
Rubber Stock Pile Jumps Crude Prices

Renewed activity on the part of the Government to build up the rubher stockpile has forced prices up to the highest point since Spring. Spot ". bbe, sold for 1814 certs last week. ¿ against 15% cents September 1.

U. S. officials are taking these steps to make sure we have an adequate supply of rubber on hand in the event foreign sources are suddenly cut off. So far the bureau of federal supply has bought 10,000 tons of No. 1 ribbed smoke sheets, a top grade. The government is buying on instructoins from the Army-Navy inunitions board.

Reports have been circulated for days that the natural rubber stockpile will run between 500,000 and 1,-000,000 tons. Nearly 200,000 tons are reported to be on hand at present. The sudden spurt in stockpiling was interpreted in Washington as due to the shift in Russian policy. One official reported Russia no longer allows her satellite countries to export stockpile materials to the United States. There has been no evidence in the rubber markets that the Soviets are stockpkiling rubber. They are believed. though, to be building up stocks of other critical materials and decnetralizing stocks over a wide front behind the Urals.
