

In some places along the highway great quantities of wasted water are ed spot through which water has dumped in the barrow ditches. What do these people think of a country that wastes such a precious natural resource?

> For the past several weeks we have been talking about grassand pastures. To obtain the most from these pastures we need to use them properly. One method of doing this is to plant supplemental pasture such as sudan grass in summer to take the load off of the pasture.

> When pastures are used very heavily in the hot summer they tend to thin out in stand, lose vigor, and to continue this method of use will eventually kill all the good grasses out.



11-YEAR CYCLES?—This reproduction of a large chart prepared by Hardy Benson of Hereford was the basis of a program at the Friona Lions Club recently. The Deaf Smith County farmer uses this as evidence to support his contention that rainfall on the High Plains comes in 11-year cycles. Most of the writing is too dim to make out in this reduction, but the rise and fall of rainfall totals from year to year is plainly evident. The three wettest years shown were in 1905 with 32.31 inches; 1923, 39.35 inches; and 1941, 37.21 inches. The lines under the graph show 11-year periods of alternating dry and wet cycles. According to his theory, we are right in the middle of an 11-year dry cycle.
