> Among the resolutions passed were one supporting the state's right to work law and one for calling for stricter guidelines for the Texas Education Agency which was criticized for types of programs and requirements it puts on local school districts.

Another resolution objected to establishment of government-regulated child care centers for pre-school age children, which are supposed to make it easier for mothers to work, but could turn the children into a military-type program at an early age.

Two resolutions objected to extension of the time limit for states to approve the Equal Rights Amendment and the use of tax funds for promotion of the International Woman's

A resolution was also passed objecting to the use of tax dollars for abortions.

Two resolutions sponsored by the American Agriculture Movement were also passed. One objected to foreign investors in the state, calling for such foreign investors to be subject to the same tax structure as American citizens. It also called for foreign investors to be given a time limit to sell their property, or see the property liquidated and confiscated.

AAM also sponsored the resolution called for support of the AAM's five-point program, which calls for 100 percent of parity, creation of an entity composed of agricultural producers to devise and approve policies that affect agriculture.

Another resolution passed opposed the registration of firearms, calling for support of the right to bear arms. It denied the use of tax dollars to enforce the registration of


THE ONLY BAD we can afford to give much attention is that which has the possibility of improvement. The other must be ignored.



foliage of many trees, especially the evergreen varieties. Small bagworms hatch in late spring or early summer from old bags left on the tree during the winter. Young worms spin silken sacs and attach small bits of leaves or twigs to the outside. The bagworm carries this sac wherever it goes.

Later in the year, full grown larva attach to the tree and pupate within the bag. After some time male bagworm moths emerge and mate with females which remain inside the bag. The female then lays eggs inside the bag to start the cycle over again.

Application of insecticides should be made when small worms are first observed. Chemical controls are : ot effective on the older and larger bagworms. 
