Now Jimmy Carter and his administration can only propose legislation. It is the Congress which finally enacts bills into law. While it may be great fun to throw bricks at the executive branch it is your friendly local representative in the legislative halls who finally passes the bill.

Ergo, as much or more attention must be paid to Senators and Congressman if oppressive and cockeyed legislation is to be kept off law books.

In this week's paper we have several pictures of the new ambulance that Farwell acquired through the assistance of the Area Council of Governments. It is a tremendous improvement over the old ambulance that has served the town for the past six or seven years. However, with the advent of the new ambulance we would suggest that the City fathers not summarily get rid of the old ambulance. Features Latest Equipment - -

Farwell Fire Dept. Has New Ambulance

After months of planning, preparation and anticipation, Farwell Volunteer Fire Department has a new ambulance. The new piece of equipment - ordered by the City Council several months ago - was picked up in Amarillo last month.

After being readied for use by local firemen the ambulance was officially put into operation a little over one week ago.

The one-ton chassis vehicle has several features which the other Farwell ambulance does not have. According to Lee Hutchins, fire chief, "It is a vast improvement over the other vehicle."

He said it has several kinds of kits, ranging from poison kits to obstetrics kits. Hutchins laughingly said of the latter equipment, "I hope we don't have to use it!" The ambulance also has all the required splints, according to Hutchins. In addition it has a vacuum oxygen system and the latest equipment to handle almost any emergency.

The interior of the vehicle, manufactured by Ford Motor

Company, is wood-grained. Special radio equipment has been installed which will enable the ambulance operators to keep in touch with law enforcement officials in both Curry and Parmer Counties. In addition to that, a citizens band radio has also been installed, making it possible for the ambulance to keep in contact with other fire department members.

Hutchins said the ambulance

would be able to transport two stretcher cases at one time or approximately five people with minor injuries.

The ambulance was purchased by the city in conjunction with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Total cost of the vehicle was \$15,768. Of that amount the city pays 40 percent or \$7,128.

Last month the City Council approved a lease agreement with the PRPC concerning the

new ambulance. It will remain in effect until the grant which the city is using to pay for the ambulance runs out some time in this year. At that time the complete ownership of the ambulance will revert to the City of Farwell.

To date no decision has been made regarding the old ambulance. At the next City Council meeting scheduled for Monday, Jan. 16, it will be decided whether to keep it or sell it.

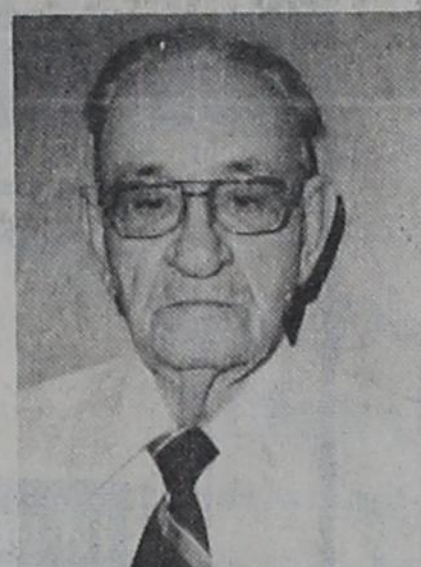
Mobile Home Parking - - Public Hearing Set By Farwell Council

Some Money Recovered - -

Friona Store Robbers Taken Into Custody

Two men have been arrested in connection with the Friday night robbery of Piggly Wiggly in Friona, reports Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Rodolfo Corella, 24, a former Friona resident, and Fred Constanancio, 48, of Friona are presently in the custody of Parmer County law enforcement officials. The two men have been charged with robbery and assault, and bond has been set at \$25,000 each.

According to Sheriff Lovelace, Joe Tungate, 38, assistant manager at Piggly Wiggly, left the store at 9 p.m.

Friday night with approximately \$20,000 in cash and checks. He was on his way to the bank, but before he could do anything, Corella - who was waiting in Tungate's vehicle - allegedly attacked him with a club and a knife.

Sheriff Lovelace said Constanancio was also involved with the robbery, but he did not take part in the fight and he did not have a weapon.

Tungate was cut several times in the scuffle. After the two suspects fled the scene, the injured man drove himself to the hospital. Several moments later the sheriff's department was notified of the robbery.

The description which Tungate gave the authorities eventually led to the arrest of the two men - Corella in New Mexico and Constanancio a few miles north of Friona.

"Since we were familiar with Corella, the victim's description seemed to match him and we concentrated on finding him immediately," Lovelace said. "We had a big break there because just a few days ago the Roswell law officers has sent a routine teletype asking if we had anything on Corella," he added.

That coincidence and the excellent cooperation between Parmer County officials and the Sheriff's departments in Roswell and Carlsbad led to the quick arrest of Corella as he was preparing to leave the area.

New Mexico authorities also wanted Corella on charges of robbery and car theft.

The suspect was arrested in Loving, N.M., as he and his wife and child were preparing to board a bus, Lovelace said. The Loving authorities turned him over to Roswell authorities who in turn agreed to temporarily set aside their charges because they felt Parmer County had a better case, Lovelace said.

Corella waived extradition and was returned to Parmer County Tuesday.

Constancio was arrested Sunday six miles north of Friona at his girl friends home, the sheriff reported. "We had two warrants on him," Lovelace said, "one for probation violation and the other for robbery and assault."

He explained that Constan-

cio was already serving six years probation for theft at the time of the robbery in Friona. He added that Constanancio also has another case of theft pending against him.

Lovelace said they were able to recover part of the money - approximately \$7,000 - from the two suspects, but not the checks.

He commended the New Mexico authorities for their cooperation and efficiency in apprehending Corella. Lovelace said he spent almost all day Saturday on the telephone conversing with New Mexico law enforcement officers in an attempt to clear up the case.

In other law enforcement activities, Lovelace said van-

dals threw a brick through the front window at Allen's Jewelry in Friona, causing the burglar alarm to go off.

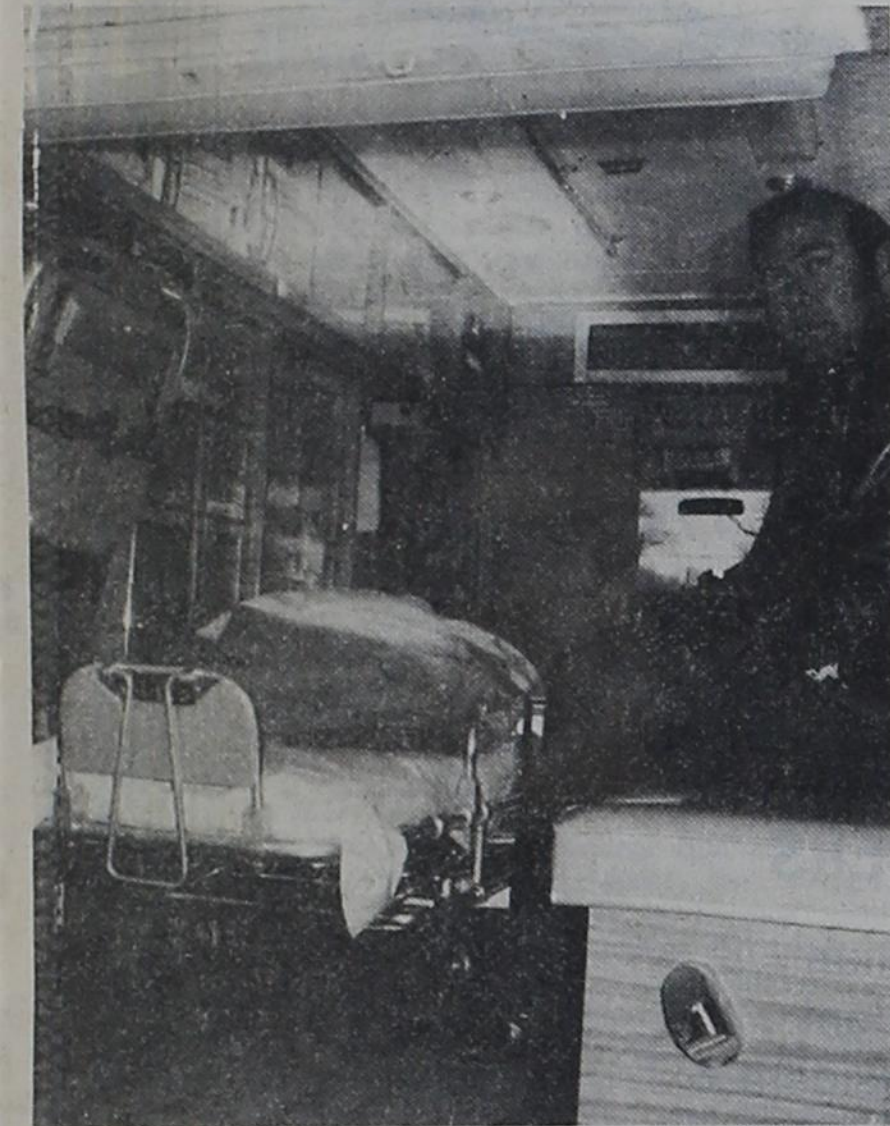
Then Tuesday, the sheriff said that three unidentified black males attempted to short change the clerks at the Ha-Lo Drive-In and Allsup's store in Farwell. According to Lovelace, one of the blacks also tried to take a money bag from under the counter, but it

was empty. Lovelace said that from reports they have received he thinks these are the same three men who have tried similar activities in area towns.

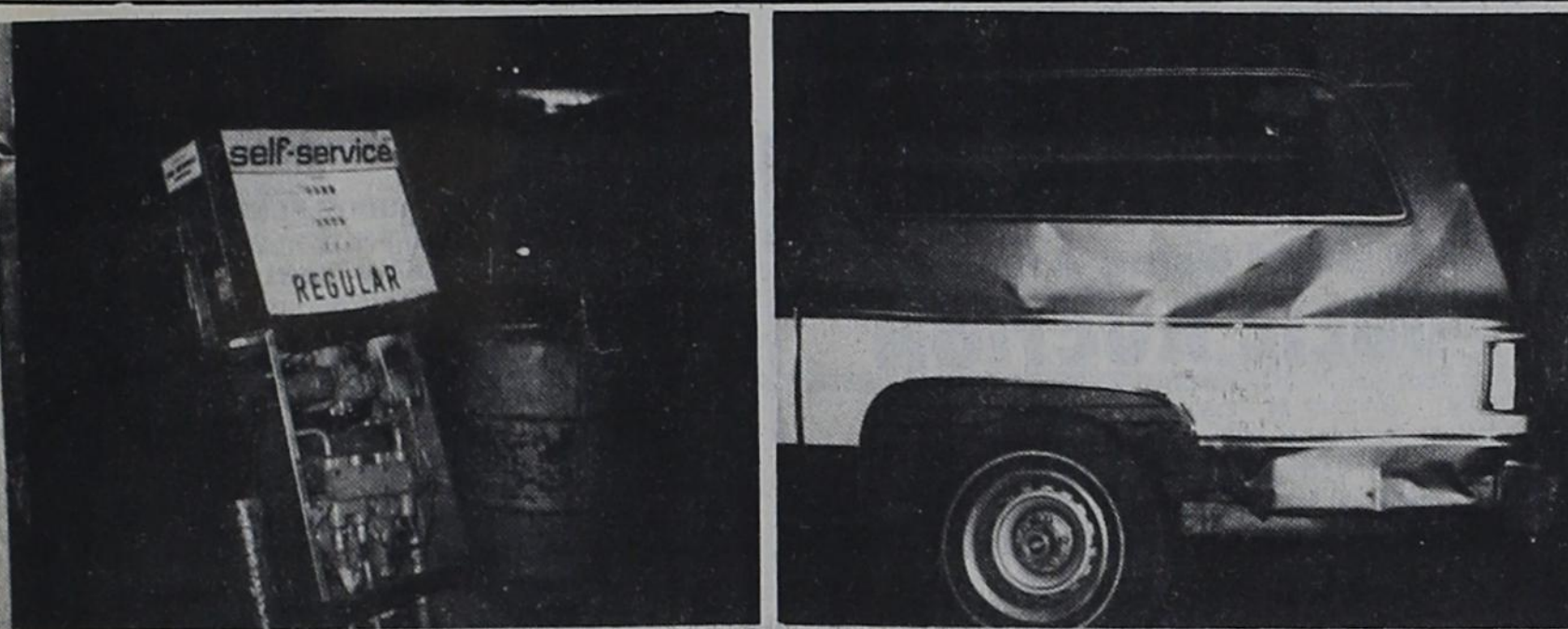

Accident Damages Heavy

report: According to Fant, Jean H. Wilkins, a paraplegic, was backing her 1974 two-door Cadillac from the south end of the Allsup's parking lot. As she changed gears, the car leaped forward, knocking a 1961 Plymouth, owned by Wilma Edge of Texico, night manager at the store, sideways,

denting the right rear bumper. Fant said that Mrs. Wilkins apparently became confused after the first impact and mistakenly hit the forward throttle instead of the hand-operated brakes, causing her car to lurch forward. It then struck the van which was parked near the pump, knocking it into the pump. Owner of the van is Howard W. Phares of Fieldton, Tex. Fant said the Cadillac had a fast idle which apparently caused it to react erratically to the hand controls. He added that no citations were issued. Due to the danger of gas leaking from the broken pump the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene.

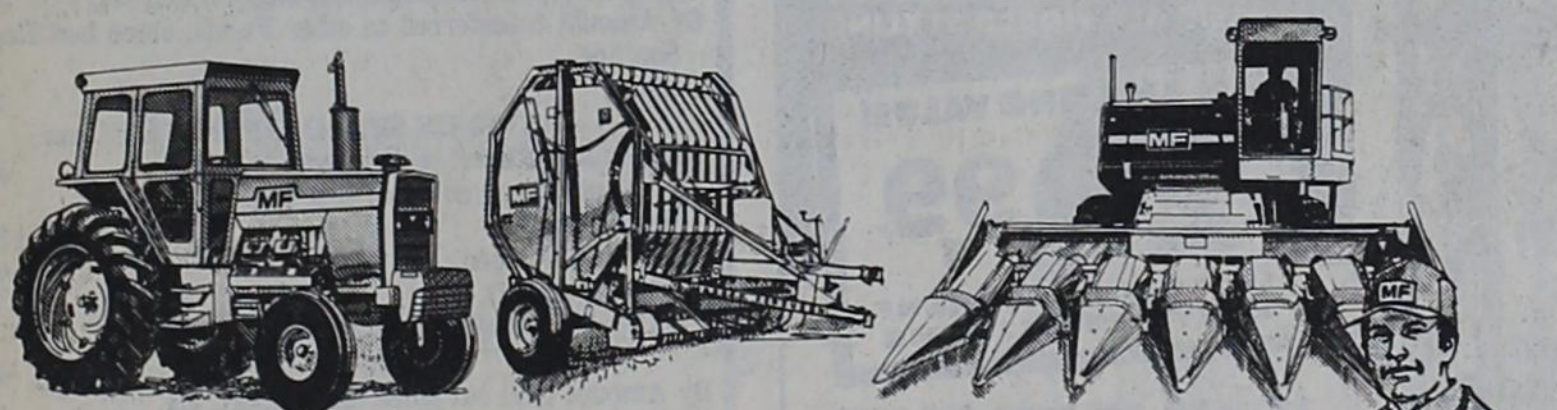

Combine all ingredients in a double boiler. Heat until cheese is melted. Serve warm with chips.

HOT MULLED CIDER

½ c. brown sugar
1 t. whole allspice
1 t. whole cloves
¼ t. salt
dash ground nutmeg
3 inches stick cinnamon
2 qts. apple cider
orange wedges

Combine sugar, allspice, cloves, salt, nutmeg, cinnamon and cider in a large saucepan. Slowly bring to a boil; cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Remove spices. Serve in warmed mugs with a clove-studded orange wedge in each. Serves 8.

STRAWBERRIES AND CREAM CREPES

3 c. fresh strawberries
½ c. granulated sugar
1 c. cottage cheese
1 c. dairy sour cream
½ c. powdered sugar
10 to 12 cooked crepes

Slice strawberries; add granulated sugar and set aside. In blender, whip cottage cheese until smooth. Stir in sour cream and powdered sugar. Fill crepes with about two tablespoons of creamy mixture and berries; fold over. Top with remaining strawberries and cream. Serves 10.

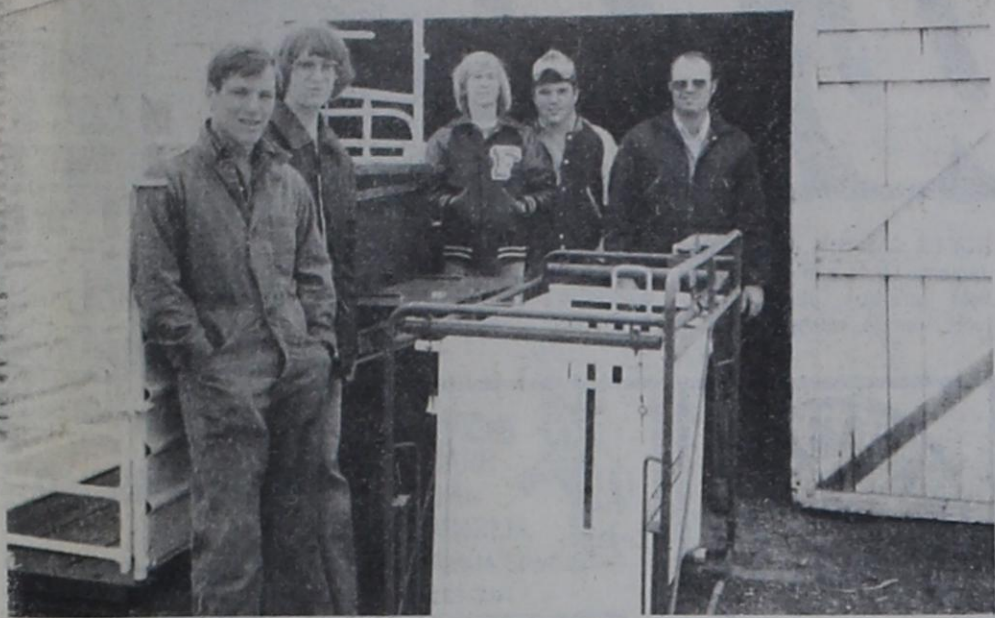

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. BEREAN BIBLE SOCIETY CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60635

DO YOU UNDERSTAND?

When Philip the Evangelist heard the Ethiopian prince reading Isaiah 53, he asked him: "Understandest thou what thou readest?" (Acts 8:30). This is a question we should continually keep asking ourselves as we read the holy Scriptures.

Many religious people do not much care whether or not they understand what they read if only it warms their hearts! To them the Bible is little more than a fetish. Taking only those Scriptures which appeal to them and leaving the rest, they actually feel themselves quite spiritual and often talk about believing the Bible whether or not they understand it.

But such "spirituality" is far from honoring to God, and such "faith" is blind and superstitious at best. While it is true that the Bible teaches many truths which we believe though they are beyond our comprehension, yet to believe what it says we must first understand what it says. God would have us read His Word and believe it intelligently. Indeed, true faith will want to understand more and more of God's Word. One who does not care whether or not he understands what God has said is not really interested in knowing what God has said. Such a person will take any passage that suits his fancy and use it as he wishes, for his "faith" is based, not on an understanding of what God has said, but on his own will.

The Church would be stronger and more aggressive if more of God's people had a deep desire to know and understand what God has said to them, and if those in the pulpit had the single passion to understand God's Word and help others to understand it.

In Mark 6:34 we read that our Lord was "moved with compassion" toward the multitudes because He saw them "as sheep not having a shepherd." AND HE BEGAN TO TEACH THEM MANY THINGS.

The reason so many people can do no more than hope for salvation, is because they have never even been taught God's simple plan of salvation, how "Christ died for sinners" so that they might be justified "by grace, through faith." We must begin our study of the Bible by understanding and believing this great truth.

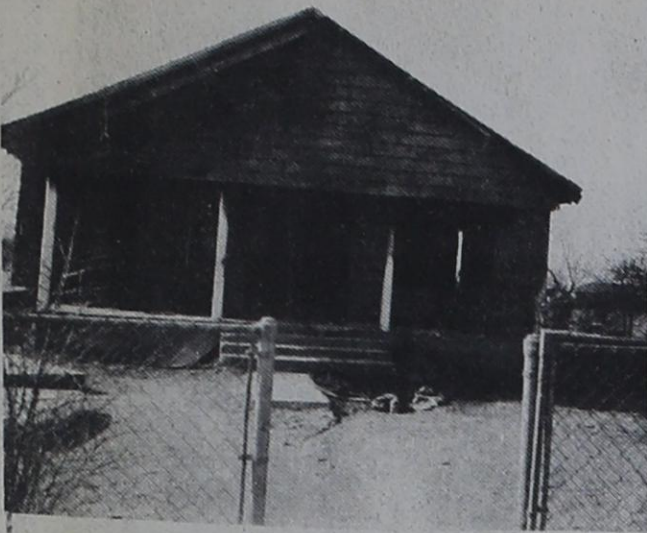

Hospital Notes

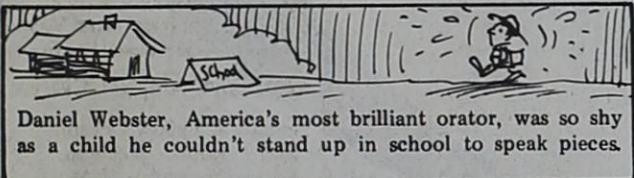
Fred Curtis of Farwell underwent surgery at the hospital in Muleshoe Saturday. He is reported to be "doing fine" and is to be released this week.

Area Farmers Block Train



About 40 area farmers and their tractors Wednesday morning successfully blockaded a segment of the Santa Fe railroad two miles east of Bovina, halting the progress of a train for about 45 minutes.

The demonstration was peaceful, but no law enforcement officers were on the scene. However, the farmers refused to leave until railroad representatives from Clovis arrived on the scene. After negotiations were carried out the farmers departed.

Similar incidents have been staged throughout the area by the American Agriculture Movement farmers who are on strike, another part of Phase II of the strike which began December 14.

A spokesman for the railroad said they were "not unsympathetic to the farmers

but we are in the transportation business." He added that he failed to see "how stopping us can help the farmers."

The spokesman pointed out that it was illegal to stop a train according to the Interstate Commerce Act and other federal laws.

Parmer County Attorney Johnny Actkinson when contacted, said that the act of stopping any train or other vehicle is a Class B misdemeanor, subject to \$1,000 fine and six months in jail. He said the section of the law prohibits the obstructing of the highway or any other passage way.

According to Actkinson, it was possible that the farmers perpetrating these blockades could be arrested if they failed to respond to a "reasonable request or order to move aside."
