

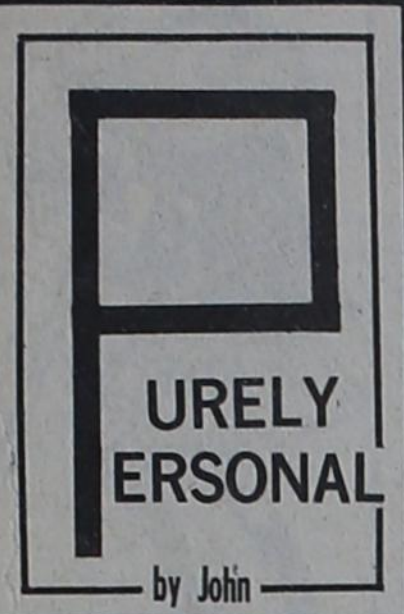

How much money \$32,546.50 turns out to be is a very relative matter. To the federal government it is the blink of an eye. To the city of Farwell it is a substantial sum. In spite of the difference in budget size between the USA and the city of Farwell, we don't think either one should spend this sum for a new Farwell city park.

In our opinion, Farwell has two adequate playground areas for the small fry. One is the north side of the grade school block and the other is the park south of the courthouse. Both sites contain to some degree playground equipment for youngsters in line with the potential use of such equipment in Farwell. Both of these locations would be only from one to one and a half blocks from the projected park area. To establish a park under the guise of serving the kiddoes is redundant at best.

The other feature to the projected park is the projected tennis court system. We are not particularly griping about spending all that money for tennis courts, but do question the city's priorities in spending the money.

According to our information on the proposed park, it will cost \$65,093. The feds will fund half of this and the locals will come up with the other half. We further understand that approximately \$16,250 will have to be ponied up by the city by about Sept. 1 of this year. This appears to place quite a strain on the city money-raising facilities, especially since the City Dads can't find a few thousand clams to equip the new disaster vehicle.

Priorities in spending limited city funds seems to be the issue here. The city is dragging its feet over establishing a local law enforcement system. This is the item that ranked number one on the citizens' list of needs for the town, and is the one that should be arranged for as soon as possible.

We have a serious rat problem that also cries for attention. In the summer the weeds on main street are a public disgrace. The city was presented the opportunity to negotiate for the cemetery north of town. This was passed up for several reasons but money was mentioned.

In planning to spend \$32,546, it looks like, from this corner, that a new park area would rank pretty low on the municipal totem pole. If this project goes through as planned, then it would seem logical that these other city problems could also be handled within the present city tax take.

We noticed where Wes Izzard recently commented on odd names for towns or villages or just plain old wide spaces in the road. He mentioned "Why, Arizona," the other day in his column.

Let's add "Dime Box, Texas," to your list Wes. This strikes us as an intriguing name and one that should have an interesting history behind it.

Any loose change from Dime Box can communicate with Wes. We suspect that he would appreciate hearing.

A.W. Gober Re-Elected To Conservation Board

Unofficial results of the 1975 election of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, held Tuesday, Jan. 14, have been announced by the District's Lubbock office. Incumbent A. W. (Webb) Gober of Farwell, Secretary-Treasurer of the five-member Board of Directors, was elected to a second two-year term.

Gober, representing Director's Precinct 3, which includes Bailey, Castro and Parmer

counties, defeated challenger Bob Anthony of Dimmitt.

Residents of Parmer County winning an unofficial four-year term on the District's County Committee are Floyd Reeve, Friona, and Ralph Roming, Bovina.

Also re-elected to the Board was Billy Wayne Sisson of Hereford. He begins his third term as Director representing Precinct 4 (Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall counties).

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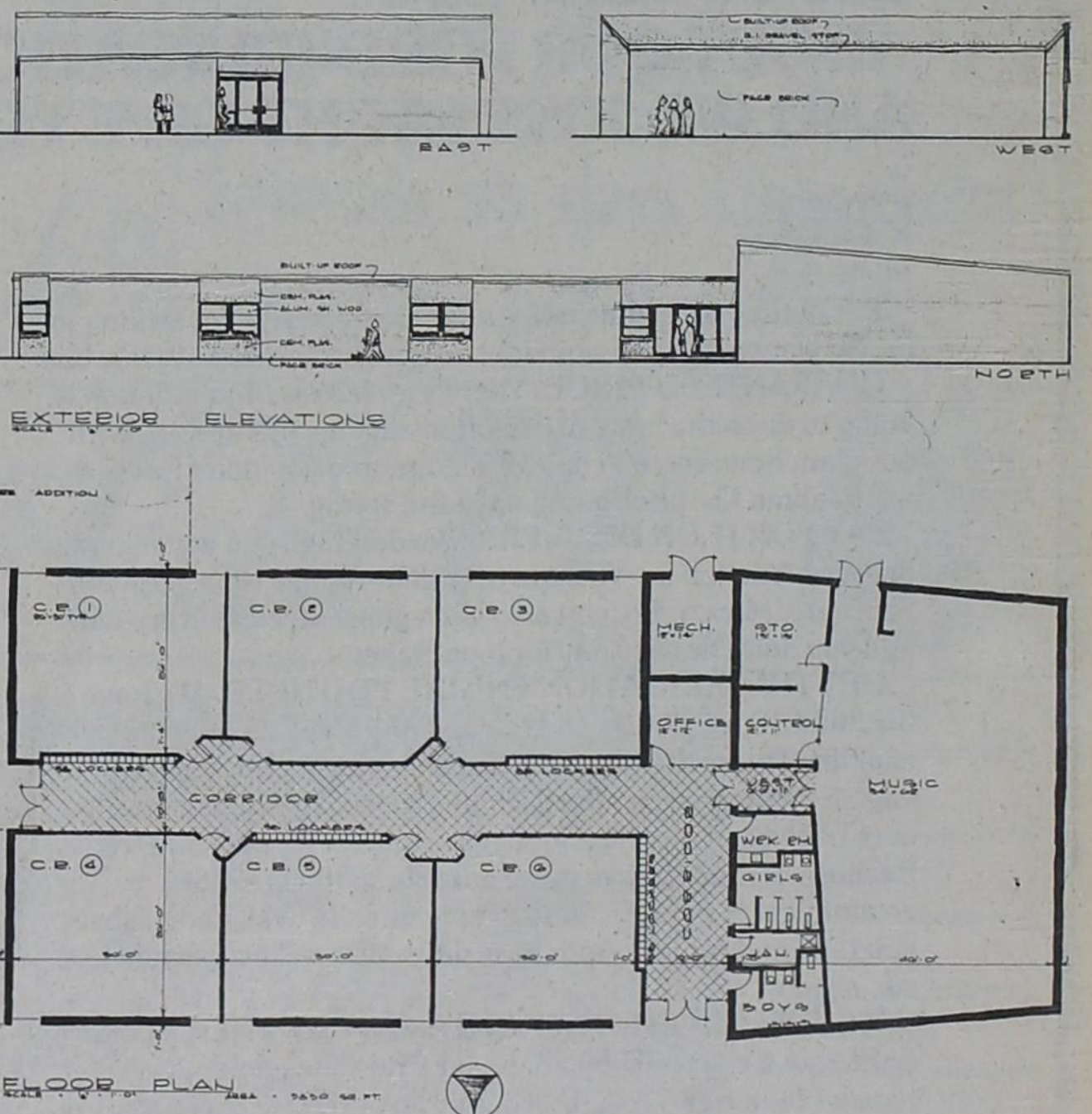

Junior High, Music Room Construction Set At Texico

Colton Construction Co. of Albuquerque was awarded the contract for the facility, following submission of the low base bid of \$218,510 to the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal Schools. The Board accepted Colton's base bid from a field of eight bidders at the regular school board meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 15. Construction of the facility will start immediately, with completion targeted for the opening of the next school year.

Drop Bovina, Springlake - -

Steerettes Claim Two Victories

In their third conference game of 1975, the Farwell Varsity Steerettes traveled to Vega Tuesday, Jan. 14, and suffered a defeat 52-40. In retaliation of the black mark on their record the Steerettes welcomed Bovina onto Steer court Friday, Jan. 17, and gored the visitors by a 76 point margin, out-scoring Bovina 102-26.

In action against Vega, Farwell was never able to grab the lead, trailing 12-4 at the end of the first period. The Steerettes managed to even out the score 20-20 at the halfway mark but fell behind 34-26 when the third quarter ended. Farwell added 14 points to their tally in the final stanza but were still the underdogs 52-40 when the final buzzer sounded.

Taking the scoring lead for the Steerettes was Kathy Booth who was credited with pumping in 20 points. She was followed on the scoring ladder by Sharon Booth who dropped in 14 points. Also scoring for Farwell was Kathy White.

Leading in the rebounding department for the Steerettes were Sharon Booth, Terri Boling and Joi Meeks who each grabbed off five rebounds.

According to team statistics, the Steerettes were on the mark for 13 of 41 attempted field goals for 31 percent and 14 of 19 free throws for 73 percent. Total team rebounds numbered 26 and stolen balls added up to nine.

Farwell entered competition against Bovina Friday and zapped the visitors 18-8, 54-13 and 83-19 during the first three periods of play. The Steerettes returned during the fourth period to up their final tally to 102 while giving up only 26 points to Bovina during the four quarters of action.

High point scorer for the Steerettes was Kathy White who crammed a total of 34 points through the hoop. Also scoring in double figures for Farwell were Sharon Booth, 31, and Kathy Booth, 22 points.

Other Steerettes adding to Farwell's scoring effort were Bonnie Foster and Sheryl

Woods.

Leading rebounder for Farwell was Kathy White who picked up a total of nine followed by Lori Norton with six.

Team statistics reveal the Steerettes hit 42 of 74 attempted field goals of 56 percent and 18 of 34 free throws for 52 percent. Total rebounds picked up by the Steerettes totaled 42 while stolen balls numbered 28.

In conference action Tuesday, Jan. 21, the Steerettes traveled to Springlake-Earth to face the pre-season third ranked Wolverettes and dropped the host team by a six point margin, 56-50.

Farwell's basketballers held the lead from the first quarter, 9-8, 27-21, 40-36, respectively, and topped Springlake when the final buzzer sounded 56-50.

Taking the leading scorer position for the Steerettes was Sharon Booth who dropped in 25 points. Also scoring in double figures for Farwell were Kathy White with 13 and Kathy Booth with 12. Sheryl Woods also added six points to the Steerettes' final tally.

Honors as leading rebounder were awarded to Lori Norton who was credited with picking up eight followed by Terri Boling who grabbed off six rebounds.

In overall team statistics, it is revealed the Steerettes hit 20 of 49 attempted field goals for 40 percent and 16 of 24 free throws for 66 percent. Rebounds picked up by the Farwell roundballers totaled 29 with stolen balls numbering nine.

The win over Springlake-Earth put another victory mark on the Steerettes' conference record making it read 4-1 thus far in conference play.

Varsity Steers Defeat Bovina, Springlake

The Farwell Varsity Steers played host to the Bovina Mustangs in action Friday, Jan. 17, and sent the visitors home with a 71-52 defeat on their season record.

The Steers took a 14-8 first quarter lead and maintained the six point margin, 31-25, at the end of the first half of competition. Farwell led to their side of the scoreboard and came up with a 53-37 lead at the end of the third period. Game action closed after the final stanza of play with the Steers taking the victory 71-52.

Taking high scorer honors for the Steers were Gene Christian and Brad Jones who each put 18 points on the scoreboard. Also scoring in double figures was Lesley Curtis who was credited with scoring a total of 11 points.

Other scorers adding to the Steers' final tally were Mike Woods, Gary Green, Clay Roberts, Gerald Hardage and Russ Jones.

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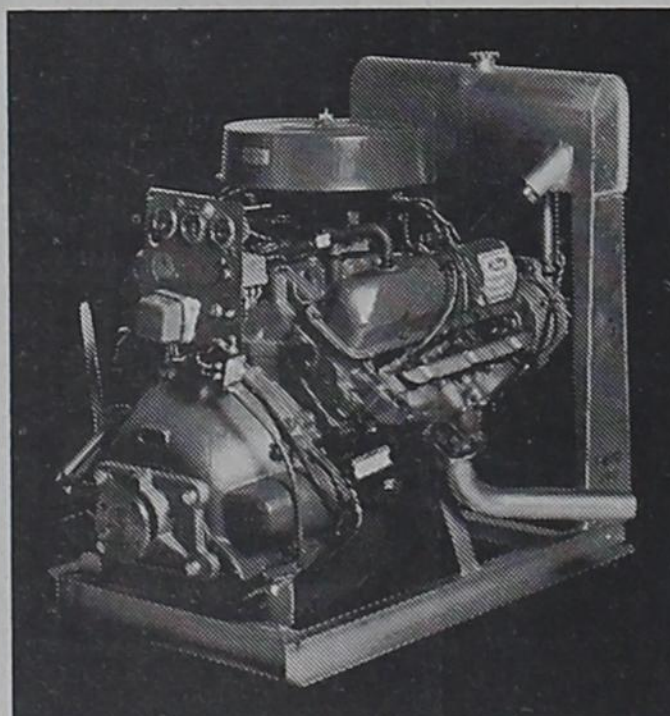

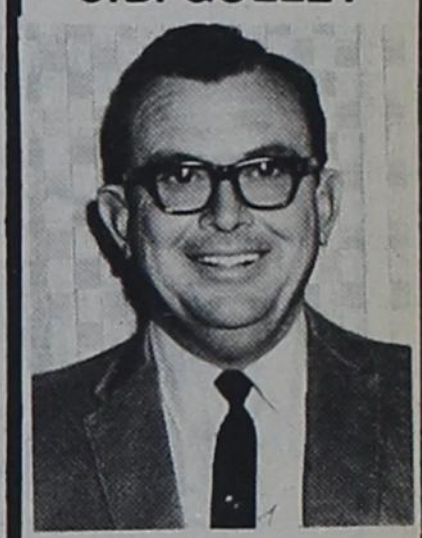

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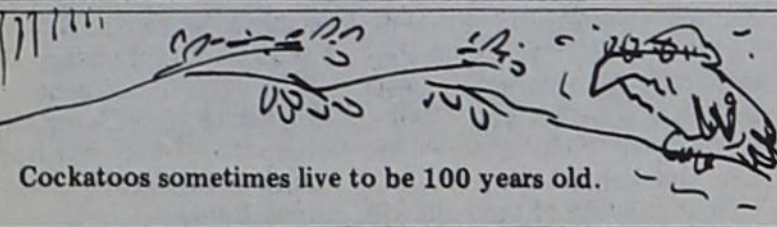

THE END OF THE WORLD

There has been a great deal of discussion lately about some Hindu astrologers who have predicted that this world will come to an end next February. The fact is that some sincere Christians fear these prophets might be right. The Hindu astrologers, though, are wrong. Next February will not see the end of the world, for according to the Bible the world, or earth, will never come to an end. The word "world," which our Lord used in this connection, does not refer to the earth, or even the people on it. It is the old Greek word *aion*, or age. Several ages in God's program have already come to an end, and others will, but no matter what man may devise, in the way of destructive weapons, the earth will never be destroyed. In Isaiah 45:18 we read:

"For thus saith the Lord that created the heavens; God Himself that formed the earth and made it; He hath established it, He created it not in vain; He formed it to be inhabited: I am the Lord, and there is none else."

But doesn't Rev. 21:1 predict "a new heaven and a new earth"? Yes, but the context clearly indicates that this refers to the future renewing of the present heaven and earth, not the creating of different ones. Verse 5 says: "He that sat upon the throne said, Behold I make all things new." Note: He didn't say "I make all new things," but "I make all things new." There is a difference. People should not be concerned about the end of the world, but about the end of this present age. "The dispensation of the grace of God," for God has never promised how long it would last. Every hour He delays the return of Christ to recall His ambassadors, is an hour of wonderful grace, in which men may be saved by grace, through faith in Christ, who died for our sins. This is why Paul urges us: "As workers together with Christ, we beseech you that ye receive not the grace of God in vain. Behold, NOW is the accepted time; Behold, NOW is the day of salvation (II Cor. 6:1,2). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

NOTICE OF RIGHTS

Under Federal law, parents of students under eighteen and students over eighteen have the following rights:

1. The right to inspect all official records directly related to the student including but not limited to, identifying data, academic work completed, level of achievement (grades, standardized achievement test scores), attendance data, scores on standardized intelligence, aptitude, and psychological tests, interest inventory results, health data, family background information, teacher or counselor ratings and observations, and verified reports of serious or recurrent behavior patterns.
2. The right to inspect such records within a reasonable period of time, not to exceed 45 days.
3. The right to a hearing to correct inaccurate or misleading statements in such records, or statements that otherwise violate the right of privacy or other rights of the student.
4. The right to prohibit third parties from inspecting the records without written consent of the parent or student who is eighteen years or over. The written consent shall specify the records to be released, the reasons for such release, and to whom released. A copy of the records to be released shall be given to the parents and the students if desired by the parents. No written consent is needed:
 - (a) for local school officials who have a legitimate educational interest,
 - (b) for officials of other schools in which the student intends to enroll if the parents are notified of the transfer and have a right to challenge the record content at a hearing prior to transfer,
 - (c) for certain education officials pursuant to federal programs when the identity of the student or parent is not used,
 - (d) for collection of personally identifiable data specifically authorized by Federal Law,
 - (e) for transfer of materials under court order or lawful subpoena,
 - (f) in connection with a financial aid application.
5. The right to have information transferred to third parties only on the condition that no further party will have access to the information without written consent of the parent or student who is eighteen years old or over.

6. The right to have all third parties desiring access to a student's file sign a written form indicating specifically the legitimate interest the party has in seeking the information. Only the parents, the student and the school official responsible for record maintenance may inspect that form.

Sir:
I feel I must take issue with you in defense of the proposed teachers' raises for next year, pending now in the Texas legislature. I was very disappointed and a little disillusioned in your choice of words. I hardly see myself or any of my professional friends as "money grabbers"; however, I do advocate and support the proposed raises. May I explain why?

Texas last year ranked 37th among states in teachers' salaries, \$1,706 below the national average. Estimates for 1974-1975 have not been released. A beginning teacher's salary in Texas schools this year was \$6600. (Some districts add to this base out of local funds.) Is it truly "unrealistic" and "extravagant" to raise the base pay of a college graduate who faces additional, required post graduate work to \$8200? I think not unrealistic or extravagant at all; instead fair and a long time coming. Why should Texas lose good teachers to other states in search of a better living?

Is there any less "dedication" when a good teacher also seeks a good standard of living? Must they be in conflict one with the other? Teachers are not in the profession for the money in the first place. The initial motivation instead is a love for children and a sincere concern for their future.

It is my judgement that our generation of teachers are the best qualified, most professional, and dedicated in history as we must be to meet the responsibility and challenge of today's youth growing into today's world.

I am always disturbed by comments such as your editorial in the severe damage in communication between the schools and the community it could do, that could take years to bridge. Too often we find the school and community growing further apart (i.e. New Mexico school boards seeking to close most meetings to the public as I've read in the Clovis paper). Instead, they should be fully supportive of one another in a cooperative partnership. After all, both claim a common interest and responsibility for their young people.

In conclusion, Mr. Getz, I strongly invite you to spend a day in my classroom or any classroom within our fine system, and see if we can convince you otherwise.

All bids shall be sealed and, except the bid of the State of New Mexico, if one is received, shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit of not less than \$3,000 (i.e., two per cent (2%) of the principal amount of the bonds) either in cash or by cashier's or treasurer's check, or by certified check drawn on, a solvent bank or trust company in the United States and payable to Texico Municipal School District No. 2. Such good faith checks shall be returned if the bid is not accepted. If the successful bidder shall fail or neglect to complete the purchase of said bonds within thirty days following the acceptance of the bid, or within ten days after the bonds are offered for delivery, whichever is later, the amounts of the deposit shall be forfeited to the District as liquidated damages and in that event the Board of Education may accept the bid of the one making the next best bid. If all bids are rejected, the Board shall readvertise said bonds for sale in the same manner as herein provided for the original advertisement. If there be two or more equal bids and such bids are the best bids received and for not less than par and accrued interest, the Board of Education shall determine which bid shall be accepted.

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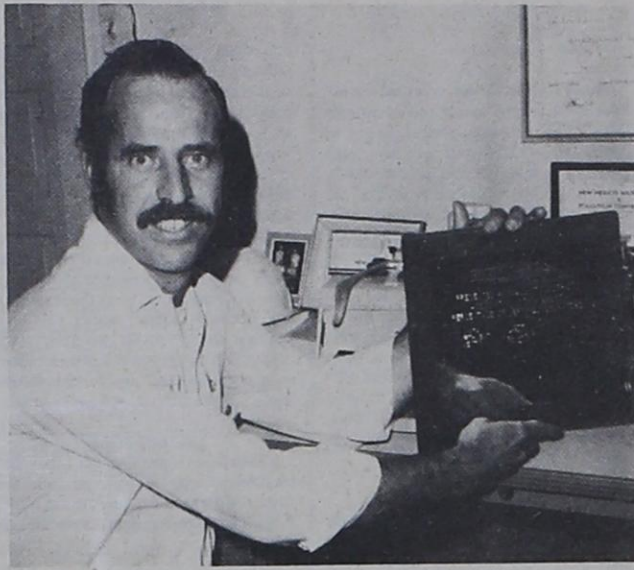
Billy Hammit Receives Charles Caldwell Award

Blankenship Named To Dean's List

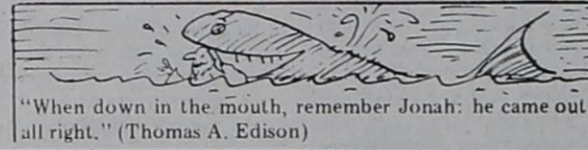
