#### BETTER U. S. EATING MEANS MORE MARKETS

Feeding the American people is the farmer's job. So how well the American people are fed has a lot to do with the markets farmers can find for their products. Nutrition programs of the Department of Agriculture are aimed at better standards of diet-which mean greater demand for farm products and more money in the farmer's pocket.

Here's a summary of programs now being opearted by USDA:

School Lunch:-Aimed at providing school children with nutritious meals, it also helps form good eating habits. Federal aid for school lunches has continued and expanded for 11 years. With the enactment of the National School Lunch Act this spring. Congress put the work on a permanent basis. All 48 States, the District of Columbia, and the terriagreements.

Direct Distribution;-Through this program the Department distributes fresh fruits and vegetables and other price-support operations. Commodities are turned over to schools for use in school lunches, or sent to institutions or welfare recipients. Has a time of peak production.

Home Food Preservation;-More than 6,000 community canning centers have been established through this program. Through these centers, local surplus foods are saved for family and school lunch use. Program is used to prevent food waste in peak production seasons, and provides means for canning commodities bought by USDA under the Dir-



Under the program, all veterans entitled to out-patient dental care at VA's exepnse have free choice of dentists participating in the project where VA dental clinic service is not available.

Veterans must obtain authorization for this local treatment from the VA regional office having jurisdiction. Regional offices in the Dallas Branch Area are located at Jackson, Miss.; New Orleans and Shreveport, La.; and Dallas, Waco, Houston, San Antonio and Lubbock, Texas.

Without exception, the largest Texas cities showed decreases in permits for November.

Sherman, leading in cities reporting increases over October, has a 161 percent rise. Childress followed with a 105 percent rise, Brownsville reported a 95 percent gain in permits Lubbock, a 72 percent increase, Seguin reports reflected a 54 percent gain, and Coleman permits rose 53 percent.

Permits granted continued more than double pre-war levels, however, in spite of the drop for the last two months. In November building permits were 162 percent above the average month of the basic 1935-39 period. The seasonally-adjusted index was 262 for the month of November, lowest of the year except for permits in May, when the index registered 242.



Fighting qualities of the 36th this book can best be summed up by a statement made by Field Marshall Albert Kesselring, the ace German defensive specialist. Seymour Korman, Chicago Tribune war correspondent, asked Kesselring, "Tell me, the finest American division to have opposed you?" Without looking up and without a moment's hesitation, Kesselring sputtered, "Your 3rd and 36th Infantry Divisions. I've been constantly amazed by their audacity, at their long flanking tactics and the way they turned up in so many different places. I've had to pit my best troops against them."

The heritage of the 36th Division dates back to the Alamo when the 141st infantry made its sacrifice in the Texas Revolution. Composed of Texas National Guardsmen, the 36th was again mobilized into the Army of the United States on November 25, 1940, at Camp Bowie for World





ABOUT THE WATER CONSERVATION QUESTION:

Because of erroneous information being spread throughout the High Plains area that the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and the Lubbock City Commission are in favor of legislation to regulate the drilling of wells and pumping of water in the region, the two groups held a joint meeting Friday, January 3, in the City Commission room to discuss the problem.

It was unanimously stated that neither the Chamber of Commerce nor the City Commission had ever agreed to back any such legislation and the following joint statement was issued by C. A. Bestwick, Mayor of Lubbock, and Roy Furr, President of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

"The Lubbock City Commission and the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce have not advocated, proposed, approved or endorsed any legislation, rules or regulations in regard to protecting, controlling or allocating underground water.

"The two organizations are opposed to any legislative proposals until the people of this area have the opportunity to thoroughly study them.

"Both groups do advocate and propose a thorough study of the underground water resources of the area and ask the cooperation of all the citizens of this section in helping to put into effect protective measures if the study indicates they are needed."

The two groups voted to meet at the request of the High Plains Water Use and Conservation Association with directors of that organization, January 10. A number of similar meetings are planned with other interested groups to thoroughly inform them of the position of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and the Lubbock City Commission.







### Monopolism

By GEORGE S.BENSON President of Harding College Searcy. Arkansas



NORWAY has little governmentmanaged industry, as such. The only things wholly owned and operated by the government are the post office, telephone, telegraph, electric power, and railroads. There seems to be no agitation for extension of government ownership and management. In fact some leaders feel the trend is in the other direction and that the government has shown no ability to provide efficient service.

However, cooperatives are numerous in Norway. Entirely different from government management, they nevertheless control the buying and selling of almost everything and are monopolistic in nature. The effective organiza-tions of the co-ops, while indi-vidually owned, have been used in some instances for extension of government control. Subsidies have been offered to farmers cooperatives in an effort to please everybody: the producers with higher prices and the purchasers with low prices.

Wait 'Til THE COMPLETE-You're Old NESS of the cooperative monopoly may be seen in the association of may be seen in the association of drug store operators, to which all operators belong. To open a new drug store a man would first have to become a member of the association and get its approval, after which he would appeal to the government which could never grant a license unless the applicant were admitted to the association.

Drug store operators admit no new members except at their own pleasure, and then seldom except to replace a member who has died. I was told that an aspirant | nations in the world.

to the drug industry can seldom be admitted to the association and obtain permission to operate his own store before he is 45 years

Plenty of UNDER the right Frontiers kind of economic climate, the Norwegian people could raise their standard of living. And this right climate Communism can never provide. Norway does not lack for frontiers. Their farms produce as many bushels of grain per acre as our farms. The fishing waters of Norway are not surpassed. Possibilities for electric power are the best in the world. Manufacturing and lumbering offer only the ordinary difficulties. The country is not over populated. Yet their standard of living is not more than half as high as that in America.

When forward looking Norwegians try to modernize an industry, they are met squarely with the deadening hand of monopoly, either private or public. If one fishing company manages to find a way to sell its products at a good price, while another com-pany exports its fish to Europe for a lower price, the former company pays a tax which goes to the second company for the sake of equalization.

This policy invariably discourages excellence and tends to mediocrity. A premium is thus placed on inefficiency and on failure to make money. But a realistic incentive system, based upon honest competition throughout, could soon make little Norway one of the most prosperous small

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




