Sleeping Car Service Lubbock To Dallas

AMARILLO—The re-establishment of daily sleeping car service between Lubbock and Dallas, effective from both terminal February 15, was announced today by H. C. Vincent, traffic manager of the Santa Fe Railway.
Relaxation of an ODT order that prohibited use of sleeping service for short distances during war-time

permits the Railway the opportunity of again providing a service which is much in demand.
The service will include a twelve section standard sleeper with one drawing room, leaving Lubbock daily on Train No. 95 at 9:45 p. m. for Sweetwater, thence over the T&P to Ft. Worth, arriving there at 7:25 A. M. and Dallas at 9:00 A. M. The westbound sleeper will leave Dallas daily over the T&P at 9:45 A. M. and will leave Ft. Worth at 11:20 P. M., reaching Lubbock on Santa Fe Train No. 94 at 9:20 each morning.

Housing Worked Out For Vets At Tech

LUBBOCK—Every veteran who applied for assistance in finding a place to live so he might attend Texas Technological College has been cared for and all are enrolled in classes, W. T. Gaston, business manager of Tech, has announced.
Housing was provided through various means, including placing three, instead of two, men in each room of the men's dormitory, opening a wing of another dormitory to married men and their wives, securing use of barracks and other facilities of closed Lubbock AAF for married veterans, and opening of rooms in private homes by citizens of Lubbock. Government organizations assisted by renting and lending beds, mattress and other materials to Texas Tech and cooperating organizations.
President and Mrs. Whyburn of Tech did their individual bit by turning over two rooms in a wing of the presidents home on the campus to two veterans.
The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, various veterans organizations and civic groups aided in working out plans for housing the more than 1,000 veterans who applied for admission to Tech for the semester started on February 1.

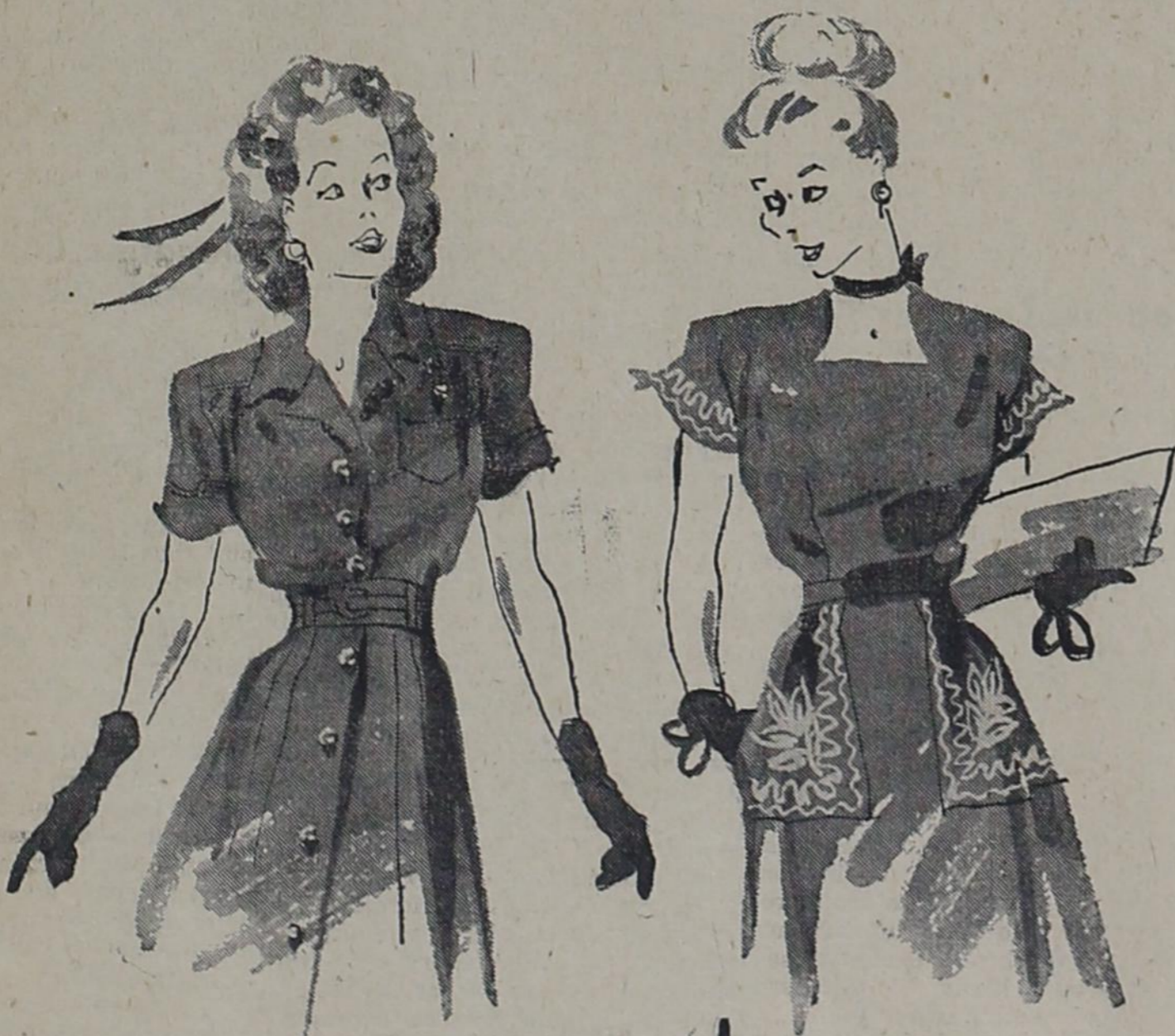

Ride 1,200 Miles on Horses

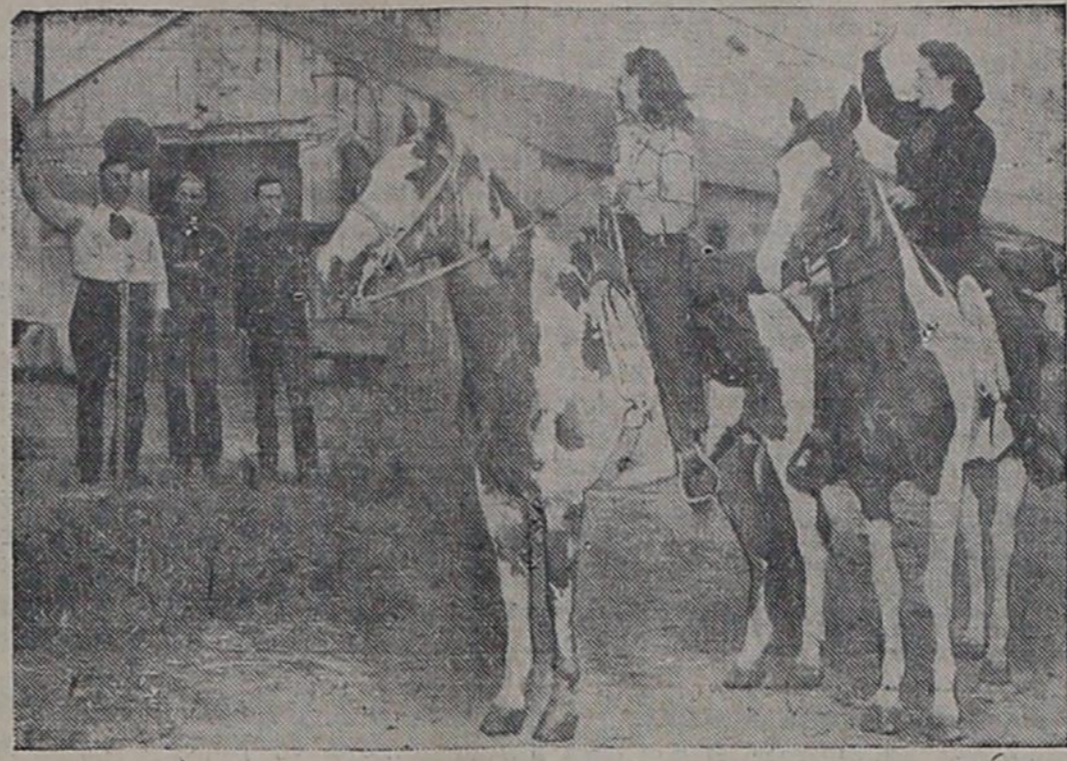

Farm Homes Planned For The Southwest

AUSTIN—Believing that farm homes in Texas and the Southwest should be designed with special attention to Texas climate and the demands of the family, Walter T. Rolfe, chairman of the department of architecture at the University of Texas, has sketched his plans for such a home in the February issue of Country Gentleman.

The kitchen and utility room, which provides for laundry, sewing, canning, home freezing and food preparation—are located so as to permit the housewife a full view of the out-of-doors, as well as well-lighted, cheerful work rooms.

Living room and bedrooms open out on a garden, which is well-removed from the dust of the driveway. A large service porch can be used for a variety of purposes. A fireplace in the living room has a double function with a cupboard above it for storage.

The house has many windows—particularly necessary for the heat of Texas summers—and has a flexible heating plan for either oil or gas, and also a provision for attic fans.

A special attraction for the housewife are the washroom in the garage, and an arrangement to by-pass traffic to the barn and corrals by means of an outer drive.

Trees, Shrubs Should Be Transplanted Now

"If you plan to set out some new trees or shrubs on your place this year, don't wait much longer," County Agent Lee McElroy said today, adding, "Before you know it, the sap will be rising and buds will be swelling with a spell of mild weather, putting an end to movement of trees this year."

Several people, the agent said, have contacted him recently in regard to putting out new, or moving old, trees. The best advice, he said today, is old advice—see that the roots and top of a tree balance. In transplanting, some of the roots are destroyed, and it is necessary that the tops be cut down to compensate for this loss. Otherwise, the tree will be top-heavy, and when growth begins, will demand more food than the roots can supply.

He further warned that if trees and shrubs are ordered from a warmer climate, they must be set out in the near future. "In warmer areas, the sap will soon rise," McElroy said, "and if you try transplanting then, your trees and shrubs will more than likely die."

Ball and burlap the trees, to keep the roots from drying out while planting operations are in progress, he said. Make the hole deep enough that the trees will be about an inch deeper in the ground than they were in the nursery; be sure the hole is sufficiently large to hold roots without crowding, or curling them toward the surface. After the tree is set, pack moist soil firmly by tamping, and a good watering will help settle the earth and get trees off to a good start.

Enlistment Deadline For Regular Army Lifted

The War Department, in a move to encourage the return of experienced soldiers, has removed the January 31 deadline for reenlistment in grade of former rated Army men, it is announced by Lieut. Col. Robert L. Hardy, commanding officer of the West Texas Recruiting District.

Former servicemen can now reenlist in the Regular Army in the grade held at time of discharge, if they apply within three months of discharge and not later than June 30. After that date, men now in the Army will be permitted to reenlist in the grade they hold at discharge if they accomplish reenlistment within 20 days of discharge.

Time Extended

Col. Hardy explained that the new ruling extends by five months the former deadline which set Jan. 31 as the date by which re-enlistment in grade could be accomplished. The previous 20-day limit given rated men has been extended to three months effective immediately. The 20-day limit will apply from July 1 on for men now in service.

Promotions Granted

Enlisted men who have enlisted on or after June 1, 1945 and within three months of their discharge will be promoted to the grade held at time of discharge, it was further explained. All promotions made under these provisions and the grades in which former service men are enlisted become permanent, and warrants will be issued by commanding officers of posts, camps and stations of first assignment, Colonel Hardy declared. These warrants will show the soldier as ranking from the date on which he received the grade in which he was discharged.

Choice Given

The provisions of enlistment regulations which permit choice of length of enlistment, choice of arm or branch of service and overseas theater, remain unchanged. Men with overseas service or long periods of service can be enlisted to fill existing vacancies within continental United States, if they choose to re-enlist for a period of three years. Other periods of enlistment for which men 17 to 34 can enlist are 1½ years and two years. Men now in service can enlist for one year plus the length of the re-enlistment furlough granted all men with prior service.

Overseas Theaters Listed

The choice of assignment in Europe, China, Alaska, the Caribbean and the Pacific is given to men who enlist for the three-year period, and the Mediterranean theater has been opened for re-enlistments just recently. Also liberalized is the travel of dependents of servicemen at government expense to the overseas stations to which the soldiers are assigned. These are the Bahamas, the Caribbean, Brazil, Bermuda, Newfoundland, Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, and the Marianas in the Pacific. A recently announced policy of the War Department limits the overseas tour of duty to 2½ years maximum.

Supt. H. A. Clift was in Amarillo, Saturday, where he attended a meeting of Panhandle school heads. One of the most interesting discussions of the day, the local superintendent reported, was a forum conducted by Dr. A. M. Meyer, of West Texas State College, Canyon. Urges Producers To Market Beef Stock

Producers who have beef cattle ready for market are urged to dispose of them to slaughterers, George Armstrong, secretary's representative in operation of packing plants, has said, according to a telegram received here at the AAA office.

State headquarters dispatched a copy of the wire received from Armstrong to the local office, John Martin, supervisor, reported.

Armstrong reported that plants are ready for full scale operation and that the hog market is lively, but sale of beef cattle to slaughterers is lagging. In order to satisfy consumer demand and avert a flooded market, producers are urged to sell their cattle as rapidly as they become of marketable quality, Armstrong said.

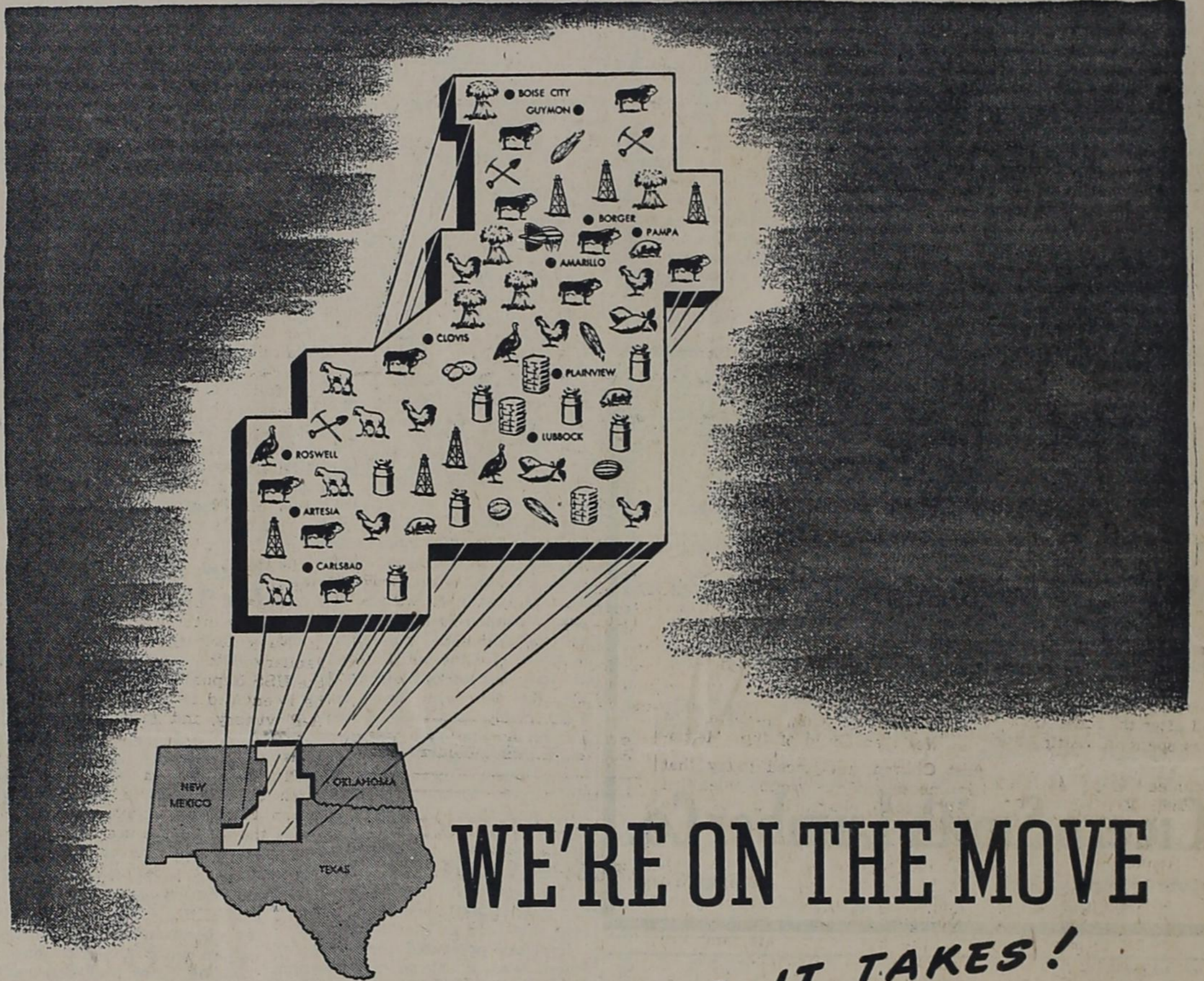
Co-op Shareholders To Meet In Amarillo
