It is also known that a large percent of the farming lands south of the Santa Fe tracks in this county, usually considered the row crop section, was planted to wheat last fall. This is equally true in the Laz-Oklahoma Lane-Mrs. E. W. Mc- buddy section, where a considerable acreage has always been put in feed crops. Most wheat growers agree that the wheat that was seeded early last fall will withstand the high winds to be expected during the spring months, but they are not so sure about late plantings, pointing out that the young growth has not rooted sufficiently to survive too much wind and sand during the spring. Too, it is observed, all wheat fields are in a most susceptible condition to fall prey to wind ravages. The top soil is described as "puffed up" from alternating freezing and thawing weather the past month. Charley Calaway, of the Rhea community, said this week that virtually all the cultivated land in his section was covered with wheat, and W. H. Alderson, of west of Friona, brings in the same report.

February 28th is the deadline for producers who wish to make application for dairy subsidy payments for the final quarter of 1945, John Martin, of the AAA office, said today.


Martin added that between now and that time, producers who wish to receive subsidy payments for the sale of dairy produce must submit receipts of sales made during October, November and December.


