Drouth Stimulates Cattle Movements

With dry weather still prevailing over a vast area of the high plains country, cattle movements have been taking on added impetus during the past two weeks.

Faced with grass shortages on the open range and the further possibility of little wheat pasturage during the winter months, stockmen are moving their herds in unprecedented numbers through the Clovis cattle rings. There is little demand for stocker cattle on the Clovis market, with most of the sales going to Kansas and Nebraska feeders. Fat cattle, however, continue to bring good prices.

Meanwhile, wheat farmers of this and adjoining counties are still hoping for moisture that will condition their fields for fall sowings. Very few farmers have received sufficient rain to bring up the volunteer growth as yet. Showers west and north of Bovina some weeks ago have been the exception, with the result that several farmers in those localities have killed their volunteer growth and proceeded with sowing operations. Charles Calaway, of the Rhea community, reports his wheat sowings up to a good stand.

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Fire Department Gets New Hose

Otis Huggins, secretary of the Texico-Farwell Fire Department, announced that 1000 feet of new double-jacket hose has been received by the local department.

This hose had been on order for some time, and will be an asset to the Texas interest in the Fire Department, in helping to get a lower rate of insurance. The old type of hose did not meet the specifications of the insurance board, and the department was not recognized.

Lunch Room Operating At Texico School

The Texico school lunch room program got underway last Monday, announces B. A. Rogers, superintendent of the school. Rogers stated that the starting of the program was proving very satisfactory, with most of the equipment installed, excepting a refrigerator and a few other items.

According to the school head, donations toward the buying of equipment (the old lunch room was destroyed by fire a year ago) reached the amount of about \$500, which helped greatly in setting up the program.

Superintendent Rogers stated that officials have hopes of receiving more government surplus to complete the outfitting of the lunch department.

Mrs. Blair said that there was a small turn-out at the working, but considerable work was accomplished. The group voted to buy a small power mower that will be used to keep down the weeds and grass.

Max Wells, of Friona, took first prize in the Sears Foundation gilt show, here last Saturday, when the seven gilts and a boar, given out by the Sears Roebuck Store Area of Amarillo, were up for judging.

Wells also showed his gilt at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo, in competition with boys from 18 other counties where the program is held.

Donald Christian, of Oklahoma Lane, showed the boar, which also will be exhibited for judging at the Amarillo show. He was not judged locally, being given the counties for breeding purposes only.

Troy Christian of Oklahoma Lane won second place with his gilt; Derrel Norton of Farwell, third; Charles Verner, Oklahoma Lane, fourth; and Denzil Young, Oklahoma Lane, fifth. Thirty dollars was distributed among the winners according to placements. The prizes were issued in the form of purchase orders, and will be used for needs in promoting the swine program. Each contestant will have an opportunity to enter his animal in another prize winning show, next spring, when premiums will be paid the boy who has the sow with the heaviest litter of eight-week-old pigs.

County Agent Ollie Liner, who has been in charge of the 4-H club boy's program, stated that last spring, when the pigs were placed in the care of the boys, Troy Christian received the smallest gilt, and that the outlook was poor for his chance to win a prize. However, Troy's gilt placed second in the show, proving "what good management and correct feeding will do".

Farwell Man Victim Of Gunshot, Friday

Lee Blair was seriously injured last Friday afternoon about 1 o'clock in his home, from a self-inflicted gunshot, thought to be accidental.

Blair was sitting in a rocker in the living room holding a small caliber pistol, when his brother, John Blair, walked into the room and yelled at him. It appeared to have excited Lee, causing him to jump and squeeze the trigger while bent over the gun.

The bullet entered Blair's left chest just above the heart, going in at an angle which caused the slug to tear through the left side of the chest and come out from the back of the left shoulder. Blair fell from a half-sitting half-standing position to the floor.

John Blair, with the aid of Cecil Rundell, rushed him to the Memorial Hospital in Clovis, where he was given plasma and placed under an oxygen tent. He is reported to have gained consciousness during the night, and while talking to some of the relatives, stated that he "did not know what happened."

Blair was removed to his home Sunday morning, and is reported to be getting along satisfactorily.

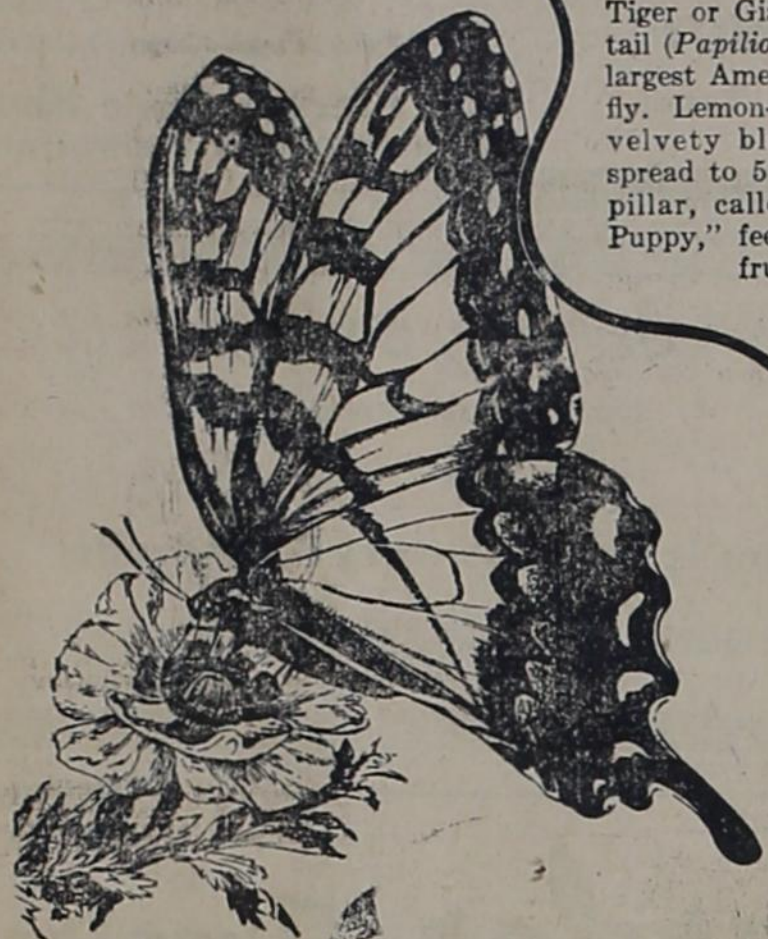

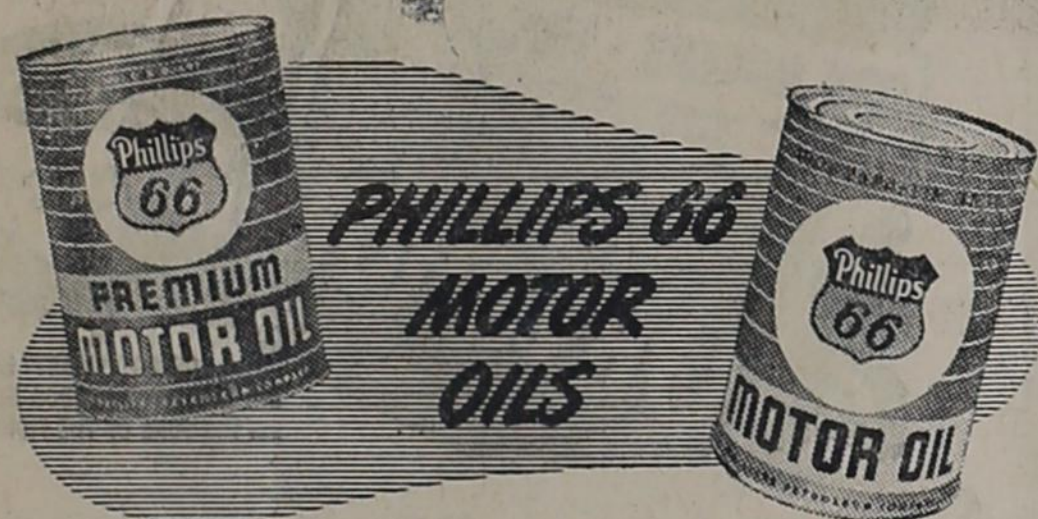

True Stories of West Texans

THE DEATH OF BILLY THE KID

Billy the Kid was on the loose again. He had killed two guards and shot his way out of the Lincoln county, N. M., jail just two days before his scheduled execution. The cattlemen of the Texas plains grew grim as they heard the news and gave detailed instructions to their line riders. They knew their stock would begin disappearing once more.

Sheriff Pat Garrett of Lincoln figured that the Kid had skipped the country and was laying low in Old Mexico. But John William Poe, former buffalo hunter of the Fort Griffin country and present special detective for the Canadian Cattlemen's Association of the Texas Panhandle had received a tip to the contrary.

"He is over at Fort Sumner hiding in his 'querida's' house," his informant, Quinn, whispered.

And Poe decided that Quinn was right. The Kid would be among Mexican friends in Sumner and the nearby town of White Oak; most of the few American residents were of undesirable character and also in sympathy with the young outlaw.

Inducing Sheriff Pat Garrett and Deputy Sheriff Kip McKinney of Roswell to accompany him, the three entered the abandoned army post, Ft. Sumner, by separate and circuitous routes. This was in July of 1881. The suspected house was watched but no Kid appeared.

"It's not quite midnight. Let's call

on Pete Maxwell, a big sheepman here. Perhaps he will know if the Kid is around," Garrett suggested.

Leaving the other two on the long porch, Garrett stepped inside to Maxwell's adjoining bedroom. Almost immediately another man slipped softly from the shadows towards the two on the porch. He was within arm's length of Poe before he saw them. Like a flash he sprang upon the veranda, whipping out his six shooter and covering the men.

"Quien es? What is it?" he demanded. But instead of shooting he backed into the open doorway of Maxwell's bedroom. Neither man had reached for his gun and so death passed them by.

A moment later two shots rang out within and Pat Garrett rushed out onto the veranda.

"I killed the Kid!" he blurted. "I killed the Kid!"

And indeed it was the Kid. Sheriff Garrett had recognized his voice in the semi-dark and shot instantly.

The following day, July 15, 1881, William H. Bonney of the New York slums, commonly known as Billy the Kid in western cow country, was buried beside two of his cronies in the old military cemetery of Fort Sumner. As leader of an organized band of desperadoes who had also become proficient as cattle rustlers and horse thieves, the Kid was said to have killed a man for each of his own 21 years of life.

ACA News

The first fields of Parmer County's relatively small acreage of grain sorghum have been combined. The yields reported so far are ranging between 800 to 1250 pounds per acre which is below average but far above earlier estimates. Irrigated crops and some dry land sorghums will produce from 1500 to 3000 pounds per acre. With the Parmer County CCC

loan rate set at \$2.06 per cwt. and the current price far above that, we are assured of an excellent price for what little we produce.

Commodity Credit loans will be available for both warehouse and farm stored grain. Unlike wheat loans which cannot be disbursed after the first of 1948, grain sorghum is eligible for the loan through February 28, 1948.

The purchase agreement plan will also be in effect for this commodity whereby the producer man sign an agreement with CCC assuring himself of the support price.

Farmers who are holding wheat or grain sorghum are advised to protect themselves by signing a purchase agreement, thereby insuring against a complete collapse in the market.

While we are still on the subject of grain sorghum, we might mention the fact that there will be a 25 cent per acre conservation payment for all stalks left on the ground 10 inches or more in height. This payment also applies to sudan stalks that are not grazed. Producers must make application for payment before combining starts. The object, of course, is to leave more protective stubble on the land to cut down wind erosion.

We will have a 1948 Conservation Program, but payments will be limited to \$500.00 per person no matter

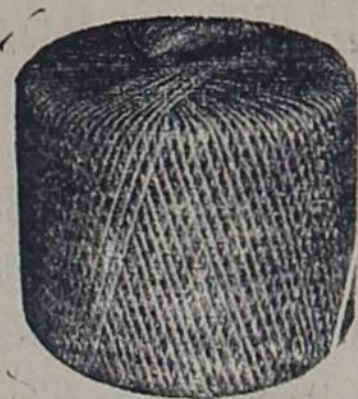
