This week brings to a conclusion another of the annual battles waged by our local school systems to impart some education to our collective children. If the sad story of one teacher I recently talked to is any indication, it is indeed a "battle."

In the past we have voiced the opinion that society "en masse" is going nuts and we would comment that the present rules and regulations governing the educational system is proof of our growing national dementia.

We as a nation have become so enamored with "civil rights," "personal freedoms" and "doing one's thing" that the future good of the individual and society is being trampled under a deluge of legal insanity.

What is ignored in today's culture is the basic fact that gaining an education is a restrictive and unpleasant process. It also comes at a time of life when we are least inclined toward personal restrictions and unpleasant tasks. Therefore, it would seem to us to indicate that a modicum of rules, regulations and personal deportment is necessary to insure that some degree of "book larnin'" is instilled in the young minds.

In spite of the restrictions placed upon educators and school systems the goal of equipping our youth for a productive future life could be attained if basic rules of conduct and personal responsibility were laid down and enforced by parents.

Parental guidance and control is a necessity before we can expect the school systems to fulfill the goals we have set for them. What is really necessary is for parents to love their children enough. What is enough? Possibly the following thought can tell us.

"YOU DON'T LOVE ME!" How many times have your kids laid that on you? And how many times have you as a parent resisted the urge to tell them how much?

Someday, when my children are old enough to understand the logic that motivates a parent, I'll tell them:

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to ask you about where you were going, with whom, and what time you would get home.

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to be silent and let you discover that your hand-picked friend was a creep.

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to make you return a candy bar with a bite out of it to a drugstore and confess, "I stole this."

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to stand over you for two hours while you cleaned your bedroom, a job that would have taken me 15 minutes.

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to ignore, "whatever other Moms did."

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to figure you would lie about the party being chaperoned but forgave you for it after discovering I was right.

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to let you stumble, fall and fail, so that you could learn to stand alone.

I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to accept you for what you are, not what I wanted you to be.

But most of all, I LOVED YOU ENOUGH to say "no" when you hated me for it. That was the hardest part of all.

The good old days of the 3-cent stamp, the 5-cent stamp, the 10-cent stamp and now even the 13-cent stamp are gone forever. The penny postcard is a memory only to the older members of the population. And if the present trend continues in rising postal rates, the soon-to-be 10-cent postcard will be but a memory to today's school children.

Price of mailing a first class letter increases from 13 to 15 cents this Monday at 12:01 a.m., reminds Farwell Postmaster Otis McMillan. Price of postcards will be raised from nine cents to a dime.

The new first class rates are 15 cents for the first ounce and 13 cents for each additional ounce, McMillan said.

Republicans Pass Twelve Resolutions

Ellen Estes of Bovina, Ron Awtry of Friona and Jimmy Briggs of Lazbuddie were elected as delegates from Parmer County to attend the state Republican Convention.

The county Republicans passed a resolution favoring the five-point proposal by the American Agriculture Movement, calling for 100 percent parity and more control by farmers over their commodities; opposition to the United Kingdom Treaty which ex-

empts foreign investors from paying taxes required of American citizens; and opposing the Human Rights Covenant which denies rights of private property holdings.

Other resolutions urged the repeal of the Supreme Court ruling requiring children be bussed away from neighborhood schools; called for the abolishment of Daylight Savings Time, and called for reforms in the welfare program to eliminate fraud and

abuse.

A resolution also that elected Republican officials uphold the party platform; and another resolution called for the nation's defense and military be kept sufficient to prevent enemy attack.

Another resolution called for an amendment to prohibit deficit spending except during national emergencies and limiting government services as a means of curbing inflation.

The tenth resolution called for the resignation of William F. Brock III from the Trilateral Commission and as chairman of the Republican Party.

They also asked that the Texas Legislature rescind its ratification of the ERA amendment, and urged those states which have not yet acted on ratification to reject the amendment.

The last resolution passed urged that all attempts to extend the deadline for ratification of the ERA be rejected.

Absentee Voting Underway

Absentee voting for the June 3 Democratic and Republican runoff elections began Wednesday and will conclude next Tuesday, May 30. Anyone wishing to cast an absentee vote may do so between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. CDT at the office of the county clerk.

One Democratic runoff is between John Poerner and Jerry Sadler for the post of railroad commissioner, unexpired term. Six of the eight Parmer County precincts will have only this one issue on the June 3 runoff ballot for the Democrats.

Bovina and Rhea voters will choose between incumbent Jack Patterson and Glendon Sudderth for the county commissioner's seat.

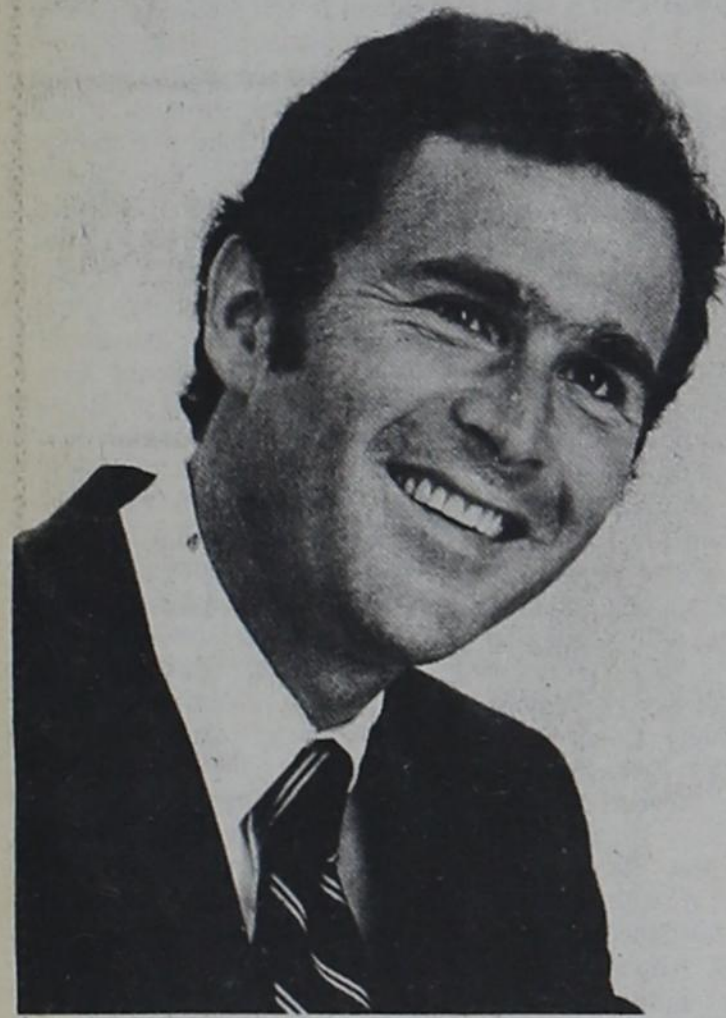
According to Hollis Horton, County Democratic Chairman, some voting boxes will be consolidated for the Democra-

tic runoff. Black, Lakeview and Friona precincts will all vote in Friona. The Oklahoma Lane Precinct will vote in Farwell. Other voting sites include the Rhea Parish Hall and the old American Legion Hall in Bovina.

Hollis explained that the changes were made "to save on election expenses" and because in the majority of the precincts — where only the state race will be considered — voting is expected to be light.

In the Republican runoff, incumbent Frank Hinkson and J.W. Gammon oppose each other for Republican County Chairman. Also on the runoff ballot are Jim Reese and George Bush, Jr., candidates for the GOP nomination for U.S. Congress. The winners will oppose Democrat Kent Hance in the November general election.

Texico City Hears Parking Report

Texico City Council met Tuesday night to consider numerous items. Maurine Caywood of the Senior Citizens organization met with the trustees to discuss changes in the group's budget.

City Marshal Mickey Fenn reported on his meeting with New Mexico Attorney General Toney Anaya concerning traffic signs in Texico. Originally, the city wanted to change the stop signs to yield signs, but the request was turned down because 300 feet of clear vision has to be available for each corner in which a yield sign is placed. Also, according to regulations "no parking" signs are to be placed on Eunice Street which is adjacent to the Texico High School. Parking will continue to be allowed on Griffin Street which runs parallel to all Texico schools because the area is roped off

during regular school hours. Crosswalks are also to be painted for all church, park and school zones.

Fenn's vacation from May 23 to June 7 was also approved. During Fenn's absence the New Mexico State Police will patrol the city.

In other business, it was reported that the city will employ four local youths through the CETA program; repairs on the city's big water well will be handled by a Lubbock firm; and the Council approved liability insurance for the swimming pool.

They also voted to once again resume the regular meeting times of the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month. For the past few months the Council has been meeting every Tuesday night in an effort to clear up a backlog of business.

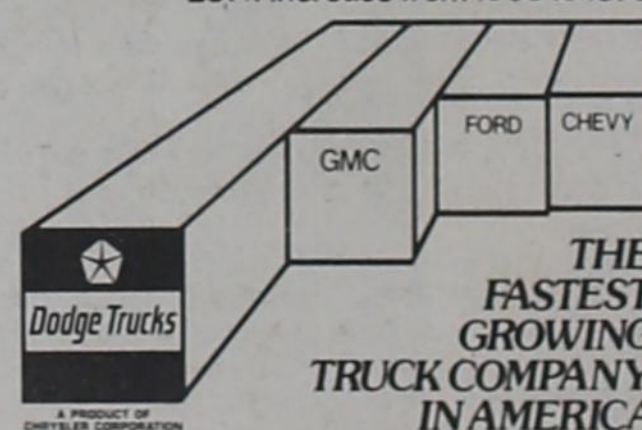
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Academic Awards Given At Texico High School

THERE IS GOOD TO SEE, to appreciate, and to be the controlling influence in our lives.

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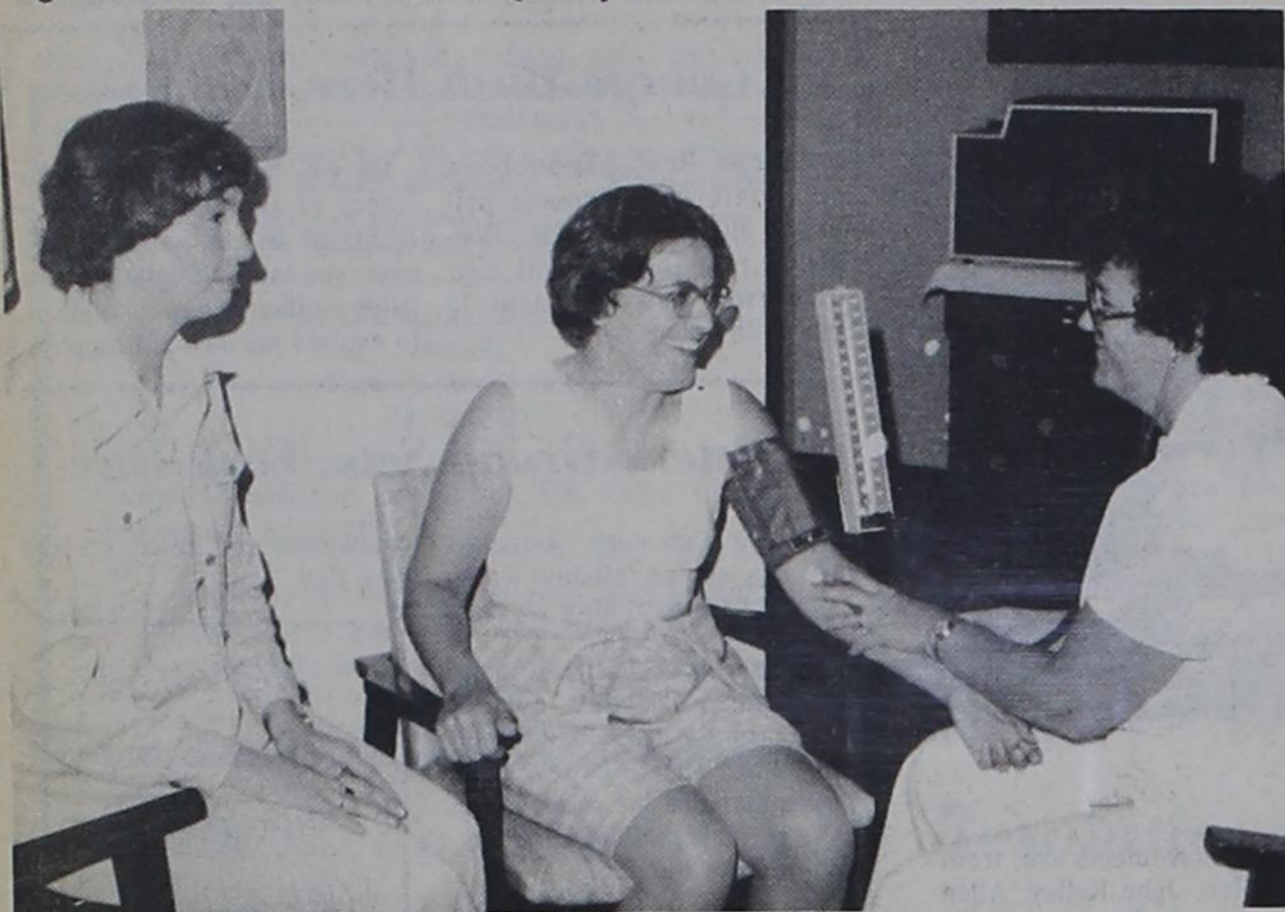

Tommy plans to enter Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth next fall to begin work on the master of theology degree.

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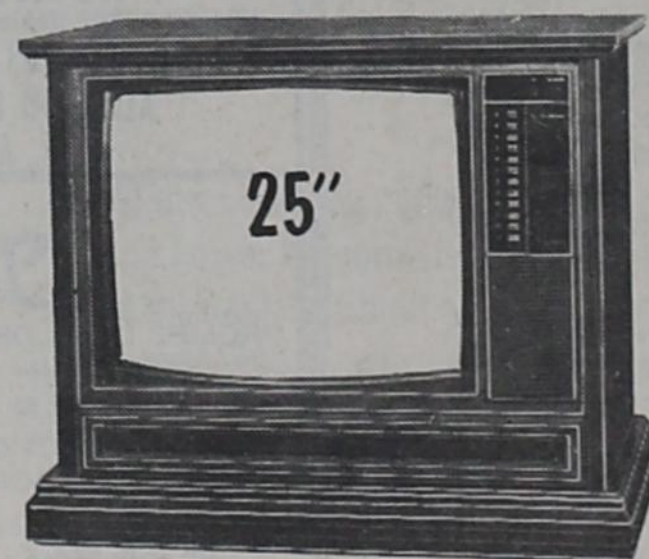
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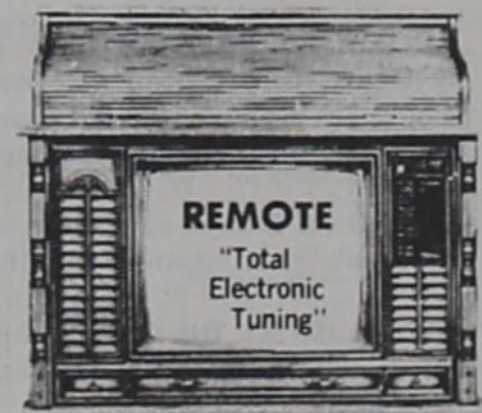
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Carolyn Meeks Wed To Dean S. Hardage

Did you know that peaches were once called "Persian apples" or that peach pits were among the first seeds ordered for planting by the Governor of the Massachusetts Bay colony in 1629?

United States. California, South Carolina, Georgia, and New Jersey lead the nation in commercial peach production says the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The peach has been a favorite since the early days of man. Originally from China, the peach was introduced to the Greeks and Romans by the Persians. For this reason peaches were at one time called "Persian apples."

Fresh peaches from Texas, Georgia, California, and Louisiana will be ready for table use or in lunch boxes in late May, according to market news offices of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

The popularity of the peach spread throughout Europe. In fact, so popular was the peach that the early colonists established it as a crop by the mid 1600's. The popular peach continued to go west with the pioneers. By the middle 1800's peach trees were established throughout the country.

Peaches are a highly nutritious fruit. Each peach contains calcium, phosphorus, and iron as well as high concentrations of Vitamin A. Peaches are about 87 percent water and contain fewer calories than either apples or pears.

Today peaches are grown commercially throughout the

USDA reports that two types of peaches are grown in the U.S.: freestones and clingstones. The freestone variety has flesh which separates from the pit very easily. Flesh of the clingstone, clings to the pit.

R. Hadley Graduates

When buying peaches, the USDA suggests that you look for those which are fairly firm or just beginning to soften. Avoid peaches which are extremely hard and exhibit a greenish color. These peaches were picked prematurely and will not ripen normally. Do not buy peaches which have large flattened bruises. These bruised areas will decay readily causing the peach to spoil.

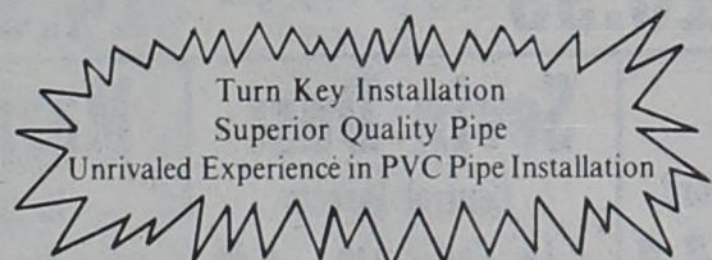

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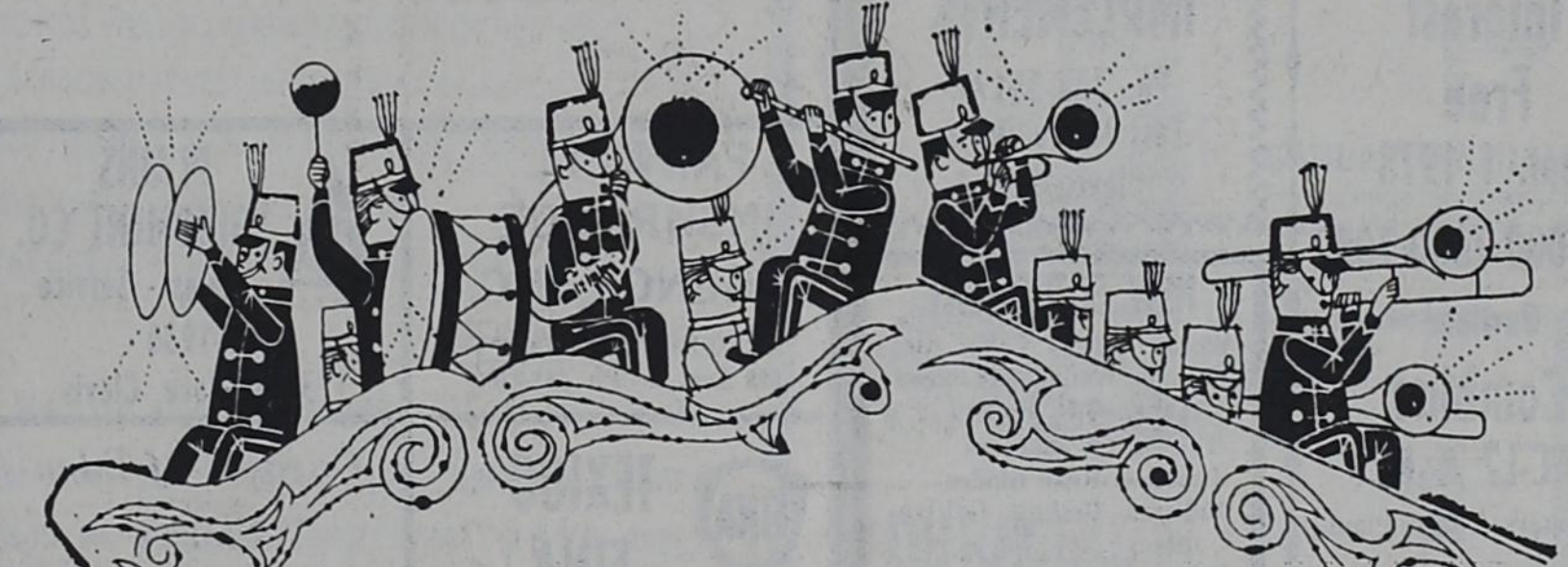
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Aboard Son's Ship - -

The ship is to transport men and heavy materials. It also is capable of landing on the beach if necessary.

It is powered by six diesel engines, and a special 900-horsepower electric engine is used for maneuvering the front end as the ship is either coming in or going off the beach, he said.

Programs were conducted daily for the visitors and, in addition, they were allowed to visit any part of the ship.

"The men liked for us to ask questions about their ship assignments," Anderson said. He was most impressed by the "sniper scope" which is similar to a telescope. Anderson explained that "it is larger than the ones used on rifles, but it acts like infrared enabling them to see at night."

According to Anderson, the Navy has been allowing some family members to take these cruises for the past four years.

Ensign Anderson will leave for Alaska in July. He has been home on leave for the past few days.

During World War II, the senior Anderson served in the army.

Mrs. Anderson joined her husband and son in San Diego after the USS Barbour County docked.

R.W. Anderson of Farwell recently enjoyed a "thrill of a lifetime" when he joined his son, Navy Ensign Will Anderson, aboard the USS Barbour County for a week-long cruise from Pearl Harbor to San Diego.

The special cruise -- for the fathers, brothers and children of the Navy crew -- began April 17 and ended on the 26th. The visitors who traveled on seven different ships were called the "Tiger Crew."

The seven ships including the USS Barbour County had been involved with an eight-month cruise which included Japan, Korea, Singapore, Thailand and Hawaii. 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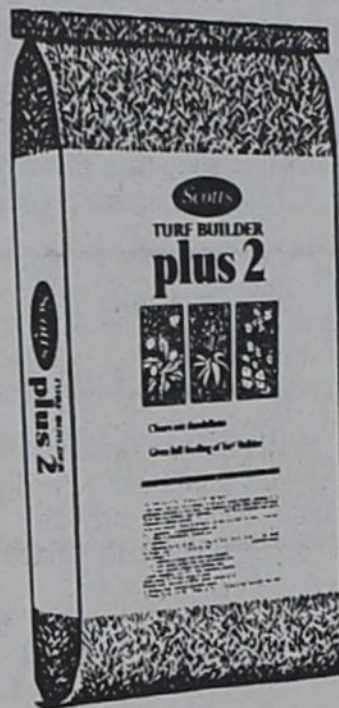
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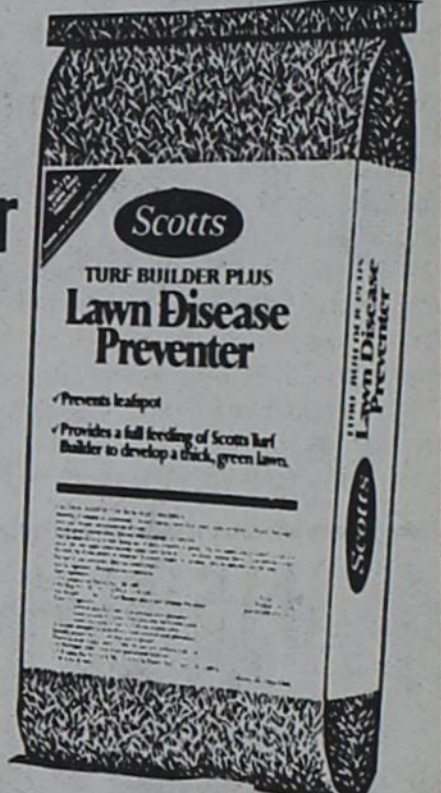
