





Health Notes

AUSTIN—In recent years typhus fever has developed into serious health enace in Texas according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who today issued an appeal for every Texan to cooperate in rodent control measures which will prevent the spread of this disease.

"Last year, 1147 cases of typhus were reported in Texas, and in the first 18 weeks of this year, the State Health Department has been notified of 185 cases," Dr. Cox stated. "With the peak of this disease usually occuring in August, if the present trend is continued, we may expect this total to be greatly increased by the end of summer."

The type of typhus fever occuring in Texas is known as endemic or Brill's disease, and is transmitted to human beings from infected rats, by means of the rat flea. The eradication of rats is the only way to reduce this health hazard, and a consistent program will materially aid in the control of typhus in Texas.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that it is the duty of every individual to cooperate in strict rodent control measures since the eradication of rats is the only possible way typhus fever can be controlled.

AUSTIN—With the advent of summer and the ensuing exodus from city to country resorts and picnic spots the annual problem of ivy poisoning is once more making its appearance.

In order that city dwellers may guard against this poisonous plant by instant recognition of it, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statement. "Poison ivy may be recognized by its leaves and its fruit. Each leaf is divided into three leaflets, the margins of which vary from smooth to more or less notched outlines. The small greenish flowers appear in May or June and the fruits which are the size of a small pea are pale green and poisonous when immature."

The symptoms of ivy poisoning range from slight redness and itching to exaggerated sweeling and blisters, accompanied by severe burning sensations. There are all gradations between these extremes. In mild cases the skin is covered by numerous small blisters containing a colorless serum which is not poisonous. The poison cannot spread from broken blisters but pustules may form and infections may result as secondary consequence. Recovery usually occurs in from 10 days to 3 weeks. Occassionally a persistent skin inflanimation follows.

Dr. Cox advised persons planning picnics and out door excursions to learn to recognize poison ivy and thus be able to avoid it. Prevention is much easier to accomplish, than relief from ivy poisoning.

AUSTIN—"It is an unfortunate fact that some people are willing to risk their health—possibly even their lives—by prescribing for themselves and taking a drug that they have read about somewhere and which has been termed a 'miracle drug'," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Although such drugs as pencillin streptomycin, thiouracil and sulfa drugs have been of great value in combating diseases that have heretofore been very dificult to control, nevertheless, they can be very dangerous products in untrained hands. They were never intended to be used promiscuously for self-medication." the State Health Officer as-

If a pharmacist refuses to sell a particular drug and explains that it cannot be supplied without a physician's prescription the would-be purchaser should not become provoked. That pharmacist is giving sound public health advice and is also complying with the law. The State Health Officer declared that self-medication is never advisable, and even "miracle drugs" should be taken only when a doctor prescribes



Take Care of Your Garden



The time to kill weeds in your garden is before they begin to grow! Hoeing the surface soil in vegetable or flower garden not only destroys sprouting weed seeds; it actually prevents their germination. As soon as the seedlings break through in the garden rows so that they can easily be seen, it is time to begin stirring the soil between rows and as close to the plants as possible without dis-

turbing them. Either a hand hoe or a wheel hoe is an excellent tool. If it rains a few days after the first cultivation, stir the surface soil again as soon as it is dry enough, before cultivating a second time,-

is too wet to work. Weeds within the row will probably have to be removed by hand while the plants are small. Some gardeners find an old kilchen knife a handy helper. Or, a hand weeder is a convenient tool. As plants grow larger, they usually dominate so that Another reason for cultivating the down the husky weeds.

Q. How much feeder space is necessary for chicks?

A. According to the age of the chicks, feeder space should be provided as follows: First three weeks1 in per chick

3 to 6 weeks of age ... in. per chick 6 weeks to maturity . . 3 in. per chick

Q. What is the proper age for breeding a Jersey heifer?

A. Tests made over a period of years at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company show that it is better to breed helfers according to body size rather than age. A Jersey heifer weighing 500 lbs. is fully big enough to breed. Jersey heifers at the Purina Research Farm usually reach this weight by 12 months of age.

Q. Under what conditions do you recommend creep feeding of pigs?

A. Creep feeding is recommended when sows are hand fed, especially when several sows and litters are fed together. When sows are self fed, a creep for pigs is not necessary. Little pigs become interested in the sow's feed and will eat small amounts of solid feeds if given the opportunity. A pig creep will permit the feeding of special feeds to the pigs and exclude the sow. Whether or not creep feeding is practiced, pigs should be encouraged to eat feed from the time they are two weeks old, because the sooner they start the easier it is to put on rapid gains and the less setback there will be at weaning time.

Q. Could you tell me the reason I couldn't get my kid to drink colostrum milk?

A. Probably the milk was cold, and kids will not drink cool milk. The fresh colostrum should be heated carefully in a pan placed in hot water or in a double boiler over a low flame, as it scorches and coag-ulates easily. Stir constantly while heating. It should be quite warm, about 100 degrees F. If kids do not drink well the first one or two feedings, do not be alarmed. Usually the trouble is that the milk is not warm enough.

VETERAN'S NEWS

Ex-GI Joe thus far has proved to be a good loan risk, according to latest Veterans Administration figures on defaults for loans guaranteed by the Government under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill)

As of March 25, VA had approved for guaranty more than 643,000 home loans with a face value of \$3,642,-000,000 and carrying guarantee commitments of \$1,707,000,000.

As of the same date, claims had been made against the guaranty by lenders in only 212 home loan cases, and 42 of these subsequently were withdrawn by the claimants. Of the remainder, 135 claims in the net amount of \$235,400 have been paidand this amount will be reduced by further recovery through liquidation of security for the loans.

VA said the small number of current defaults could not be expected to reflect the long-term trend. The loans are made repayable up to 25 years. The contracts have been negotiated since September, 1944, when the program went into effect.

Casualties among veterans who went into business with the aid of GI loans are considerably higher. Of 45,450 such loans totaling \$187,000, 000, some 960 have resulted in claims. VA has paid 732 for 680,000, also subject to further recovery through liquidation of assests.

VA said business loans are made payable in much shorter periods of time than real estate loans, therefore a higher rate of defaults during the 21/2 years of operation of the GI Bill is to be expected.

Only 26,700 farm loans, had been approved by VA through March 25 Claims had been filed against 68, of which 42 had been paid in the amount of \$31,700. Farm loans may be amortized over periods up to 40


On the other side of the ledger VA said that 12,590 loans of all types had been repaid in full by March 25.



The majority of the dogs were killed with the strychnine-treated grain bought from the Rodent Control Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, says County Agricultural agent J. B. Waide, Jr. The prarie dogs are a big threat to Plains stockmen in that they reduce the carrying capiciy of pastures.

Several hundred pounds of 1080 poison were put out during the campaign by a Rodent Control Service representative. County Agent Waide explains that 1080 is a powerful poison developed during the war, and that it can be used only under the supervision of Rodent Control personnel.

Farmers in the county are now following up the strychnine and 1080 with cyanide crystals, placed in the prairie dog holes. They are working for a 100 percent kill, and Waide believes that the cyanide will finish off the remaning 15 percent. He states that a complete kill is necessary or the dogs will re-populate faster than a county-full of jack rabbits.


