Estimates that had been made the bushels in Parmer County were pretty well justified last weekend, with completion of a survey made of all elevators in the county.

A Tribune reporter interviewed every elevator operator in Parmer County in order to arrive at some definite figures concerning the yield in the county this year. Tabulations reveal that up to that time a grand total of 603 carloads had already been shipped from the county elevators, and an estimated 882 carloads was in storage in elevators, awaiting shipment.
