




Pacific Mail Gets Top Air Priority

Lt. Colonel Robert L. Hardy, commanding officer of West Texas US Army Recruiting District, has just been informed that Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson, in an effort to improve and speed up mail deliveries to soldiers in the Pacific, announced that all air mail to and from troops in Japan, the Philippines, Okinawa and other Pacific areas has been given a No. 1 priority and is being transmitted daily by air. This means mail will have priority over both personnel and cargo.

Because of rapid demobilization during recent month, plane service to the Pacific has been curtailed. This is due partially to the loss of maintenance personnel. As a consequence of the curtailed service, it has been necessary to send a large volume of personal air mail letters, to and from military personnel, by surface during February, and over 3,000,000 of such letters are now enroute by surface vessels.

With the establishment of the new priority for mail, all air mail letters for troops in the Pacific, except. those already enroute by ship, are: being flown to their destination without delay.


