injecting 1-2 c.c. of four per cent silver nitrate into each sinus, followed by light massage. If a syringe is not available, open the sinus, drain, and swab with four per cent silver nitrate. Make the incision large enough so it will stay open and drain. Cutting a circular hole with sharp scissors gives best results.

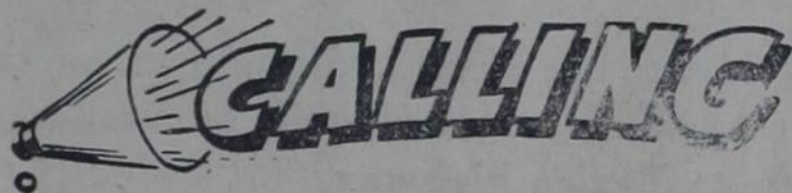

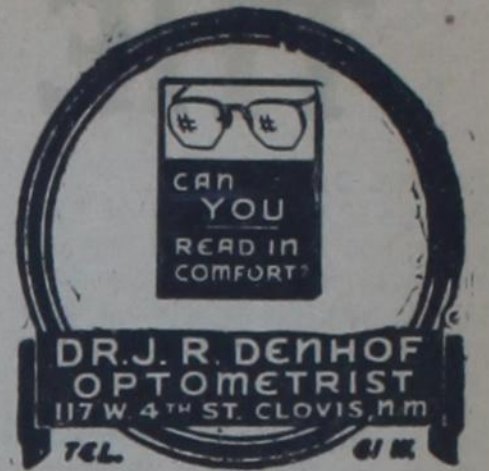
