### Victory Clothing Drive Opens Monday

The second campaign for the collection of used garments, bedding and shoes to be sent to needy people all over the world, will begin on January 7th, Mrs. Mable Newberry, Parmer county chairman of the drive, announces.

In the drive, which concludes on January 31st, the American people are asked to donate 100,000,000 garments, the national director, Henry J. Kaiser, has reported. Contributions asked include coats, suits, trousers, skirts, dresses, shirts, knitwear, sweaters, underwear, pajamas and night gowns, shoes (also galoshes, overcoats and rubbers), bedding, piece goods, remnants, draperies.

The collection is sponsored by the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Association, and through UNRRA will be shipped quickly to the many countries where devastations of war have dislocated civilian supply and economy. Distribution will be world-wide—and all garments free and without discrimination of any kind.

It was stressed that not only adults need clothing—and shoes, badly—but also infants and children of school age. Local people are asked to check their closets and storage boxes, Mrs. W. H. Graham, Farwell chairman said today, and turn in their contributions to the Magness Implement Company in this city.

All types of washable garments should be washed, but need not be ironed, Mrs. Graham said, and added that all contributions should be clean and sanitary. Shoes should be mated and "sensible" types, and the chairmen have been advised that straw hats, toys, feather beds and pillows, mattresses, novelties and household furnishings are not desired.

In the collection, no sorting of garments will be required locally. Garments will be packed in proper form and shipped, collect, to warehouses designated for each area. It is further emphasized that collection of used clothing is not on a competitive basis, but all people, for the assistance of others less fortunate, are asked to take their donations to the nearest collection point.

Many Americans last year enclosed letters with their contributions, and the practice is encouraged for all donors in the current drive. Mrs. Graham asked that all Texico-Farwell people make it a New Year's resolution to go through their closets now, and turn in collected garments immediately.

## Capt. Gabe Anderson Awarded Silver Star

FORT SILL, Okla.—Captain Gabe D. Anderson Jr., of Farwell, has been presented the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in combat with the 27th Armored Field Artillery battalion, 1st Armored Division, by Major General Louis E. Hibbs, commandant of the Field Artillery School, Fort Sill, at a ceremony before members of his staff. Captain Anderson now is a student in Officers' Refresher Course No. 11 at the Field Artillery School.

"For meritorious service in combat from 9 February 1945 to 8 May 1945 in Italy," reads the citation from headquarters of the 1st Armored Division, commanded by Brigadier General Maurice W. Daniel. "During the period, Captain Anderson continually displayed outstanding ability and dynamic leadership in the handling of his battery. These meritorious qualities demonstrated by Captain Anderson reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces and worthy of high praise."

Captain Anderson served overseas as executive officer of Battery B, 27th Armored Field Artillery battalion from May 1942 to September 1943, commander of Battery B from September 1943 to April 1945 and S-3 (operations) of the 27th Armored Field Artillery battalion from May 1945 to June 1945.

In addition to the Bronze Star, Captain Anderson wears the Silver Star for gallantry in action, and six battle stars for participation in major campaigns in North Africa, Tunisia and Italy, including the invasion at Salerno.

Captain Anderson, who received his commission as a second lieutenant of field artillery upon his graduation from Texas A. & M. College in June 1941, previously attended the Field Artillery school in 1941 when he was a student in the battery officers course.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gabe D. Anderson, Sr., reside at Farwell. Mrs. Anderson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John S. Williams, also are residents of Farwell. Captain and Mrs. Anderson are now residing at 1333 Ferris Street, Lawton, Okla.

### Paratrooper Arrives In Time For Christmas

Now discharged, Pfc. Jess Herbert Pipkin, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Pipkin, arrived in the States a short time ago and made it home for Christmas with the family, arriving here on December 23rd. He was discharged at Fort Sam Houston on December 22nd.

Pipkin was overseas with the 517 Parachute Infantry, serving in Italy, France and Germany, for a total of 19 months, he told a reporter the first of the week.

"We landed at Naples . . . then later moved on to Southern France, where I made an invasion jump, between Nice and Marseilles. We were in that area for some time, then when the Battle of the Bulge broke out they pulled us up there for duty," the young man related.

He made his return trip to the States on a Liberty ship, and reported that it was "pretty rough . . . we ran into a storm . . . wind up to about 90 miles an hour."

He made contact with only one boy from home while serving in Europe—Bobbie Anderson, also of a parachute outfit, who happened to be stationed near Pipkin in France.

Pipkin plans to enter school at Texas Tech at the opening of the coming semester.

### Champ Porter Buys Half Interest With Brother

Champ Porter, recently discharged from the Army, announced Tuesday that he had purchased half interest with his brother, John Porter, in the State Line Grocery and Market of this city, and would be actively associated with the business hereafter.

Porter, an experienced grocer and butcher, will be a valuable asset to the popular store. He said that no expansion program was planned for the immediate future.

### Ration-Free Tires Are Non-Existent Here

Tire-hungry motorists found little or no relief in immediate store for them on January 1st, locally, despite the fact that all tires were removed from the ration list at midnight, December 31st.

A check-up of local tire dealers revealed that all sizes of passenger car tires were non-existent, and there was little indication that stocks would be built up in the immediate future. One dealer said he had been promised a "small shipment next week", adding that he had no idea what the sizes would be nor how many.

It is generally felt that there will be an acute shortage of tires for at least 90 days, of the popular sizes of passenger tires, and it may be six months to a year before there will be plenty of tires for everybody.

Tractor tires seemed to be adequate with most local dealers displaying small stocks.

### Clift Reports Progress On School Program

H. A. Clift, superintendent of the Farwell schools, returned home the first of the week from his Christmas vacation, during which time he took time out to make two trips to Dallas with the view of speeding up the local school's application for surplus Army goods.

Clift said that he had been assured by officials in Dallas that the local school would get "practically everything we asked for" when the school's application was finally reached. He said that the Farwell application was No. 72, and that application No. 69 had been acted on when the vacation period arrived.

Clift and vocational director Robert Morton went to Hereford Monday afternoon, to inspect a tractor that can be allotted to the local school, among other materials and supplies.

"Primarily, we are interested in getting some equipment for the machine shop in the ag department," Clift said, "and then we want some more equipment for the cafeteria," he added.

Clift said he felt reasonably sure that the local school would get the goods requested.

### Davies Sale Booked For Monday, 8th

Ray Davies and his son, Pete, have scheduled a general farm clean-up sale at their farm, located ten miles north of Bovina on Monday, January 8th, starting at 10:30 A. M., Texas time.

The sale will be in charge of Haney V. Tate, Clovis auctioneer; and M. H. Martin, of Bovina, will serve as clerk. The ladies of Rhea will serve lunch at noon.

### Sale of E Bonds Here Is Far Below Quota

For the first time, Parmer County defaulted miserably in the sale of E Bonds in the Eighth War Loan, which came to an official close on Jan. 1st, it was announced here today by G. D. Anderson, chairman of the War Finance Committee.

At the same time, Anderson revealed, sales in the other issues exceeded the askings by substantial margins. The E. bond sales only attained 38.1% of the quota, he said, with the total sales amounting to \$32,162.50.

In addition to failing to meet its quota in the sale of E bonds, Parmer County turned in one of the poorest showings of any county in Texas.

The State Highway Department at Austin will receive bids up to 9 a. m., January 10, for the construction of approximately 20 miles of paving on Highway 86 in Parmer County.

The project calls for "grading and structures," on Highway 86 from 1½ miles east of Bovina to the Castro County line. Plans and specifications are available at the office of W. H. Garrett, district highway engineer, at Dimmitt.

This piece of highway construction is listed as "public works project" and marks the first highway work in this county to be undertaken in the new program, which is calculated to see much highway construction in Texas during the next several months.

The Parmer County Commissioners Court made the right-of-way available for the construction work only recently after the Highway Department advised the Court that it was ready to let the contract and proceed with the work at an early date.

### Cattle Movements Are Continuing Locally

Cattle Inspector Harry Whitley reports that cattle movements from the wheat fields in Parmer County are continuing in the face of unbroken drouth, which has contributed to rendering the wheat fields worthless for grazing.

He said that most of the cattle were being moved to other states, to be placed on full feed.

Meanwhile, Parmer County wheat growers are manifesting a growing uneasiness over the lack of moisture for their fields, contending that much of the wheat will be lost if moisture does not come soon. On the other hand, the more optimistic viewpoint is taken by some observers who contend that the seeded wheat will live until next spring without additional moisture.

The more hopeful observers point out that moisture now would surely be followed by freezes that would cause the topsoil to puff up, thus creating a serious hazard when the winds begin to blow. "Unless we could get a heavy, beating rain that would pack the soil, I'd prefer no moisture at all before April," is the way one wheat grower puts it.

### Bakery Expects To Start On Friday

"We hope to have our first baking on Friday, in order to be ready for Saturday's business," Perry Crawley said Tuesday when asked about the progress of the new business.

Crawley, recently discharged from the Army, said he had been delayed by late arrival of new equipment, adding that some of it still is not on hand. Most of the machinery has been placed in position and only a few adjustments remain to be worked out before the business can get in operation.

The bakery equipment is being moved here from Brownfield, Texas, and will operate in the Albert Thomas building across the street from the Red Cross Pharmacy in Texico.

## '45 Not So Bad In Final Months, Check Shows

The year of 1945 came to a close on Monday night, and a brand-new 1946, clad in peace, came quietly in. Along with the rest of the nation, Texico-Farwell ranked as top news during the year the end of the war—first the surrender of Germany and then that of Japan—while the death of President Roosevelt shocked the community.

Until August, when Japan threw in the sponge, and even for a few weeks afterwards, this area struggled (for civilians) with gas rationing and shortages, including meat and soap, the worse nuisance shortages to housewives.

Ten servicemen, either from this county or with relatives here, gave their lives during 1945, a checkup of past issues of The Tribune shows: Sam Justice, a paratrooper, was killed during the battle of the Belgium Bulge, actually killed on Dec. 28, 1944, but not reported here until 1945; Paul Nittler, of Bovina, was buried in France; Theo C. Ruckman, of north of Texico, died following battle injuries in the ETO; Roy Lee Robinson was killed on Iwo Jima;

Oren Brown, formerly of Lariat, gave his life in the Philippine Islands; Walter A. Moeller, of Muleshoe, was reported as missing and must be presumed dead; Homer Carrell Johnson, former local resident, was killed in the South Pacific; John Beale died in a Japanese prison camp; J. L. Herron met his death in the European theatre; and Millard A. Bell, reported missing in 1944, was officially reported dead by the war department.

In addition, Parmer marked up four tragic home-front deaths. J. D. Thomas died of injuries sustained when he walked into the path of a moving car on the streets of Farwell; Frank Eason drove in front of a train on the crossing at Lariat; E. M. Deaton's light airplane plunged to the ground, taking him to his death; a tractor seat collapsed beneath Otto Treider and he was killed by the machine; and Champ Landrum took his own life with a gun. Another tragedy was reported in the death of young A. L. Hood, Jr., sailor, who was killed in a car accident in the States.

But it was not all gloomy during 1945, for many of the community's servicemen came in home, either with discharges in hand or with release pending, while glorious news of the liberation of Tom Caldwell, Bill Roberts, George W. Harper, all German prisoners, Edgar and James Beck, Tom Adkins, Melvin Treider, Japanese prisoners since early in the war, was received—all of them coming in home in a few weeks.

The county pitched in with the nation in raising Red Cross quotas (Parmer having the distinction of being the first in the area to top both its Red Cross and War Fund assignments during the year). Bond sales went good until the final drive, which lagged in the sale of the E series. Local closets were ransacked during last year for pounds of clothing to be sent to liberated Europe and the islands.

The 4-H clubbers did all right by themselves during the year just closed. Merrell Rundell took first in the district in a pig lot improvement contest, then placed third in the state. Murrell Foster took the prize

for showmanship in the dairy show at Plainview, while at the same place Wendol Christian was awarded the cup for top production. Alvin Kriegl had the top-ranking gilt, and Junior Matthews did the best work in pig production, it was judged at the Sears 4-H pig show, while many of the boys, as well as other owners, exhibited stock at county shows during the year, and C. W. Grissom won the Santa Fe trip to Chicago, attending the national 4-H convention.

Fire struck in the area, too, with the Lariat store, the W. W. Bigham home in Farwell, and a large elevator owned by J. G. McFarland, near Friona, being the victims. A small home on the Lee Sudderth farm also went up in smoke, result of lightning.

Marking the changing parade, the Jack Dunn ranch was sold to N. L. Tharpe, while the Green Manufacturing Co., operated for many years in Texico by members of the Green family, was sold to Sheets and Buck, who came here from California. (Continued on Last Page)

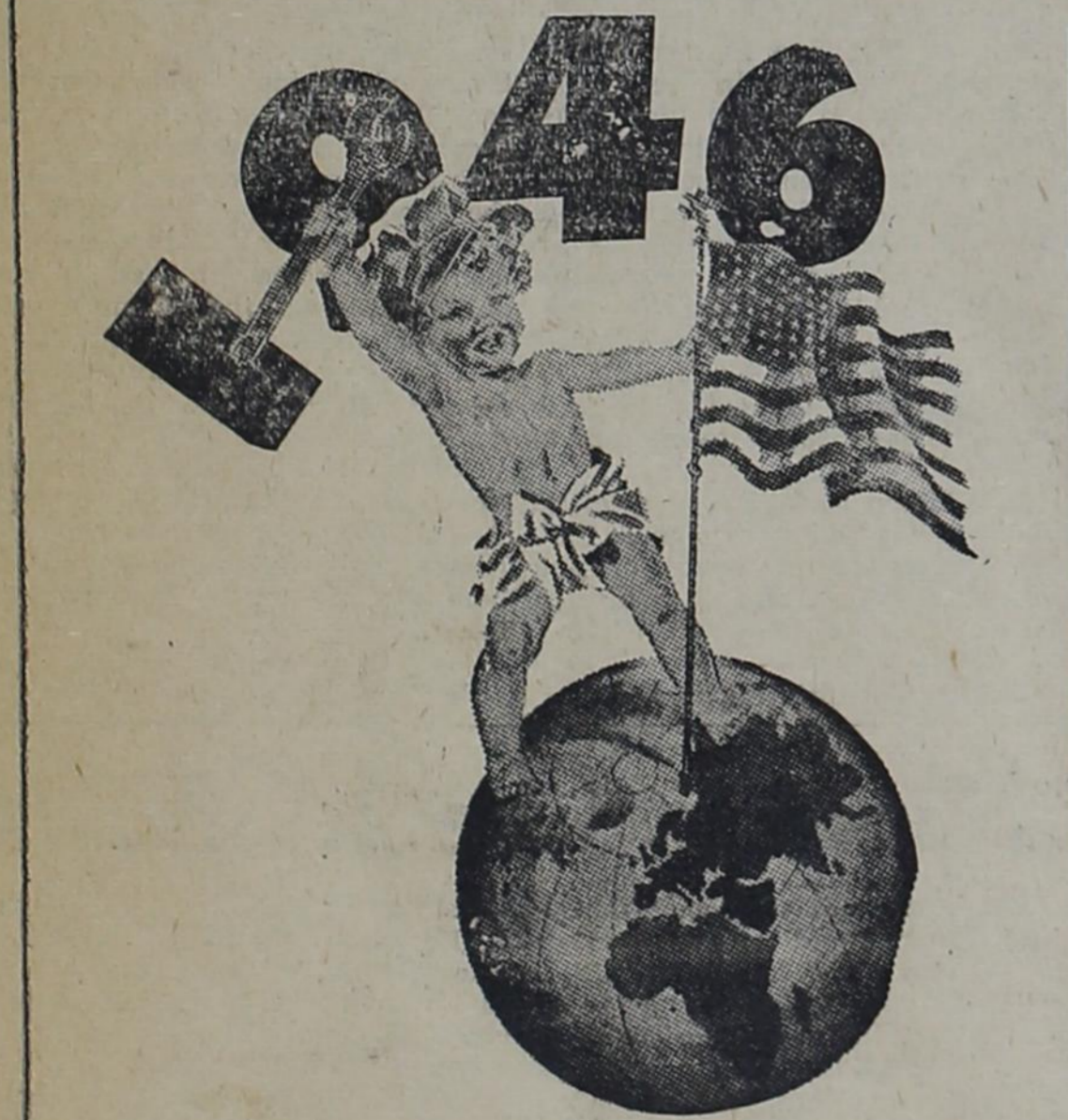

### Calls Attention To License Payments

nia. C. M. Henderson purchased the Farwell Bonded Warehouse, and announced plans for construction of a large terminal elevator in Farwell. D. K. Roberts and Lee Kline put in a new tire store, with Kline later selling out to Walter Hardage. The Harrison Hardware stock in Texico was disposed to various buyers, and the Harrisons moved to Quanah.

For the first time in three years, honest-to-gosh license plates were sold for cars and trucks (only one to a vehicle, though!) but the sugar situation went the other way, with sweetening of all types short. Local Scouts and Cubs went about the serious business of gathering up waste paper, and made a nice showing, and Parmer county had more poll taxes paid than usual in off-election years.

Supt. B. A. Rogers was reelected at Texico, as was Supt. J. T. Carter at Farwell, but Carter tendered his resignation and moved to Lubbock, with Supt. H. A. Clift taking over here. E. M. Mills, head of the local Triple A office for several years, took his departure and was in turn succeeded by John R. Martin, while Lee Thompson resigned the county judgeship and County Attorney A. D. Smith was appointed to that job, with Sam Aldridge moving in as county attorney.

Bank deposits climbed, to new highs locally, despite dry weather which put a crimp in the farmer's pocketbooks. An office was opened in Farwell for the utilities, with Otis Huggins in charge, and Bob Barton recently left the local gas office, being succeeded by Bill Banks, returned veteran. J. C. Wilkinson, for years deputy sheriff in Parmer County, also tendered his resignation and Rev. W. C. Wright left the

Texico-Farwell Baptist pastorate, with Rev. Virgil Hunton being called.

A prairie fire of no small proportions brought out the whole town in late fall, when the sweeping flames threatened homes in south Farwell. Men armed with sacks, hoes, shovels, and various home-made fire-fighting equipment joined the fire boys to stop the spread of the blaze. Caustic remarks by the local Men's Club brought about some improvement on the State Line road, while Commissioner T. E. Levy of Parmer county had workmen busy on the Farwell streets.

The Texico FFA club took an exhibit to the state fair at New Mexico, and brought home third place for their showing. Deer hunters polished up their guns and took off to the mountains in December, coming back with more aches than deer, and the Christmas lights went up again downtown, for the first time since war was declared.

A move was launched by Friona citizens to construct a Parmer County Community Hospital; extensions were planned by the local waterworks into east Farwell; a new bakery is in sight for Texico; Highway 86, out of Bovina toward Dimmitt, is slated to be paved; the Farwell school was approved to secure surplus army goods; W. H. Graham tendered his resignation as chairman of the draft board, in office since the beginning of Selective Service; the community as a whole turned out for home-town entertainment; and the Church of Christ built a new parsonage in Farwell.

Miss Sybil Ham was crowned queen of the annual Halloween carnival, with Billy James Moore as king; while Miss Maxine Ford was the Farwell football sweetheart, and Miss Delphine Johnson was named Miss Texico at the stunt night program. Harriet Baker won second in New Mexico on 4-H club sewing, Mrs. E. P. DeLoach celebrated her 90th birthday, and Eugene Fletcher noted his 75th birthday. The Order of Eastern Star also had a birthday, its 10th, and its Edna Mae Caldwell represented Texico in the DAR contest in New Mexico, placing second.

Farwell had football again this year—of the six-man variety—and wound up a successful season with no losses. The Farwell basketball team went into play-off with Spring Lake for title of the western half of the district, but was defeated. Texico's track teams did quite well, taking first in the junior and second in the senior division in the county, with the seniors placing 4th in the district. M. Doolittle placed second in state in the low hurdles, and Roop was tied with several other men for first in vault.

The Texico girls walked off with Curry county volleyball honors, and tied for third place at the county cage meet, putting two players—the Flye sisters—on the county team. Peggy Flye also placed on the all-star team at a Friona invitation tourney, while Jim Bob Roop, for the boys, was rated on the all-tournament team at the county.

The Farwell and Friona boys split the honor for champions of Parmer in basketball, taking the same percentage wins in the county meet, held here; while Friona's girls walked off with the honors at Bovina, when the girls' teams met.

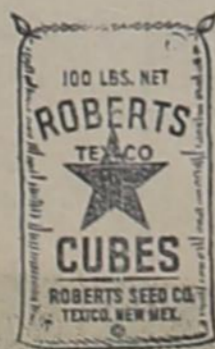
