Now Jimmy Carter and his administration can only propose legislation. It is the Congress which finally enacts bills into law. While it may be great fun to throw brickbats at the executive branch it is your friendly local representative in the legislative halls who finally passes the bill.

Ergo, as much or more attention must be paid to Senators and Congressman if oppressive and cockeyed legislation is to be kept off law

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
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Convalescent Center Chit Chat

Besides volunteer work, the Johnsons like to snow ski and recently they accompanied the church's high school department boys on a skiing trip to Santa Fe. Johnson instructs the class in Sunday school. They also water ski, getting away to Ute lake whenever they can.

Our homemaker has three recipes she has consented to share with us:

CHEESE DIP

Kraft Garlic Pasteurized Process Cheese (6 oz.) 1 can mushroom soup 1 small can dried green chilies

Combine all ingredients in a double boiler. Heat until cheese is melted. Serve warm with chips.

HOT MULLED CIDER

½ c. brown sugar 1 t. whole allspice 1 t. whole cloves 1/4 t. salt dash ground nutmeg 3 inches stick cinnamon 2 qts. apple cider orange wedges

Combine sugar, allspice, cloves, salt, nutmeg, cinnamon and cider in a large saucepan. Slowly bring to a boil; cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Remove spices. Serve in warmed mugs with a clovestudded orange wedge in each.

STRAWBERRIES AND **CREAM CREPES**

3 c. fresh strawberries 1/2 c. granulated sugar 1 c. cottage cheese 1 c. dairy sour cream ½ c. powdered sugar 10 to 12 cooked crepes

Slice strawberries; add granulated sugar and set aside. In blender, whip cottage cheese until smooth. Stir in sour cream and powdered sugar. Fill crepes with about two tablespoons of creamy mixture and berries; fold over. Top with remaining strawberries and cream.





or not he understands what God has said is not really interested in knowing what God has said. Such a person will take any passage that suits his rancy and use it as he wishes, for his "faith' is based, not on an understanding of what God has said, but on his own will.

The Church would be stronger and more aggressive if more of God's people had a deep desire to know and understand what God has said to them, and if those in the pulpit had the single passion to understand God's Word and help others to understand it.

In Mark 6:34 we read that our Lord was "moved with compassion" toward the multitudes because He saw them 'as sheep not having a shepherd: AND HE BEGAN TO TEACH THEM MANY The reason so many people can do

no more than hope for salvation, is because they have never even been taught God's simple plan of salvation, how "Christ died for sinners" so that they might be justified "by grace, through faith." We must begin our study of the Bible by understanding and believing this great truth.
