ducts have incerased 167 per cent above the low acerages of 1935-39. At the same time, he has increased the volume of the goods he markets by 52 per cent.

He is getting a larger share of the money that people pay for farm products. In the 1935-39 period only 40 per cent of the retail cost of food went into the farmer's pocket, the rets of it going to the "middleman" the marketing agencies, Since 1943 however, he has received from 52 to 56 per cent of each dollar the consumer spends for farm products.

The prices the farmer pays have increased only 102 per cent in the period. This is divided between his costs for commoduties used in production which have increased 93 per cent, and what he pays for commo dities he uses in family maintenance which have risen 110 per cent.





O. v son, who was blinded while in service during World War II, and I would like to know if he is entitled to receive a guide dog at government expense?

A. Yes. A service-connected blind veteran is entitled to receive, at government expense, a guide dog and various devices necessary to assist him in overcoming his handicap.

Q. Does a veteran have to have a 10 percent ro more service-connected disability to be eligible for out-patient treatment?

A. Any veteran with an established service-connected disability is entitled to out-patient treatment for the service-connected disability, regardless of the degree of disability. Q. If I go to a private physician determine whether I need hospital treatment or domiciliary care, will the government pay the cost of the examination?

A. Only if VA has given the physician prior authority for such examination.

Q. Please tell me what veterans are eligible to have prescriptions filled at government expense.

A. If the vet's physician has been authorized by VA to treat the veteran. VA will pay cost of the prescription if it is used in treatment of a service-connected disability.







#### **Gas Producers, Royalty Owners Losing Money**

AUSTIN—Texas gas producers and royalty owners lost approximately \$10,000,000 in 1946 because they received pay for only about seveneighths of the gas they actually produced, declared E. I. Thompson, executive vice president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, at a meeting of the executive committee of the organization held in Fart Worth.

"Pressure should now be exerted to correct this unjust and arbitrary practice," Thompson said. "To accomplish this, a special gas committee of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association has developed a corrective clause, which it recommends that producers and royalty owners insist upon including in all gas purchase contracts, unitization agreements and oil and gas leases."

Briefly, the money lost in Texas gas production is attributed by Thompson to conflicting settlement practices between Texas statutes and gas company determinations. #### FARM CASH INCOME IN TEXAS SHOWS GAIN

AUSTIN-Farm cash income in Texas staged a brisk August-to-September gain to boost the seasonallyadjusted index up to a point five times above its prewar levels, The University of Texas BBR reports. The 42 per cent August-to-September hike bounced the index ur to 506.3, based on the prewar 1935-39 average of 100. The part played by a rise in prices is difficult to determine, but increased production on the state's farms has augmented the rising prices of farm products to bring in more intake to Texas farmers than they have ever had before. Cotton lint and cowpea prices were down during the month but prices of all other Texas farm products advanced. Grain prices soared as high as the 18 per cent wheat price rise over its August level, livestock prices were on the march upward, and poultry and egg prices were far above their August marks. 





of 1100, was all that was left of a herd being delivered to Fort Stanton. John Chisum was a newcomer to the territory of New Mexico, but not to the cattle industry. He had started in the cattle business while in East Texas back in 1854. Here, for three consecutive years he had trailed his herds to Shreveport and seen them shipped by steamboat up and down the Mississippi. But more grazing room was needed and for the past four years Chisum had turned his extensive herd of longhorns loose on the open range of the West Texas Concho country. He was conceded as being the first cattleman in that region.

He is said to have left the Concho to R. F. Tankersley, a distant neighbor since 1864, when he decided to move closer to a market at Fort Sumner. His trail led west from the lush regions of the Concho river, through the lands of the mesquite and pear south of the Llano Estacado and on to the Horsehead Crossing of the Pecos before it swung northward.

But the railroads were pushing westward, and within two years after his final move Chisum was driving cattle to Abilene and then Dodge City, Kansas, as well as west to Tucson, to San Carlos Apache reservation in Arizona, and to the Gila River. 


